Multiple Eagles medal in track

The Bruning Davenport Shickley Eagles traveled to Henderson April 12 to participate in the Heartland Invite.

The boys were able to score 30 points and ended up in sixth place in the eight-team mostly class C meet while the girls finished third and scored 88 points.

The boys had a gold medalist when Thomas Mick established a personal best in the pole vault with a leap of 13 feet, 6 inches.

Mick also ran to a sixth place finish in the 100.

Sam Christensen also brought home a pair of medals with a fourth place run in the 110 hurdles and a fifth place leap in the high jump.

Taylor Anderson was fourth in the high jump and Brandon

Anderson fourth in the triple jump as well.

All three relays placed fifth with the team of Brett Holtzen, Kamron Dickson, Taylor Anderson and Kale Smith participating in the 3200 relay, John Christensen, Kale Kleinschmidt, Caden Norder and Brandon Anderson in the 400 relay, and Kendall Dickson, Kale Smith, Stuart Rohr and Noel Gines in the 1600 relay.

The girls were paced by Catherine Mick's four gold medals as she won the pole vault with a leap of 11 feet, the 100 hurdles in 15.35, the 100 in 12.94 and the 300 hurdles in a time of 48.36.

Tristen Mosier brought home four medals as well by taking second in the pole

vault, third in the 300 hurdles, sixth in the 100 hurdles and then teamed up with Madison Elznic, Carley Elznic and Miranda Elznic to finish sixth in the 1600 relay.

Jadyn Kleinschmidt took second in the triple jump with a personal best leap of 31 feet, 3.5 inches and ran with Mashaya Dierking, Sera Johnson and Carely Elznic to finish fifth in the 400 relay.

Megan Grote was third in the high jump with Caitlin Mosier finishing right behind in fourth.

The 3200-relay team of Lexi Kadel, Morgan Lowery, Haley Pena Lopez, and Johana Degner topped off the scoring with a fourth place finish.

Titan boys clean up in Superior

The Thayer Central boys placed first at Superior's Del Wicks Invitational April 14, where they competed against Deshler and six other teams. Deshler hosted the invite.

The boys had 194 points. Leading in the shot put was second place finisher, Dietric Kenning with a 46-foot, 1-inch throw. Kenning was followed by Shevin Solomon, who placed sixth with a 38-foot, .25-inch heave. Kenning also took third place in the discus, going 120 feet, 5 inches.

In the high jump, Tim Schulte was third at a height of 5 feet, 8 inches. For the long jump, two Thayer Central athletes, Simon Wiedel and Jadyn Dightman were first and third, respectively, with Wiedel jumping 21 feet, 6 inches and Dightman at 20 feet, 2.50 inches.

In the boys' triple jump, it was Dightman again, this time in first place at 41 feet, 4.50 inches.

The boys 4x800-meter relay saw the Titans in second. Isaiah Keilwitz (2:18.9); Dylan Fischer (2:15.3); Evan Fuglestad (2:16.7); and Zach Koss (2:11.3) ran the relay in 9:02.30.

Schulte was first in the boys' 110-hurdles in 16.80 and Keegan Casey, fourth with 18.70.

In the 100-meter dash, Wiedel had another first place for a time of 11.10. He was joined by Elijah Nobbman, who sealed the race in 11.70 for fourth place.

The Titan boys were on as Aubrey Fangmeier and Connor Mumm were first and second in the 400-meter dash. Fangmeier's time was 52.10. Mumm ran it in 52.40.

In the 3200, Damian Stewart claimed first place and Casey, fourth place. Stewart's time was 11:19.60. Casey made the run in 12:03.70.

For the 200-meter dash, it was Wiedel in 22.50. Nobbman followed in fifth place. His time was 24.10, the same time he ran in the preliminary.

Mumm and Fangmeier were first and second again in the 800-meter, except Mumm took the lead this time. His time was 2:04.40. Fangmeier ran it in 2:04.50.

In the 300-meter hurdles, Fuglestad finished in first place for a time of 42.40. Schulte was third at 44.40. Koss finished in sixth place in 47.20.

The 1600-meter run saw Stewart in third and Fischer in fourth. Stewart ran it in 5:13.10. Fischer's time was 5:14.70.

Thayer Central claimed first place in the 4x100-meter relay. Nobbman, Schulte, Dightman and Wiedel had a time of 45.40.

And Fangmeier (53.4), Fuglestad (55.2), Koss (55.5) and Mumm (53.2) ran the 4x400-meter relay in 3:37.60 for first place.

The girls 4x100-meter relay team took first place with Jena Cottam, Brinley Linton, Chey-

anna Tietjen and Maddison Williams in 55.70.

Williams made her mark in the girls' triple jump with a second place finish. She leaped 30 feet.

More Thayer Central runners, Cambrie Cottam, Mariah Hintz, Jessica Huhman and Katelyn Richardson, placed in the top three finishers in a time of 11:34.20.

Tough competitors from Dorchester, Deshler and Superior edged Emily Welch to fifth place in the shot put. Welch's distance was 34 feet, 1.50 inches.

Welch and Maggie Harris pressed on to the discus and finished 14th and 15th, with Harris taking the 14th spot.

Bridget Linton secured fifth place in the girls' high jump with a height of 4 feet, 2 inches. Likewise for Jena Cottam, who was fifth in the long jump with 14 feet, 2 inches.

Bailee Remmers was fifth in the pole vault. Her height was 5 feet, 6 inches.

Tietjen finished in fourth place in the girls' 100-meter hurdles in 18.50.

Jena Cottam maintained her preliminary run in the 100-meter dash, placing fifth in the finals in 13.60.

MacKenzie Johnson was third in the 400-meter dash. Her time was 1:06.90.

Hintz, Huhman, Johnson and Grace Souerdyke came in third place for the 4x400-meter relay. Their time was 4:51.60.

personal record by shaving of two seconds in the 300 hurdles.


Elizabeth Meier set a new season record in the discus by throwing 10 feet farther and is now only two feet away from her personal record of 119 feet.

Council stated that they would like to see it be 8' wide so people have access to the

walkway and it will be accessible to handicap people as well. Phil asked City Administrator, Chris Fangmeier if at the intersections they would need to have cones for the disabled. Chris stated that he believed that they would need to have them, and they could help with that. Chris also reported that maybe the City could tear out the old sidewalk. This would benefit the public instead of a sidewalk however; we may need to lose 3 trees to go 8' walk way. Chris was asked to look into this and see what surrounding towns are doing, and maybe to check with Bellville KS, to see what they give to new businesses coming into town.

MINUTES OF MEETINGS AND MARCH 14TH MEETING

City Clerk Marcy Welch reported that we have a correction to the March 7th meeting, in the Library report. It should read as follows: In February we completed our Bibliostat Report 2014-15 for the State Library Commission. This past fiscal year we circulated over 17,000 items. Plus another 878 items were circulated through OverDrive.

The Library provided 22 children's programs and two adult programs last year.

So far this fiscal year we have checked out over 6, 698 items and an additional 435 items have been check out through OverDrive. Totaling 7,124.

Since October 1st we have completed 14 library programs. Our next program for children is scheduled for March 19th featuring the Easter Bunny. Currently we are working on our Summer Reading Program. Plus a couple of possible speaker programs for adults are in the planning stage.

We have filed for E-rate. Since the Federal USAC is phasing out discounts on phone service we will probably receive about \$370.00 if it passes through the channels. ORDINANCE NO. 859
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEBRON, NEBRASKA, GENERALLY PROVIDING FOR THE CONTROL AND REGULATION OF DOG OWNERSHIP WITHIN THE CITY; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEBRON, NEBRASKA AS FOLLOWS:
 SECTION 1. Sections 90.01 through 90.99 shall hereafter provide as follows:
GENERAL PROVISIONS § 90.01 RUNNING AT LARGE.

It shall be unlawful for the owner, keeper or harbinger of any animal, or any person having the charge, custody or control thereof, to permit a horse, mule, cow, sheep, goat, swine or other animal to be driven or run at large on any of the public ways and property, or upon the property of another, or to be tethered or staked out in such a manner as to allow such animal to reach or pass into any public way.

(Neb. RS 17-547) (1999 Code, § 6-201) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006) Penalty, see § 90.99

§ 90.02 ABANDONMENT, NEGLECT AND CRUELTY.

(A) Definitions. For the purpose of this section, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires different meaning.

ABANDON. To leave any animal for any length of time without making effective provision for its food, water or other care as is reasonably necessary for the animal's health.

ANIMAL. Any vertebrae member of the animal kingdom, except humans. The term shall not include an uncaptured wild creature.

CRUELTY MISTREAT. To knowingly and intentionally kill, maim, disfigure, torture, beat, mutilate, burn, scald or otherwise set upon any animal.

CRUELTY NEGLECT. To fail to provide any animal in one's care, whether as owner or custodian, with food, water or other care as is reasonably necessary for the animal's health.

HUMANE KILLING. The destruction of an animal by a method which causes the animal a minimum of pain and suffering.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER. Any member of the Nebraska State Patrol, any county or deputy sheriff, any member of the police force of the municipality or any other public official authorized by the municipality to enforce state or local animal control laws, rules, regulations or ordinances. (1999 Code, § 6-202)

(B) Law enforcement officer; powers; immunity.

(1) Any law enforcement officer who has reason to believe that an animal has been abandoned or is being cruelly neglected or cruelly mistreated may seek a warrant authorizing entry upon private property to inspect, care for or impound the animal.

(2) Any law enforcement officer who has reason to believe that an animal has been abandoned or is being cruelly neglected or cruelly mistreated may issue a citation to the owner as prescribed by law.

(3) Any law enforcement officer acting under this section shall not be liable for damages to property if such damage is not the result of the officer's negligence. (1999 Code, § 6-203)

(C) Penalty. A person commits cruelty to animals if he or she abandons, cruelly mistreats or cruelly neglects an animal. (Neb. RS § 28-1008, 28-1009, 28-1012) (1999 Code, § 6-204) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006)

§ 90-03 ENCLOSURES. All pens, cages, sheds,

yards or any other area or enclosure for the confinement for animals and fowls not specifically barred within the corporate limits shall be kept in a clean and orderly manner so as not to become a menace or nuisance to the neighborhood in which the said enclosure is located. (1999 Code, § 6-205) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006)

§ 90.04 DANGEROUS ANIMALS PROHIBITED.

(A) It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to own, keep or harbor any dangerous animal within the corporate limits of the city, except that this section shall not be construed to prohibit a public zoo, circus, humane society or carnival from displaying dangerous animals as exhibits, or to prohibit any wild life rescue organizations with appropriate permits from the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission from rehabilitating or sheltering dangerous animals.

(B) It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell, give away, transfer or import into the city, any dangerous animal as defined in this section, excluding a public zoo from doing business with another public zoo.

(C) In the event that any law enforcement officer determines a dangerous animal is being owned, kept or harbored by any person in violation of this section, said law enforcement officer may have such person or persons prosecuted for such violation and shall order such person or persons to remove said dangerous animal from the city, or destroy it. Such order shall be contained in a written notice to remove or destroy the dangerous animal within ten days of receipt of said notice and shall be delivered in person or by certified mail, return receipt requested. If the owner or person keeping or harboring such unusual animal after the expiration of ten days from receipt of said notice, and no appeal taken to the Mayor and City Council, the law enforcement officer shall have such dangerous animal destroyed. § 90.05 DANGEROUS ANIMAL DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of § 90.04 through 90.07, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning. **DANGEROUS ANIMAL.** Any animal which is not naturally tamed or gentle, or which is of a naturally wild disposition, or which is capable of inflicting serious injury upon or killing human beings and having known tendencies, individually or as a species, to do so, or which because of its size or other characteristics would constitute a danger to human life or property, including any dog which has, without provocation, bitten any human within the prior 12 months, unless such dog is confined behind a fence from which it cannot escape or is securely chained, in the back of the owner's property, in such a manner that the dog cannot range within five feet of the property line of the owner or within ten feet of the public sidewalk, and also including, but not limited to, the following animals which shall be deemed to be dangerous per se: bears, wolves, lions, ferrets, poisonous snakes and spiders, alligators, crocodiles, anacondas, pythons, boa constrictors and piranhas.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER. Any member of the Nebraska State Patrol, any county or deputy sheriff, any member of the police force of the municipality or any other public official authorized by the municipality to enforce state or local animal control laws, rules, regulations or ordinances. (1999 Code, § 6-202)

(B) Law enforcement officer; powers; immunity.

(1) A healthy dog, cat or ferret that is currently vaccinated against rabies and that bites or reportedly bites a human will be examined by a licensed veterinarian, who will determine the animal's health status. If no signs of illness compatible with rabies are detected, the animal will be quarantined under such conditions as are outlined in an official quarantine order issued by the Animal Control Authority or Public Health Official and observed for a period of ten (10) days from the date of the bite. Instead of being quarantined, the animal may be humanely euthanized and tested for rabies in an approved laboratory.

(b) Quarantined animals may be treated by a veterinarian, but rabies vaccine should not be administered to the animal until the quarantine period is complete. (D) Other animals. Any animal, other than a dog, cat, ferret or livestock that is bitten by or otherwise potentially exposed to a rabid or suspect rabid animal should be euthanized immediately. Animals maintained in USDA-licensed research facilities or accredited zoological parks that are exposed or potentially exposed to rabies shall be evaluated on a case-by-case basis by the Animal Control Authority or the Public Health Official. (E) Testing of suspect rabid animals. (1) If a suspect rabid animal is available for testing, an animal that was bitten by or otherwise potentially exposed to the suspect rabid animal will be isolated pending the rabies testing result on the suspect animal. (2) If the testing results are negative, the bitten or otherwise potentially exposed animal shall be released with the approval of the Animal Control Authority or Public Health Official. LICENSE § 90.20 LICENSE REQUIRED; EXCEPTIONS. (F) Any person who owns, keeps, harbors or maintains or sustains any dog or cat that he or she wishes to dispose of may take and place the same in the animal shelter designated by the city to be disposed of as provided by this division. The animal shelter may require the payment of the expense of the disposition of the dog or cat to be paid by such person.

§ 90.26 ENFORCEMENT. (A) It shall be the responsibility of the Mayor and staff of the city to administer this chapter, and to promulgate the necessary rules and regulations for its implementation. Enforcement shall be the responsibility of the city and the county law enforcement.

(B) Upon the effective date of this chapter, in the city, all regulations pertaining to rabies control and licensing will be enforced by the city employees and county law enforcement officers, or others with regulatory authority specified by the governing body.

DOG AND CAT REGULATIONS

§ 90.40 OWNER DEFINED.

Any person who shall harbor or permit any dog to be for ten (10) days or more in or about his or her house, store or enclosure, or to remain to be fed, shall be deemed the owner and possessor of such dog, and shall be deemed to be liable for all penalties herein prescribed.

(Neb. RS 54-606, 71-4401) (1999 Code, § 6-110) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006) Penalty, see § 90.99

§ 90.41 PROCLAMATION.

(A) It shall be the duty of the governing body whenever in its opinion the danger to the public safety from rabid dog is great or imminent, to issue a proclamation ordering all persons owning, keeping or harboring any dog to muzzle the same, or to confine it for a period of not less than 30 days or more than 90 days from the date of such proclamation, or until such danger is passed.

(B) The dogs may be harbored by any good and sufficient means in a house, garage or yard in the rear of the premises wherein the said owner may reside.

(C) Upon issuing the proclamation, it shall be the duty of all persons owning, keeping or harboring any dog to confine the same as herein provided.

(Neb. RS 17-256) (1999 Code, § 6-111) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006)

§ 90.42 RUNNING AT LARGE.

(A) It shall be the duty of the County Sheriff or any Deputy Sheriff to cause any dog or cat found to be running at large within the municipality to be taken up and impounded as provided for in this chapter.

(B) RUNNING AT LARGE shall mean any dog or cat found off the premises of the owner and not under control of the owner or a responsible person either by leash, cord, chain, wire, rope, cage or other suitable means of physical restraint.

(1999 Code, § 6-112) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006)

§ 90.43 CAPTURE IMPOSSIBLE.

The County Sheriff or Deputy shall have the authority to kill any animals showing vicious tendencies, or characteristics of rabies which make capture impossible because of the danger involved.

(Neb. RS 54-605) (1999 Code, § 6-113) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006)

§ 90.44 INTERFERENCE WITH ENFORCEMENT.

It shall be unlawful for any person to hinder, delay or interfere with any law enforcement officer who is performing any duty enjoined upon him or her by the provisions of this chapter, or to break open, or in any manner directly or indirectly aid, counsel or advise the breaking open of an animal shelter, any ambulance wagon, or other vehicle used for the collecting or conveying of dogs to the shelter.

(Neb. RS 28-906) (1999 Code, § 6-114) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006) Penalty, see § 90.99

§ 90.45 KILLING AND POISONING.

It shall be unlawful to kill, or to administer, or cause to be administered, poison of any sort to a dog, or in any manner to injure, maim or destroy, or in any manner to attempt to injure, maim or destroy any dog that is the property of another person, or to place any poison, or poisoned food where the same is accessible to a dog; provided, that this section shall

not apply to municipal police officers acting within their power and duty.

§ 90.46 ANNOYANCE.

It shall be unlawful for any person to own, keep or harbor any dog or cat which by loud, continuous or frequent barking, howling, meowing, yelping, fighting or mate calling shall annoy or disturb any neighborhood or person or which habitually barks or chases pedestrians, drivers or owners of horses or vehicles while they are on any public sidewalk, street or alley of the municipality.

(1999 Code, § 6-116) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006) Penalty, see § 90.99

§ 90.47 LIABILITY OF OWNER.

(A) It shall be unlawful for any person to allow a dog, cat or other animal owned, kept or harbored by him or her, or under his or her charge or control, to injure or destroy any real or personal property of any description belonging to another person.

(B) The owner or possessor of any such dog, cat or other animal, in addition to the usual judgment upon conviction, may be made to be liable to the persons so injured in an amount equal to the value of the damage so sustained.

(Neb. RS 54-601, 54-602) (1999 Code, § 6-117) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006) Penalty, see § 90.99

§ 90.48 LIMITATIONS ON NUMBER OF DOGS AND CATS.

(A) Maximum number; exemptions. It shall be unlawful and a public nuisance for any person to allow more than two (2) dogs and/or more than three (3) cats to be kept, harbored, or maintained at any property in the city unless one of the following conditions have been met:

(1) The property is located in the industrial district and a special use permit is obtained; or

(2) The person, entity or facility is a licensed animal shelter or animal rescue organization.

(B) Exception to requirements. Any person who presently owns, keeps, or maintains more than three (3) licensed cats or two (2) licensed dogs other than as authorized by this section may retain their licensed animals. If for any reason one of the animals is lost, sold, given away, dies, or is removed or leaves the premises then such animal may not be replaced if the maximum number remains on the premises.

(C) Deadline for compliance with requirements. Any person who presently owns, keeps or maintains more than three (3) cats or two (2) dogs other than as authorized by this section shall be required to license each of such animals by March 1, 2016, in order to qualify for the exception provided by this section.

(D) Penalty for violations. Any person who is found to be in violation of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Each day in violation of this section shall constitute a separate offense.

DANGEROUS/POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DOGS

§ 90.60 DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of this subchapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

ANIMAL CONTROL AUTHORITY. The Thayer County Sheriff's Department or any other entity authorized to enforce the animal control laws of the municipality.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER. Any individual employed, appointed or authorized by the Animal Control Authority for the purpose of aiding in the enforcement of this chapter or any other law or ordinance relating to the licensing of animals, control of animals or seizure and impoundment of animals and shall include any state or local law enforcement or other employee whose duties in whole or in part include assignments that involve the seizure and impoundment of any animal.

DANGEROUS DOG. Any dog that, according to the records of the Animal Control Authority:

(1) Has killed or inflicted severe injury on a human being on public or private property;

(2) Has killed a domestic animal without provocation while the dog was off the owner's property; or

(3) Has been previously determined to be a potentially dangerous dog by the Animal Control Authority and the owner has received notice of such determination and such dog again aggressively bites,

attacks or endangers the safety of humans or domestic animals. A dog shall not be defined as a **DANGEROUS DOG** if the threat, any injury that is not a severe injury, or the damage was sustained by a person who, at the time, was committing a willful trespass as defined in Neb. RS 20-203, 28-520 or 28-521. Or any other tort upon the property of the owner of the dog, who was tormenting, abusing or assaulting the dog, who has, in the past, been observed or reported to have tormented, abused or assaulted the dog, or who was committing or attempting to commit a crime.

DOMESTIC ANIMAL. A cat, a dog or livestock.

OWNER. Any person, firm, corporation, organization, political subdivision or department possessing, harboring, keeping or having control or custody of a dog.

POTENTIALLY DANGEROUS DOG.

(1) Any dog that, when provoked:

(a) Inflicts a non severe injury on a human or injures a domestic animal either on public or private property; or

(b) Chases or approaches a person upon streets, sidewalks or any public grounds in a menacing fashion or apparent attitude of attack.

(2) Any specific dog with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack when unprovoked, to cause injury or to threaten the safety of humans or domestic animals; or

(3) Any specific breed of dog identified in Section 90.64 of this municipal code.

SEVERE INJURY. Any physical injury that results in disfiguring lacerations requiring multiple sutures or cosmetic surgery or one or more broken bones or that creates a potential danger to the life or health of the victim.

(Neb. RS 54-617) (1999 Code, § 6-119) (Ord. 781, passed 3-7-2005; Ord. 795, passed 8-7-2006)

§ 90.61 RESTRAINED.

The owner of a dangerous dog shall restrain the animal in a secure pen or by a chain or leash in the rear of the owner's property, at least ten feet (10') from a public sidewalk or right-of-way.

§ 90.62 CONFINED.

While unattended on the owner's property, a dangerous dog shall be securely confined, in a humane manner (for not more than 72 hours), indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure suitably designed to prevent the entry of young children and to prevent the dog from escaping. The pen or structure shall have secure sides and a secure top. If the pen or structure has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides shall be embedded into the ground. The pen or structure shall also protect the dog from the elements. The owner of a dangerous dog shall post a warning sign on the property where the dog is kept that is clearly visible and that informs persons that a dangerous dog is on the property.

§ 90.63 FAILURE TO COMPLY.

(A) Any dangerous dog may be immediately confiscated by an animal control officer if the owner is in violation of this subchapter. The owner shall be responsible for the reasonable costs incurred by the Animal Control Authority for the care of a dangerous dog confiscated by an animal control officer or for the destruction of any dangerous dog if the action by the Animal Control Authority is pursuant to law and if the owner violated this subchapter.

(B) In addition to any other penalty, a court may order the Animal Control Authority to dispose of a dangerous dog in an expeditious and humane manner.

§ 90.64 POSSESSION OF DANGEROUS DOG BREEDS; EXCEPTION.

(A) It shall be unlawful in the city to keep, harbor, maintain or have in a person's possession or control any dog whose breeding has been deemed as dangerous.

(B) Dog breeds which are deemed dangerous are as follows:

(1) Pit Bull dog;

(2) The Bull Terrier breed of dogs;

(3) The Staffordshire Bull Terrier breed of dogs;

(4) The American Pit Bull Terrier breed of dogs;

(5) The American Staffordshire Terrier breed of dogs;

(6) Any Chows;

(7) Any Dobermans;

(8) Any Rottweilers;

(9) Any wolf or wolf hybrids;

(10) Dogs of mixed breed or of other breed than above

listed which breed or mixed is known as pit bulls, pit bull dogs or pit bull terriers;

(11) Any dog which has the appearance and characteristics of being predominantly of the breed of Bull Terrier, American Staffordshire Terrier; any other breed commonly known as pit bulls, pit bull dogs or pit bull terriers; or a combination of any of these breeds; or

(12) Any trained attack dog.

(Ord. 386, passed 6-4-2012) Penalty, see § 90.99

(C) The owner of a dog identified by breed as a dangerous dog in this ordinance may possess such dog by:

(1) licensing the dog as provided in this code and paying an annual licensing fee equal to twice the amount of the standard fee;

(2) purchasing a muzzle from the City Clerk, which shall be worn by the dog at all times when the dog is off the owner's property;

(3) restraining the dog on the owner's property as required by § 90.61 of this code; and

(4) fully comply with all other code provisions.

§ 90.99 PENALTY.

(A) Any person violating any provision of this chapter for which no specific penalty is prescribed shall be subject to § 10.99.

(B) Any person who shall violate or refuse to comply with any provision of §§ 90.01 through 90.07, inclusive, shall be guilty of an infraction and subject to a fine of not less than \$50.00, nor more than \$500.00 per infraction. Each animal not maintained in accordance with the provisions of said sections shall constitute an individual infraction. A new violation shall be deemed to have been committed every 24 hours of such failure to comply.

(C) Any person who shall violate or refuse to comply with any provisions of §§ 90.20 through 90.28, 90.40 through 90.48, 90.60 through 90.64, shall be guilty of an infraction and subject to a fine of not less than \$50.00, nor more than \$500.00 per infraction. Each animal not maintained in accordance with the provisions of said subchapters shall constitute an individual infraction. A new violation shall be deemed to have been committed every 24 hours of such failure to comply.

Conviction for noncompliance may result in a \$100.00 per day fine to the landowner, with a maximum fine of \$1,500; or
2. Should more immediate control be required, proceed pursuant to the law and have the weeds controlled by such method as he/she finds necessary, the expense of which shall constitute a lien and be entered as a tax against the land, and be collected as other real estate taxes are collected, or by other means, as provided by law.

Also, the public is notified that noxious weed seed and propagative parts may be disseminated through the movement of machinery and equipment, trucks, grain and seed, hay, straw, nursery stock, fencing materials, sod, manure, and soil as well as articles of similar nature. Methods of treatment have been prescribed by the Director of Agriculture and may be obtained from the county weed control authority.
