Region V Services takes an 'employment first' approach

Region V Services is taking an employment first approach with the people it serves.

The agency, with offices located in Hebron and Fairbury, is dedicated to working with those who have developmental disabilities.

Through a grant received by the Developmental Disabilities Council, Region V employed the services of Darla Wilkerson, owner and consultant for CSI Network, to train staff how to put together classes for individuals seeking job coaching. The program is part of a five year process Region V has been developing to focus on employment opportunities for the developmentally disabled.

Once staff have been trained in job coaching, they will teach career courses for those with disabilities. The course is seven weeks long with one class per week and eight individuals enrolled, according to Lori Svanda, Region V employment consultant.

In the class, participants discover their strengths and interests in order to find positions that will best fit the

Hebron native assumes command of First Army unit

A Hebron native is now commanding a U.S. Army unit at the Rock Island Arsenal in Illinois.

Capt. Laura Esper, a 1996 graduate of Hebron High School, and daughter of Jeff and Lanae McLaughlin of Hebron, assumed command of Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, First Army Reserve Support Command, in an April 10 ceremony in First Army Headquarters at Rock Island Arsenal.

Maj. Gen. Paul Benenati, First Army deputy commanding general for support and First Army Reserve Support Command commander, said the ceremony represented one quality officer replacing another.

"The First Army Support Command is getting another great leader," Benenati said. "Capt. Esper will use her talent and expertise to take the unit to new heights. She has an exceptional background as a soldier and leader. I've got all the confidence in the world that she will continue the great work of this unit."

Esper thanked the First Army leadership for giving her the re-

sponsibility of commanding the detachment.

"I am excited," she said. "I look forward to serving with you and leading these fine soldiers of the First Army Reserve Support Command. The first sergeant and I are a team, and we will work hard to ensure we have high standards and support all Army programs."

As commander, Esper will oversee a unit with 78 soldiers, whose mission is to provide trained and ready soldiers to First Army to enable training readiness support.

Esper enlisted in the Army in 1996 and became an officer through a direct commission ten years later.

Her awards include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Army Commendation Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Army Achievement Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Armed Forces Reserve Medal with M device and Bronze hour-glass, the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, the Joint Meritorious Unit Award with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Meritorious Unit Commendation, and the Combat Action Badge.

Chester election to be held regarding bond issue

The Village of Chester will hold a special bond election on May 12 regarding a resolution for a new building.

According to the notice of election, voters will respond to the following question:

"Shall the Village of Chester, Neb., construct a new building to be used for municipal purposes, including use in connection with providing fire and rescue services and storing and maintaining vehicles and equipment used for fire and rescue services, at a cost not to exceed \$100,000 for the purpose of constructing such new building ... Shall the Village caused to be levied and collected annually, a special levy of taxes on the taxable value of all the taxable property in the Village, and all other taxes, in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as such principle and interest become due?"

If the resolution is passed, "the

Board of the Village shall be empowered to issue such bonds and to impose a tax upon all of the taxable property in the Village sufficient to pay the interest on and principle of such bonds..."

This special election will be the first all mail election held in the county.

Ballots will be mailed to voters no earlier than 20 days prior to the date of the election and no later than ten days prior to the election.

The deadline for ballots to be returned is 5 p.m. on May 12.

Ballots can also be personally brought in.

Voters are allowed to bring in their own ballot as well as the ballots for two other people.

According to Marie Rauner, Thayer County clerk, the drop box outside the courthouse will be put up again.

The final date to register to vote for the election is May 1 at 6 p.m.

1885

130 Years Ago

Eld. M. M. Gleason has been employed to preach in the Christian Chapel here.

A monthly market day would be a great benefit to the farmers and business men of this entire county. It would be equivalent in interest and benefit to a county fair and a number of public sales combined. Everybody who has anything to sell could bring it to town with a reasonable prospect of finding buyers. Now, let some of our energetic people take this matter in charge, work it up, and the Journal will help.

Werner Brothers have received and are placing in position in the Central Hotel, a hotel Monitor Range costing \$300. It is known as the Miller range and is under the control of fuller, Warren & Co., of Chicago. These ranges are made of wrought iron, and contain eight nine-inch holes and two large ovens. It also has a 75-gallon water tank and is especially adapted for hotel use.

Among the newcomers to our city this spring is the firm of Young, Knode & Co., who bring with them good recommendations. They carry a large stock of exclusive hardware and have also bought the Chicago lumber yard and are filling up.

Hubbell is now unexcelled by any town of its size in the west for beautiful homes and fine buildings. There is an air of thrift and neatness about the town that render it charming. Good sidewalks and well laid stone street crossings commend it as a town of public spirit and enterprise.

At a meeting of the town board this week M. H. Weiss was appointed town attorney and J. H. Boyle town marshal. Sidewalks were ordered built on the north side of Lincoln Avenue from Third Street to First Street and on the west side of Second Street from Lincoln Avenue to Olive Avenue.

John Segin has put up in his restaurant and bakery a new patent reel oven. The articles to be baked are put on shelves which are revolved in the oven by heavy clock-work mechanism.

1895

120 Years Ago

Joseph Willy has sold his stock of merchandise to his father-in-law, John Huber. Mr. Huber will put considerable additional capital into

the business and an extensive stock of general merchandise is now on the road, the business will be carried on at the old stand and Joseph Willy has been installed as manger. The Racket Store now promises to become one of the leading attractions of the county and a great credit to Hebron.

Early this morning, news of the bold and successful robbery of the post office at Belvidere was brought to Sheriff Lindsey. The safe was blown open and \$200 in stamps and some money were stole. Up to this writing the robber has not been apprehended, but late reports say they have some clue and hope to have him lodged in the county jail before very long.

Chester has a fire: A terrible fire at Chester. Loss about \$18,000 with about \$7,000 insurance. The east side of thayer Street from the livery barn north to the corner of Howard Street was burned Wednesday morning about 2 o'clock.

Belvidere: The County Commissioners decided to let Mrs. Flicker adopt the child found on Mr. Irwin's doorstep...We have enough wheels in town now to organize a bicycle club...If you see a man with a scowl on his face just make up your mind that they are house cleaning at his home. If there is anything a man hates it is house cleaning. Who thinks that "home is heaven" when he cannot find his each chair or anything else?

1905

110 Years Ago

W. H. Wilson and family left today via the Rock Island for Davidson, Assiniboia, Northwest Territory, Canada, to make their home.

Rev. C. E. Giwits, assistant superintendent of the Child Saving Institute at Omaha brought two little boys to Hebron, last Saturday, and found a home for one at Wm. Houck's, north of town, and the other at C. W. Walker's, southwest of town.

The Hebron Home Telephone Company is a thing of the past, it having dissolved its incorporation and reorganized under the name of the Hebron Telephone Company, the word "Home" being left out as the plant has already grown away from Hebron to other towns in the county.

1915

100 Years Ago

The Hebron Commercial Club entertained the farmers

of this vicinity at the opera house last evening. Lunch was served to about 409 by I. C. Gray and assistants.

Miss Fairy Wills died at her home four miles south of Hebron last night, from diptheria. She was a member of this year's graduating class, being vice-president of the class.

On Saturday afternoon a small-sized jimmycane did some damage in the north part of town. At J. J. Miller's place the wind picked the hen-house three feet into the air and carried it 20 feet to the northeast. A closet was carried 100 feet, and a stack of alfalfa hay was scattered over two blocks. The owner was sawing wood 20 feet away and consequently he "saw" it.

1925

90 Years Ago

The Junior Class play, "Take My Advice" will be staged next Monday at the Majestic Theatre in Hebron.

Miss Baryl Lawless of Hebron was chosen as one of the girls to take part in a pageant to be given, May Day, at the Peru State Teacher's College.

W. A. Coffendaffer and family have moved back from Osceola to Hebron. Mr. Coffendaffer has been manager of a telephone exchange, but will not engage in the electrical business.

1935

80 Years Ago

A story known well by many Hebron people was that told in a feature article in the Lincoln Journal, Sunday, telling of the experiences and ambitions of Ralph Menke, son of Mrs. Kate Menke, here. Born and raised here, Ralph is well liked. "A boyish hobby of "looking at the stars" will become the life-time vocation of astronomy for Ralph Menke, when he is graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1937," chronicled the Lincoln newspaper. A couple of years ago Menke built himself a miniature observatory, 8 feet square, at Hebron in his yard. The lower section is made of brick and stucco and the upper is a dome eight feet across. This dome revolves on rollers so that the two-foot opening up one side can be moved and permit the young observer to see different parts of the sky.

Members of the county terracing committee, and superintendent Aldrich, engineer Sawyer of the CCC Camp, and the county agricultural agent met with the county commissioners Tuesday, Feb. 1, to discuss plans for a county-wide terracing program. CCC Camp Thayer is ready to assist in this terracing program and with the cooperation of the county board and the farmers in the county, it is believed that much can be accomplished towards saving the soil.

It is reported that there are over 100 cases of ringworm in this county.

Good Beam, 65, of Twin Falls, Idaho, who suffered a fractured skull in an automobile accident near Harvard about a month ago, died at a hotel there, Wednesday, where he had been receiving treatment. Mr. Beam had been visiting relatives at Davenport where he lived for many years, and at the time of the accident was being taken to Hastings to catch a bus for his home.

Stronger Economics Together Program deadline is May 7

The Nebraska Stronger Economics Together (SET) team is now accepting applications from community/county representatives and economic developers to participate in the 2015-2016 SET program.

As an approved state, Nebraska SET can offer two multi-county regions step-by-step assistance to organize and develop an economic development blueprint for their region.

Launched in 2010, SET is now offered in 50 regions in 28 states, including Nebraska. The SET program offers in-depth analysis tailored to the region that uncovers local assets, resources and emerging strengths.

Throughout the five planning sessions, participating regions explore underlying economic structures, identify opportunities and develop a plan of action to further strengthen connections and advantages across the region.

Assistance is then provided to assist regions for putting the economic development plan into action. Together, the SET program is approximately an 18-month opportunity for regional collaboration and growth.

To be eligible, a region

must consist of at least three counties and have 51 percent or more of the region's population living in rural areas, or have 75 percent of the region's land located in rural areas.

Selection of regions will be dependent upon the region's application and site visit from the Nebraska SET team. Costs for the regions will be minimal and may only include participants (staff/volunteers) time and travel to and from the regional SET meeting locations.

The SET program is a collaborative project between Nebraska Extension's Community Vitality Initiative, Nebraska USDA Rural Development, Southern Rural Development Center, Purdue University's Center for Regional Development.

Twin Valley Weed Management Area Receives Grant

Twin Valley Weed Management Area announced today that it will receive \$328,000.00 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust for the "Eastern Republican and Little Blue Riparian Improvement Project."

The Trust Board announced funding for the project at its meeting on April 2 in Lincoln. The project is one of the 113 projects receiving \$19,491,958 in grant awards from the Nebraska Environmental Trust this year. Of these, 56 were new applications and 57 are carry-over projects.

The highly successful Eastern Republican and Little Blue Riparian Improvement Project continues ongoing efforts to eradicate invasive species, control vegetation in stream

channels, and improve riparian habitat along the Republican and Little Blue Rivers and their tributaries within six of the Twin Valley Weed Management Area (TVWMA) counties.

Control efforts are conducted in a holistic manner, utilizing a full range of mechanical, biological and chemical tools.

TVWMA has undertaken this project over recent years to improve stream flow along the Republican and Little Blue Rivers to help enable Nebraska to meet its water delivery obligations to Kansas, to restore and maintain into the future a healthy river system and prevent wasteful degradation of water resources, to improve riparian habitat including replanting beneficial species, and to increase public awareness of the best practices that can be used to properly manage riparian lands.

The Nebraska Legislature created the Nebraska Environmental Trust in 1992. Using revenue from the Nebraska Lottery, the Trust has provided over \$233 million in grants to over 1,700 projects across the state.

Anyone - citizens, organizations, communities, farmers and businesses - can apply for funding to protect habitat, improve water quality and establish recycling programs in Nebraska.

The Nebraska Environmental Trust works to preserve, protect and restore our natural resources for future generations.



needs of employers and employees. Those taking the class will work on interview skills as well as their resumes.

"It's just like an employment agency," said Svanda. "We do the same thing: 'what do we need to do to get a job like that?'"

Most participants will not be working 40 hours a week, according to Svanda.

"Most will be working 2-15 hours a week depending on the jobs," said Svanda.

Once the participants have completed the course, the staff at Region V tries to find them a job that will fit his/her abilities and interests as well as employers' needs.

The staff at Region V has found that the best way to match individuals with potential employers is by word of mouth and personal connections.

"The more information we get out there, the better," said Tammy Hinrichs, Region V area director. "A majority of

employment is through personal connections ... so it's just about getting word out there and networking with different employers."

"This is a small community but a very accepting one," said Lisa Meyer, community support coordinator at Region V.

The staff have even formed a networking group with other community members to find potential employers.

"We are always looking to match people up," said Hinrichs. "We would be willing to meet with an employer at any time who contacts our office."

Once an individual is matched up to an employer, the staff wish for him/her to be as self-supporting as possible but are willing to step in to assist if needed.

"We want them to be as independent on the job site as they can be," said Svanda. "We help and do job support and job checks. If there's a problem, we go back in ... and help with whatever skills they

need to practice."

If there is an issue, coaches assist with job skills that need to be practiced outside of the workplace.

The job coach is at no cost to the employer.

Success stories Region V has had with employment matches include a man who has worked for Blue Valley Nursing Home in Hebron for 20 years, a woman who has worked at the Deshler Post Office for a year, a woman who has worked at the Hebron Subway for four years and a man who has worked as a dishwasher at Mary's Cafe for two years.

"It provides better quality of life," said Hinrichs. "They want the same things we want."

Region V works with over 900 individuals in southeast Nebraska.

There are currently offices in Auburn, Crete, David City, Fairbury, Lincoln, Nebraska City, Wahoo and York. There are satellite programs in Beatrice, Columbus, Gretna, Hebron and Seward.






Wiedel also took first in the 200 meter dash (22.00), another personal best. The junior also made second place for long jump (21'02") as well as for triple jump (41'06.5").

The Board of Trustees of the Village of Davenport, Nebraska, met in regular session on Monday, April 6, 2015, at 7:00 p.m. in the conference room of the fire hall. Minutes of the March regular meeting were declared approved as printed, there being no additions or corrections, and reading aloud being dispensed with, as copies of the minutes were distributed to trustees along with their notices.

The treasurer's report was given. Seifert, seconded by Crosier, moved that the report be accepted. Roll call vote: AYES: Crosier, Littrel, Manes, Seifert, Trapp. Motion carried. The semi annual transfer from the water fund to the electric fund for loan repayment will be done this month per September 2013 minutes.

Current patrol reports were available. Correspondence reviewed: State Dept. of Roads regarding the 2016-2018 STIP availability on line. Approach into town needs attention—Nebraska State Department of Roads will be contacted.

Claims for March expenses were presented and audited. Trapp, seconded by Littrel, moved that the claims be paid. Roll call vote: AYES: Crosier, Littrel, Manes, Seifert, Trapp. The chairman declared the motion carried and ordered payment of the following claims. It was suggested that the fire marshal should be contacted regarding any rules on required distance of fire hydrants from structures. Clerk will get the phone number of the fire marshal. Suggestion was made that perhaps the park bathrooms could use some updating. Littrel, seconded by Trapp, moved to adopt the Resolution For Participation in All-Hazard Mitigation Planning and Update Process: WHEREAS, a joint All-Hazards Mitigation Plan identifies the vulnerability of public bodies to natural or manmade hazards and the projects that can be implemented to reduce or eliminate vulnerability and exposure, and WHEREAS, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requires that a public entity must have a current All-Hazards Mitigation Plan in place before they are eligible for Federal funding for hazard mitigation projects and mitigation efforts resulting from natural disasters, and WHEREAS, the Lower Big Blue Natural Resources District and the Little Blue Natural Resources District will serve as the coordinating agencies, for the updating of the multi-jurisdictional All-Hazards Mitigation Plan for their respective districts and the nine-county area including all of Adams, Clay, Fillmore, Gage, Jefferson, Nuckolls, Saline, Thayer & Webster counties and all associated local governmental entities for which hazard mitigation planning is desirable, and WHEREAS, The Village of Davenport, Nebraska de-

sires to participate in the multi-jurisdictional All-Hazards Mitigation Plan update process for the benefit of the public we serve, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the governing board of the Village of Davenport, NE hereby states its willingness to participate in the proposed All-Hazards Mitigation Plan update process described above and will attend necessary meetings and participate in those activities necessary to complete an effective plan for all entities in the nine-county area. Roll call vote: AYES: Crosier, Littrel, Manes, Seifert, Trapp. Motion carried.

Seifert, seconded by Manes, moved that the removed park equipment—slide, infant swingset (2 swings) and merry-go-round be advertised for sale. Roll call vote: AYES: Crosier, Littrel, Manes, Seifert, Trapp. Motion carried. Sealed bids will be opened at the May meeting.

The annual water quality report was reviewed and has been filed with the State.

Reasonably priced backhoe and/or tractor will be pursued. It was the consensus of the Board that the tractor mentioned to Trapp here in town is too small for our use.

Seifert will make contacts regarding burning of structures. The fire department would be willing to do this—owners would need to pay for and meet inspection(s) and clean up expenses and requirements.

Rod Tegtmeier thanked the Board for their contributions to the ballpark improvements over the last year. It is hoped that the remainder of the fence could be replaced. The cost would be \$11,500.00. Some trees need to be trimmed at the ball field.

A thermal imaging camera has been ordered by the VFD. It was the consensus of the Board that payment of 1/3 by the Rural Fire Board, VFD and Village as moved earlier will be followed. The VFD is also looking into a demolition saw.

Maintenance reported doing some tree trimming with more to do, sewer back up on 6th (it will continue to be monitored) and discussed needed repairs for the chipper truck (maintenance will visit with Smith regarding this). The monitor screen for the alarm system will need to be replaced (if possible get more than one bid).

There being no further business to come before the Board the meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

Nebraska Timeline

BY THE NEBRASKA STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Moving the Capitol (or was it the Capitol?)

One conundrum that writers often face is the distinction between capitol (the building) and capital (the seat of government). According to one early Nebraska legislator, confusion over the meaning of the two words threatened to derail efforts to relocate the seat of Nebraska government in 1867.

Omaha was the capital of Nebraska Territory from 1855 until after statehood was achieved in 1867. This reality continually outraged legislators and other Nebraskans from south of the Platte River, who felt political chicanery by Omaha politicians and speculators had deprived the South Platters of their rightful claim to the prize.

Although the area south of the Platte had the larger population, Territorial Governor Thomas B. Cuming had drawn the legislative districts to give those living north of the Platte a majority. The North Platters were thus able to turn back all efforts to relocate the capital during the territorial years.

The political balance changed, however, with the ascendancy of the Republican Party during the Civil War and the election of the first state legislature, which had a South Platte majority. The first state governor, David Butler, was also from south of the Platte and could be counted on to support capital relocation.

One of Butler's first official acts was to call the state legislature into special session on May 16, 1867, to get the new state up and running. Removal of the capital from Omaha was high on the list of things to do. At that time, the legislature was still meeting in the former territorial capitol building in Omaha.

The South Platte majority in both houses of the legislature had the votes to effect removal, but the lack of a dictionary and the idiosyncrasies of the English language had them scratching their heads, according to William M. Hicklin, a representative from Otoe County. He recalled the story in connection with an 1892 reunion of members of the first state legislature, and his tale appeared in volume five of the Nebraska State Historical

Society Publications (1893). According to Hicklin, two days were required to draft the relocation bill because none of the legislators from the South Platte region knew which of the two words, capital or capitol, meant the seat of government and which meant the building from which the government operated.

Obviously, the bill's intent was to relocate the seat of government, "the capital," not the building, "the capitol." Not a single dictionary was to be found among the legislators from south of the Platte and no one in Omaha would lend them one, because Omaha residents opposed capital removal.

Some of the South Platte members were adamant that it was the capitol that was going to be removed, but they grew suspicious when Omaha legislators agreed with them.

Finally Hicklin telegraphed J. Sterling Morton in Nebraska City, who replied, "Ask the Omaha fellows and then spell it the other way. Keep your eyes open." With that, Hicklin and the others concluded that, indeed, it was the capital that they wanted to move, and the bill was drafted with the proper spelling to accomplish that goal.

It passed June 14, 1867, and capital commissioners Governor David Butler, Secretary of State Thomas P. Kennard, and Auditor John Gillespie proceeded to select the village of Lancaster (renamed Lincoln) as Nebraska's new state capital. A new capitol building was built there and the legislature convened in Lincoln for its 1869 session. Perhaps this is an apocryphal story, but it certainly fits the tone of the rough and tumble politics that characterized Nebraska's early years.

Hospital Guild purchases AED for medical clinics

The Hospital Guild for Thayer County Health Services recently purchased three Automated External Defibrillators (AED) for the Bruning, Chester and Milligan medical clinics. With the addition of these three, all six medical clinics now have one of these lifesaving devices.

An AED is used to treat a patient going into cardiac arrest. The AED is connected to their chest to check their heart rhythm. If necessary, the AED will automatically send an electrical current to the heart muscle. The AED sends

the jolt to try to reset the heart into a normal rhythm, possibly saving the patient's life.

Cardiac arrest usually occurs when the heart's electrical activity becomes disrupted and the heartbeat gets dangerously fast or chaotic. This may cause the heart to stop beating effectively and no longer be able to pump blood adequately.

During cardiac arrest, the brain and other vital organs quickly become starved of blood and the life-sustaining oxygen and nutrients it carries. If the heart rhythm is not

restored quickly there may be permanent damage to the brain and other organs.

Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is a vital step in the lifesaving process. CPR can keep some blood flowing to your heart and brain for a short time. But often only defibrillation can restore the heart's normal rhythm and ultimately save your life. This is especially true if you experience a type of abnormal heart rhythm known as ventricular fibrillation.
