## Rugby in Hebron Sunday

Hebron will welcome a women's collegiate Rugby exhibition double-header April 17.

Four-time national champion, Wayne State will face Central Missouri and Chadron State. The event begins at 2 p.m., on the Thayer Central football field.

Students in kindergarten through 12th grade will be admitted free.

After the games, Wayne State players will host a free youth rugby camp for 45 minutes for grades kindergarten through 12.

As an extra bonus, two Thayer Central alumni — Jasmine Kovacs and Maddie Reece will show their fieldwork. Kovacs is on the Wayne State team and Reece is the captain of the Chadron team.

Rugby is a fast-moving, rough game with close contact.

"You are up close and personal with your teammates and the opposing team," Reece said.

She is a scrum half for her team, which is like a quarterback on a football team.

Kovacs is also a scrum half, and recently, she and Reece faced each other on the field for a March Madness tournament last weekend.

About 90 teams were there, Reece said.

The Wayne State Wildcats have qualified for the national competition again this year and they will travel to Charlotte, N.C., in early May to defend their title.

Chadron went 2-2 in qualifying play. The team lost only one game this season.

Kovacs started playing her freshman year. She said it sounded exciting.

"At orientation four years ago, one of the girls just grabbed me and told me to go to practice," Kovacs said.

Reece also started as a freshman. "My cousin played and I didn't want to play college sports. Rugby was a good option and I just stuck with it," she said.

## Hog permit approved

The Thayer County Commissioners approved a permit for Pawnee Ridge to expand its number of animal units from 1,750 to 3,500.

The approval of the conditional use permit is pending Pawnee Ridge's application with the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.

The Thayer County Zoning and Planning Commission had held a hearing March 10 to make a recommendation to the commissioners.

An Odor Footprint analysis was reviewed at the meeting, but didn't have an impact as the commission moved to approve the permit; however, the commission is recommending Pawnee Ridge fence its new composting facility to try and control predators.

Earlier, the county commissioners had been asked to consider the water needed for the facility.

While the commissioners understand the legitimate concerns, they do not regulate water, Commissioner Dave Bruning said.

It is the Natural Resource District that would regulate a new well, however, Pawnee Ridge's well is thought to be under the limit of 50 gallons.

Bruning said the commissioners are not able to pass a resolution to restrict wells because Pawnee Ridge's application is already in place.

"We would have had to do something before they applied," Bruning said.

According to the application, Pawnee Ridge will add a gilt developer barn, gestation barn and 480 furrow crates.

## Catching autism early on is best

Melody Lindsey of Chester began educating herself on autism when she first learned her son was functioning on the high end of the autism spectrum.

"He was diagnosed with Asperger's. The pediatrician thought he had ADD or ADHD," Lindsey said about her son, Robert, who is a senior at Thayer Central this year.

The acronyms stand for Attention Deficit Disorder and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder.

Children who have been diagnosed with ADD or ADHD may be autistic, Lindsey said.

It was the preschool teacher who first thought Robert was autistic. He was three years old, and the family lived in Alaska.

"Once you know, start the help right away," Lindsey advised parents.

Under a doctor's suggestion, Lindsey had Robert in speech and occupational therapy. He learned typing in the first grade because his writing coordination lacked.

Lindsey said she used constant repetition and a lot of patience.

"I've worked with him all his life," she said.

She said autistic children don't respond to traditional discipline. Time outs helped Lindsey because she could explain to Robert what he did wrong.

"Some days are very trying," Lindsey said.

Autistic children will typically hone in on something they like. For Robert, it was heavy construction equipment. He also liked movies,

so Lindsey brought out Bob the Builder to give his interest meaning.

"He went from dump trucks to Pokemon cards," Lindsey said. "He can tell you every Pokemon card ever made."

But his social life was a different story.

"Socially, autistic kids struggle," Lindsey said. "He was bullied."

Robert tells others with autism to keep their heads high.

"It will honestly get better if you get the help you need," he said. "My mom caught me very early, but I have met kids on the lower end. I feel lucky."

Robert said he made friends with an autistic student, who has a hard time with other students.

"No one ever talked to him. It was a little upsetting," he said.

Lindsey said Robert also had an excellent resource teacher who recognized his needs. She had gum and rubber balls for Robert to squeeze to relieve his anxiety.

Robert is no longer bullied. He stands 6 feet, 5 inches.

Life changed when the family moved from Anchorage, Alaska, to Chester about three years ago.


"Robert has adapted here really well," Lindsey said.

He has been on the track and football teams for three years and wrestled for one year.

"The kids here took him in," Lindsey said. "We've had no problems."

And now, Robert's journey will soon take a new path. He is planning to attend Central Community College in Hastings this fall.

"I have always advocated for him. Now he has to advocate for

himself," his mother explained. Essentially, Robert has taken the lead for two years.

"Robert doesn't feel like he's different — he knows he is different," Lindsey said.

She once met a doctor with Asperger's.

"Don't stop your children from who they want to be — they can do it," she said.

Robert is thinking of majoring in computer science, but he said there is a lot out there for him to explore.

Lindsey has a plethora of information for parents of autistic children and said she would be glad to share her experience and talk to parents.

"You have to kind of crawl into their head," she said about autistic children.

Hebron freshman, Jay Cottam, undecided, continues his favorite pastime at a higher level. Cottam is a varsity member of the UNK Men's Golf Team. Coach Wesley Bernt took notice of Cottam during Cottam's sophomore year playing at Nebraska State Golf where he earned second place in Class D.

Cottam said his dad, grandpa and an uncle all play golf. He said, "I really gained an interest in golf from my dad. I used to always go out to the course with him when I was little, and he's the reason I am where I'm at today. He's put more effort into my golf game than his own, and I owe a lot of my success to him."

Cottam had been instilled with a great work ethic from day one and has maintained the habit. Bernt said, "Cottam has a great work ethic. He is always on the course practicing. He shows leadership by getting other kids out onto the course for extra practice."

Cottam is not sure when he officially started playing golf, but he said there are pictures of him swinging a club when he was just a few years old. While he had started playing golf for fun, he began to take a serious interest in golf when he was on his high

school team. Cottam attributes his early success to having confidence in competing at a higher level.

Bernt said time management is the greatest challenge for incoming freshman.

Cottam agreed managing time can be tough when you are a full-time student, working, as well as an athlete. "It can be tough at times, but I always try to prioritize school before golf, even though it may be hard at times," he said. He tries to get his schoolwork done ahead of time so he can spend more time on the course practicing. On some days,

Cottam will spend up to six hours practicing.

"Golf in college is a lot different from high school golf in a variety of ways. College (level) golf courses are longer and tougher than most high school courses I've played. The greens are a lot quicker, but I actually enjoy that part," Cottam said. "The competition is obviously a lot tougher as well because there are a ton of good players in our conference, but that's what makes things fun. It seems like someone new wins every tournament, and in high school you (would) see a lot of the same kids winning tournaments. It's just cool to know how many good players are out there," Cottam said.

While time management is a difficult transition, it is not the only one.

"The biggest transition that I've gone through is adjusting to living on my own and not having my family around. I'm terrible at remembering to do my own laundry and that's something I don't enjoy doing," said Cottam. "Overall, I've just had a lot more responsibilities to take care of on my own and that's probably been the hardest thing to get used to. But it's a great learning experience and has allowed me to become a more mature individual."

## 1886

### 130 Years Ago

Farm work is coming on with a rush.

G. W. Loeber is owner and captain of a new canvass boat.

The snow and last Saturday and Sunday is probably the last appearance of the "beautiful" until next winter.

O. P. Hendershot will soon build a handsome residence on his lots on the corner of Olive Avenue and Seventh Street.

Nathan Beck, who recently arrived here from Tiffin, Ohio, has a complete loom for weaving. He is a thorough weaver by trade and ready to take orders.

The new town north of Thayer County, along the line from DeWitt to Edgar, are respectively named, from the east westward, Ohio, Media and Shickley.

H. E. Garzee has sent from Florida, his resignation as county commissioner from the third commissioner district and M. C. Dill of Belvidere has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Attention is called to the special of Miss Alice Beck in this issue. We are informed she is an artistic dressmaker, and would highly appreciate orders from those needing such work.

A party of C.R.I.&P. R.R. surveyors arrived in Hebron last Friday after having been along the line taking cross-sections. They report it a matter of much difficulty and expense to get to Leland's Mill.

Louis Schieferdecker started Monday night for Lemore, Calif. We hope he will soon accumulate a colossal fortune and return to Hebron to spend it.

The distinguished lady lawyer and lecturer, Belva Lockwood, of Washington, D.C., will speak on "Political and Social Life in Washington," at the opera house in Hebron April 1, and also in the Belvidere opera house April 2. Admission, 35 cts.

The many friends of ex-County Clerk, A. F. Clemons, will learn with surprise and regret of his determination not only to tender his absolute resignation at the next meeting of the County Commissioners, as Clerk of the District Court, but of his intention to remove at once from the county.

## 1896

### 120 Years Ago

J. P. Rosebaum of Harvard was in the city this week looking after his business interests.

Last night someone entered Mrs. Robinson's barn in the eastern part of the city and stole the top buggy therefrom; also a black goatskin lap robe. \$25 reward is offered for the return of the property and conviction of the thief.

Wednesday evening about 8 o'clock a man was seen hanging around the premises on the farm where Sam Wolf lives, but when an attempt was made to approach him, he dodged behind some of the buildings and refused to answer when asked what was wanted. Mr. Wolf went to the house and got a revolver and returned to the barn, and the man began to walk around the barn, seemingly to draw him on, and when he started around the northwest corner of the barn, he found the man had turned and drawn a gun. Mr. Wolf dodged back and threw up his right hand just as the man fired, and the charge that was evidently intended for his heart, struck his wrist, causing him to drop his revolver. He remembers nothing of what happened till he got to the house and cannot tell

which way the man ran. Mr. Wolf thought the man used a revolver, but a gun wad was found in his coat sleeve and the doctor thinks it looks like a shot gun wound. It is feared his hand will have to be amputated as the bones were completely shattered, almost tearing his hand off. Since moving on the farm a few weeks ago, Mr. Wolf has been driving to town in the morning to run the elevator as usual. Wednesday a man was seen by several citizens hanging around the elevator, and it is supposed that he followed Mr. Wolf home in the evening, as it is thought to be the same bum that set fire to Mr. Wolf's house here in town last week, evidently no knowing at the time that they had moved out a week or so before. No trace of the fellow has been found. Later...Dr. Stutzman and Dr. Snowden amputated Mr. Wolf's hand just above the wrist yesterday and he is doing as well as could be expected. It is thought by some that the shooting was not done by a tramp.

Rev. Morgan Morgans closed a very successful series of meetings at the Christian Church last Sunday night with 43 additions.

Dan Webb and family, who recently came from Minnesota, have looked Thayer County and part of Kansas over and at last located in Hebron.

Dr. O. I. Latta returned from Lincoln, Tuesday, where she has been taking post graduate course at Cotner University, and is now prepared to respond to professional calls.

Hebron probably has the oldest voter in the county. At the election Tuesday, Mr. Houghton, who is 95 year old, cast his ballot.

Tuesday was election day and was marked by a severe dust storm which lasted all day, gradually growing worse until night, when the wind subsided. The election was unusually quiet. Notwithstanding the very unpleasant weather, a large number of ladies availed themselves of the opportunity to vote on the school question. The temperance element elected six and the saloon element five candidates.

Chester: Dr. Mosshart is up with the times in his profession. We understand he is administering Dr. Edson's new consumption cure, "Aseptolin," to one of his patients... Mrs. Morris Burch died of typho-pneumonia, on March 24, at her home near Tarkio, Mo. Mrs. Burch was Anna Leebode before marriage and most of her life was spent near Chester.

Belvidere: Miss Saunders, the state organizer of the good Templars, organized a lodge here Saturday night with about 20 members.

Belle Prairie: Wake up! Wake up! What are you going to do about having preaching at the school house? It is time you were taking the matter over...another son, by jinks, is what makes that broad smile on Herb Brown's face and causes him to hold his head at an angle of 45 degrees. One day last week we counted from where we were at work, 23 teams at work, which speaks as to what our farmers are doing at present.

## Autism Awareness Month

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a neurological and developmental disorder that begins early in childhood and lasts throughout a person's life. It affects how a person acts and interacts with others, communicates and learns.

It includes what used to be known as Asperger syndrome and pervasive developmental disorders.

According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), Autism affects one out of every 68 children in America. It is about 4.5 times more common among boys (1 in 42) than among girls (1 in 189). Most people with autism will always have some trouble relating to others. But early diagnosis and treatment have helped more and more people who have autism to reach their full potential.

Strides are being made in improving the lives of those living with autism because health care professionals are doing a better job of detecting the disorder early, parents are getting their children more promising treatments, and autistic children are getting the support they need in school. It is also now illegal for insurance companies to deny health insurance to people with autism.

There is no cure for autism. Therapies and behavioral interventions are designed to remedy specific symptoms and can bring about substantial improvement. The ideal treatment plan coordinates therapies and interventions that target the core symptoms of autism: impaired social interaction, problems with verbal and nonverbal communication, and obsessive or repetitive routines and interests. Most professionals agree that the earlier the intervention, the better.

False claims in the news have made some parents con-

cerned about a link between autism and vaccines. But studies have found no link between vaccines and autism. It's important to make sure that your child gets all childhood vaccines. They help keep your child from getting serious diseases that can cause harm or even death.

Autism tends to run in families, so experts think it may be something that you inherit. Scientists are trying to find out exactly which genes may be responsible for passing down autism in families.

Symptoms almost always start before a child is three years old. Usually, parents first notice that their toddler has not started talking yet and is not acting like other children the same age. But it is not unusual for a child with autism to start to talk at the same time as other children the same age, then lose his or her language skills. Symptoms of autism include:

• A delay in learning to talk, or not talking at all. A child may seem to be deaf, even though hearing tests are normal.

• Repeated and overused types of behavior, interests, and play. Examples include repeated body rocking, unusual attachments to objects, and getting very upset when routines change.

• There is no "typical" person with autism. People can have many different kinds of behaviors, from mild to severe. Parents often say that their child with autism prefers to play alone and does not make eye contact with other people.




## Students shoot Hoops for Heart
