Hazardous waste collection...

The Thayer County Commissioners in conjunction with Trailblazers, RC&D, will host a household hazardous waste collection on Saturday, April 13. Held from 8:30-11 a.m., at the Thayer County Road Department, 1309 Road 6100, Hebron, patrons can dispose of all paint, cleaning products, lawn and garden chemicals, pesticides, herbicides, used oil, antifreeze, batteries, florescent bulbs, and mercury items such as thermometers and thermostats at the collection.

No tires, electronic equipment, appliances, PCBs, picric acid, science lab or radioactive materials, biological hazards, pharmaceuticals, items containing asbestos, wood preservatives, explosives, will be accepted at the collection.

Also, household quantities, not commercial quantities of acceptable items will be accepted.

The collection is a free service provided by a coalition of organizations and volunteers concerned about the health of our environment, with financial support provided through a grant to the Trailblazer RC&D from the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality Waste Reduction and Recycling Program and other assistance provided by the Boy Scout Troop and Thayer County commissioners.

Annual Sales Tax...

Thayer County showed an 11.5 percent increase in net taxable sales for the annual 2012 period over 2011. The county had \$37,628,317 in net taxable sales for 2012 compared to \$33,743,618 the previous year according to the Nebraska Department of Revenue comparison of annual net taxable sales released in March.

The City of Hebron showed an 11.3 increase in the same time period after having \$20,225,570 in net taxable sales for 2012 over \$18,167,086 in 2011. The city collected \$1,112,408.18 in sales tax for the 2012 time period. 2011 saw a collection of \$999,542.58.

Thayer County collected 2,069,561.36 in sales tax for 2012 over the \$1,856,253.67 in 2011.

Little Blue cleanup starts this summer

TVWMA (Twin Valley Weed Management Area) officials met with local landowners in Deshler last week seeking permission to work along their property as the weed management team eradicates problematic vegetation and cleans up debris along the Little Blue River. TVWMA coordinator Merle Illian presented the plan. "All the work is within the channel," he told approximately 40 people in attendance Tuesday afternoon at the Thayer County fairground activity center. "We will not go outside the channel. We will not touch areas where erosion may be a problem, and we do not touch debris such as cement or iron. We only remove woody vegetation."

A couple of years ago, Illian said the TVWMA secured a \$568,000 grant from the Nebraska Environmental Trust to continue river improvement projects in the Republican and Little Blue River areas. For two years the co-op has been removing invasive plant species, specifically phragmites, and debris along the Republican River and its tributaries. "Now that we're finishing up with the Republican, we'll start on the Little Blue," he said.

Outlined in the Little Blue NRD's "Out of the Blue" March pamphlet, benefits of the project include flow enhancement, reduced flood damage, improved riparian forest health, re-establishment of natural landscapes, improved grazing for livestock and long-term control of invasive plants. Phragmites, a particularly invasive plant, had taken hold of the Republican River and basically choked off the flow of water, Illian explained. "We haven't seen much in the Little Blue, so that's a bonus."

Clay County weed superintendent Bruce Rumsey said the TVWMA was

formed in 2004 and includes county weed superintendents, Trailblazer RC&D, the Lower Republican and Little Blue NRDs, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Nebraska Game & Parks Commission and private landowners. "Noxious weeds don't recognize borders, so we banded together and joined our resources," he said. "With this last grant we've focused on the Republican River which was in very bad shape - 98 percent of our effort has been on the Republican."

Mail pick-up time changes start April 24

Daily mail pick-up service time changes could be taking place as soon as April 24, says Hebron Postmaster Mike Prellwitz. The time changes are quite significant, he said, noting Hebron's outgoing mail will be picked up at 3:30 p.m. each day instead of the current 5:15 p.m.

The shaved hours are proposed as a means of saving money for the cash-strapped US Postal Service. A similar proposal was made a couple of years ago, but was not enacted. Prellwitz said that although the pick-up service times are "proposed," the Hebron post office has changed the times on outside mailboxes. If the

changes do occur, he said, it will be on April 24 for the local area.

TCHS Board of Trustees begin search for CEO

Thayer County Health Services will see new leadership soon as the board begins the process of replacing the medical center's CEO. In the meantime, Janelle Ali-Dinar will step in as the administrator for at least 60 days.

Last month Ali-Dinar met with Thayer County Commissioners Dave Bruning, Chris Frye and Dean Kreuger to explain the upcoming process of finding a replacement for past CEO Joyce Beck. Beck was relieved of her duties in February after the commissioners told the hospital's board of trustees to "do what they felt they needed to do to improve

morale," at the facility.

Last week, the board of trustees held a strategic planning meeting where members worked on developing a comprehensive strategic plan to address key issues facing TCHS. Topics included replacing the administrator, provider recruitment, employee engagement, optimizing growth opportunities and budgets and capital projects.

The hospital will also pursue a community assessment survey which will help determine what the future healthcare needs are for the communities served by Thayer County Health Services. Based on the results

of the survey, Thayer County Health Services will be able to develop a comprehensive plan to meet not only the current, but future needs facing the facility. The survey will also outline recruitment needs.

The timetable necessary to develop, implement and put all of the strategic plans will be an on-going process. In the meantime, the board appointed Janelle Ali-Dinar, Regional Director, CHI NE/St. Elizabeth Regional Medical Center (SERMC) as the interim CEO at Thayer County Health Services. Janelle will be on

New mobile access to GIS available for Thayer County

Thayer County is pleased to announce brand new mobile access to GIS and assessment data. Due to the ever-increasing use of mobile devices and smartphones, anyone may now access county assessment and property data via their mobile devices. This option is open to anyone using a mobile device such as a tablet or smartphone with an available internet connection. The existing assessor website, hosted by GIS Workshop, will now be available in a mobile, or 'lite' version with the same ease of use and access to all the same property information.

As of Friday April 5, anyone visiting the existing website from a mobile device will be automatically directed to the mobile version of the site. They will still have the ability to search for property information by Parcel ID, Owner Name, Street Address, and Section/Township/Range. Searching the county for any of these will bring up a list of search results with links to the individual pdf reports in the same format as on the desktop website. In addition, the mobile site will have full map functionality that will allow anyone to see the map, zoom to a property, pan, and click on a parcel to access reports. Full data regarding values, taxes, and property photos will now be conveniently available from any smartphone or tablet in a condensed and easy to read format.

1883

130 Years Ago

John Sawyer of Friedensau has gone to purchase more sheep.

Mrs. E.L. Johnson of this place, announces her new millinery establishment in this issue.

H.J. Struve of Friedensau, during the last 30 days, has shipped east 2,000 dozen eggs, 2,000 pounds of butter and has sold over \$2,000 worth of farm machinery.

G.H. Galbraith of Davenport precinct, is making a specialty of sheep-raising. He now has about 500 and reports them doing well.

J.J. Kern of Friedensau is making a specialty of Berkshire hogs. He has lately sent to Missouri for another expensive pair of those thoroughbred animals.

F.J. Hendershot reports sale of three quarter sections to parties who will become residents of this county. The prices were \$1,200, \$1,400 and \$1,900.

It is with feelings of sadness that we announce the death of Morgan Bartlett from injuries resulting from the kick of a horse just a week before. By his quiet, gentlemanly conduct and faithfulness he had gained many friends who deeply sympathize with this grief-stricken relatives in their last great affliction.

We are informed that two gentlemen have been looking over the business prospects of Belvidere and are so well pleased with the outlook that they have decided to start a bank and lumber yard in that place. One of the gentlemen is a lumber dealer of extensive experience and proposes to furnish lumber at unprecedented low rates.

A commercial traveler reported that the passenger train on the S.J.&W. passed over a bridge a mile north of Hastings to which the bodies of two dead men were hanging. Later intelligence confirms the report. The bodies were the remains of Ingram and Green, who received a lynching at the hands of a Hastings vigilance committee of 35 for the assassination of a citizen of that city.

Dr. J. Piggott of Belvidere, one of the largest landowners in this county, has just bought another improved farm. His last purchase is the place recently owned by Charles A. Bede, and joins Dr. Piggott's "St. Louis Park Farm," formerly owned by M.I. Meade. The doctor claims that this farm, now consisting of 320 acres is unexcelled for natural beauty, and planted groves by any farm in the western hemisphere. He now owns 11 well-improved farms, aggregating 1,760 acres and they are all valuable. From 1,000 acres of corn last year, he received an average yield of 45 bushels. This season he will raise 1,200 acres of corn and about 500 acres of small grain. After four years experience he speaks in the highest terms of praise of the soil. Climate and healthfulness of this county, and claims that its qualifications for mixed farming and stock-raising are excelled by no other locality he knows.

Mrs. H.G. Huse, landlady of the Gettis House, has lately been adding some elegant furniture to her cozy and attractive establishment. Under her deft management her guests can have little to desire.

The term of school just closed in Hebron has been a profitable one to the pupils under the excellent instructions of Prof. D.S. Duesenbury, Nellie Fletcher, Lizzie Green and Josie N. Keith.

James Bittle from Iowa has purchased a farm and has become a resident of Spring Creek precinct, this county.

William Van Winkle, a painter of this place, fell while in McKenzie's blacksmith shop and received severe injuries.

F.L. Bruning of Belvidere was gladdened by the arrival of his parents and a brother from Illinois. Thayer's population will receive a welcome accession by these arrivals, as they will hereafter be citizens of this county.





Turning to the Little Blue River, Illian said pruning, thinning and removal of fallen trees, controlled burns and sediment removal will be used to maintain the river. "This is a three-phase project," he said noting logjam and debris removal will begin this summer. "And we don't just kick the debris down the channel; we pull it out of there, up and away from the river. We take fallen trees put them up on the bank as far as we can, kind of tuck them in among other trees so they won't float down the river when it's up."

Illian said landowners would be contacted prior to workers entering their property. "We want to walk your area, take suggestions from you, explain what we need to do and work with you,"

he said. "For instance, if you have a favorite fishing hole that has a log sitting there, we won't touch it if you don't want us to."

Illian said the Little Blue had some trouble areas but for the most part was in good shape. The upcoming project would be more for maintenance than anything he explained.

Phase two - chemical treatment of noxious and invasive vegetation - will take place in the fall he said. "We use a helicopter to spray, particularly the islands in the river. Vegetation on the islands traps sediment causing the island to become higher. That forces the channel to change and can limit carrying capacity of the river. So we want to take out all the vegetation off the islands. We also use ATVs." The TVWMA uses Habitat to chemically

treat the unwanted weeds and will stay strictly in the channel to avoid any contact with crops, he said.

Phase three is follow-up, he explained. "We come back in the summer of 2014 and address all the chemically treated vegetation. We disc the vegetation, roll it under the soil, then pulverize the ground to open it up."

Illian said of course the vegetation will come back, especially in dry years, but the management team hopes landowners will help them out by keeping their areas clean of noxious weeds.
