## Tidbits

### Thayer County Health Services open house

Thayer County Health Services will hold a ribbon-cutting ceremony and open house April 29 from 12:30 to 2 p.m. Lunch will be provided.

The ribbon will be cut at 1 p.m. to celebrate the hospital's completed massive renovation project.

Open house tours will be conducted from 1:30 to 3 p.m.

The hospital renovation project completed earlier this year included a new chemotherapy room next to the Specialty Clinic.

The primary benefit of the treatment area is the convenience of being able to receive chemotherapy treatments close to home without the need to travel.

Patients will meet with the oncologist, Cancer Physician Dr. Robert Warner, and he will determine if CT scans, MRI, bone marrow biopsy, ultrasounds or PET scans are needed.

Once he has the results he needs, he will prescribe specific treatments, alleviating the need for patients to leave the area for treatments.

The Hebron Journal-Register will run a complete story on the clinic in next week's issue.

### Chemigation permit renewal June 1

The Little Blue NRD reminds producers the deadline for renewing annual chemigation permits is June 1.

Existing permit holders planning to use them in 2018 should be sure to turn in the proper permit forms and fees.

Any permit not renewed by June 1 will be treated as a new permit.

If a producer finds during irrigation season that emergency permits are required, the cost is \$250.

Chemigation is the process of applying either fertilizer or chemicals to crops at the proper time to meet plant health and production needs.

Little Blue must inspect as new chemigation equipment on new permit applications to insure safety.

## Theatre celebrates five years, shows progress

Five years ago as the Arts Council of Thayer County planned improvements for the Majestic Theatre, the price to see a movie was \$5.

Today, the price to see a movie is still \$5.

"Our fun fact is we thought about going back and doing retro pricing for everybody, but our prices remain the same," Crystal Fangmeier of the council said about the theater's five-year anniversary.

The theater will hold its anniversary celebration Friday through Monday. Everyone will receive a small popcorn for free. Medium and large popcorns will be \$2 off, the price of a small popcorn.

The movies are "Sherlock Knomes" and "Ready Player One."

Fangmeier said it's hard to find prices that have stayed the same the past five years.

"It's a big deal," she said.

"We want to make sure families can come here and not be so burdened," Carlece Kenner, also a member of the ACT, said.

Majestic has come a long way in five years. A second theater was added and another projector purchased. An automated system operates the lights, which was a switch from concession workers running back and forth to turn the lights on and off.

"It had wooden seats and needed remodeling bad. The structure itself was good," Kenner said. "In defense of the previous owners, it's really hard to make it a business."

Majestic recently added a party room with a refrigerator for 24 to 25 people. A cleanup deposit is returned if renters clean the room themselves.

The Arts Council wants people to know the theater is available for many functions, from family parties and reunions to presentations.

"We're looking at different ways to include the arts than just movies. If people have ideas they would like to see brought in on our new stage, we are open for the arts," Fangmeier said.

"We've had family reunions and they used the stage to interview older members of their family," Kenner said. The stage is in the second cinema, along with a surround sound speaker system.

Kenner said the Wiedel Family Christmas was held at Majestic with about 35 to 40 people. They saw "The Star."

Additional activities held at the theater have been the Modern Woodmen Speech Contest, a sleepover for about 70 girls scouts and for athletes in sports camps after a long day of practices.

"We can show the movie as long as we have someone who can come down," Kenner said about the volunteers who work at the Majestic.

"We have volunteers working down here and people have their heart and soul in here," Kenner said.

Fangmeier said she became involved in the council because she thinks the theater is a vital part of the community for people wanting to live in Hebron.

The theater could help promote living in Hebron, Fangmeier said.

Those attending the anniversary celebration will be encouraged to register their email addresses for theater news and updates. Anyone registering will be entered into a drawing for a \$10 theater gift card.

## MetalQuest welcomes King

## Harms promotes volunteerism

Mrs. Thayer County Jenilee Harms was one of the five finalists at the Mrs. Nebraska America Pageant Saturday evening, but according to her, she had already won.

"I'm so excited at how excited they are for me," she said about her family before the pageant. "No matter the outcome, I have already won."

Husband Jordan, Hayden, 12, and Harlow, 5, supported Harms through every step of her preparation for the pageant.

"This whole experience — I can't express how much it means of how proud my kids are of me," she said.

The votes tallied, Harms came away as second-runner up with two awards — the "Jan Wilcoxon Local Titleholder Award" because as Mrs. Thayer County, she had the most community service appearances, and the "Leadership Award" for exhibiting exceptional leadership by promoting the pageant and sponsors. Funds raised for the pageant are donated to "Victoria's Voice."

Harms had a voice of her own to promote as well. Her platform was "Volunteerism and Self-Acceptance."

Her website, ShineBeyond.com, demonstrates Harms' commitment to the stages of self-acceptance through volunteering regardless of the recognition for doing so and rising above individual flaws.

Harms has volunteered as a Chester rescue emergency medical technician for four years. She is the vice president of the Chester Community Foundation, on the Chesterfest planning committee and the co-leader of a Girl Scout Daisy troop.

She said volunteering puts her life into perspective and self-acceptance is a benefit.

Harms wasn't too nervous prior to the pageant.

"My family is going. Hayden has his own tux. It's definitely out of my comfort zone. I didn't even have Facebook before this," she said.

The tomboy who won't watch herself has always wanted to be in a pageant.

Stanclift of Alexandria, a volunteer in the navy, died from diphtheria and the body arrived at Alexandria, his former home. He died in Brooklyn, ready to embark. The third death reported is

that of young \_\_\_\_\_ (part of paper missing) Milner, a volunteer from Byron, who is said to have died from appendicitis enroute to Manila, Philippine Islands.

Naiman and Miss Christina Subeneacher were united in marriage at the Lutheran church in Gilead, Feb. 26th...Mr. Fred Naiman sold his 240 acre farm southwest of Gilead to Mr. John Daringer and Mike Hergott at \$115 and acre.

Fordyce Lee Roper, the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Roper died of pneumonia, Mar. 2, aged 9 months and 24 days.

A wedding of particular interest to the newspaper fraternity of Thayer county was that of Oscar R. Padgett of Davenport to Miss Irene C. Rewick of Carleton on Feb. 23. The groom is the capable editor of the Davenport Journal, while the charming bride is one of Thayer county's talented young ladies.

(The Bruning Banner) Bruning residents are back to the old wells this morning while George Zeig and his painters from York are engaged in painting the inside of the waster tower. The contractor has promised to make all possible haste with the work.

While taking in the countryside last Sunday, we visited the wild game preserve of R. J. Lilidoll and Carl Wintersteen at the home of Wm. Dunker, north of Bruning on the Meridian. The boys have an enclosed tract which ordinarily is a pond, but at present is dry. Within this enclosure are some 50 wild ducks and geese of various types. Mr. Dunker has five snow geese that he trapped this spring while they were enroute to their northern home. Species of the Canadian and Hutchinson geese and Mallard duck are to be seen. Mr. Dunker fears that if required rainfall does not come to fill the pond that the wild birds will not increase in number during the hatching season. The farm is under the supervision of the state game warden's office and Mr. Dunker must report any increase or decrease to the state warden. A trip to the preserve is of great interest to the lover of bird life.

Blood typing of Hebron school children is about one-third completed, according to Supt. Robert Hill of Thayer County Memorial Hospital.



**COUNTY COURT Fines Paid by April 18, 2018**

Alton "Mook" Wilhelms, age 95, of Lincoln, formerly of Stromsburg, passed away April 10, 2018, at Bryan East in Lincoln. Alton was born January 25, 1923, in Bruning, to John Herman and Gertrude Minnie (Bowman) Wilhelms.

He attended school in Bruning, graduating in 1940. He went on to Hebron Junior College and was among the last graduating class in May 1942. He then attended Midland Lutheran College, but his enrollment was interrupted with military service when he enlisted October 12, 1942, serving until February 1946. He received the American Service Medal, Asiatic Pacific Medal, World War II Victory Medal and a Good Conduct Medal during his service in the Army.

After his time in the service, he returned to Midland Lutheran College and graduated in 1947 with a major in history and minor in English and music.

Mook was chosen president of Nebraska Newspaper Advertising Service, elected president of Nebraska Newspaper Association, and in 2002 was named Master Editor-Publisher and, in 2010, he was inducted into the Nebraska Newspaper Hall of Fame.

In retirement, Mook and Ardis enjoyed traveling, visiting six continents, all fifty states and cruised the Aegean Sea, the Caribbean Sea and Mediterranean Sea. They also visited China and Russia. In 2008 they moved to Lincoln to be closer to their daughter and also to Husker games.

Mook was active in sports as both a player, coach and fan. He was a huge fan of Nebraska football, only missing one game in Lincoln since 1948. He was elected a member of the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame Board of Directors in 1992. He was a member of Salem Lutheran Church where he sang in the choir and served as councilman, Stromsburg Commercial Club and was a 70-plus year member of the Stromsburg American Legion Post #132 and served on the color guard and firing squad. He was Post #132 Honored Veteran of 2015. He was named Swedish Festival King in 1971.

## Baysinger selected for Boys State







## Twin Valley Weed Management receives grant

Twin Valley Weed Management Area announced today that it will receive \$143,000 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust for the "Eastern Republican and Little Blue Riparian Improvement Project" project. The Trust Board announced funding for the project at its meeting on April 5 in Lincoln.

The project is one of the 105 projects receiving \$18,301,819 in grant awards from the Nebraska Environmental Trust this year. Of these, 66 were new applications and 39 are carry-over projects.

The highly successful Eastern Republican and Little Blue Riparian Improvement Project continues ongoing efforts to eradicate invasive species, control vegetation in stream channels, and improve riparian habitat along the Republican and Little Blue Rivers and their tributaries within six of the Twin Valley Weed Management Area (TVWMA) counties.

Control efforts are conducted in a holistic manner, utilizing a full range of mechanical, biological and chemical tools. TVWMA

has undertaken this project over recent years to improve stream flow along the Republican and Little Blue Rivers to help enable Nebraska to meet its water delivery obligations to Kansas, to restore and maintain into the future a healthy river system and prevent wasteful degradation of water resources, to improve riparian habitat including re-planting beneficial species, as well as including pollinators, and to increase public awareness of the best practices that can be used to properly manage riparian lands.

The Nebraska Legislature created the Nebraska Environmental Trust in 1992. Using revenue from the Nebraska Lottery, the Trust has provided over \$289 million in grants to over 2,000 projects across the state.







## CCC/POW building is newest addition to Thayer County Museum



The Civilian Conservation Corps, or CCC, as it was commonly called, was a government program that was operated from around 1933 to 1942, to provide jobs for men ages 17 to 28, that couldn't find work elsewhere due to the depression of the 1930's.

They built buildings, roads, planted trees, helped out in emergencies and performed many other tasks. One CCC site was in Hebron at what is now called Riverside Park. During World War II, in 1943, 1944 and 1945, the CCC buildings in Hebron were used to house Prisoners of War (POW's).

The POW's that were held at the camp were available for hire by local farmers, to help make up for the lost labor due to those serving the military. Fred Pohlmann of Byron was one of the farmers who often hired POW's. Fred would drive a truck to Hebron where six to 12 POW's and one guard would climb in the box of the truck for a ride to Byron with him. He and his wife Justine spoke German and could communicate very well with them. Even though there were strict rules about how farmers interacted with the prisoners, such as not letting them in your house, everyone got along so well, that they often fed the group dinner at their dining room table.

One afternoon the guard had to ask his prisoners for

a favor. He sat his gun down in the field and couldn't find it. All the prisoners that were with him, went out to the field and searched until one of them found it, and willingly handed it over to him. The prisoners were treated very well and they knew it. They had no desire to escape. Some of them later returned to the United States and lived out the rest of their life here.

In the years that followed many of the buildings were moved to other locations and used for other purposes. One of the buildings, or it may have actually been part of a larger building, rested just a couple feet west of an alley in Hebron between 3rd and 4th, and Jefferson and Holdrege Streets. This building has been mostly restored and now donated, by Bob and Becky Reinke to the Thayer County Historical Society grounds in Belvidere. On April 16, Ball and Sons Moving transported it to the Museum grounds for permanent display.

It has been re-sided with exact duplicate wood siding, has the original windows, and the original type of rolled asphalt roofing. The floor will be replaced after it is set down on the foundation, with flooring Richard Reinke salvaged in about 1978, from a two-story house in Deshler that stood at 315 Bryson. Most of the salvage work from that house was done by Clarence Shoof and a

refugee named Dua Lee. Bob also helped on it part of the summer.

The building where Kathy Taylor has her beautician shop in Deshler is also a former CCC/POW building. The north side still has the original windows and siding on it.

The Museum would like to furnish at least a portion of the building with original items from when it was used for CCC and POW, especially a couple of the metal beds. If anyone has anything to donate, please contact the historical society.

Other projects at the Museum include building a blacksmith shop from concrete blocks made in Davenport, formerly used for a barn, and later donated by Kerry Mersch. Another project is a church from Hubbell. The United Methodist Church has been purchased from Tina Reed. It has several beautiful stained glass windows that are being professionally restored, while it gets moved to the museum grounds in Belvidere.



American trade and industry companies, educational institutions and labor unions.

"We've had a relationship with NIMS for a while," Jolene Harms, human resources administrator for MetalQuest, said. "We did an open invite to Montez and he was interested."

King, a former training and technology manager for Magna International and certified machinist, was Jolene Harms' instructor for a training in Washington D.C., approximately a month after the November 2016 election.

"He's been very supportive," MetalQuest President Scott Harms said. "He is behind a lot of the initiatives we all feel strongly about."

Once a solid economic backbone of the United States, manufacturing and other trades have seen a shortage while their workforces age out.

"We're short on trades - electricians and machinists - and coupled with an aging workforce, it's hard to fill that pipeline," Volk said.

"Four-year schools are great, but they're not for everyone," Scott Harms said. "We look at four-year colleges as a one-size fits all mentality and it's not. There are kids who are good with their hands. We're basically showing NIMS the technology and opportunities that exist in manufacturing in the Midwest."

"Right now, there are 6.1 million unfilled jobs in the United States and another

6.8 million people seeking employment. Manufacturing alone will see two million jobs go unfilled over the next decade due to the skills gap," King stated in a NIMS press release.

According to the 2018 Joint Economic Report by Congress, two in three high school graduates attended a four-year college. Over the past 30 years, tuition has increased 225 percent over inflation.

The report recommends closing the skills gap will benefit students, who have the potential to earn \$45,000 a year after vocational and technical training through a two-year program.

A heavyweight in the entertainment industry, Mike Rowe of "Dirty Jobs" promotes the "Works Foundation" and S.W.E.A.T. Pledge - Skill and Work Ethic Aren't Taboo - to encourage trade school degrees.

King visited Southeast Community College in Milford the day before coming to Hebron and met SCC President Paul Illich.

Both Harms and Volk are SCC alumni.

And now, Harms' son, Broderick, is an SCC graduate.

"I wanted to give my son different options and show him what was out there," Harms said. "He made the decision to go there. The program does a really good job of teaching people a lot of the drafting and fundamentals of metal cutting."

The program is Precision Machining and Automation Technology and Broderick

Harms took his craft to the SkillsUSA competition for a first place win as CNC Turning Specialist in the college division. He is eligible to compete in the national competition in Louisville, Ky., June 25-29.

Harms said manufacturing has changed over the years and the negative stereotypes about it being a dirty, low-skilled job simply isn't true.

King was able to see MetalQuest's first robot purchased four to five years ago.

"There are multiple robots working together. Every machine is talking to each other. They take the raw material and turn it into finished parts and pack it in a box. Robots are doing the carpal tunnel type jobs," Harms said.

He explained robots do not take jobs away because people are needed to run them.

"Who wants to stand and load a machine with slugs?" Harms said.

After the tour, Volk and King went to Sandy Creek school near Fairfield to see the first, rural Career Pathways program in Nebraska. They also went to Dramco Tool and the Career Pathways Institute, both of Grand Island.

"He's telling us we're doing things he hasn't seen before," Harms said about King. It's good for people in Washington D.C. to hear that."

He said the Career Pathways program is vital to Nebraska, and has the potential to reach students at middle-school level.
