### Opening day for area schools coming

Thayer Central's first day of school will be Sept. 6 because of the new addition. School begins at 8:15 a.m. Classes will be dismissed at 3:35 p.m. for elementary and 3:41 p.m. for junior and senior high school students.

Buses will run accordingly and times remain the same as last year. New rural patrons wanting to ride the bus should contact the director of transportation, Denny Fangmeier at 402-768-1388.

Deshler Public Schools open their doors to students Aug. 15. This year, the school will celebrate the addition of an eight-lane 400-meter track with nine lanes on the west straight away.

An underground sprinkler system will also be installed for the football field and outside the track.

Future renovations included the purchase and installation of new bleachers and lights, according to the board's plans posted during the 2015-2016 school year.

Bruning-Davenport Unified School begins its year Aug. 17. Students in pre-kindergarten through grade one will be in Bruning, along with students in grades nine through 12.

Students in grades two through eight will attend school in Davenport.

Preschoolers age three will attend 8:10 to 11:40 a.m. Four year olds attend 8:10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. All preschoolers attend Monday through Thursday and all begin their year Aug. 22.

Shuttle buses will run between Bruning and Davenport morning and evening. Buses meet at Carleton at 7:45 a.m. and 3:45 p.m. Transportation will also be provided to home schools after sport practices.

## Bruning Grocery awarded for excellence

Bruning Grocery has carved itself a paragraph in the permanent Congressional Record.

The family-owned business was one of eight to receive the "Excellence in Economic Development award from Congressman Adrian Smith, who solicited nominations in May and ended up with more than 50 businesses from 30 communities in the Third District.

"I join your family, friends and neighbors in acknowledging your accomplishments and applauding your efforts, and hope they will inspire increased economic development, which will strengthen communities across the Third District," Smith stated in a letter to the grocery last month.

Paul Philippi, who is third generation to lead the store, said Smith stopped in last year.

"We talked about the struggles in a small town, like the difficulties in customer flow," Philippi said.

A customer nominated the grocery.

"We had no clue we had won," Philippi said about that Monday morning they all came to work, only to be congratulated and learn their accolade was shared the day before on Facebook.

The store was hailed on Smith's site for "exceptional service," ability to draw shoppers from surrounding communities, for its competitive prices and the "vibrancy" Bruning Grocery adds to the town's main street.

In telling the story, Philippi said the store builds on the services it provides and strives to improve.

Always.  
"We have a strong meat department - you want a steak, we'll cut it for you. Our hamburger is ground fresh multiple times a day," he said. "We just try and keep that as

our niche because we do it really well."

At the same time, Philippi said they have to work within areas of the store to stay current.

"We are trying to better in our freezers and match what the people want," he said.

His grandfather Rex Philippi bought the store in 1973 and in 1984, Philippi's father, Kurt, continued the evolving legacy.

"It seems like with each generation, new ideas crop up. When dad came in, there wasn't much for pop and chips, so he brought that in," Philippi said.

He said he joined the business right out of college in 2008, but Philippi has been in retail grocery as far back as he can remember.

"The grocery business is fun.

We've got really good workers," he said. We know everybody and we work really hard. It's comfortable. You don't regret coming to work."

The store's employees stand out in Philippi's view.

"Our employees are awesome. We have long standing employees, some for 15 or 20 years. These girls go above and beyond, more than I ask them," he said.

It gives Philippi pride, but it's not his doing, he added.

"It's theirs," he said.

Consistent expansion is another survival tactic of the rural grocery store.

Big changes in the 1990s saw Bruning Grocery with new areas for its specialty in meat, and storage loading and unloading. The Philipppis

also added a couple aisles.

"We needed the capacity. Every year, we have a little bit of growth," Philippi said.

It's not easy thriving amidst Dollar stores and Walmarts, but Philippi takes a unique stance.

He said he'll never match the pricing or hours of the corporate giants, but if he can't draw customers into the rural experience, then he needs to offer something different.

"So far, we've been able to balance it and we hope to continue that," he said.

He encourages shoppers who haven't visited the store to "check it out."

"Be proactive and come in, try it out and ask questions," Philippi said.

## Toad's Place open for lunch, supper and late nights

Toad's in Belvidere is now Toad's Place. It is open for lunch and supper with wings and sandwiches added to the Toad's menu.

A group of neighboring investors came together to keep Toad's open once owner Mark Sittler announced he was closing after 33 years.

Sittler's last day was May 28. Ryan and Samantha Stradley went through more than a month of cleaning and construction to swing the door open for business July 8.

"We had a band our first night. We had a good 200 people," Samantha Stradley said.

The country-rock band, 7 Days Sober with local Cole Harris on guitar and vocals, asked Stradley if they could play.

"It was the first country-ever band in Toad's," Stradley chuckled.

Behind the front door, Stradley said they brightened up the first of three rooms with new walls, ceiling and lighting.

"The day we signed paperwork, we were in there cleaning it out," she said.

The renovated dining room and bar seats 35 with one wall done in diamond plating to give the bar shine.

The bar itself also had a facelift.

Stradley is looking forward to redoing the floors and lights in the kitchen, along with replacing the range hood.

Makeovers are planned for the second and third rooms.

"We're going to add two new pool tables and arcade games," Stradley said about the third room she

wants open by the Husker football season.

Instead of people leaving the area to watch the football games, she sees Toad's Place as an excuse not to.

Several flat screens are going in to give Toad's Place an edge on sports.

Stradley is excited to finish all three rooms, which will seat 195 total.

"We definitely want to bring more people to Thayer County,"

As for food, Stradley said they kept Toad's menu, including the famed Sloppy Toad that was invented when Linda Hudson owned the Dairy Queen in Hebron.

"She taught that to Toad and he brought it here," Stradley said.

They also kept Toad's Burger, only now, bacon is available for it.

Stradley said the chicken fried steak is hand-breaded and the potatoes are real, something customers say they don't find often.

Stradley, who is originally from Maine, worked for Carnival Cruise Lines. She has a culinary degree in fine pastry arts.

Ryan Stradley is a former employee of the Sundowner Bar and Grill in Chester.

Hours are 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 5 to 10 p.m., Sunday and Tuesday through Thursday. On Friday and Saturday nights, Toad's Place stays open until 1 a.m.

## Swenson teaches Mongolian teachers and learns

Richard Swenson, a retired teacher from Nebraska schools for more than 30 years, has taken his skills beyond guiding children and for that matter, across borders.

Recently, Swenson, who lives in Davenport, returned from Mongolia, where he taught English to

Mongolian high school teachers for six weeks.

Swenson was with a team of four people working through the English Language Institute, which has allowed Swenson several trips to teach in China as well.

"Teaching adults is a whole different game than teaching children," he said.

Swenson and the group stayed

in apartments and followed a daily schedule of teaching conversational English and speaking on American culture while listening to the teachers explain Mongolian culture.

The Mongolian teachers read and wrote English well, but conversing in the English language was a challenge for them, Swenson said.

He said they introduced the teachers to American health, a traditional

American wedding, holidays, leisure activities, photographs and programs on families.

He said some Mongolian programs matched the American methods.

Most of the approximately 40 Mongolian teachers were women.

Swenson said after he pulled the *Hebron Journal-Register* out, they

## 1886

### 130 Years Ago

Ohiowa has a paper, Larimar is the editor.

Wild plums and grapes are a large yield this year.

The time will soon be here for school to begin, them boys and girls will be happy.

Great interest in manifest by those interested, with regard to the location of the R. I. depot in Hebron.

Mrs. Greely Dill fainted away and fell upon the floor last week at the church while rehearsing with the choir for the dedication services at Belvidere.

Hebron spoke with the voice of 337 to 35 today.

The contract for the M. E. Church at Chester was let on Saturday evening to cost \$1,800 to \$2,000. Hooker & Howe are the contractors of the wood work and A. Adams the mason work.

The Germans of Gilead nearly all voted for bonds.

Local correspondents and farmers report the corn looking much improved, and prospects a great deal better since the recent rains.

The farmers are cutting and putting up wild hay which is extremely light. The price is very high, \$5 to \$7 per ton.

We are called upon to chronicle the death of another of the old citizens of Carleton precinct, Mr. O. E. Deming who died on Saturday. The funeral services were conducted at the house of the deceased, and the burial at the Hebron cemetery.

Spring Creek spoke out, 75 for and only 16 against bonds today. They mean business.

This is what may be called hot weather, ranging from 80 to 111 degrees.

The new bridge placed across the draw which crosses Sixth St. north and south of Olive Avenue, are quite beneficial, and will save considerable extra travel.

Mr. John G. Deshler, of Columbus, Ohio, is here to see that the people do their duty in securing the Rock Island. He intends to go back on the Rock Island or on foot. That is a good position, and we hope to see his spirit manifest by enough to secure the building of the same.

Street Commission Klaes has mowed the weeds from the outside of the walks, so that ladies can pass along them without soiling their white dresses, if they take the outside of the walk, which would be poor taste, all things being equal. Now we would suggest that it would be nice if the property holders would mow the weeds from the other side.

Several cases of those enemies of humanity at this season of year, flux and cholera infantum, are reported, among the latter the children of Willis Young and Mr. Richardson.

The M. E. Church at Belvidere, was dedicated on last Sabbath as announced by Rev. John Galligher P.E. of this district, assisted by Dr. Ware of York College. There were present, Revs. Pierce, of Hebron; Deal of Superior, Lenfest, of that appointment; Des Islets of the Presbyterian Church at Belvidere; and others. A large audience, many of whom could not find room in the church were present. The doctor gave an able discourse, after which he gave another exhortation to the text of \$625 which was provided for after which the dedicatory exercises were attended to. This is considered by those who are informed and prepared to judge, to be the best church in the county. The members and friends have worked hard and much credit is due them. They are now clear of debt as a church, and may expect to do good work in the large field which is before them.

In Chester, Rev. Father Boll met a man from Jerusalem. He speaks only a few English words. As far as could be understood by signs, pictures and a letter, his father, mother and brothers were beheaded at Alexandria during the last war, his wife and three small children live in Jerusalem, to whom he wishes to return. In order to learn the particulars about his sad condition, Father Boll invites all that understand, perhaps, Arabic, to come and see him next Sunday, because on that day the poor man will attend high mass and vesper for which he expresses his desire under tears and sighs.

## 1896

Wm. B. Price of Cripple Creek, Colo., formerly editor of the Belvidere News, has been calling upon Thayer County friends this week. Mr. Price has a better thing than editing a paper upon his hands now, being a shareholder in some silver mines of Colorado.

Davenport: The 10-year-old son of James Row, living a few miles northwest of town, was thrown from a riding plow, Tuesday, and was badly hurt. One arm was broken and other injuries sustained.

Alexandria: The Big Sandy Mill was struck by lightning during the storm Monday night but no serious damage was done as the mill was running the next day...Died, July 27, John Charles, son of George and Emma Hunt, aged 2 months and 25 days... The school board of district 36 meets today to let the contract for a new schoolhouse to be build in time for the fall term of school.

## 1906

### 110 Years Ago

## 1916

### 100 Years Ago

About 55 Lutheran ministers, representing 250 pastors and congregations in the state of Nebraska, and belonging to four different synods were gathered at Trinity Lutheran Church at Bruning Aug. 1 and 2. ## 1926

### 90 Years Ago

During the rain storm Tuesday evening a tornado landed in the farm yard of the Norder farm, occupied by Henry Norder, northeast of Bruning, and caused considerable damage.

## 1936

### 80 Years Ago

At 4:30 o'clock Monday afternoon, a tornado struck Hebron and vicinity, doing considerable damage. Rainfall measured 1.20 inches with some hail, and the temperature suddenly dropped 43 degrees, from 100 to 67. Many large trees were ruined by the force of the tornadic wind and there were several narrow escapes, but no injuries were reported. The violent wind demolished many houses, barns and wind-mills.

Ralph Menke invited those wishing to observe Peltier's comet to do so by visiting at his home after 12 o'clock p.m. from Aug. 1 to 5.

The many friends of Fred Vieselmeyer, pioneer resident

of Deshler, will rejoice to know that the report of his death was erroneous. He is in good health.

Two-hundred-forty-seven Thayer County farmers have received aid from the Resettlement Administration.

There are 2500 families in Thayer County who own radio sets, according to a new report issued by the U.S. Department of Commerce.

The opening of Hebron's municipal swimming pool, Tuesday, attracted a huge crowd. Four boys and a girl from the Lincoln Y.M.C.A. gave a splendid exhibition. Amusement was furnished with clown diving and Chinese lifesaving. There was also a laughable contest with four Hebron boys in a race, opening a satchel and donning girls' clothes and then swimming across the pool. Don Day, aged 9, son of Gene Day, gave a fine exhibition of swimming and diving. Life savers, Kelly and Smith, gave a demonstration of life-saving.

A large crowd attended the beauty show at the high school gym, Friday evening. There was a preliminary contest of 12 little tots. Little Roberta Ann Hartley, aged 3 1/2 years was chosen as "Little Miss Hebron." In the contest for "Miss Hebron, 1936," there were 38 contestants. Erma Grace Wicks won first and will represent Hebron at the state fair contest at Lincoln. Jacqueline Richards won second and Emily Hess, third.

The John Casper barn and all sheds adjoining, including 300 bushels of grain, were destroyed by fire last Sunday evening. The farm is located five miles northeast of Belvidere.

## 1946

### 70 Years Ago

The Boy Scout Camp at Corliss Springs last week was a success. The boys and troops made new and lasting friendships.

Lauren Lietsch, living a few miles east of Carleton, received very serious burns late Monday afternoon while refilling a tractor used on a combine. The fuel was ignited when splashed on the manifold and enveloped him in flames.

Paul Martinson, former resident of Hebron vicinity, was killed Sunday morning about 2:30 in a car accident, three miles south of Fairbury.

Several weeks ago, one of the service men from the Fairmont Base, dove into the Hebron swimming pool, without estimating the depth. The result was he struck bottom

But with that exuberance of youth, he dragged him in to safety.

## 1956

### 60 Years Ago

Frank Bringewatt, who recently moved to Bruning and is operating a boiler plant here, has been appointed an authorized dealer of Purina feeds in this community.

Low base bids totaled \$107,735 for the construction of additions to the Bruning School, according to figures compiled at the bid opening here Tuesday night. The architects' estimate for the work was placed at \$122,600.

Numerous complaints have been registered with the Village Board about traffic violations on Bruning streets. Some of the "younger set" have been criticized for their needless and menacing actions behind the wheel on several occasions. The Village Board issues a warning that these infractions must stop and that persistent violators will be dealt with according to the law--regardless of who they are.

Nancy Wilkening of Bruning was declared winner of the 4-H Timely Topics public speaking contest held in Hebron Saturday morning. Nancy chose the subject "World Peace of World of Pieces" and developed it very interestingly.

Less than six months after the Thayer County Memorial Hospital Guild embarked on its largest monetary project in its history, the group reported nearly 75 percent of the \$8,000 goal had been reached for a blood analyzer.

Nebraska Public Power District had completed publication on a small booklet about the electrical problems and devastation created by the snow and ice storm which hit south central Nebraska on March 29, 1976. The storm caused 100,000 people to be without electricity for periods ranging from one or two days to up to several weeks. Repairs costs amounted to 15 million dollars.

For example, in 2014, there were 667 cases of measles in 27 states, the greatest number of cases since measles was eliminated in 2000. During 2015, 147 people were part of a large, multi-state measles outbreak linked to an amusement park in California. Almost one in 10 people who became sick with measles in this outbreak were babies too young to be vaccinated. Still others were not able to receive certain

vaccinations due to severe allergies or weakened immune systems.

To help keep them safe, it is important that those who are able to get vaccinated are fully immunized. This not only protects them, but also helps prevent the spread of these diseases.

Immunizations can save your family time and money. A child with a vaccine-preventable disease can be denied attendance at schools or daycare facilities. Some vaccine-preventable diseases can result in prolonged disabilities and can take a financial toll because of lost time at work, medical bills or long-term disability care.

In contrast, getting vaccinated against these diseases is a good investment and usually covered by insurance. The Vaccines for Children program is a federally funded program that provides vaccines at no cost to children from low-income families.

Immunization protects future generations. Vaccines have reduced and, in some cases, eliminated many diseases that killed or severely disabled people just a few generations ago. For example, smallpox vaccination eradicated that disease worldwide. Your children don't have to get smallpox shots anymore because the disease no longer exists anywhere in the world.

Thayer County Health Services wants to encourage parents to make sure their children are completely immunized against these preventable diseases. If we continue vaccinating now, and vaccinating completely, parents in the future may be able to trust that some diseases of today will no longer be around to harm their children.

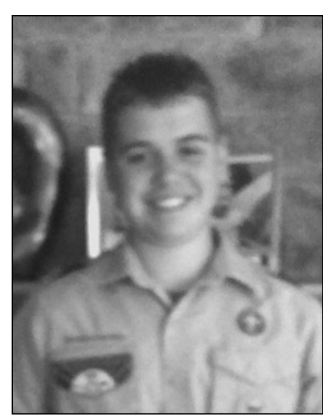

## Nebraska Timeline

### Chimney Rock anniversary in 2016

One hundred ten years ago in July 1906, Ezra Meeker stopped at Chimney Rock near Bayard, Nebraska, on his retracement, from west to east, of his 1852 journey along the Oregon Trail.

Sixty years ago this month, on August 22, 1956, Chimney Rock was dedicated as a National Historic Site within the National Park Service system. Of all the natural wonders encountered by the thousands of overland emigrants crossing Nebraska to Oregon, California, or the Salt Lake Valley in the mid-nineteenth century, Chimney Rock was the one most often mentioned in their diaries.

The late National Park Service historian Merrill J. Mattes devoted a chapter to the rock in his 1969 study, *The Great Platte River Road*, which remains in print. The chapter includes many of the emigrants' comments about the rock as recorded in trail diaries.

In 1906 Ezra Meeker, at the age of 76, took a covered wagon and a team of oxen along the Oregon Trail to call attention to its historical significance and promote a project to mark the route.

Such a project was consummated in 1912-13 when the Daughters of the American Revolution and the state of Nebraska erected some sixty granite markers documenting the trail across Nebraska.

In 1909, Meeker published an account of his trek entitled *Ventures and Adventures of Ezra Meeker*. In the book he described the death of "Twist," one of the two oxen (the other was "Dave") that had pulled his covered wagon from near Seattle, Washington, to Nebraska in 1906.

On August 8, 1906, Meeker was traveling along the Platte River near Brady when the seven-year-old "Twist" began breathing heavily. Meeker unyoked the ox, "gave him a quart of lard, a gill of vinegar, and a handful of sugar, but all to no purpose . . . and in two hours he was dead." The ox was buried nearby.

This was a serious setback that prevented Meeker from completing his retrace of the trail until 1908. It took time to find another ox, which then had to be trained to pull in a yoke. Meeker finally found a replacement for "Twist" at the Omaha stockyards after looking over a thousand head of cattle. He named the new ox "Dandy."

Fifty years after Ezra Meeker stopped at Chimney Rock it was dedicated as a National Historic Site. The dignitaries attending included Merrill Mattes, then NPS regional historian; Nebraska State Historical Society (NSHS) Director William D. Aeschbacher; former

director James C. Olson, and Nebraska Congressman A. L. Miller, the ranking member of the U.S. House Interior Committee.

As reported by the Aug. 23 Bayard and Scottsbluff newspapers, Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton, a Nebraskan appointed by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, sent a letter to be read for the ceremonies. In it Seaton recalled that signing the national historic site designation for Chimney Rock had been his first act after taking office.

In his address at the dedication, Congressman Miller recalled that Chimney Rock had once been characterized as "the finger of God pointing to the heavens," which had also pointed the way of "a courageous people toward a new land of freedom and opportunity."

Because the eighty-acres on which Chimney Rock stands had been donated to the NSHS in the late 1930s, it administers the site. In 1994 the Society opened the Ethel and Christopher J. Abbott Visitor Center there.

Although erosion has made the spire somewhat shorter than it was when Ezra Meeker passed by in 1906, Chimney Rock still fascinates twenty-first century travelers. Some 25,000 persons stopped at the visitor center in 2014-15.

## Hebron to host Stomp! out Epilepsy and SUDEP 2016

The Chelsea Hutchinson Foundation (CHF) is a Colorado non-profit corporation formed by Julie and Doug Hutchinson to provide help and support to individuals, particularly children and young adults, who have epilepsy. When you support CHF, you make a big difference in the lives of those who struggle with seizures and epilepsy. We are a very grass roots, volunteer-based Foundation that is committed to getting relief right into the hands of those who need it. We aren't big, but we are mighty and determined. The main focus is to raise funds to provide grants for seizure-response dogs. These trained companion dogs may be able to detect an oncoming seizure and provide warnings and/or respond after the onset of a seizure. The Foundation also provides Emfit, SmartWatch and SAMiAlert movement monitors for those in need. To date we have granted 84 seizure response dogs and over 380 monitors. The Chelsea Hutchinson Foundation is named for Julie and Doug's beloved daughter, Chelsea, who died in her sleep during a seizure in April of 2009. SUDEP (Sudden Unexpected Death in Epilepsy) was the cause of her death. During the 6 years that Chelsea had seizures, no one ever told the Hutchisons a seizure could take her life, other than through an accidental fall or drowning. As a result of that omission, the Chelsea Hutchinson Foundation informs those living with epilepsy of the risks and raises awareness of SUDEP so that no other families are blind-sided. The Foundation began STOMP out Epilepsy and SUDEP

Awareness Walk in Colorado in 2010 on a mission to raise public awareness that seizures are serious and not to be taken lightly. These special canines are taught anywhere from 30-90 commands over a two-year period before being placed with their future life partner. Clients of our Service-PUPS program attend a 12-day training camp in Lincoln, NE. Service dogs assist persons with a variety of disabilities including but not limited to: spinal cord and head injuries, muscular dystrophy, post-polio syndrome, arthritis, seizure disorders, multiple sclerosis, cerebral palsy, and chronic pain disorders. Domestipups also has a Therapy Dog Program that includes Reading PUPS, Edu-PUPS, Petting PUPS, Praising PUPS and PUPS teach-us. Come meet and learn with Domesti Pups at STOMP! Plan on sticking around after the walk, there will be a pulled pork dinner for purchase. By

supporting STOMP! You can help us help families living with Epilepsy. Living with Epilepsy can be challenging even for those with the mildest cases. 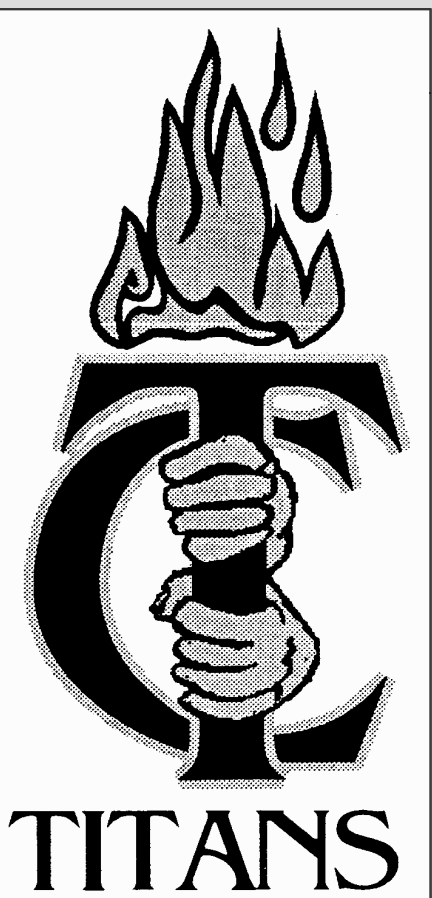

# New Hospital Safety Ratings Available to the Public

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) recently signaled to the nation's hospitals that it was getting serious--and tough--about patient safety and the quality of care hospitals provide. The government's rating system-five stars for the best hospitals and one star for the worst-sends a message that patients have a right to know what's going on inside the hospitals they entrust with their lives or those of their family members.

The overall star ratings, the first for CMS, are a composite of 64 measures the government has used the past few years to rate hospital performance. They include factors such as complication rates for patients who've had knee and hip replacement surgery, urinary tract infections associated with catheter use, death rates among patients with serious but treatable complications after surgery, and patients' reported experience with their care.

Only 102 hospitals out of the 3,600 rated received five stars, and they included less well-known specialty facilities such as Lincoln Surgical Hospital in Lincoln, and the Orthopaedic Hospital of Lutheran Health Network in Ft. Wayne, Indiana.

Medicare gave 129 hospitals one star. They included two prominent hospitals in Washington D.C. - MedStar Georgetown University Hospital and George Washington University Hospital - as well as several hospitals in New York City. Geisinger Medical Center in Danville, Pennsylvania, that health policy experts and politicians cite for exemplary quality involving new ways of delivering and coordinating care, received a below-average two-star rating.

The ratings reveal a contradiction between scientifically measured evidence and the advertising hospitals use to build their brand. Hospitals like to tell their communities

about new cancer treatments or new children's wings, not mediocre ratings. In my neighborhood, New York City's Mt Sinai Hospital has used banner ads on the street to create an awareness of the hospital, which received only a mediocre three-star rating.

Those of us who have written about hospitals know that smart patients need to look way beyond the nightly advertising on TV.

Medicare often caves in to healthcare industry demands and has backed off many proposed rules that powerful doctors, hospitals, and drug companies opposed. But it isn't pulling any punches on this one despite attempted roadblocks. Last April some 200 members of the House of Representatives and 60 U.S. senators sent letters to CMS urging delay in releasing the star ratings.

They argued that the ratings may not take into account that many hospitals treat low-income patients with complex conditions and, thus, may not be fair to providers. "The star system is an irresponsible slap in the face to America's most essential hospitals, those that take in the sickest patients," Dr. Eric Dickson, the chief executive of UMass Memorial Health Care, told the Boston Globe. His flagship teaching hospital in Worcester, Massachusetts, received one star.

But as Leah Binder who heads The Leapfrog Group, which advocates for patient safety, has noted on Forbes.com, the letter sent by the senators did not mention responsibility to patients who may suffer harm in a hospital. The British Medical

Journal reported in May that researchers who examined the scientific evidence concluded that in 2013 medical errors were the third-leading cause of death in the U.S. behind heart disease and cancer.

That's cause for alarm and may be a reason why CMS didn't bow to political pressure this time.

Jordan Rau, a staffer at Kaiser Health News who has written about the evolution of hospital ratings, told me the stars may influence low-rated hospitals to improve their scores.

Hospitals may also fear that consumers will see the stars, which are easy to understand, dig into the numbers behind them, ask questions, and perhaps choose other facilities if they can. If that happens, CEOs may feel mighty uncomfortable going before their boards and explaining why they received only one or two stars.

Medicare has also just released the names of hospitals required to pay monetary penalties for having more patients than expected return to the hospital. About one-third of readmissions, considered a marker of quality, are preventable. The government looks at readmissions for such conditions as heart attacks, pneumonia, and hip and knee replacements.

Clearly, if you're planning a hospital stay for major surgery or any reason, check both CMS sites for the star ratings (<https://kaiserhealthnews.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/hospital-stars-july-2016-pdf1.pdf>) and the readmissions penalties ([https://kaiserhealthnews.files.wordpress.com/2016/08/medicare-readmission-penalty-year5\\_pdf\\_final1.pdf](https://kaiserhealthnews.files.wordpress.com/2016/08/medicare-readmission-penalty-year5_pdf_final1.pdf)).

Examining the ratings for facilities you are considering should either give you peace of mind-although nothing is guaranteed in the patient safety business-or cause for concern.

My advice: see how the "stars" align before you're a patient at any hospital.

read the advertisements. He also showed the teachers a Lincoln newspaper.

"They like to see what's for sale in the grocery store and what jobs are available. They were really interested in the real estate ads," Swenson said.

He gave the newspapers to the teacher-students, who will use them in their classes. The Hebron newspaper featured the story on Hebron becoming Nebraska's Porch Swing Capital.

Swenson said he enjoyed learning about the Mongolian lifestyle.

While there, he ate Mongolian foods. The diet focuses on beef, mutton and goat.

"It leaves you wanting for vegetables," he said.

"Many Mongolians still live in round, tent-like structures," he said. The structures are called "gers," and sound like the word, "air."

The gers are movable. Swenson was interested in the solar panels outside the gers that generated electricity and satellite television.

It was modern, he said, and the vehicles were modern as well.

He said weather called for a jacket in the morning, but by the afternoon, the temperature was up to 75 degrees.

Mongolia looks like Wyoming, Swenson said.

"There are grasslands, hills and mountains. It was open range, so the bus had to slow down and wait for livestock to cross," he said.

Swenson did attend church services twice among a small congregation of 20 people, who sat around a table and told of their Christian experiences.

The group also traveled the country and learned of the people in western Mongolia, who use eagles to hunt.

They are trained like falcons, Swenson said.

In northern Mongolia, the people raise reindeer and live in teepees. The reindeer provide milk and meat and are used as draft animals, much like horses.

Swenson has presented on his teaching travels before and is scheduled to speak at the Davenport Senior Center Aug. 25 after the noon meal.
