New teachers, new sports arena, Thayer Central back in session

A host of new teachers will greet Thayer Central students as they head back to school today. Seven new instructors as well as an elementary aide with educational experience from one year to 24 years will head up classrooms from Kindergarten through 12th grade while two teachers will instruct special education, and one will direct the after school program.

At the elementary level, first-year teacher Samantha Parolek, of Clarkson, will instruct the third grade while first-year teacher Rhonda Starbuck, of Hebron, will instruct second grade. Starbuck, who has been employed by the district for a decade, recently earned her teaching certificate.

Becky Kleveland, who grew up in Chester and has 24 years of teaching experience will be the new fourth grade teacher this year. She comes back home from Centralia, Mo., where she taught for nine years.

At the high school level, both Jacey Oschner and Melissa Dux will begin their teaching careers. Oschner, who owns and runs the business Blu•J in Hebron, will teach Family Consumer Science, while Dux, of Reynolds, will teach business and FBLA classes.

Thayer County receives national award

During the 2012 NACo (National Association of Counties) annual conference and exposition held in July at Allegheny County, Pa., Thayer County was awarded an Outstanding Performance award in recognition of outstanding utilization in the NACo Prescription Discount Card Program.

Thayer County implemented the program in 2005, and since that time residents have saved more than \$72,000. Residents can see significant savings on their prescription medications simply by presenting the card. There is no enrollment form, no membership fee and no limits on how many times the card is used; the card even works for some pet medications. Free prescription discount cards can be printed from www.nacorx.org or go to the Thayer County Clerk's office or local pharmacy to pick up a card.

Thayer County is one of more than 1,400 counties across the country currently offering the program to residents. Participating counties across the country have saved their residents more than \$480 million on the cost of their




The Thayer County Fair was a big hit again this year as well-attended grandstand shows, 4-H contests, a huge parade and visiting dignitaries came together in a host of activities.

ReinCoat LLC open for business

Galvanizing facility to employ 30 people, keep part of Reinke's process at home

"It would have been so easy to open up the newspaper and see this company was going to open a facility overseas, but Reinke's made a commitment to stay here," said U.S. Senate candidate Deb Fischer during a ribbon cutting ceremony for ReinCoat, LLC, last week. "This is a facility that makes Nebraska proud."

ReinCoat, LLC, is a \$10 million, 35,000 square foot galvanizing fa-

cility expected to meet the coating needs of Reinke Manufacturing. "The new facility allows us to bring our galvanizing operation in-house," said Reinke Manufacturing president Chris Roth during the ceremony. "We have always out-sourced these needs, but will now be able to stay here in Thayer County."

Galvanization is the process of applying a protective zinc coating to steel or iron to prevent rusting. Hot-dip galvanizing passes the metal

through a molten bath of zinc at a temperature of 835 degrees Fahrenheit. According to Reinke literature, a kettle capable of holding 14,500 gallons and weighing approximately 95,000 pounds, or 47.5 tons, contains the zinc. A furnace weighing approximately 33 tons, heats the zinc. The molten zinc weighs 804,000 pounds, or 402 tons.

According to the literature, there are virtually no volatile organic compounds generated from the process

which is designed to use very low levels of lead. And although an enclosure over the pre-treatment room was not required, Reinke's added it to improve overall working conditions. "This allows us to be better neighbors," Roth said.

Reinke Manufacturing galvanizes pivots and trailers manufactured at the plant.

The local company currently employs 470 people, 20 at its Belleville plant.

A fire occurred in Alexandria yesterday at 3 a.m. The fire originated in an old dilapidated, unoccupied building north of Austin's blacksmith shop. This building was completely destroyed and the roof over the Odd Fellow's Hall (which is the upper story of Austin's blacksmith shop) was nearly all burned. The furniture and regalia in the hall was saved. The estimated damage is about \$300. Different opinions are held in regard to the origin of the fire, but it is generally thought to have been the result of children kindling a fire in an old stove in the unoccupied house.

Last Saturday the boys got up a lottery with a pony for the prize. The man that drew the pony was to set up the beer. Karl drew the prize and some of the boys got set up, and had quite a lively time until about midnight. They made more noise than was necessary and some of the good citizens talk of investigating the matter.

John Burns received the news of his father's death. He had been dead some time, but owing to irregularity of the mails, the latter was delayed.

1892

120 Years Ago

Hebron schools will open August 29.

Jackel & Hoffman have employed another man, Nicholas Farrell of San Francisco, to help them in their tailor shop. The force now numbers four.

H.C. Kilpatrick of Gilead precinct says, "Never during my 12 years of residence on the Little Blue have I had such a splendid crop of corn as this year, and I have always had good crops." He will put in 200 acres of wheat this fall.

Dr. H.C. Manary of Carleton, gives us an account of a fatal accident that occurred near Carleton. A son of Andrew Giffeth, about 13 years of age, was plowing when for some reason the horses became frightened and ran away. In some way the boy became tangled with the sulky plow. Death resulted in seven hours from contusion of the brain.

The Garten Terchloride of Gold Remedy Assoc., of Hebron, has now perfected its organization and is in complete running order. The association has suitable quarters in the Hendershot block. The officers are: C.M. Wetherald, president; T.C. Marshall, secretary; A.L. Roper, treasurer and Dr. C.M. Sutherland, attending physician. All forms of liquor, morphine, opium and tobacco habits are successfully treated. At present there are two liquor patients and four tobacco patients.

On Monday, the members of the Morton Post No. 17, G.A.R., of this city, took charge of the funeral of John F. Gilmore, who died from the effects of sunstroke in this vicinity. He was supposed to have been and claimed to be an old soldier, although but little of his history is known. For a number of years he has been a dealer in fruit trees and was working for Mr. Graham of this city. He had no money.

Last Sunday evening special policeman Joseph Klaes arrested a mulatto who was lolling around the Rock Island depot without a visible means of support nor did he appear to want any. H was taken before Police Judge Hendershot and sentenced to ten days at hard labor. In pursuance of the sentence he has been exercising himself on the courthouse weeds.

Thayer County has purchased six Austin graders for use of the county. Of the three recently purchased, one has been allotted to Alexandria precinct. J.H. Enslow, the road overseer, has it in charge.

While at Manitou, Colo., W.B. Hughes walked to the top of Pikes Peak remained there all night, saw a glorious sunset and a magnificent sunrise and walked down the opposite side of the mountain the next day.

G.D. Proctor of Alexandria has the general agency in several counties, for the indestructible school seat, an invention of great merit and strength.

Mr and Mrs. Henry Eden and Mr. and Mrs. Louis Higel celebrated their 13th wedding anniversaries.


1942

Nebraska Counties Designated As Disaster Due To Drought

Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Dan Steinkruger announced that an additional 15 counties have been designated as primary natural disaster areas due to the ongoing drought affecting Nebraska.

Those counties are: Adams, Boyd, Burt, Butler, Clay, Colfax, Cuming, Dakota, Dodge, Hamilton, Polk, Saunders, Thurston, Webster and York. This brings the total number of Nebraska counties with a primary designation to 76. In addition, the following 10 contiguous counties also become eligible for disaster programs: Cass, Douglas, Fillmore, Lancaster, Nuckolls, Saline, Sarpy, Seward, Thayer and Washington.

A current Nebraska map listing the approved counties is available on the Nebraska FSA website at www.fsa.usda.gov/ne.

In response to the expanding ongoing drought conditions affecting crop and livestock producers across Nebraska, USDA has implemented various actions and programs. Specifically, counties have been allowed to emergency hay and graze CRP acres and Emergency (EM) Loans are authorized for eligible producers. Steinkruger stated, "As conditions continue to deteriorate, producers are encouraged to contact their

local FSA Service Center for detailed information about available programs and updated Secretarial disaster designations."

USDA has responded to drought conditions by reducing EM loan interest rates, reducing CRP payment reductions and expanding the list of practices eligible for CRP haying and grazing. In addition, Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) acres are available for modification in response to drought conditions.

In addition to the Emergency (EM) Loan Program, the FSA has other loan programs and disaster assistance programs which can be considered in assisting farmers to recover from their losses.

West Nile Virus Disease Cases Up This Year

Take steps to protect yourself and your family

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is urging people to take steps to prevent West Nile virus infections. Outbreaks of West Nile virus disease occur each summer in the United States. This year, some areas of the country are experiencing earlier and greater activity.

Thus far in 2012, 42 states have reported West Nile virus infections in people, birds, or mosquitoes. A total of 241 cases of West Nile virus disease, including four deaths, have been reported to CDC. This is the highest number of cases reported through the end of July since 2004. Almost 80 percent of the cases have been reported from three states, Texas, Mississippi, and Oklahoma.

West Nile virus is transmitted to people by infected mosquitoes. In the United States, most people are infected from June through September, and the number of these infections usually peaks in mid-August. Seasonal outbreaks often occur in local areas that can vary from year to year. Many factors impact when and where outbreaks occur, such as weather, numbers of mosquitoes that spread the virus, and human behavior.

The best way to prevent West Nile virus disease is to avoid mosquito bites:

- Use insect repellents when you go outdoors.
- Wear long sleeves and pants during dawn and dusk.
- Install or repair screens on windows and doors. Use air conditioning, if you have it.
- Empty standing water from items outside your home such as flowerpots, buckets, and kiddie pools.

In addition, the following 23 Nebraska counties became eligible for this assistance because they are contiguous to one or more of the primary Nebraska counties that were designated on August 8, 2012 by the Secretary of Agriculture. Those Nebraska counties are: Buffalo, Cass, Dixon, Douglas, Fillmore, Franklin, Hall, Holt, Kearney, Keya Paha, Knox, Lancaster, Merrick, Nuckolls, Platte, Rock, Saline, Sarpy, Seward, Stanton, Thayer, Washington and Wayne.

Emergency loan applications are available and must be submitted through the local FSA county office from any applicant who qualifies for a physical or production loss (at least a 30 percent reduction from normal) in a single

who are infected with West Nile virus will develop symptoms such as fever, headache, body aches, joint pains, vomiting, diarrhea, or rash. Less than 1 percent will develop a serious neurologic illness such as encephalitis or meningitis (inflammation of the brain or surrounding tissues). About 10 percent of people who develop neurologic infection due to West Nile virus will die. People over 50 years of age and those with certain medical conditions, such as cancer, diabetes, hypertension, kidney disease, and organ transplants, are at greater risk for serious illness.

The CDC is clear on why they are seeing more activity than in recent years. Regardless of the reasons for the increase, they recommend everyone take action to protect themselves and their family. There are currently no medications to treat, or vaccines to prevent, West Nile virus infection. People with milder illnesses typically recover on their own, although symptoms may last for several weeks. In more severe cases, patients often need to be hospitalized to receive supportive treatment, such as intravenous fluids, pain medication, and nursing care.

If you or a family member are experiencing symptoms that have you concerned, contact your health care provider. If necessary, there are several tests available to diagnose the West Nile virus.

NIFA Asset Modernization Initiative Available

Program Description

The Nebraska Asset Modernization Initiative is designed to accelerate small manufacturers' investment in modern assets. The financial incentives are available for investments made by existing companies that will, generally, within three months, modernize their production assets, expand their production lines to increase market share and/or target markets with new products.

Manufacturers and agricultural/food product processors that have been in business in Nebraska for more than five years, employ from 2 to 200 employees, and have net depreciable Nebraska-based assets of \$10 million may be eligible. The resources are available as either a grant ("MAG") or loan loss reserve ("CAP").

Description of Programs

The Modern Asset Grant Program (MAG) provides a direct grant in an amount up to 6 percent of eligible basis for new or used (manufactured after 2005) machinery and equipment once it has been acquired and placed in service by an eligible business. A res-

ervation of a grant award from NIFA must be received by the company prior to any commitment/purchase order/down payment by the company for purchase of the asset.

The Capital Access Program (CAP) provides a loan loss reserve contribution in an amount up to 5 percent of the eligible amounts borrowed for new or used (manufactured after 2005) machinery and equipment acquired and placed in service by an eligible business. CAP Awards match lender and borrower contributions of up to 5 percent for a total reserve of up to 10 percent on a CAP loan. A lender's initial \$500,000 in CAP loans qualifies for an additional bonus contributed by NIFA to the loan loss reserve.

Availability of funds: Until June 30, 2013, amount Initially available: \$1.5 million, amounts awarded and reserved to date: \$536,428.69, remaining balance: \$963,571.31.

The source of funding for this Initiative is solely from resources within the NIFA general fund. No federal or state tax dollars will be expended in the operation of this program.

Funds available for homeownership assistance

Funds are available through the Thayer County Economic Development Alliance (TCE-DA) to provide down payment subsidies to homebuyers for the purchase of existing homes within Thayer County. The program includes financial assistance in the form of a conditional grant for minor rehabilitation of homes purchased.

Eligible applicants include interested persons/families looking to purchase a home in Thayer County and whose incomes are 100 percent or lower of the median household incomes of Thayer County, adjusted for family size.

For example, a family of four with a combined household income of \$57,000 or less may qualify. Other applicant eligibility criteria include: Home being purchased must be the principal residence of the buyer; completion of a homeownership training program; credit-worthiness.

The purpose of the Homeownership Opportunity Program (HOP) in Thayer County is to provide financial assistance for the purchase of

existing single-family residential housing units which are safe, decent, sanitary and affordable to low and moderate income persons/families-buyers.

This program will provide assistance to those persons/families of greatest need, improve availability of housing, promote homeownership, increase attractiveness of underdeveloped neighborhoods and increase local employment. The Thayer County Economic Development Alliance (TCE-DA), a non-profit corporation, owns and operates the program with program management and application assistance from the Southeast Nebraska Development District (SEDD).

The maximum home loan subsidy will be \$17,000. The subsidy to any buyer shall not exceed the lesser of (1) \$17,000 or (2) 20 percent of the purchase price, or (3) the amount of money necessary to pay the purchase price after expending all liquid assets of the purchaser, which exceeds \$5,000, after the 2 percent down payment requirement.

All program applicants are encouraged to secure permanent financing from Thayer County lenders.

TCE-DA may also provide funds to complete minor repair and/or rehabilitation work in the form of a "conditional grant." The maximum amount of these grants will be \$8,500 per home. Additional rehabilitation funds may also be secured through the USDA Rural Development programs. Rehabilitation work will be completed after the purchase of the property and must be completed within six months of the purchase closing date.

The program is funded by Nebraska Affordable Housing Trust Funds awarded to TCE-DA by the Nebraska Department of Economic Development.


