Tidbits

Lewis pretrial hearing continued until May

Michael Lewis, who was due for a pretrial hearing April 5, was granted a continuance by Thayer County District Judge Vicky Johnson until May 7 at 9:45 a.m.

Lewis, is charged with use of a firearm to commit a felony and first degree assault in the shooting of Reuben Elting in Hebron Oct. 27. Elting survived his injuries, however, his brother, Remington did not.

Lewis has not been charged in Remington Elting's death. Thayer County Attorney Dan Werner said he is waiting on more information from the Nebraska Attorney General's Office.

There are eight NSP investigators involved and future decisions will be based on a comprehensive review of the reports, Werner added.

Two priests who served in area on diocese list

Father Clarence Crowley, who served at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Hebron and Father John Copeland, who was at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Alexandria, are part of the Lincoln Diocese initial list against whom substantiated allegations of childhood sexual abuse have been reported.

Crowley died in 1986. Copeland retired in 2012, and had faculties revoked and with a restriction on public ministry in 2012.

The Lincoln Diocese announced three new actions April 2 in its continuing effort to address abuse.

The actions include the adoption of comprehensive new safe environment policies; a list of diocesan priests who had substantiated allegations; and an investigation into misconduct by deceased priest Monsignor Leonard Kalin.

Volunteer legacy celebrates its first million

"It's called Things and Stuff on Hebron's main street,

"It's packed with bargains that can't be beat (that are mighty sweet)."

In March of 1967, a new hospital was under construction, and members of the Hospital Guild documented, "the need would be great," in its minutes: "It was decided to have a county wide rummage sale in Hebron. Mrs. Penry was appointed Chairman, her Committee, Mrs. W.E. Baker, Mrs. Jim Johnson and Mrs. M.L. Christensen. Mrs. Penry named the operation "Things and Stuff" and the sale continued throughout July and August."

Fifty-two years later, the Thayer County Health Services Guild is celebrating a \$1 million milestone and preparing itself for the second million while Things and Stuff thrives, and annual fundraisers provide the Guild opportunities to purchase equipment and other necessities for the hospital.

Its humble beginnings on a Friday afternoon in the spring of 1950 started with gathering reading materials for patients, mending hospital linens and canning garden vegetables. In 1950, the hospital

was located in the former women's dormitory of the Hebron Academy.

The ladies who met to form the Guild decided to meet four times a year and committees were assigned. The first president was Eleanor Saylor.

At the second meeting in July, 31 ladies came, some from the towns of Chester, Bruning, Belvidere and Hubbell, and mending topped the volunteer list of things to do.

According to the minutes of the October meeting, the Belvidere ladies hemmed 75 towels and the canning committee reported 258 quarts of vegetables in donated jars had been sealed.

At that same meeting, H.L. Nacke explained there was a bond proposal for taxpayers to assume the hospital's debt.

The volunteers pressed on, creating tray covers for special dates and holidays, and paying \$6.50 for children's gowns.

While the ladies kept hemming, the Guild began funding larger needs for the hospital, and answered emergency calls for assistance at the hospital as the 1953 tornado wreaked havoc. The Hebron Lions Club also stepped up with an emergency generator

The American Legion officially turned 100 years old March 15, and at Deshler Post 353, a birthday banquet was in progress last month with Marvin Baden, Steve Harms, Keith Hintz, Mike Isernhagen and Norman Sorge receiving 50-year membership pins after the flags were in place and the hand salute.

As editor Amanda Washburn wrote in *The Nebraska Legionnaire*, the first 100 years demonstrated the Legion's outreach for veterans and their families, the na-

tion's youth and local communities.

Washburn wrote:

"The American Legion was born out of Lt. Col. Teddy Roosevelt Jr.'s idea to start a veterans organization after the first world war. Roosevelt convinced 20 officers to join him for dinner to plan the well-known Paris Caucus.


"This caucus was held March 15-17, 1919. The caucus then planned to hold another caucus in America.

"The St. Louis Caucus was then held in May 1919 to adopt the official name, "The American

Legion," a preamble and constitution. The American Legion was chartered by Congress as the only war-time veterans service organization on Sept. 16, 1919."

Honoring youth is a large part of the Legion's activities — there is an Eagle Scout of the Year; approximately 400 young men are sent to Boys' State (the Legion Auxiliary sends girls to Girls' State) to learn about the government process; selected applicants attend the Junior Law Cadet Program; an annual

Circle of Friends is all about kindness

Autism Awareness has its own day and month of the year with World Autism Day April 2 and the month of April focused on the disorder — there is no cure and the cause is unknown, according to Autism Action Partnership, which also states researchers have noticed an increase in the autistic population.

As sponsor of the autism awareness group at Thayer Central, Laurie Fischer said elementary students have also formed a Circle Of Friends, the "Peer Mediated Intervention," where members use actions and words as positive intervention for autistic students.

"There is much more information on autism now than there was five years ago," Fischer said about when the school's COF was formed.

"There were less than 50 schools in Nebraska with this program," Fischer explained. "Now, there are over 250 schools with a Circle of Friends program."

From April 1 to April 5 this year, COF members at Thayer Central asked for behavioral interventions from their peers to act on Autism Awareness by showing patience and kindness toward students on the Autism Spectrum, defined as the variety of ways people are uniquely affected by autism.

"They may not use their voice to speak, they may have regimented sensory diets, and may enjoy spending their time at home or in recreational programs as an adult. Everyone's symptoms of autism are different," Autism Action Partnership provides.

"Ask them if they have a like such as a favorite TV show or movie. Ask them a question that needs more than a 'Yes' or 'No' answer like: 'Tell me about a favorite show you like and why,'" Thayer Central COF requested of its student community on the second day of awareness week.

Additional interventions were to invite autistic students to athletic activities and although they might not understand the rules, consistent invites were emphasized as well as compliments and communication.

"Reach out to them, include them, be considerate to them and always think of how you can help them overcome some of their social shyness," was the awareness tip of the day, April 5.

Circle of Friends take positive intervention deeds a step further by accepting nominations from peers and school staff for random acts of kindness they witnessed.

"You see I have a counter full of nominations ready to go," Fischer said, holding up decorated brown paper bags with treats inside for nominees. "I even have people from outside the school who nominate someone in the school."

It could be COF has earned its own reward through random kindness and gentle interventions. This year, the group will donate \$300 to Wood River schools from proceeds earned while members raised awareness for autism.

Wood River was underwater from widespread flooding in March. Residents were evacuated from their homes and the river hadn't crested as townspeople piled sandbags in nearby Alda.

On being arraigned, he pleaded guilty, and was fined \$250 and costs, which he at once paid, increasing the county school fund to that amount. The accused claims to be a cousin to the notorious James brothers, who were the terrors of Missouri a number of year ago. He is said to have boasted that no officer could take him into custody. His easy arrest and prompt payment of the fine is just what might have been expected from a boaster. He has perhaps arrived at the

Consolidation of the Deshler State Bank with the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Deshler was announced by Examiner H. V. Davis of the state department of trade and commerce.

People drove long distances to attend the sale of the Jos. Lamb acreages Tuesday. Prices ranged from \$28 per acre for rough land, to \$105. These are not representative of Thayer County values, as under normal business conditions, the land should bring a higher price.

The Gilead State Bank failed to open its doors Monday. The board of directors voted Saturday to request the banking department to take charge. The capital stock is \$20,000 and the deposits about \$200,000. Too much real estate and slow paper are causes assigned for failure. Withdrawals of deposits within the past 10 days have been more than \$50,000. With the bank closing at this time, the management feels that the loss to depositors will be small.

80 Years Ago

The request of the Hebron city council for a P.W.A. grant, to finance the arching of canal street and also for additional paving in the city, has been approved by the government. The amount to be spent for these improvements will exceed \$125,000.

Elmer Yost, 45, of Chester, lost his life in a fire at the home of his brother, Carl

Yost, in Hebron, about 7 o'clock last Friday morning. Carl Yost arose at about 6 o'clock, started the fire in the wood-burning furnace and went upstairs to shave. Within five minutes Mrs. Yost opened her eyes and saw the flames from the basement enveloping the stairway. Mr. Carl Yost came down through the flames. The girls, Helen Beryl and Pauline, in their night clothes escaped through a window on the north porch, where firemen found them and carried them to a neighbor's house. Meanwhile, Carl had shouted warnings to his daughters and called to his brother Elmer, who sat on the side of the bed dressing, and had put on his underwear, socks and shoes. Helen ran shouting to his door, and Elmer answered, "Yes, I'm up---and I'll be there." Helen turned to find her sister, who had run to the burning closet to get clothes, and she stood half paralyzed until aroused by her sister's scream. Probably a few more seconds and she might have succumbed! Carl Yost started up a ladder towards his brother's room, but a burst of flame drove him down, and he called to firemen to pour a stream of water in to the other window in the same room. Later the firemen found Elmer's body on the floor beside the bed, death having apparently come through suffocation. Mrs. Carl Yost's bare feet were frozen in the snow, and Helen Beryl's burns were treated at the hospital for several days. Many friends proffered assistance, and the afflicted family found refuge in the Cora Worth apartments. The Yost household goods were a total loss. The residence, owned by Mr. Yost's aunt, Mrs. Pet Wilcox of Hubbell, was ruined, with insurance of \$2,000.







for the hospital. As a salad master, window air conditioner, drinking fountain and a few lawn chairs were purchased by the Guild in 1954. It was also decided the Guild would research a plan to facilitate loans for girls who planned to pursue careers in nursing.

In 1957, the Guild recorded purchases and projects to provide surgical instruments, a portable X-ray machine, 14 electric fans among other items.

Jump ahead three years, and members of the Guild acknowledged their mission had changed:

"Many disposable and pre-sterilized supplies were becoming available, and had proven practical from the standpoint of economy and patient safety. Sewing and mending was becoming less of a problem, and hospitals were being advised not to use home canned garden products."

The volunteers decided they would amend the Guild's constitution and officially call themselves, "The Guild Council of Thayer County Memorial Hospital." Members were encouraged to be active in the idea of a new hospital.

Mrs. Dale Hinrichs of Bruning was elected president in 1966. She appointed a representative from each town in the county to help the hospital planning committee with mailings. Guild members were nudged to vote for the new facility in the upcoming election.

The hospital voted in and under construction by 1967, the Guild had already discussed furnishing its new lobbies.

"The need would be great" project showed the rummage sale profit at \$1,197.89. In the same year, the Guild proposed they decorate a large Cedar tree at the old hospital with Christmas lights in memory or honor of

his loved one. Each light was a donation, and the "beautiful" tree was officially named, "Lights of Love," and its first fundraiser made just over \$1,000.

In 1968-1969, the Guild's purchases included 30 trees for the grounds, drapes for the lobbies and office, ash trays, medical filing cabinets, a riding lawn mower and a wheel chair. The ladies also kept up with the candy strippers by forming a committee and purchasing uniforms.

By 1974, Things and Stuff "had become a major source of income, and was open each week throughout the year, on Thursdays from nine to nine," according to the minutes.

Guild member, Carol Krueger, said the shop was on top of the former bank at 4th and Lincoln Streets.

"They hauled everything up and down 30 steps," Krueger said.

In 1979, however, the Guild looked for new opportunities to fundraise. Medical equipment was constantly being updated. The furniture the volunteers had purchased for the hospital needed repair. And Guild members were zeroing in on the hospital's latest need, an X-ray unit.

"Things and Stuff, Lights of Love and the gift shop income would not suffice, and many new projects were being discussed," they recorded in the minutes.

A quilt raffle began in 1980 and raised \$335. Two years later, a food sale was held, cookbooks sold, and a Things and Stuff sale was held at the VFW.

Meanwhile, the Guild's purchases had expanded—a Narco-Medical Infant Care System, an Infant resuscitator and a Flame Photometer were just three of the many items members provided.

They held special events, like the Autumn Tour of

Homes and Salad Luncheon and Style Show. Memorials to the Guild were also coming in.

Volunteers helped at food stands, Bingo fundraisers, at the golf course for the celebrity tournament and recycled aluminum, newspapers and glass.

By 1989, Things and Stuff was bringing in thousands with a tally of \$20,532.90 that year.

"You have come a long way, ladies!" Stan Clouse told them in the 90s. Clouse was the vice president for the Lutheran Homes.

Last year, Things and Stuff brought \$53,336.21 for medical equipment, along with \$2,500 from the quilt raffle, bake sale and Lights of Love.

Today, Guild members are more ambitious than ever, voluntarily serving over 150 hours throughout the year helping with blood drives, Women's Health Night, mass flu clinic and the county fair.

At Things and Stuff, the hours multiply to 7,300 hours collectively between helping folks make purchases and sorting items for the store.

Last year, the Guild contributed \$25,000 to the Cattlemen's Ball and pledged another \$20,000 for a new medical transport.

Over time, members also developed their own scholarship program and each year, the Guild provides \$1,000 to students pursuing a medical degree.

"Keep bringing gently used items to our donation box,

"It could be tops, pants, scrubs, shoes or socks.

"Even plates, knickknacks or an out of tune fiddle,

"We'll sell 'em out buy equipment for the hospital.

"This coming April, you will hear cheers and hollers.

"As we celebrate the milestone of raising one million dollars."

Each January, a law enforcement officer and firefighter/EMS personnel from Nebraska are recognized for their hard work and selfless bravery while performing their duties. Each June, one elementary, middle and high school teacher from Nebraska are recognized for their hard work and dedication to teaching our state's youth and promoting patriotism," Washburn wrote.

Hebron Saxton Post 180

On July 5, 1918, the *Hebron Register Champion* ran an article on Leo Saxton of Belvidere as the first World War I casualty from Thayer County.

He "Died at His Gun Like a True Soldier After Taking a Heavy Toll of Huns" read the sub-headline.

An officer gave the details: "On the night of June 7, my platoon, a part of E company, advanced against a town held by the Germans, took it and advanced beyond.

"Your son I had given a responsible position as automatic rifleman because of

his proven ability as a soldier. He died at his gun like a true soldier after having given the Germans a big taste of hell for two hours." (*From Thayer County Museum Archives*)

Private Leo D. Saxton, Co. E 30th U.S. Infantry Regiment American Expeditionary Forces, was 25 years old at the time of his death. Approximately two months before, he wrote home from "Somewhere in France," and the letter was published in the newspaper:

"Hello, well I have arrived and am feeling fine. I was a little sea-sick for a couple of days. We got six meals a day — three going down and three coming up.

"This sure is a pretty looking country around this camp. It is not as cold here as I thought it would be. The pastures are all green and flowers in bloom.

"We have barracks here to sleep in. I suppose you got the card I wrote before I left America. It was to be sent when I landed over seas. I can't imagine that I am so far away. I sure have seen a lot of new and funny sights, the railroad engines and cars here are about one third as big as those in America.

"Have any of the fellows from around home come across yet?

"We are not allowed to write anything pertaining to military affairs. I would like to tell you some of the places I have been, but I can't do that. I hope I will be able to tell you about it some day.

"You want to tell all the kids around home to write. I haven't had a letter for about a month.

"Did you get the pictures I sent you while we were on the boat? They gave us a can of Velvet, a package of Bill Durham and two packages of cigarettes.

"We have to use foreign money over here. I don't know one piece from another.

"Well I guess I will have to close for now." (*Thayer County Museum Archives*)

An early photograph of the Saxton Post shows the members in uniform with the following officers and members in the front row: S.W. Beck, vice commander; George E. McLaughlin, chaplain; Lloyd Cannon; Manford Templin; Walter J. Werner; George J. Landkammer; Walter Powell; H.A. Morris, post commander; and H.E. Tibbits.

According to a District 11 membership analysis, membership in Thayer County reached 242 with 24 in Bruning; 73 in Hebron; 15 in Alexandria; 8 in Byron; 17 each in Hubbell and Carleton; 25 in Davenport; and 63 in Deshler. Membership as of Jan. 31 of this year was at 193 with 250 members as the goal.

Total members for District 11, which includes Fillmore, Gage, Jefferson, Saline, York and Thayer counties was 1,987 as of Jan. 31 as compared to the 2018 tally of 2,256.

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Chatting with Babies

Do you feel uneasy about talking with a baby because you fear they can't understand what you're saying? Fear not, as brain research shows us that talking with infants is important in helping their brains develop, and in learning about language and communication, all before they can really understand the meaning of the words being said.

The more adults speak with infants the more neural connections, or synapses, are formed. These connections need to be strengthened by repeated exposure to listening to language or else the brain will prune away the unused connections. Use it or lose it is the phrase to remember. Here are some ideas for making the most of time spent chatting with an infant:

1) Talk about the baby's actions as they move. "Oh, I see you are crawling right along. Soon you will reach me!"

2) Verbalize feelings. Put their feelings into words to help them learn to label what they are feeling and later when they begin to speak to use words to describe their emotions. "Something has made you angry because you are all red in the face and crying." "You look so happy with that big smile on your face. You really like your stuffed toy don't you?"

3) Provide guidance to help babies achieve something. "I can see you want that toy by your blanket. You can reach out your arm and grab it."

4) Build positive relationships with the baby. The best way to do this is to use "serve and return" interactions with the child. When an infant cries, babbles, or coos you can respond with an action or words that let them know they have been heard. For example when a baby says, "Baa!" You can repeat that sound "Baa!" This simple "serve and return" interaction helps build the child's brain and puts in place a strong base for future learning. Some other tips for building on serve-and-return interactions are to: notice what the child is looking at; notice facial expressions; offer comfort and hugs when needed; take turns talking being sure to wait for the child to respond; and practice noticing when the child is ready to move on or end the activity.

When you take the time to converse with infants,



speaking to them, then stopping to listen to them, and then speaking again, this is demonstrating how communication works. It also helps parents and providers build strong attachments with infants, something which is crucial for all infants to survive and thrive. Infants who have at least one strong, secure attachment with a caring adult, will be more successful at building and learning skills that will help them throughout their lives such as self-regulation and academic achievement.

By taking small moments of time throughout the day to chat with your baby you are building your child's brain and setting them up for a lifetime of learning and acquiring skills that will help them deal with life's trials and triumphs.


Olive Van de Wal gave the Thought for the Day, Dianne Waldmeier and Jackie Williamson served a special lunch. Next month will be flower planting month.

Getting a bird's eye view...



THE NOXIOUS WEEDS ARE: Musk Thistle, Plumeless Thistle, Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Knapweed (spotted and diffuse), Purple Loosestrife, Saltcedar, Phragmites, Knotweed (Japanese and Giant), and Sericea Lespedeza. **NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THIS 10th DAY OF April, 2019**, pursuant to the Noxious Weed Control Act, section 2-955, subsection 1(a), to every person who owns or controls land in Thayer County, Nebraska, that noxious weeds being grown or growing on such land shall be controlled at such frequency as to prevent establishment, provide eradication, or reduce further propagation or dissemination of such weeds.

Upon failure to observe this notice, the County Weed Superintendent is required to:

1. Proceed pursuant to the law and issue legal notice to the landowner of property infested with noxious weeds and giving such landowner 15 days to control the noxious weed infestation. Conviction for noncompliance may result in a \$100 per day fine to the landowner, with a maximum fine of \$1,500; or

2. Should more immediate control be required, proceed pursuant to the law and have the weeds controlled by such method as he/she finds necessary, the expense of which shall constitute a lien and be entered as a tax against the land, and be collected as other real estate taxes are collected, or by other means as provided by law.

Also the public is notified that noxious weed seed and propagative parts may be disseminated through the movement of machinery and equipment, trucks, grain and seed, hay, straw, nursery stock, fencing materials, sod, manure, and soil as well as articles of similar nature. Methods of treatment have been prescribed by the Director of Agriculture and may be obtained from the county weed control authority.

Durflinger takes plea bargain

Jesse Durflinger, 28, pleaded no contest in March to possession of a controlled substance, a Class IV felony, and on April 2, he was sentenced in Thayer County District Court, following a presentencing investigation.

Durflinger was sentenced to 18 months in prison, along with 12 months of post-release supervision. He received 106 days of time served. He was also ordered to pay \$163.22 in costs, plus additional transportation expenses. Durflinger is allowed

to sit the costs out and will not be released until they are paid.

The court found a lesser sentence would reduce the seriousness of his crime; promote a disrespect for the law; his incarceration is necessary for public safety; he is at risk to commit more crimes; and is in need of correctional treatment.

Possession of a controlled substance calls for up to two years imprisonment, 12 months of post-release supervision and a \$10,000 fine or both.

Blue Valley thrift store closes for second time

The Blue Valley Community Action Partnership closed its Hebron office and thrift store indefinitely because of continuing concerns about the building that houses the office and store.

Blue Valley announced it was closing in March for an architectural firm to analyze the structure, but decided to reopen.

The organization is now closed and searching for

a temporary location in Hebron while administrators determine a course of action for the future and remain committed to a physical location in Thayer County.
