Tidbits

Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$140,768.64 in sales tax for the month of January 2014 after showing a 2.4 percent increase in net taxable sales over January 2013. For January 2014, the county had \$2,559,425 in net taxable sales - up from \$2,498,498 in 2013.

According to Hebron Clerk Jean Nagay, the City of Hebron collected \$18,422.29 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,327,491 for the month of January. That shows an increase of 2.4 percent in net taxable sales over January 2013. The motor vehicle tax (\$2,256.99) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$16,165.30) goes into the sales tax fund.

The Department of Revenue releases figures approximately three months later than the actual month being profiled. February 2014 figures will be released at the beginning of May.

Temporarily closed parks to reopen...

State park areas temporarily closed by the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission last fall will reopen April 18 - two weeks earlier than previously planned.

The parks will reopen early because work crews reassigned from the closed parks completed their assigned projects ahead of schedule. The purpose of the closures was to redirect Game and Parks staff and resources from the closed areas in an effort to reduce the more than \$40 million of identified deferred maintenance needs of an aging Nebraska State Park System and meet compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and environmental requirements.

The Alexandria state recreation area is included in the list of those that will reopen April 18.

Hebron City Council continues discussion of ongoing projects

The Hebron City Council discussed many different ongoing projects along with a few new ones at their regular monthly meeting on April 7.

Dilapidated properties were once again on the agenda. Letters were sent to possible nuisance properties last month. Only two of the property owners contacted the city about the letters. For these two, city council members asked for plans of actions to be made in order to see progress being made to fix up the properties. The other properties were declared nuisance properties including: 324 North 3rd Street, 237 South 3rd Street, 1025 Olive Avenue and 330 Jefferson Street.

Members of the Boy Scout Pack 305 also spoke with members of City Council about a new project they hope to start. This project is a flag fund raiser. The group would put flags on resident's lawns around town on four separate dates throughout the year. They plan to charge \$30 for a flag. All money raised will help pay for expenses for various camps. To help assist

the group in getting started, they asked that the city council buy 50 flags. Once these are purchased, the group believes that the project will be self-supporting. Council members voted to help the pack with this project.

Council members also met with Drew Harris, superintendent of Thayer Central schools, to discuss the school improvements proposed in the upcoming bond. Harris spoke on the main reasons why the bond has been pursued and addressed frequently asked questions. He told council members that four of the main reasons for the improvements include: increasing safety and security, bringing all the students to one campus, helping to bring the school to ADA standards and creating more classroom space to accommodate for the number of students in the district.

Council members Jay Bauer and Beth Goldhammer also updated the group on the community center. The side wall specifications have been changed from 14 feet to 16 feet. JEO Consulting Group has said

that they are working on completing the final plans although a final date for the completed plans hasn't been given.

The group also discussed two different proposals for widening Dove Road with Chris Fangmeier, Hebron city supervisor. The original thought was to look into putting a turn lane in, but after considering the proposals, the group decided to look solely at widening the road. The hope is that the road would be widened seven feet to the north in between 13th Street and Highway 81. Fangmeier also spoke with council members about replacing various electrical poles throughout Hebron. Getting cost estimates for this project would be the next step.

In other business, the city council:

- discussed possible city office building improvements
- approved a raise for council members and the mayor. The new salary for the mayor will be \$750 a month while council members will be paid \$300 a month.

County Board faces short agenda

The Thayer County Board of Commissioners held their regular meeting on April 2.

To begin their meeting, the group met with Richard Heinrichs, Thayer County road superintendent, to discuss current projects within the roads department. Currently, the department is working on equipment repairs, acquiring new employees and various improvements throughout the county. One of these improvements includes replacing road signs that are missing. Signs for 911 will also be ordered soon and be placed around the county. Commissioners asked that Heinrichs look into possible assistance to pay for these signs.

In other business, commissioners:

- approved a request for a gathering on the court-

Old livery barn near Bruning taken down

The view on Highway 81 around Bruning has been changed after a historic barn that has sat near Bruning since the turn of the century was torn down last week.

The barn had some history before it was moved to where it sat today. The barn was built around 1905. Originally it sat in the town of Bruning and was used as a livery barn at the time.

The barn was moved outside of Bruning in the 1930s. Before this move could happen, the barn saw some changes. The original structure was around 20 feet wider. Although it was only moved across a field, it had to be moved one half at a time, said Frank Bruning.

It was moved by John Martin with

Group of 462 veterans tour many memorials in Washington D.C.

Although the weather didn't cooperate for their trip, three area veterans didn't let that stop them from enjoying the sights of Washington D.C. on the Korean War Veterans Honor Flight.

Max Gausman of Chester, Kenneth Kerwood of Bruning and John Levendofsky of Hebron along with 462 other Korean War veterans were all selected to go on the flight. All three served around the time of the Korean War. Although their jobs differed, they all experienced what it meant to serve their country.

The experience began the night

before the group flew out of Omaha with a meal and program. The banquet also included a recognition of volunteers and donations in which Anne Heitmann, Allison Tietjen and the Thayer Central students were recognized for helping to make the flight possible. Also included in the night was entertainment and special moments for the veterans.

"The highlight of that night for me was when they brought together two veterans who hadn't seen each other since 1951," Levendofsky said.

That was just the beginning of the special moments for the veterans. The following day was full of memories that the group said they will never forget.

Following the banquet, the veterans were able to catch a little sleep before their trek to Washington D.C. began early the next morning.

"It was great," Gausman said. "It was a long day but it was sure worth it."

After waking up around 2:30 a.m., the veterans and sponsors

boarded the plane and were on their way for a day of sight seeing.

It was a snowy and cold day on March 25, but the veterans took the opportunity to reminisce and enjoy the sights of Washington D.C.

Once they arrived in Washington D.C., the group was greeted by around 200 people who thanked them for their service and then the tour began. The veterans filled six buses that traveled through the city to see the many memorials including the Arlington National Cemetery and the Korean War Memorial.

Although the trip included seeing many different sights, all veterans agreed that the way the trip ended was their favorite part.

"You can't even imagine the reception when we landed in Omaha," Kerwood said. "When we came home from Korea, I don't know if we had one person welcome us."

When the veterans returned they found close to 1,500 people waiting to welcome them back at 11:30 p.m. at Eppley Airfield.

Although all three local veterans had different reasons for wanting to go on the honor flight in the first place, they all agreed that they felt honored to have been given the opportunity to travel to Washington D.C. with many other Korean War veterans.

"It is something we will never forget, that's for sure," Gausman said.

Deshler man gets jail time for assault

During Thayer County District Court on April 3, Skylar Horsechief was set for sentencing on an attempted domestic assault charge. This is a class III felony. After entering a plea agreement his charges were changed.

According to court documents, Horsechief has been convicted of similar charges of domestic assault on Aug. 27, 2012, and again on Oct. 28, 2013.

Due to his prior charges similar to this, and because he was unsuccessful on probation, District Judge Vicky Johnson sentenced him to not less than three years and not more than four years in jail. He received credit for 143 days already served.

John Coyle also appeared in District Court last Thursday. Instead of the pretrial, Coyle entered in a plea agreement. He was originally charged with burglary, theft-unlawful taking over \$1,500 and criminal mischief. With the plea agreement, his charges were changed to one count of theft which is a class III felony. He is set for sentencing on June 5.

Morton Post No. 17, G.A.R. of Hebron will have a campfire and soldiers' supper of beans, hard tack and coffee for members of the order.

Married in Hebron, W.J. Ulferts to Mrs. Anna Senn, both of Thayer County.

H. Heartz, who has charge of the stonework on the new building of Collins, Bennett & Willard, informs us that the walls are to be carefully built with a view to durability and solidity, and with such good workmen as he is, that result will be attained.

The financial report of the County Poor Farm appears in this issue. On an examination of the report, it will be seen that the farm is not only self-sustaining but returns a good revenue to the county.

The Belvidere Comedy Company will present "The Turn of the Tide" to be followed by the farce, "Is the Editor In?" The proceeds of the entertainment are to be devoted toward the purchase of an organ for the Presbyterian Church at that place.

The Board of Village Trustees elect met at the office of J.A. Bowdle, and organized as follows: W.J. Green, chairman; J.M. Stanley, clerk; A.G. Collins, treasurer. The following appointments were made: M.H. Weiss, village attorney and O.P. Hendershot, street commissioner.

Belvidere

School District No. 66 is erecting a schoolhouse near George Benton's, two miles east of town.

A brother of Minor Dill, living southwest of town, is now clerking in P.F. Burruss' hardware establishment.

Deputy U.S. Marshal Hastings called on a citizen of this place and took him to Omaha on charge of selling a certain kind of bitters. We have not learned the result of the trip, but suppose it went rather hard on the man's pocketbook.

Carleton

Albert Federspiel, our new blacksmith, has moved his shop back 100 feet and Jacob Engel is putting up a new shoe shop in its place.

A few of our citizens met at the schoolhouse to organize a fire company. Several gave their ideas about the matter, but nothing further was done.

Thomas Rowland returned from the west. He says he has taken a claim and has come back to claim someone's daughter.

Hackney

Oats are about all sown. Charles Row has his new house almost completed and intends moving in soon.

1894

120 Years Ago

Deshler is taking steps to incorporate and have a village government.

Jesse Brown has built a new house and other buildings on his farm three miles east of Hebron.

Oh, those beautiful hats at Mrs. Gallant's millinery store. Have you seen them? She is selling them cheap too.

Carleton is incorporated but held no village election this year, the officials have failed to make election arrangements.

Mrs. L.C. Jones, editor of

the Deshler-Herald informs us that G.W. Meeker of Murdock, Cass County, this state, will erect a brick building in Deshler and establish a state bank in that thriving village.

District Court Clerk James Dinsmore is a very competent man for the position he fills so ably, but as a chicken hatcher he has not yet climbed high on the ladder of fame. The other day his patent incubator caught fire and burned up the "whole shooting match," including the budding career of a lot of unhatched chickens. The sheriff and his deputy object to tramps in the county jail as their occupancy leaves the bedding infested with swarms of vermin.

The King's Press Drill Co., of Blue Springs has received an order from California for a carload of press drills. The company will give employment to 25 hands. And this important and growing enterprise was lost to the city through the indifference of several parties who could have held it here without the expenditure of one cent.

A.F. Townsend, S.A. Cottam, Vint Brown and Chas. Strosnider of Hubbell were in town. The Strosnider 52 acres east of Hubbell were bid in at sheriff's sale by Mr. Cottam for \$4,275.

We are informed that J.T. Fulton has disposed of his residence in which he now lives, to Mr. Sutton, the plumber, who will take possession in 30 days.

Hebron has no use for a "continental" Sabbath. Sunday is a day set apart for higher purposes than being given over to sports — and the word is here applied to amusements rather than individuals. Baseball is clean, wholesome recreation for weekdays, but there is no necessity of making the day of sanctity one of carousal.

The new cluster light poles were set this week and are all that were expected to be both in quality and looks. The lights are expected to be lit for the first time Monday night. The city has ordered all stationary awnings to be torn down, so as to not interfere with the light rays. The lights will be in two different parts; the upper lights will burn all night and the lower until midnight, when they will be turned off automatically. When the new lights are lit, Hebron won't look like the same place at night.

What is Distracted Driving?

Distracted driving is any activity that diverts a person's attention away from their primary task of driving. All distractions endanger the safety of the driver, passenger, and bystanders. With driving there are three main types of distraction:

- Visual - taking your eyes off the road
- Manual - taking your hands off the wheel
- Cognitive - taking your mind off what you are doing.

Sending a text message while driving uses all three: visual, manual, and cognitive. That is why it is by far the most dangerous distraction. The best way to end distracted driving is to educate everyone on the danger it poses. If you don't already think distracted driving is a safety problem, please take a moment to learn more. Then share these facts with others. Together, we can help save lives.

Five seconds is the average time your eyes are off the road while texting. When traveling at 55 mph, that's enough time to cover the length of a football field blindfolded. Contrary to popular belief, the human brain cannot multi-task. Driving and talking on a cell phone are two thinking tasks that involve many areas of the brain. Instead of processing both simultaneously, the brain rapidly switches between the two cognitive activities.

Headset cell phone use is not substantially safer than handheld use. Whether handheld or hands-free, cell phone conversations while driving are risky because the distraction to the brain remains. Activity in the parietal lobe, the area of the brain that processes movement of visual images and is important for safe driving, decreases by as much as 37 percent when listening to language, according to a study by Carnegie

Mellon University.

A CDC study examined the frequency of two major distractions: cell phones and texting. With cell phones they found 30 percent of drivers in the United States reported they have talked on their cell phone while driving in the past 30 days. Seventy-five percent of drivers ages 18 to 29 said they have talked on their cell phone while driving at least once in the past 30 days, and nearly 40 percent reported that they talk on their cell phone "regularly" or "fairly often" while driving.

What are the risk factors? Thousands die needlessly each year because people continue to use their cell phones while driving. How many deaths will it take before we all make the decision to stop using our phone while driving? Texting takes the driver's attention away from driving more frequently and for longer periods than other distractions. Also younger, inexperienced drivers under the age of 20 may be at highest risk because they have the highest proportion of distraction-related fatal crashes.

How can distracted driving be prevented? Many states are enacting laws that ban cell phone use; talking and texting while driving. Parents need to talk to their children about the dangers of using a cell phone while driving. All adults should consider making a pledge to not talk or text while driving. Make the decision to stop using your phone behind the wheel today, may help save a life tomorrow.

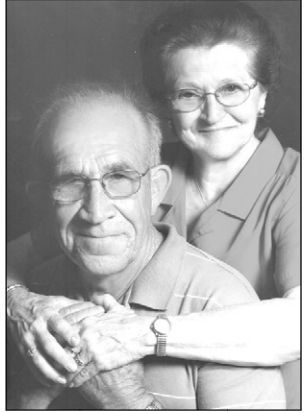

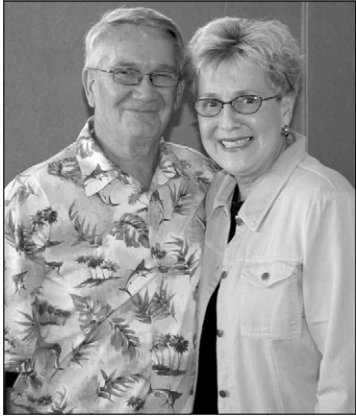

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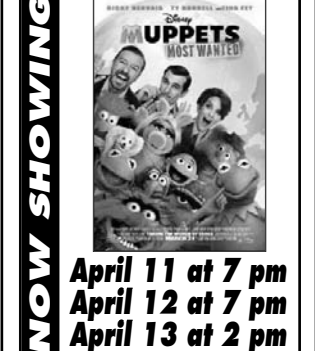

The 16 schools in the Mudecas conference are divided in half so that eight schools compete in two separate divisions at the same meet at the same

time. Both the boys and girls teams put in a good days work as the girls finished first in their division while the boys took sixth.

The girls were led by several strong performers as Jen Mick took home three gold medals finishing first in a time of 0:13.1 in the 100, first with a time of 0:27.6 in the 200 and teaming up with Christy Swartzendruber, Mashaya Diierking and Courtney Kamler to win the 400 relay in a time of 0:55.8. Jen also took third place in the pole vault to round out her day. Jill finished second in both the long jump and the 200 as well.
