Alexandria man arrested after shots fired

Man incarcerated with five charges...

On Monday, April 13, the Thayer County Sheriff's Office arrested Jesse Durflinger, 24, of Alexandria, after a 911 call was made regarding an incident in which the caller and the suspect were involved.

Around 6:30 p.m., a male caller reported having an altercation with his son, Durflinger.

The 24-year-old reportedly fired a weapon during the incident then fled the residence, taking the weapon with him.

The Nebraska State Patrol responded to assist.

They offered the service of

their Air Wing and a K9 unit. The Alexandria man was taken into custody at approximately 7:45 p.m.

He was found about one mile south of Alexandria in a field.

He was arrested without incident and lodged in the Thayer County Jail with five charges:

- 1) use of a weapon to commit a felony
- 2) terroristic threats,
- 3) obstructing an officer,
- 4) assault
- 5) possession of drug paraphilia



School board continues construction research

At last Thursday's facility meeting, the Thayer Central school board listened to presentations by representative of Ayars and Ayars, Inc. of Omaha and JEO Consulting of Wahoo regarding construction methods. While Ayars and Ayars prefers design/build, JEO focused more on design-bid-build though they implemented all three methods (the third method is construction management).

Design/build is the construction method in which the design and construction services are combined into one contract. Design-bid-build is a method in which the design and construction are separate roles and contracts.

Though they had scheduled to pass a resolution as to which method they would like to pursue at Monday evening's board meeting, the board chose to table the decision so they could continue their research on the best fit method for the school.



City council passes non-smoking resolution

At the April meeting, the Hebron city council approved a tobacco-free policy for city-owned outdoor recreational facilities.

Several students from Thayer Central presented the resolution to council members. Rachel Heitmann, senior at Thayer Central and speaker for the group, outlined the benefits of establishing a tobacco-free policy including the health and role modeling benefits.

Outdoor recreational facilities in which tobacco use will be prohibited include Roosevelt Park, Willard Park, Hebron Sports and Recreation Complex, Hebron Walking Trail, Hebron Municipal Pool and the Arboretum. This will include restrooms, parking lots, and spectator and concession areas.

Tobacco products include e-cigarette products, cigars, smokeless tobacco, cigarillos, cigarettes, snus and snuff.

The resolution is effective immediately upon the date of adoption.

Signs will be posted prominently at each location.

Those who are found violating the policy may be asked to cease tobacco use or to leave the facility premises.

First county all mail election approaching for Chester

Thayer County's first all mail election will be held on May 12 for the Chester bond issue.

All mail elections cannot be used for candidate issues but can be used for bond issues.

According to Marie Rauner, the Thayer County clerk, all mail elections are a growing trend in Nebraska.

"It's usually a higher voter turnout," said Rauner. "The costs are comparable or lower than having polls and poll workers."

Ballots will be mailed out April 24 and will need to be returned by May 12 by 5 p.m.

Ballots can also be personally brought in. Voters are allowed to bring in their own ballot as well as the ballots for two other people.

"We will be putting up the drop box again," said Rauner.

Signatures will be compared to signatures on file to help prevent fraud.

Ballots will be put in a locked ballot box until the polls close.

The total cost will be figured after the election.

The final date to register to vote is May 1 until 6 p.m.

All regular notices will be posted for the election.

Davenport community installs new playground equipment...

New public playground equipment was installed in the Davenport park on Saturday, March 28. As soon as the weather is dry, a timber border will be constructed around the equipment and filled with a rubber mulch. This park project is the first phase of an ongoing, two-phase fundraising effort lead by the Davenport Community Foundation. The playground equipment totaled about \$76,000. The second phase of the fundraiser includes constructing a new clinic building adjacent to the current one then renovating the existing clinic building into a wellness center. The Foundation continues to work to raise the remaining \$108,000 for the clinic and wellness center addition. The Foundation's goal to complete both the playground and clinic/wellness center is \$360,000. All donations are tax-deductible and may be pledged over time. The new playground is already a huge hit with many youngsters, families and visitors in Davenport.

People should be very careful in setting out prairie fires. This is the season of the year the wind is liable to blow without much warning and great damage can be done.

Attention is called to the new advertisement of the Hebron Hotel. Foreman & ring proprietors, T. Foreman, manager. This hotel has recently been enlarged, refitted and refurbished and now affords excellent accommodations.

Temperance in Thayer County triumphs. On Tuesday, Hebron elected an anti-license board by an average majority of 12; Chester by 12 and Hubbell by 3. We have not heard from Alexandria yet.

The name of Harbine post office has been changed to Byron, Thayer County, Neb.

1905

110 Years Ago

John Lund, of Stoddard precinct, left Wednesday with a car of household goods for his new home at Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada.

The "wets" drowned the "drys" Tuesday, and in consequence of the democratic victory Hebron will have saloons another year.

An unusual sight was that of a fall of snow on Wednesday afternoon, April 5, and it recalled to minds of the old settlers the memorable blizzard of April 14-16, 1873, when a man froze to death near the old R. Walker farm, southwest of Hebron. His body was found on the 16th and brought to town and laid in the old cottonwood schoolhouse, which stood on the lot where the Journal office now stands, until the family took

charge of the body.

F. Foster brought over a number of witnesses from Alexandria Wednesday to prove up on the homestead on which he had lived for about 25 years. A rare occurrence.

100 Years Ago

1925

90 Years Ago

Professor M. Payson and his student singers, a mixed chorus from the Hebron Academy, returned home triumphant from the four county music contest held at Exeter.

Five glee clubs and four orchestras from five schools participated in the event, the Academy entering a girls glee club and a mixed chorus, the latter taking the prize.

Frank Werner of Alma is assisting in the Huntsman drug store while Frank Huntsman is in California, called by the death of his father. Werner was associated in business here with Frank's father years ago.

Davenport: Carl Heigle sold his barbershop to Jas. Miller of Belvidere. Mary Berkey died at her home after suffering eight weeks from a paralytic stroke.

Belvidere: Frank Williams finished putting up a new wind mill tower and remodeling the wheel of the wind mill on Mrs. Dill's farm where Ralph Ortman lives.

Hebron autoists encountered a new variety of tramp on the highway when a man and woman with a few months old babe, asked for a ride. They were walking from Ft. Worth, Texas, to Hastings, where they said they had relatives. The wife carried the child, while the husband carried a sack of tools. They had been on the road less than two weeks, and had received many "lifts" from autoists.

Deb Kelso, a soldier of the Civil War, died after a brief illness, aged 77 years, ten months and 14 days. He was associated with the early development of the town of Hebron, helping provide the residents with life's necessities by hauling produce from Belvidere, than the nearest railroad station. His two brothers, one in Indiana and the other in Canada have been notified, and no arrangements have been made, as local friends are awaiting word from them.

1935

80 Years Ago

Dan Carey, one of the honored Civil War veterans of our town, is spending the winter in the home of his granddaughter, Mrs. Joe Elliott, and is confined to the home by illness. He has recently been visited by several of his children, also by his brother, John Carey and wife of Lincoln.

Edward Pohlmann, Deshler, was named a member of the Board of Directors of the Southern Nebraska Public Power District at Hastings last Tuesday, formed for promoting the construction of lines for electrification of farms. Twelve counties in this section of the state were represented at the meeting.

Sidney Lewis Wolcott was born at Inavale, Dec. 10, 1910, and died at the University Hospital in Omaha, Feb. 4, 1935, at the age of 24 years, one month and 25 days. The deceased was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Wolcott, and in 1915 came with them to Hebron where he has lived ever since. He attended the Hebron public school, graduating from the high school with the class of 1928. Although physically handicapped from childhood so he could not take an active part in most athletics, he was always intensely interested in all sports. Interment was made in the Pleasant Prairie

Cemetery north of Inavale.

Mrs. Will Sholl received word last week that her son, Bryan Losey, of Detroit, was seriously injured in an apartment house fire. All exits were cut off and he attempted to let himself down from the third story by means of a rope made of sheets. The rope broke and he fell to the pavement below, breaking a number of bones. His condition is critical.

Mrs. Dora M. Schainost has been named educational supervisor for Thayer and Jefferson counties, and as such will hold classes in Hebron and Fairbury, to aid in preparing foreign-born residents for citizenship.

The epidemic of measles and small pox which has overtaken many parts of Thayer County, has not spared Hebron.

The latest census figures for Hebron shows a big increase with a total of 2019 plus 223 at Camp Thayer making a total of 2,242.

Walter Knape of Gilead suffered a broken leg while sawing wood on Friday.

Fay Hosack reports that while working on the Walker Hill, which was cut down eight feet, the rock was blasted out, and they found a quantity of centipedes, scorpions and snakes.

70 Years Ago

The entire nation as well as the rest of the world was shocked about 5 o'clock Thursday afternoon, April 12, to hear that President Franklin D. Roosevelt was dead. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage at his cottage in Warm Springs, Ga. Harry S. Truman was sworn in as president at 6:09 p.m.

Mrs. John Dillie reported a white robin in her yard Saturday afternoon. It was in company with a number of other robins. The bird was entirely white with a yellow breast.


1975

Rumors of the bank's possible closing had circulated throughout the county for a couple of weeks prior to its closing. The bank was owned by the Alexandria State company with J.W. It is also now illegal for insurance companies to deny health insurance to people with autism. The Affordable Care Act contains important provisions for individuals with autism and related conditions.


There is often nothing about how a person with autism looks that sets them apart from other people, but they may communicate, interact, behave, and learn in ways that are different from most other people.

The learning, thinking, and problem-solving abilities of people with autism can range from gifted to severely challenged. Some people with autism need a lot of help in their daily lives; others need less.

Autism begins before the age of three and lasts throughout a person's life, although symptoms may improve over time. Some children with autism show hints of future

National Autism Awareness Month

April is National Autism Awareness Month. This month is a time to raise awareness and educate ourselves on the complex needs of people with autism and their families.

In the US, about one in 68 children is identified with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) according to estimates from the CDC. Autism is almost five times more common among boys (1 in 42) than among girls (1 in 189).

While there is still more to learn about what causes autism and which treatments work best in helping people with autism thrive, researchers are getting closer to finding answers thanks to ongoing autism research.

Studies have shown that one-third to half of parents of children with autism noticed a problem before their child's first birthday, and nearly 80 to 90 percent saw problems by 24 months of age. It is important to note that some people without autism may also have some of these symptoms. But for people with autism, the impairments make life very challenging.

There is no cure for autism. Therapies and behavioral interventions are designed to remedy specific symptoms and can bring about substantial improvement. The ideal treatment plan coordinates therapies and interventions that target the core symptoms of autism: impaired social interaction, problems with verbal and nonverbal communication, and obsessive or repetitive routines and interests.

Most professionals agree that the earlier the intervention, the better.

For many children, autism symptoms improve with treatment and with age. Some children with autism grow up to lead normal or near-normal lives. The key is early detection and developing a good treatment plan. If you have questions regarding autism and your child's development, please make an appointment with your healthcare provider.

How to Successfully Negotiate with Wedding Vendors

The average wedding tends to be one of the most costly ventures in a couple's life together. Many couples seek ways to cut costs, and negotiating with prospective vendors is one way to do just that.

Too often couples overlook haggling for better prices because they may be intimidated by the process or simply want to plan the most memorable day regardless of cost. Many vendors build some wiggle room into their prices, and the key for cost-conscious couples is to find the right strategy to unlock that lower price.

Explore your options. Weddings are big business for vendors, and the competition is stiff. Visit a variety of vendors and compare their services and prices prior to making any decisions. This will give you an accurate range of costs and information for future negotiations. Vendors may be willing to match competitors' prices, so knowing what the photographer down the street charges can provide you with some negotiating leverage.

Dress modestly for meetings. It's tempting to want to dress to impress, but very often wedding vendors judge potential clients by their appearances. If you walk in with a designer handbag and driving the latest model luxury vehicle, a vendor may get the impression you have extra money to spend. While you do not have to play the pauper, dress modestly so your appearance doesn't hurt you at the negotiating table.

Never take the first offer. A good business person will tell you there always is room for negotiation. Avoid the loaded question of "What can you spend on this?" by the vendor. Instead, let them bring up a price first, and realize that this first quote can almost always be negotiated down. Inform the vendor that you would really like to work with them but he or she needs to lower the price. See if they can offer a different package or provide a discount.

Negotiate the big-ticket items first. Discounts on big-ticket items, such as the reception venue, will save you the most money. For example, you will save more by getting 20 percent off at the catering hall than if you save 20 percent on your wedding gown. Once you free up extra money, you may find you don't have to negotiate as hard with smaller vendors.

Walk away if need be. Always have a Plan B in place. This way if you tell a vendor that their price is too expensive and you have to pass, you really have a fall-back option. Some vendors will sweeten the deal, but others will actually let you walk out the door. And remember, you're more likely to get a better price by being amenable and well-mannered than making threats or arguing.

Some deals aren't actual discounts. A vendor may be able to work with you by offering additional services in lieu of actually taking money off of the price tag. Extra photo prints, a dessert bar and an extra hour of time in the limousine may seem like great deals, but that's only the case if you truly need these bonuses. Even if it's a great deal, you're still spending more than you had hoped.

Wedding prices can be overwhelming. However, negotiating for lower prices is always an option for cost-conscious couples.


Petersen said, "I was thrilled to take a leadership role at the FATE conference and especially proud to share the work of our Peru State art major with my colleagues."



ORDINANCES OF A GENERAL AND PERMANENT NATURE OF THE CITY OF HEBRON, NEBRASKA ORDINANCE NO. 853

An ordinance of the City of Hebron, Nebraska revising the general ordinances of the Municipality, repealing prior ordinances in conflict, and providing an effective date.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL
OF HEBRON, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. Codification. The general ordinances of the Municipality of Hebron, Nebraska are hereby codified into eight (8) Titles (I, III, V, VII, IX, XI, XIII and XV), as well as the chapters and sections in those Titles, which provisions are adopted and declared to be ordinances of this Municipality.

Section 2. Repeal of Prior Ordinances in Conflict. All ordinances and parts of ordinances of a general or permanent nature passed and approved prior to the passage and approval of this general codification ordinance and in conflict with this ordinance or with any of the provisions of this ordinance are repealed.

In construing the provisions of this ordinance, the following ordinances shall not be considered or held to be ordinances of a general or permanent nature:

1. Ordinances vacating streets and alleys;

2. Ordinances authorizing or directing public improvements to be made;

3. Ordinances levying taxes or special assessments;

4. Ordinances granting a franchise or special license;

5. Ordinances providing for the issuance of bonds or other instruments of indebtedness;

6. Ordinances establishing grades;

7. Ordinances providing for real estate transactions; and

8. Any other ordinances which by nature would be considered special.

Section 3. Exceptions. The repeal of ordinances as provided in Section 2 of this general codification ordinance shall not affect any rights acquired or fines, penalties, forfeitures, or liabilities incurred pursuant to or actions involving any of the provisions of such ordinances

and parts of such ordinances prior to repeal. The ordinances repealed are hereby continued in force and effect after the passage, approval, and publication of this general codification ordinance for the purpose of all such rights, fines, penalties, forfeitures, liabilities, and actions.

Section 4: Defining Titles, Chapters, and Sections. The titles, chapters and sections described in this ordinance are declared to be the titles, chapters and sections of this general codification ordinance. All ordinances passed after this general codification ordinance by the local Governing Body of the Municipality shall be numbered consecutively, beginning with No. 854.

Section 5. Severability. The provisions of this general codification ordinance are severable. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, term, or provision of this ordinance is declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction for any reason, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance, which portions will remain in full force and effect.

Section 6. Blanket Penalty. Any person or person's agent or servant who violates any of the provisions of this general codification ordinance, unless otherwise specifically provided in this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of an offense and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00). Any person or person's agent or servant who aids, abets, procures, encourages, requests, advises, or incites another to commit any act which is an offense under this general codification ordinance or under any other ordinance of the Municipality may be prosecuted and punished as though he or she were the principal offender.

Section 7. Construction of Titles, Chapters, and Sections. For purposes of construction, each chapter contained and arranged in this general codification ordinance shall be considered as a separate and distinct ordinance grouped for convenience under the General Codification Ordinance No. 853, each section appearing in the several chapters of this general codification ordinance shall be considered a separate and distinct unit of legislation germane to the chapter and title under which it is grouped, and each section appearing in the chapters shall be considered as a group of legislative units germane to the chapter in which it is placed.

Any title, chapter or section duly enacted by the Governing Body of the Municipality and included in this general codification ordinance and any other independent ordinance, chapter, article, section or subsection of an ordinance duly enacted shall be altered, amended, or revised only by the complete repeal of such ordinance, chapter, article, section or subsection and by the substitution of a new ordinance, chapter, article, section or subsection containing the entire ordinance, chapter, article, section or subsection as amended, altered or revised.

Section 8. Publication and Distribution. The Municipal Code was printed in book form under the direction of the Governing Body and shall be distributed as the Governing Body may see fit.

Section 9. When Operative. This general codification ordinance shall be in full force and shall take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
