Cleared canal raises erosion concerns

When the Hebron City Council hired Crowl Tree Service of Superior, the idea was to clear away overgrown and dead trees surrounding city power lines; power lines that were being revamped in a major maintenance project. But when local residents in the neighborhood of Duffield Avenue and Seventh Street complained of large branches falling from three dying trees growing in a canal running through their neighborhood, the City decided to have the tree service take the trees out.

"They were already clearing away branches from power lines in an alley that runs through there," said Mayor Shane Day earlier last month, "and after we checked the trees, we found they were dying, so we asked Crowl to take them out."

Mayor Day said residents of the neighborhood complained of large tree branches dropping from the old Cottonwoods into yards and the street. He said one individual was afraid the large branches would land on one of his vehicles or cause some other damage to his personal property.

The mayor said the neighbors were asked by the tree service what they wanted removed and the service and city workers were told they wanted the canal cleared.

"It's the city's responsibility to keep the canal clear of limbs and debris for water flow," said councilman Rich Koch Monday night during the regular council meeting. But everyone on the board said they were surprised when all the trees had been removed. Not all were dying.

"The job cost \$3,900," said Mayor Day, "and that was the bid for the three trees. We (the board and city workers) were under the impression that only those trees were removed until we saw it. We weren't billed for the extra work, but we, and apparently Crowl's, thought it's what the neighbors wanted."

The project took three days to complete during a two-week period in January. Snowstorms delayed work.

When the work was done, the three dead trees were gone, but so too were all the trees that grew there and now erosion is the major concern. "We won't remove any of the stumps because we need to keep the roots

there to hold the sides of the canal in place," Mayor Day said last month. "We'll shave the stumps down this spring so they aren't sticking out of the ground so high and plant smaller trees and bushes for erosion control and to look nicer."

Filling in the canal with dirt is out of the question as it was put in to control drainage; however, according to one of the neighbors, it doesn't seem to fill with water like it used to. Drainage has changed over the decades with the installation of a pond, road improvements, and other land work.

Councilmen Kurk Wiedel and Robert Dodes are investigating planting new smaller trees and hedges in the area in an effort to answer the erosion issue. "We've been working with the neighbors to fix the problem," said councilman Wiedel. "Our biggest worry is the erosion."

Mayor Day said Monday night the board is treating the canal much the same way as terrace trees. "We have to keep trees trimmed back from the streets and sidewalks even if they sit on private property, and to do that we try to work with property owners and take suggestions from them about how to make their trees look the best for their property," he said. "That's what happened with the canal."

Thayer Central school board approves new track plan

At its March meeting, the Thayer Central school board approved plans to make improvements to the track; costs could reach \$700,000 and beyond.

"We need to solve some drainage issues in an effort to maximize the life of our track," said Thayer Central

Superintendent Drew Harris, adding the entire project involves putting in a completely new track, irrigating the interior of the track area, restructuring the field events stations, and putting in infra-structure to facilitate other projects down the line.

Funding to start is available as the board has budgeted for the expense in the past few years. "We knew we were going to have to do some-

thing," the superintendent said, "so we allowed for the expense in the building fund."

In his most recent newsletter, the superintendent suggests developing issues with the track are causing concern for safety, specifically cracking due to problems with the base. Resurfacing the track really won't address the issue since the problem is underneath the surface. The board

agrees.

"There's a drainage problem that needs to be fixed," said board member Mike Prellwitz. "Right now water flows underneath the surface which is damaging the base and since the base is bad it needs to be replaced. We need to raise it a couple of feet and fix the drainage to flow away from the track."

And since the board is essentially working from the ground up, other jobs have managed to piggy-back themselves to the main issue. "We have wanted to move the football field from the Sports Complex up to the school," Prellwitz explained, "and starting from scratch on the track will allow us to prepare for that."

Harris said he wasn't sure if moving the football field from the downtown area up to the school's track area would ever happen, but if it did, the school would be ready once the track project is done.

Along with removal of the existing track surface and base, increasing the track size to eight lanes, improving drainage and adding rubberized surfacing to the track, new field event areas will be created, irrigation will be added, wiring and conduit for lighting will be installed, and parking will be extended.

"These plans complement the Thayer Central Athletic Boosters' plans for athletic facility improvements," Superintendent Harris said in his newsletter. "They serve as Phase I of their proposal."

The school administration and board of education have been working in conjunction with the Athletic Boosters and details of the plan can be found on the school website at www.thayercentral.org. Click on the 'Boosters' tab at the top of the home page.

While it isn't really known how quickly the work can get done, the board is optimistic about having the new track ready for the 2012 season. "It will depend on the bidding," Superintendent Harris said. "Right now we are at the design and research stage."

Titans hold annual meet

The Thayer Central Boys' Track team won its own meet last week, cruising to the championship behind the 3200 relay team including members Trev Mumm, Jared Marsh, Kalen Wensum and Kesston Fink. The team ran the race in 8:54.8. The next day at Wilber, the team, replacing Marsh with Michael Feulner, raced to another first place finish in 9:01.

Individually during the home meet, Dietrich Brinegar swept the hurdling events assisting the Titans to its championship. Brinegar ran the 110 high hurdles in 16.79 and 300 intermediate hurdles in 43.29 seconds for the wins.

Thayer Central freshman Madison Reece led the girls' individual scores finishing first in the 800 meter run. The team finished with 49 points.

For Deshler, two relay teams collected championships on the day including the 400 meter (46.62 seconds) and 1600 meter (3:39.55) races. Both teams include Josiah Burger, Cody Loupin, Luke Dlouhy, and Thomas Vonderfecht. Vonderfecht went on to collect Deshler's only individual gold finishing first in both the 200 and 400 meter races.

Reading Assessment Results

This past year, Nebraska schools began to administer statewide reading tests. For the first time ever, Nebraskans will be able to compare their school district with other districts in the state.

Known as the Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) Reading Assessment, it was taken by students in grades three through three through eight and high school juniors. I want to focus on the results of our high schools.

Nebraska has 251 school districts that range from a few students to nearly 50,000 students. That doesn't provide a good basis for comparing the reading results of Omaha Central or Lincoln East High Schools to smaller schools like Bloomfield or Garden County.

A more useful comparison is to compare results according to our sports classifications - Class A, B, C-1, C-2, and smaller school districts.

Today I want to recognize Nebraska's top performing high schools in reading.

Among smaller school, the top five performing schools were Bloomfield, Johnson-Brock, Cody-Kilgore, Elgin, and Rock County High Schools.

In Class C-2, the top five schools were Hershey, Palmyra, Sutton, Malcolm, and Cross County. In C-1, the top five were Ord, Ainsworth, North Bend, Wahoo, and Douglas County West High Schools.

In Class B, the top high schools were Bennington, Aurora, Adams Central, Waverly, and Elkhorn. In Class A,

the top five performing high schools were Millard West, Papillion-LaVista South, Lincoln East, Millard North, and Bellevue West.

This is the first year Nebraska has conducted a statewide reading test so I want us to be careful in analyzing the results. This year is the benchmark, the starting point. Next year, we will begin to measure school growth and progress.

Over time, the results of the reading assessment and other subjects will be informative and useful in improving our schools. We should be able to identify schools with consistently high academic achievement and share their success stories with all schools. We should also be able to identify the schools with the best growth and improvement

plans and share their progress with all schools. It's about individual school achievement and school growth. Both are important.

This spring the first statewide math assessment will take place with results announced in the fall, with a statewide science assessment following in 2012. My expectation is that this new method of gauging student and school progress will provide important information that benefits our schools and our citizens.

Encourage parents, teachers and school officials to keep a positive focus on these initial results. We have good schools in our state. In a new age of data collection and analysis, this information will be an important tool in helping make our schools even better.



Legislative Update

This week we continued debating senator and committee priority bills.

We debated a bill on a subject close to my heart this week, LB305, a bill to create a state meat and poultry inspection program. Having owned and operated Karpisek's Market for nearly 20 years, I feel strongly that this bill fails to address any real issue, and doesn't provide the economic development that is claimed by the bill's introducer. I believe the only thing that LB305

may accomplish would be horse slaughter in the state. Although I am not opposed to that, it is not clear that it is even possible because of federal regulations, not to mention the cost to implement a state meat inspection program. I cast the only opposing vote on the bill, and it advanced from first-round debate.

The Legislature also debated a controversial measure that would affect the distribution of the Environmental Trust Cash Fund. LB229 would

transfer these funds to the Water Resources Cash Fund for use in water conservation projects. There was significant opposition during the hearing on this bill, as many people feel these funds are needed for the environmental trust and should only be used for that specific purpose. After a lengthy discussion and a major compromise, the bill advanced to second-round debate.

At the end of the week the body debated and advanced a bill by Sen. Council, LB200, that proposes the creation of a

financing program to stimulate grocery stores and other types of food sourcing establishments in what are referred to as "food deserts." In many rural and urban parts of the state, fresh and healthy foods are not available. Although I support this concept, I am wary of funding large businesses that are not good for locally-owned, main street businesses in small town Nebraska.

Capital View

LINCOLN - If you have lived long enough to be someone who reads newspaper columns about what's going on in state government, you have lived long enough to know that life isn't fair. It's just inexorable.

Life has ways of reminding us, individually and collectively, that our world isn't everything. Or, more specifically, that the world isn't ours to the degree we usually presume it is.

A tsunami will do it, probably for billions of people, simultaneously.

Sometimes, it takes only a conversational ripple to remind us that our parochial worldview is, in fact, parochial.

A few days ago I was around and about downtown Lincoln. What with the Legislature being in session, and this being the time of year when decisions start being made, it's also the time of year when policy matters of all sorts might begin to clog a reporter's brain. Especially if he's been around long enough to have his brain clogged with government history the way his arteries are clogged with sausage gravy. (I've spent years in Nebraska diners, eating breakfast and reading newspapers.)

And somewhere along the way to some place during this downtown excursion, a longtime acquaintance happened along, and the usual sidewalk palaver ensued.

"Hey! You look happy and healthy. How's the family?"

"Everyone's good."

"Glad to hear it."

"Is the Legislature in session these days?"

"What? (Incredulously). What did you ask me?"

"I asked if the Legislature was in town. Oh, (bleep)! You're going to make a speech now, aren't you? (Testily) You're going to do that same old show ... Not everyone wakes up every day and worries about government!"

It was embarrassing. Not because someone was standing in the street berating me; over the years, that hasn't been as unusual as it should have been. It was embarrassing because she was right. The "same old ..." stuff was on the tip of my ego. Or, it had been.

After promising that no lecture would be unleashed, I didn't apologize, but I did offer an explanation.

Parents tell you to stand up straight. Accountants tell you to keep your receipts. Dentists tell you to floss. People who have "lived government" most of their lives tell you to pay attention to it. The problem with the latter is that some of us don't "leave it at the office."

Last year I wrote a column forever swearing off columns aimed at cajoling, scolding, encouraging or otherwise nudging people along the path toward paying attention to government, or writing to their state senators every so often, and like matters. Such columns were mostly useless, and presumptuous.

That resolution has been easily observed.

My new resolution, hereby solemnly affirmed, is to forego turning conversations into classrooms. It has finally dawned upon me that it is too often as rude as it usually is pointless.

After all, my parents told me to stand up straight, my accountant told me to save receipts and my dentist told me to floss. And here I sit, a guy with bad posture and false teeth, who'd be ten years behind on his taxes if his wife didn't keep his receipts.

April Is Occupational Therapy Month

Our lives are comprised of hundreds of activities that define our life roles. These "occupations" have a profound impact on how we feel physically, emotionally, and even spiritually. They can provide a sense of satisfaction and well-being, or they can create stress, imbalance, and dissatisfaction. The study of the nature, function, and meaning of human activities is the main focus of occupational science. The application of activities to promote health and well-being is the primary pursuit of occupational therapy.

Occupational therapy is a health care profession aimed at improving performance, preventing illness and disability and promoting adaptation to life changes. In this interdisciplinary field, occupational therapists help people, including those with disabilities, live healthier, happier, and more productive lives.

History of Occupational Therapy

Occupational therapy sprang from an American society affected by industrialization, the effects of World War I, and the rapidly growing populations that lived in the city and worked in factories. With the rising incidence of industrial and automotive accidents, and medical advances that saved more and more lives, a growing population faced long-term disabilities with few resources for reconstructing lives. In 1917, a group of men and women founded the National Society for the Promotion of Occupational Therapy. These pioneers focused on the activity or "occupations" as an important therapeutic tool in the recovery of the ill and disabled.

During its early years, occupational therapy centered on hospital care, often providing the only programs available for people spending their lives in institutions. Today, occupational therapy has expanded to meet new social needs. This includes the growing aging population, the large increase in premature infants, the rise in chronic health problems, and the growing connection between lifestyle, occupation, and long-term wellness.

Therapists Do?

Occupational therapists assess, utilize, and adapt everyday activities to improve function, enhance performance, promote health, prevent illness, and increase independence in those persons to whom they provide services. They work collaboratively with their clients to identify areas of need and to develop creative solutions to address these areas.

An occupational therapist might:

- Help someone relearn to dress themselves following a stroke, head injury or spinal cord injury.

- Work with someone to regain functional use of their arm/hand following a stroke.

- Work with someone to improve their hand skills following an injury or surgery.

Although historically occupational therapists have worked with people who had experienced catastrophic illness or are living with a disability; today's occupational therapists are increasingly working with well populations. 
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Endorf Named Nebraska Mother Of The Year

The 2011 Nebraska Mother of the Year, Charlotte Vetch Endorf, was honored on April 1 by the Nebraska chapter of American Mothers, Inc. The ceremony was held in the east chamber of the state capitol.

A formal proclamation of legislative resolution was made by a representative from the office of Senator Mike Flood, Speaker of the Legislature. National Mother of the Year honors have been given since 1935 and Nebraska leads the U.S. with a total of six. Endorf will attend the national ceremony in Utah on April 28.

Charlotte is a native of Thayer County and grew up in Alexandria. Following her graduation from Meridian in 1982, she attended Southeast Community College and later married high school classmate Kevin Endorf of Western. The couple made their home in Fairbury, but job changes sent them to Norfolk 16 years ago. They have two children, Sarah and Spencer.

Sarah has now earned an associate's degree and will soon begin Montessori training in early childhood

development. Spencer plans to attend college following his high school graduation this spring. The Endorfs have also opened their home to foster children who need shelter on an emergency basis, and Charlotte is a mentor for Dr. Tom Osborne's Teammates program.

After the move to Norfolk, Charlotte and Kevin decided to do some financial belt tightening so she could be a stay-at-home mother. Their decision was fortunate, because Sarah contracted Lyme disease when she was 14. The disease was already advanced and difficult to treat before a definite diagnosis was made.

She attended school via a television hookup with her mother's assistance. Seven years later, Sarah still has health problems that require occasional trips to the Mayo Clinic, but she is much improved.

Charlotte began her writing career with a small book she and Sarah wrote about overcoming Lyme disease. A Toastmaster's speaking veteran, she ventured into a new area and began talking

to groups about the orphan trains that left New York for the west shortly before 1900. The Nebraska Humanities Council sponsors her in these engagements. She spoke at the museum in Belvidere last year and was recently in Deshler.

This interest expanded to five books about orphans who rode the trains and were adopted by Nebraska families. More information can be found at her web site, unsungneighbors.com.

Friday's ceremony at the capitol was followed by a luncheon at the governor's mansion. In addition to her husband and children, many area relatives and friends attended both events.

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

We all have something to teach others. We should reflect on how we can share our knowledge with others and thus make the world a better place.






Alessandro competes

1976 — 35 Years Ago —

Track manager W.G. Cox of Salisaw, Okla., was hired to manage the Deshler quarterhorse races, according to John Zucker, Thayer County Fair Board president.

Freak Spring Storm Cripples Area: The Lincoln Telephone Company had more than 2,500 telephone poles down, interrupting service to more than 7,000 telephone customers in a 16-county area. Emergency crews were working as many hours a day as possible until the damaged poles and lines were repaired and service restored. There was standing room only at the Hebron Laundromat as large crowds stood in line for use of the machines. Generators were the life-line for many businesses throughout the county especially the grocery stores containing perishable goods. Towns in the county allowed farmers to fill tanks with water for use in providing livestock with water. Power poles in the county were down for as far as the eye could see. Gas tank trucks were used to fill automobiles in the areas where electricity had not been restored.

The Thayer County 4-H Tractor Club was to be organized at the courthouse district courtroom for youth under 16 years of age as well as farm wives. Those who enrolled were able to qualify for the Hazardous Occupation certificate or Tractor Operator's Permit.


complement each other. The organization's primary areas of focus include basic needs, education, family development, health and nutrition, housing and transportation programs.

LBNRD Water Quantity Reminders

Spring is here and everyone seems to have one speed--fast. The Little blue Natural Resources District would like to remind landowners of some rule sand regulations that went into effect in 2007 under the District's Groundwater Management Plan.

With the current price of crops, you can drive around the district and see a lot of dirt work underway and pivots being installed. The first policy reminder is water well permitting.

WELL CONSTRUCTION: Any person who intends to construct a water well in the District on land which he or she owns must contact the LBNRD first and request paperwork for a permit. Permits are required for any new water well, or series of water wells, intended to pump 50 gallons per minute or more. They are also required for replacement wells. No well construction may begin before the permit is approved by the District.

There are exemptions to this policy 1) No permit shall be required for test holes or dewatering wells with an intended use of ninety days or less and 2) No permit shall be required for a single water well designed and constructed to pump fifty gallons per minute or less.

The following rules apply to properly permitting a new water well construction.

1) All applications for a new water well shall be submitted on forms provided by the District not less than seven calendar days prior to the intended date of construction. The District has thirty days to issue or deny the permit granted by state law. But remember, no well construction may begin before the permit is approved by the District.

2) The application must be accompanied by a sketch of the site with a distinctive mark of the proposed new well. Irrigation wells authorized by this permit may not be constructed closer than 1000 feet to any existing well having a capacity of 50 gallons per minute or more. This applies to all irrigation wells, even if registered to the same owner. Other permitted wells with spacing protection will be regulated by state statutes.

3) The fee for a new well permit is \$50 per application; a late permit is \$250. If you have any questions concerning construction of water wells, please contact the LBNRD prior to any drilling.

WATER TRANSFERS: Nebraska law is very specific that a landowner's right is for "use" of groundwater not a right of "Ownership." The term "public ownership" generally means that groundwater should be held in trust for the future, or defined as not being wasteful ("rule of reasonable use"). A landowner is entitled to use that groundwater found under the surface of the ground

for "reasonable and beneficial" use on the overlying land, subject to District rules and regulations.

Rules for Transfers for Irrigation:

1) Any person who intends to transfer water from the overlying tract for the purpose of irrigation, either with a new or existing irrigation well or series of wells, shall before construction, apply with the districts for permit to do so.

2) A groundwater user shall only be allowed to initiate new groundwater transfer for irrigated crop production to a government survey quarter (1/4) section directly adjacent or catercorner to the tract of land on which the water well is located.

3) The tract of land on which the well is located must be single tract no larger than 160 acres. An irrigation well used for transfer may not irrigate more additional acres than the total acreage of the tract of land on which the well is located.

4) New transfers of irrigation water from within the LBNRD to any area where a well moratorium, permit suspension, or groundwater allocation has been established is prohibited.

5) A non-refundable application fee of \$100 payable to the LBNRD shall accompany all requests for an irrigation transfer.

All applications for transfers are reviewed by the district's Water Resources Committee and recommendations acted upon by the Board of Directors at their monthly meeting. The District will either approve, approve with conditions, deny, or request additional information before action on the transfer.




