Council faces nuisance

The Hebron City Council ruled to send a notice to the landlord of 724 Union Ave., Tim Hartley, after more than five neighbors attended the council's meeting Monday evening

to complain. According to the neighbors, birds are building nests in the dwelling and there are five to six dogs living in the home, along with children. Several of the dogs are pit bulls and labeled by the city's new ordinance

as "potentially dangerous." The neighbors said the city hasn't acted on the property. They are scared because they often hear people in their yards at night. They are also tired of trash blowing from the property to their yards and the obvious dilapidation of the home with its broken windows. One neighbor said there is black mold in the basement.

"Ninety percent of us wouldn't live there," a neighbor said.

"We've noticed they are moving the dogs from house to house," another neighbor said.

On the law enforcement side, Mayor Shane Day, who is also a Thayer County deputy, said officers are at the home three to four times a week. Day said the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services was at the residence Monday.

Three months ago, Hartley asked the council for time to make repairs because the current tenants were due to move out. The council granted him 30 days.

In other business, the flashing light on Lincoln Avenue used for the primary school will be moved to 9th and Barger Streets at the end of the school year as a safeguard for students walking to and from school. The council arrived at the solution after a parent requested a four-way stop.

The City of Hebron will go live on Facebook. City employee, Sidnee Reinsch, asked about a Facebook page to keep citizens informed.

"It should be an informational site," Councilman Larry Fangmeier said. Fangmeier doesn't want the page to turn into a debate.

his sons, Dale and John. "When you work alongside somebody, you better get along," John said.

"Our dad thought it would be good for us. It was a pretty big leap of faith," Dale said.

Dale was 20 then. John, 22. The brothers went their separate ways for college. Dale was at the Grand Island School of Business. John took the Central Community College in Hastings route for auto repairs.

The business-sense and mechanical know-how brothers came together to form Bruning Motors.

Marvin was friends with a guy named Max Wilmore, who owned the building Bruning Motors occupies. The brothers were prepared to take over April 1, 1976.

On March 29, the famed Blizzard of '76 blanketed Nebraska and cut the power for thousands.

Dale and John began their new adventure in darkness.

"We had no electricity for 10 days or so," Dale said.

A flashlight allowed them to do some tire work and a belt hooked to a lawnmower helped pump gas.

We were off to a rough start," Forty years later, Dale and John are

Circle of Friends gather for autism

Makayla Johnson joined Circle of Friends at its inception three years ago to know more about autism. Circle of Friends is a 14-member group at Thayer Central High School.

"It makes my day a lot better when I'm making someone else's day," another member, Sequoia Heinrichs said.

As part of the group, the girls have learned breathing and stress relieving techniques to help COF's target student with autism enjoy school days. In turn, the target student has benefitted, Laurie Fischer, the group's sponsor said.

"He is more social and always excited to meet Tuesdays," Fischer said about the circle's weekly meetings.

If Johnson stays in the group, she will transition out when she graduates.

"It's nice when you can have consistency. The program is built to keep the circle close," Fischer said.

The Autism Action Partnership provides a grant to Thayer Central's COF, which is also assisted by Lisa Richardson and Jana Tietjen. The partnership defines the COF as a peer-mediated intervention for their classmates with social challenges.

Students are invited to befriend the target students. The members are educated with strategies for connecting with their target students.

April is Autism Awareness Month and to highlight



autism, COF members are asking their fellow students and the community at large to wear the organization's campaign color, blue on Fridays. They are also selling blue suckers and wristbands until April 8. Information on autism will be available.

The group created even more visibility for autism at the junior high track meet April 5 and the Quiz Bowl April 6.

Fischer said members have fun as well, and around Christmas, they hold a party and gift exchange.

World Autism Awareness Day was April 2. Autism is a developmental disorder that is displayed through certain behaviors, such as communication, keeping eye contact, developing relationships and using motor skills. People with autism may have sleep disturbance or gastrointestinal issues.

Region V unveils new Hebron facility

After approximately 10 years of searching, planning and designing, Region V employees and clients have settled into their new home at 2nd

and Olive Streets A ribbon cutting April 1 sealed the long journey to find a new facility that would draw more clients in for employment training and other

services. "We are an employment-first agency," Region V Coordinator Lisa Mever said.

In the last two years, the agency seriously pursued a building that was accessible to their clients and spacious.

"It was too hard to find an existing building. That is when we really started researching lots. We wanted to stay close to the business district," Meyer said.

Director Tammy Hinrichs, who also oversees Fairbury's Region V, said an architect helped the agency realize how it could expand. Hergott Construction made the expansion

"As you will see when you enter these doors, we have added several amenities that the people we support did not have access to at our previous site," Hinrichs said during her speech at the ribbon-cutting.

"We came up with the design and what we wanted it to be," Meyer

Inside the new facility, warm colors and open areas welcomed members of the community as Sandra Meyer held oversized scissors to slice

Clients will be able to learn receptionist skills at the building's front desk. Or, they can start training at a grocery store station with a cash register. Another station is geared toward restaurant work and in a laundry station, clients can train to fold and iron in addition to learning how to look for job interviews.

Meyer said job coaches are on hand and once a client lands a job, they will continue to learn about the job and how to keep their job.

Region V clients may be deaf,

blind, in a wheelchair or have another developmental disability, like Spina Bifida.

"We help them figure out what they need," Meyer said. "They determine their services. People think this is an institutional setting for people who can't take care of themselves. This is a community-based program. They're driving the car, we're just helping them get to their destination."

Meyer, who has been with the agency for four years, said they are hoping to expand even further. The Hebron office employs 20 people, while the Fairbury location is closer

"It's a win-win for the community," she said.

Region V trains individuals during the day and watches over some of them at night. Hebron has three group homes and Deshler, one.

"Some are more independent than others and want to stay living with their families," Meyer said.

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

Local churches sponsor adventure day

In addition, Western resident, Johnny Barta will bring his turkey and predator calling experience while Shannon LeFave and the boy scouts will teach basic bushcraft. To finish out the afternoon. participants will help create their own dutch oven desserts before heading indoors for a catered meal.

After the meal, families will be treated to a message by Pastor Zeke Pipher, who is a Nebraska native and bow hunting expert.

Pipher has regularly contributed to several outdoor and hunting magazines. He is the pastor of the Evangelical Free Church in Central City.

Aperson's life is comprised of hundreds of activities that define their life roles. These "occupations" have a profound impact on how they feel physically, emotionally, and even spiritually. These roles can provide a sense of satisfaction and well-being, or they can create stress, imbalance, and dissatisfaction.

The study of the nature, function, and meaning of human activities is the main focus of Occupational Science. The application of activities to promote health and well-being is the primary pursuit of occupational therapy.

Occupational therapy is the only profession that helps people across the lifespan to do the things they want and need to do through the therapeutic use of daily activities (occupations).

Occupational therapy practitioners enable people of all ages to live life to its fullest by helping them promote health, and prevent-or live better with—injury, illness, or disability. These are just some of the interventions and services that occupational therapy practitioners can provide:

• Helping children with mental challenges such as autism or physical disabilities.

· Work with someone to improve their hand skills following an injury or surgery. • Complete a home assess-

ment to make recommendations to increase function and prevent falls.

• Perform wheelchair seating and positioning evaluation.

• Fabricate a splint for someone with arthritis. (or hand injuries).

• Work with patients who have had a stroke resume

independence with daily living skills.

• Help people recovering from injury to regain skills necessary to return to work.

 Provide support for older adults experiencing physical and cognitive changes.

• Helping veterans with physical injuries and mental challenges such as TBI or PTSD.

Occupational therapy practitioners have a holistic perspective, in which the focus is on adapting the environment to fit the person, and the person is an integral part of the therapy team. It is a health care profession aimed at improving performance, preventing illness and disability, and promoting adaptation to life changes. In this interdisciplinary field, occupational therapists help people, including those with disabilities, live healthier, happier, and more productive lives.

Occupational therapists provide services to people from all walks of life, from infants in a neo-natal intensive care unit, to children in an elementary school, to students in a community college, to adults in a rehabilitation center, to elders living in a retirement community.

Although historically occupational therapists have worked with people who had experienced catastrophic illness or are living with a disability; today's occupational therapists are increasingly working with well popula-



Eleanora "Elly" (Larsen) Petersen was born at Fremont, on August 27, 1921, to Rev. Knud and Otthea (Poulsen) Larsen, the eighth of ten children and the youngest daughter. She passed away at Hebron on March 31, 2016, at the age of 94 years, seven months and four days.

As a baby, she moved with her family to Cushing, Wisconsin, returning to Kennard, Neb., where



she started school. In 1930, their family moved to Laurel where Elly graduated from high school with the class of

She was baptized by Rev. James Petersen in Fremont into the Lutheran Church and was confirmed by her father in 1934. After graduation, she and her sister accompanied their parents on an ocean voyage to Denmark; however, their vacation was cut short by the start of WWII. Returning to the United States, she worked in Chicago as a private "nanny." In 1940, she returned home to take care of her mother after surgery.

Elly was united in marriage October 18, 1941, by her father, Rev. Knud Larsen in Laurel, to Monty C. Petersen. They lived in the North Loup area until Monty left in 1942 to serve in the armed forces during WWII. Gladys was born in 1942 and, during the time Monty was gone, Elly took her daughter and went to live with her parents in Laurel.

When her dad got a call to serve the Cordova and Staplehurst churches, she moved to Cordova with her parents, and her children, Gladys and David, who was born in 1944 shortly before they moved.

After Monty was discharged, she and Monty began their life on a farm near Cordova. In 1947, triplets joined the family, Kenneth, Kermit and Katherine. Elly and Monty continued to make their home in the Cordova area until Monty's death in 1997 and Elly moved to the Friendship Terrace in Friend. After 14 years, Elly moved to the Garden Square Assisted living in Crete. When her health declined, she moved to Blue Valley Lutheran Home in Hebron, where she spent her last year.

Elly worked three years for Dr. Will and Dr. Coll Kamprath in Utica as a nanny. She later was employed at Warren Memorial Hospital in Friend as a nurse aide for 18 years. Elly then served as the first activity director at the Friend Manor until she retired in October of 1988 after 13 years.

She was a member of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, in Cordova, WELCA, and enjoyed singing with the choir. She was also a member of the Cordova American Legion Auxiliary for more than 50 years, and the Golden Agers of Friend. Elly and Monty were charter members of Lutheran Family Campers and held many positions of leadership. In her spare time, she enjoyed the hobbies of reading, camping, music, crocheting, cards, aerobics and playing the piano for self-enjoyment.



Nebraska personal property return and schedule due on or before May 1, 2016

The Nebraska Department of Revenue, Property Assessment Division, reminds owners of personal property that the Nebraska Personal Property Return and Schedule must be filed on or before May 1 with the county assessor where the personal property is located. If you have property at more than one location, contact the county assessor to

determine the tax district. Beginning in 2016, the Personal Property Tax Relief Act provides an exemption of the first \$10,000 of value of taxable tangible personal property in each tax district in which a personal property return is required to be filed by the taxpayer. Failure to timely report taxable tangible personal property on the return will result in a forfeiture of this exemption for untimely reported personal property.

A Nebraska Personal Property Return and Schedule must be filed for all depreciable tangible personal property that is:

a) Owned or held on January 1, 12:01 a.m., of each

year; or b) Leased from or to another

If depreciable tangible personal property subject to taxation is not reported by May 1, it is subject to the following penalties:

Deadline Date:

If value is added after May 1, but on or before June 30

Penalty: 10 percent of the tax due on the value added. Deadline Date: If value is added after

July 1 Penalty: 25 percent of the tax due on the value added.

The payment or nonpayment of sales tax does not impact the property tax status of tangible

personal property. The Nebraska Personal Property Return and additional information regarding taxable tangible personal property is available at revenue.nebraska.



Elly worked three years for Dr. Will and Dr. Coll Kamprath in Utica as a nanny. She later was employed at Warren Memorial Hospital in Friend as a nurse aide for 18 years. Elly then served as the first activity director at the Friend Manor until she retired in October of 1988 after 13 years.

She was a member of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, in Cordova, WELCA, and enjoyed singing with the choir. 



"The fire was licking at the ceiling," Dale said.


It was so hot, their tube television melted.




