# Hebron laundromat destroyed by fire

### Community meeting...

The Hebron City Council will hold an informational meeting Monday, April 29, to discuss plans for an upcoming community center project.

Tidbits

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m. and will be held at the Hebron Activity Center.

The City was recently named as a beneficiary under the terms of the Jane Stastny Brinegar Revocable Trust established Oct. 26, 2005. At its April 1 meeting, the Council resolved to accept the inheritance and abide by the terms identified in the trust agreement.

The resolution states that the City of Hebron agrees to accept the trust distribution proceeds and "agrees to use all of said funds so received for the sole purpose of constructing and maintaining a Thayer County Community Center, located in the City of Hebron.'

The resolution states that the City also agreed that the community center "shall be used for the benefit of all residents of Thayer County so that all county residents will have access to a community center where they may meet, celebrate, and enjoy the company of others."

Included in the resolution is that a memorial to Robert T. Stastny and Antonette Stastny be constructed with a picture of both prominently displayed and that the facility will be called "Stastny Community Center."

Although a specific dollar amount has not been released, the Council, in earlier sessions,

The Hebron laundromat, Mr. Bubbles, owned and operated by Merle Hartley, was destroyed Wednesday, April 10, after a fire broke out inside the business. Hebron firefighters found a billowing cloud of gray smoke as they arrived on the scene around 1:30 p.m. The laundromat is located on old Highway 81, or 13th Street, next door to the Casey's store at the corner of Lincoln Ave. The 911 call was made by an employee of Casey's.

According to Thayer County Sheriff David Lee, the blaze was not electrical and was believed to have started near or on a mattress. He said a witness came in contact with an unknown male inside the laundromat about an hour before the fire started. The man was not doing laundry and the witness asked him

to leave the premises.

Hartley said his place of business was most likely destroyed beyond repair. "One half of the building was used as a laundromat and the other half was a used furniture store,7 Hartley said. All the furniture and appliances (washers and dryers) were destroyed. "It won't be good for the people who regularly use it," he said. "They'll have to drive out of town for a laundromat now. I just wanted to provide the town of Hebron with something we don't have."

Sheriff Lee said the department has reason to believe someone is responsible for the blaze although the State Fire Marshal has not yet made an official determination of how the fire was started. The department, however, is actively seeking a man who is approximately 5'9" tall and weighs 160 pounds for questioning. A surveillance photo from the Casey's

store shows he was wearing a dark hood or stocking cap. Also, he was last seen walking west on Jefferson Avenue around the time of the fire.

No one was hurt in the blaze. Hartley said the business's name, Mr. Bubbles, was suggested by his granddaughter at the time of its opening.

If anyone has any additional information, Sheriff Lee asks that they call the local law enforcement center at 402-768-6139.

Topping the agenda was the everpresent dog issue. The city leaders are at a loss as to how to control strays, loose dogs, vicious animals, and the citizens who own them. Several attempts in the way of hiring a dog catcher, creating ordinances and elevating fines have not made as much impact as the council would like to see. Based on repeated complaints from locals, the board has decided to form a committee to investigate the situation and bring recommendations to them at the May meeting.

Nuisance properties, which continue to reappear each month, were also discussed at length. The board added a property located at 220 Jefferson Avenue to the list of watched places and continued hearings for 136 N. 4th St., and 234 S. 5th St.

On another re-emerging issue, Hebron Volunteer Fire Department Chief B.J. Linton told the council the department is considering building an addition to the fire hall.

#### U.S. 81/Highway 136 crash leaves Lincoln woman injured...

A Lincoln woman was hurt Tuesday afternoon, April 9, after being involved in a crash with a semi trailer truck at the intersection of U.S. 81 and Highway 136. According to Thayer County Sheriff David Lee, Mindi Fritton, Lincoln, was traveling west in her 2013 Dodge Journey on Highway 136 when she failed to come to a complete stop at the junction of U.S. 81. Traveling south on U.S. 81, Adolf Neufeld, a semi driver for New Hope Transport in Manitoba, Canada, did not have enough time to avoid a collision as Fritton's vehicle continued its way across the intersection. Fritton told local law enforcement, she did not see the southbound 2013 Peterbilt semi. Hebron rescue workers transported Fritton from the scene to Thayer County Health Services with injuries that were not life threatening. She was held overnight for observation and released Wednesday. The driver of the semi was not hurt.





# **Hintz Travels To Guatemala On Medical Mission Trip**

Over spring break, Kale Hintz, a sophomore from Hebron, traveled along with 11 other Concordia University, Nebraska, students to Zacapa, Guatemala, for a week-long medical mission trip in conjunction with the Central American Lutheran Mission Society (CALMS).

Led by Dr. Jennifer Janousek, director of the Master of Public Health program at Concordia, the group of students traveled with a pediatrician, nurse and dentist to provide necessary medical care for the people of Guatemala. The team visited three villages: QueBrada de Aqua, Roblarcito and San Miguel.

While on the trip, the team hosted medical and dental clinics, taught children and adults about hygiene and nutrition, and held bible studies for children. They also built latrines and stoves in some homes.

Now back in Seward, the team members are readjusting to life in the United States and say they are happy to know they were able to make a difference in the lives of the Guatemalan people.

Student participants' academic majors include premedicine, community health, exercise science, education and behavioral science. The Master of Public Health program at Concordia focuses on the fundamentals of public health, placing emphasis on practical experience through practicum work and mission trips. Based on Christian faith and values, the program prepares graduates to use their knowledge and experience to


improve the state of public health around the world.

Kyle Hintz, on the last day in San Miguel offered the following comments:

'Today was a very successful day for our mission group. We went back to the village that we visited yesterday and continued our medical and mission work. The dental and medical groups worked all day again and work on more latrines continued. I was able to be a dental assistant today and was able to learn a lot about dental work even though there was a slight language barrier with the dentist and I."

"Today will stick in the back of my mind for one reason which was both a life learning lesson and also a sad experience to witness. The situation was that the two dentists in our group were given a cutoff time of 4 p.m. With an hour left there was still a line of 40 plus people and the dentists decided that at 4 p.m., they wouldn't accept any other patients. They worked very diligently to get as many people as they could, with some fantastic assistants if I do say so myself.

Four o'clock rolled around



"As I said before this was both a life lesson and a sad situation. It was sad because there were so many people that needed to be helped but we were not given enough time to assist them all. This was a life lesson for me in the way that the dentist showed compassion towards the little girl. He showed a genuine care for that girl that he was not obligated to help, even if it meant doing one more tooth removal before he could call it a day. Tomorrow we are going to a church service in the morning and then headed to the next village to continue our work."



# NOXIOUS WEEDS MUST BE CONTROLLED YOU ARE REQUIRED TO CONTROL NOXIOUS WEEDS ON YOUR PROPERTY

**THE NOXIOUS WEEDS ARE**: Musk Thistle, Plumeless thistle, Canada Thistle, Leafy Spurge, Knapweed (spotted and diffuse), Purple Loosestrife Saltcedar, Phragmites, Knotweed (Japanese and Giant), and Sericea Lespedeza. **NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THIS 17TH DAY OF APRIL, 2013.** Pursuant to the Noxious Weed Control Act, section 2-955, subsection 1(a), to every person who owns or controls land in Thayer County, Nebraska, that noxious weed being or growing on such land shall be controlled at such frequency as to prevent establishment, provide eradication, or reduce further propagation or dissemination of such weeds.

# Upon failure to observe this notice, the County Weed Superintendent is required to:

1. Proceed pursuant to the law and issue legal notice to the landowner of property infested with noxious weeds and giving such landowner 15 days to control the noxious weed infestation. Conviction for noncompliance may result in a \$100.00 per day fine to the landowner, with a maximum fine of \$1,500; or

2. Should more immediate control be required, proceed pursuant to the law and have the weeds controlled by such method as he/she finds necessary, the expense of which shall constitute a lien and be entered as a tax against the land, and be collected as other real estate taxes are collected, or by other means as provided by law.

Also, the public is notified that noxious weed seed and propagative parts may be disseminated through the movement of machinery and equipment, trucks, grain and seed, hay, straw, nursery stock, fencing materials, sod manure, and soil as well as articles of similar nature. Methods of treatment have been prescribed by the Director of Agriculture and may be obtained from the county weed control authority.
