Area schools score above state averages on many assessments

Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) statewide assessment results show that in many grades and subject areas Thayer Central, Deshler and Bruning-Davenport schools rank above the state average for the percentage of students who met or exceeded the standards.

The assessments were administered across the state in the winter and spring of 2013. The state lists an average percentage of all the students who took the assessment and met or exceeded the standards.

A percentage is also given for each grade in each district that took the test. Four subject areas are tested including reading, mathematics, science and writing. Not all grades are tested in every subject area.

Some grades at Deshler and Bruning-Davenport are not available, because the state masks data if there are not more than five students in the category to protect the identity of those students.

Reading

The test for reading is given to third through eighth and eleventh grade students. For Thayer Central, all except three grades were above

the state average percentage of students who met or exceeded the standards. The fifth grade at Thayer Central did especially well with 95 percent of students meeting or exceeding the standards. The eleventh grade class was close behind with 92 percent of students reaching the same point. For Deshler, test results weren't available for the fifth grade class. For the remaining grades, all but two grades were above the state average for percentage of students meeting or exceeding standards. Both third and seventh grades had 87 percent of the students meet this mark. Out of the four grades

with data available, Bruning-Davenport's seventh grade class did the best with 74 percent of students meeting or exceeding the standards on their test.

Mathematics

The mathematics test is also given to third through eighth and eleventh grade students. Thayer Central was above the state average for percentage of students meeting or exceeding the standards in five out of seven of the grades tested. The fourth and fifth grade students had over 90 percent of students above the standard level. With the missing data

Arrest made in connection to break-ins

A male juvenile has been arrested in connection with the sheriff's alert that was issued two weeks ago, said Thayer County Sheriff David Lee.

On Aug. 7, the sheriff's office issued an alert stating that they had received reports from several Hebron citizens that someone had gotten into their cars and had gone through their belongings.

Reports of the same type were also coming from Deshler.

This arrest clears approximately a dozen break-ins of vehicles in both Hebron and Deshler.

The arrest also led to the recovery of a stolen firearm that was taken in a residential burglary in rural Deshler.

1883

130 Years Ago

Almy and Burden report large lumber sales.

Land sales are brisk, and land agents are correspondingly happy.

A station will be established about midway between Hebron and Chester.

C.A. Patrick informs us he has sent for a sorghum mill and evaporator of a ton per hour capacity.

As showing the wonderful productiveness of this county, we note the following fact: Last fall, Samuel Howell got two bushels and two pounds of winter wheat from Hon. Benj. Young. From this small amount of seed he threshed 60 bushels.

Miles Heath, one of the early settlers of this county, died at Belvidere. He was highly esteemed by a large circle of friends and relatives.

The frame of W.J. Green's new livery stable is up.

The Rev. G.W. Goodale and wife have permanently located at Hebron. He will organize a Presbyterian church at this place.

Phillip Moll, formerly proprietor of the Alexandria flouring mills, is building a house of business at Carleton, at which place he will put in a large stock of merchandise.

Carleton

On the 15th we had quite an influx of sportsmen and their dogs from St. Joe, but the citizens generally gave them the cold shoulder, and threatened to persecute them, and they soon left for more congenial quarters

Louis Baumann is building a mammoth barn on his place.

The ground has been broken for Mr. Moll's new store, which is to be situated on the corner of Couler and Doyle St.

Davenport

E. Walker, who purchased N. Brittenham's place has arrived with his family and household goods.

Will Brittenham is keeping the people in fresh meat. He says he will stay in the business this winter.

Tobias Castor, the general right of way man of the B&M R.R. Co., has been in Hebron for several days and has submitted a proposition from the company. The proposition is to the effect that the right of way and depot grounds are to be furnished by the citizens of Hebron and Chester with the exception of \$1,500 which the company will pay.

The name of the road will be "The Nebraska and Colorado Railroad." It will be a B&M line and a link in an extensive system. The intention of the company is to commence the building of the road as soon as the right of way is obtained.

1893

120 Years Ago

The small boy with his air gun is out hunting and there is death among the pigeons.

Eld. Humphreys preaches his farewell sermon at the Christian church next Sunday.

The buffalo horns in C. Cummins barber shop were raffled off. Sixty chances were sold. O.P. Hendershot shook the highest dice and walked off with the horns.

Five Hebron boys felt a hankering for watermelons and went to Sam White's patch, east of the city, to gratify their appetites. Mr. White was hankering for the boys and with a shotgun he hankered their feelings. The case was taken before Squire Gates, who hankered their pocketbooks to the tune of 50 cents and costs, or \$2.40 each.

The Hebron city schools will open August 28. All pupils are expected to bring their promotion cards with them. The line dividing the two districts runs from the north limit of the city down Fourth Street to Lincoln Avenue, thence east to Eighth Street, then south to the limit of the district. All pupils of the first, second and third grades living west and south of the line must attend the high school building, except that pupils living in the high school district may be sent to the Riverside school if it is deemed necessary to relieve an

over-crowded condition.

The management of the county fair which is to be held at Hebron, September 26 and 29, is determined that it shall eclipse all of its predecessors in magnitude.

One of the most pleasant social events of the season was the picnic supper given on the Blue Thursday evening by the members of the Clique to the McGinty Club. The Clinquers proved themselves adept in the art of cookery and entertained the McGintys in royal style.

Just think of a local ball game playing for \$100 a side. The Fats and the Leans of this city have each organized a ball nine with John Scoville as captain of the corpulent gentlemen and John Byrne as captain of the more attenuated. The Leans challenged the Fats to meet them in mortal combat for this afternoon, and it is expected that one side or the other will be totally annihilated, and will never more dare to assert their talents as baseball champions. While it is well understood that if a fat man hits a ball with his bat, it is likely to travel with great speed, it is an equally well established fact that the powers of the lean men as runners are perfectly wonderful. It is to be hoped no deaths will result from the game.

Mrs. Hannah E. Goodpasture, daughter of J.W. Quaintance, died at Hebron. She leaves a family of four children and other relatives to mourn her loss.

John McNitt was married to Miss Dora Stafford at Hebron.

Married at the residence of the bride's father, W.S. Gilpin, W.S. Minor and Miss Lillie Gilpin, both of Thayer County.

It is always fun to get together and work hard and sometimes laugh even harder. It all goes for a good cause as the Woman's Club has numerous projects to fund throughout the year.


One of the perks of serving the dinner was getting to listen and watch the speaker as he presented his program on farmers across the nation.

That is why with the beginning of a new school year, Thayer County Health Services wants to raise awareness with parents, educators and all adults about bullying.

Although definitions of bullying vary, most agree that bullying involves:

- **Imbalance of Power:** people who bully use their power to control or harm and the people being bullied may have a hard time defending themselves
- **Intent to Cause Harm:** actions done by accident are not bullying; the person bullying has a goal to cause harm
- **Repetition:** incidents of bullying happen to the same person over and over by the same person or group

Bullying can take many forms. Examples include: Verbal: name-calling, teasing; Social: spreading rumors, leaving people out on purpose, breaking up friendships; Physical: hitting, punching, shoving, and Cyberbullying: using the internet, mobile phones or other digital technologies to harm others

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) gives the following tips.

When Your Child Is Bullied

- Help your child learn how to respond by teaching your child how to: (1) Look the bully in the eye, (2) stand tall and stay calm in a difficult situation, and (3) walk away.
- Teach your child how to say in a firm voice, "I don't like what you are doing." "Please do not talk to me like that" or "Why would you say that?"

• Encourage your child to tell a trusted adult about the bullying.

• Encourage your child support other children who may be bullied. Encourage your child to include these children in activities.

• Encourage your child to join with others in telling bullies to stop.

• Use effective, non-physical discipline, such as loss of privileges.

• Develop practical solutions with the school principal, teachers, counselors, and parents of the children your child has bullied.

• When Your Child Is a Bystander

- Tell your child not to cheer on or even quietly watch bullying.
- Encourage your child to tell a trusted adult about the bullying.

• Help your child learn how to respond by teaching your child how to: (1) Look the bully in the eye, (2) stand tall and stay calm in a difficult situation, and (3) walk away.

- Teach your child when and how to ask for help.
- Encourage your child to make friends with other children.
- Support activities that interest your child.
- Alert school officials to the problems and work with them on solutions.
- Make sure an adult who knows about the bullying can watch out for your child's safety and well-being when you cannot be there.

• When Your Child Is the Bully

- Be sure your child knows that bullying is never okay.
- Set firm and consistent limits on your child's aggressive behavior.
- Be a positive role model. Show children they can get what they want without teasing, threatening or hurting someone.
- Use effective, non-physical discipline, such as loss of privileges.
- Develop practical solutions with the school principal, teachers, counselors, and parents of the children your child has bullied.

• When Your Child Is a Bystander

- Tell your child not to cheer on or even quietly watch bullying.
- Encourage your child to tell a trusted adult about the bullying.
- Help your child support other children who may be bullied. Encourage your child to include these children in activities.
- Encourage your child to join with others in telling bullies to stop.

Enrollment events allow those on Medicare to sit down one-on-one with a Nebraska SHIIP certified counselor and evaluate Medicare options for 2014.

Appointments are required. To schedule an appointment, or for more information, contact the Nebraska SHIIP at 1-800-234-7119 or 402-471-2841.

It is important to remember that a plan's prescription coverage changes, too, even if the monthly premium stays the same. People with Medicare should examine their 2014 choices starting on October 15 to be sure that they are enrolled in the most affordable Part D or Advantage plan for next year.

"Your health needs change from year to year. Your drug plan changes, too," said Jones. "That's why it's important to evaluate Medicare choices every year. But you don't have to do it alone. Medicare and Nebraska SHIIP provide free counseling."

There are several ways for people with Medicare to get help:

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Your Guide To A Perfect Wedding

Making Use of Wedding Leftovers

In an effort to create a once-in-a-lifetime event that is remembered by all in attendance, many couples will admit to going a tad overboard with their weddings. From ultra-stretch limousines to bachelor/bachelorette parties in Las Vegas to course after course of food and beverages, some weddings are a lesson in excess. When the party has winded down, conscious couples can ensure that some of the excesses of the wedding get repurposed for good use. And that begins with the food.

Many wedding caterers, in an effort to ensure no guest goes without their fair share of food, grossly overestimate the amount of food needed for the reception. That means there may be plenty of appetizers and main courses leftover, all of which couples have paid for. There are a number of ways that food can be saved and given to others.

- * Create classy take-home-packages. People have become much less averse to taking home food they cannot finish from restaurants. As portion sizes continue to grow, taking a portion home to enjoy later is both cost-conscious and a healthy idea. While a wedding may be a formal event, it shouldn't preclude guests from feeling comfortable taking home any uneaten food, particularly if they like the food. Provide the reception center with decorative to-go boxes or containers that can be used to package any food guests want to take home with them. Small, handled paper or fabric tote bags will make the leftovers that much more portable.
- * Donate leftover food. Neighborhood food banks may be willing to accept food donations from your wedding. Although many deal with only nonperishable foods, some will pick up both. Before the wedding you can inquire within certain organizations to find out which specialize in what area of food collection. Feeding America (feedingamerica.org) has an extensive list of food banks and food-rescue programs available online. Some organizations can pick up food and deliver it within the same day to a soup kitchen. If you cannot find an organization to help, you may actually be able to donate your food to livestock. Some farms and recreational farmers will feed pigs leftover food. This is a way to ensure food will not go to waste.
- * Help reduce waste. You can speak with your wedding caterer about cutting down on the amount of food without making it overtly noticeable to guests. First, consider a sit-down dinner where portions are carefully measured rather than buffet where amounts are estimated. Also, removing extra courses such as dessert or breakfast bars can further keep down the amount of extra food as well as the cost.
- * Take it home. If you will not be traveling to your honeymoon directly after the wedding reception, you can have the catering staff package the food and you can bring it home. Keep your freezer empty and put the food inside. When you return from your honeymoon you will have plenty of dinners already premade so you can enjoy life as newlyweds. Otherwise, you can invite friends over to view honeymoon photos and serve the food as refreshments.
- * Recycle flowers. Food may not be the only item leftover at the end of the night. Guests who may not have taken home favors or centerpieces will leave behind many beautiful items that would normally end up in the trash. Flowers and gifts can be donated to a hospital or senior center to brighten the atmosphere. Be sure to keep just a few favors available for people who send gifts in the mail since they weren't able to attend the festivities.

There are a number of ways to ensure that the excesses of a wedding can be put to good use. By donating food and other items or simply taking them home with you, you can stretch your money and resources further.

UNL to Host Many Events at Nebraska State Fair

LINCOLN, Neb. — The University of Nebraska-Lincoln will host many events at the Nebraska State Fair in Grand Island from Aug. 23- Sept. 2.

The College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources will have a booth focusing on degree programs for prospective students in the Exhibition Building Hall, as well as hands-on activities promoting CASNR academic programs in the 4-H Building. The Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources and CASNR will host an open house in the hospitality loft of the Five Points Band Live-stock Arena from 1 p.m.-3 p.m. Sept. 1. Free ice cream will be provided by the UNL Dairy Store.

UNL Extension will host an informational booth about its programs.

A UNL Admissions booth in the 4-H/FFA exhibition building will show fair-goers what it's like to receive a Big 10 education. Husker spirit items including buttons and tattoos will be distributed.

The UNL Food Processing Center display in the 4-H/FFA exhibition building will feature more than 20 food companies offering samples of food produced in Nebraska. Visitors will be able to sample

salsas, pickles, beef jerky, popcorn and more.

More than 5,000 4-H members will have more than 10,000 exhibits in such areas as science, agricultural literacy and career development. Youth from all 93 counties will be represented.

Fair-goers will get their first glimpse of the Nebraska Building now under construction. Starting in 2014, the \$5.4 million building, financed mostly by Nebraska banks, will host the Ag Literacy Experience partnership with the Nebraska Department of Agriculture. That exhibit will feature 25,000 square feet of interactive activities designed to help participants understand the science and art of agriculture, as well as expose them to agriculture-related careers.

New interactive activities at the 4-H exhibit hall will include:

- A Commodity Carnival Aug. 26-27, which aims to engage and educate youth about the vital role of agricultural commodities in everyday life. Developed by The Ohio State University Extension, the Commodity Carnival will consist of two hands-on mini carnival games - Invest and Grow and Pig-Linko - to introduce the concepts of agriculture futures, options

and commodity trading to the target audience of families and youth ages 8-14. Each activity will guide the participants through the process of producing a commodity (i.e., hogs) and selling it.

- A series of hands-on science experiments on Aug. 31, Science Discovery Day, including:

- Let's Communicate: A LEGO building challenge where one person gives instructions to his or her partner about how to build a structure.

- Blast Off: Families will design paper rockets.

- Build a Bridge: Families will build a bridge out of index cards to support washers.

- Build a Tower: Families will build towers out of dry spaghetti and mini-marshmallows.

- Inspired by Nature: Families will match human inventions with their inspiration in nature.

- Learning from Failure: Families will create a boat out of aluminum foil and test it until it sinks.

Subject: Chariot Racing Once Popular at Nebraska Fairs

Chariot racing, a favorite sport of Greek, Roman, and Byzantine audiences, also attracted American enthusiasts during the 1880s and afterward. The sport became popular as entertainment at state and county fairs in Nebraska and across the country following the first publication in 1880 of Lew Wallace's Ben-Hur: A Tale of the Christ. The novel, the result of seven years of research by the retired Civil War general, included an exciting description of Roman chariot racing that soon inspired imitation.

Chariot racing was an attraction at the Nebraska State Fair in 1881. The Columbus Journal on August 17 announced that the races would be held at night under electric lights, a first for the fair. "The audience in the amphitheatre will be able to distinguish the horses and the colors worn by the drivers. . . . They will drive teams of four horses abreast, and have agreed to make the run of a half-mile around the track in one minute."

The Nebraska State Fair continued to host such races during the 1880s as one of a number of novelties intended

to entertain as well as educate fairgoers. A review of the files of the Omaha Daily Bee during these years indicates that smaller fairs around the state also sponsored them. The Buffalo County Fair at Kearney in 1887 advertised "hippodrome and Roman chariot races by parties who came especially from Illinois for that purpose." The Adams County Fair at Hastings in 1889 included "Ben-Hur chariot races, [and] Roman mounted races" in its schedule of events. The Red Cloud Chief on September 17, 1889, reminded readers: "Don't forget the [Webster County] fair which commences next Tuesday. Chariot races every day. Do not fail to come. Every farmer in Webster county should make it a point to be present."

The races were certainly popular, but whether farmers and other fairgoers learned anything useful was debated in the press. Former governor Robert Furnas, in 1882 a member of the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture involved in planning the State Fair, said: "Special [fair] attractions of the usual kind, chariot races, bicycle tournaments, etc., have become threadbare and the expenditure of money upon them is worse than use-

less." The Columbus Journal on March 25, 1885, called chariot racing "one of the nonsensical attractions (?) of the State Fair" and reprinted scathing comment from the Nebraska State Journal in Lincoln which called it an "abuse of the object for which fairs are intended, having no recommendation except that it is a 'drawing' feature to swell the gate receipts." The Journal said:

"We observe that the board of managers of the State Fair have retained the chariot race as a feature of the annual exhibition. We are delighted to see it. The intimate relation between the improvement of agriculture and the spectacle of a half-naked woman driving four old plugs at a gallop around the race track is so intimate and vital as to need no comment."

Chariot races, however, declined in popularity only as other attractions, including auto and air races, eventually replaced them in public favor. They are still a feature of some modern rodeos.

Subject: Football on Horseback


"Of the many novelties and interesting features with the Buffalo Bill Wild West and Pawnee Bill Far East," said the North Platte Semi-weekly Tribune on August 4, 1911, "football played by horses is probably the most unique form of entertainment to be seen in that exhibition of wonders." The show about to open in North Platte belonged to William F. "Buffalo Bill" Cody and Gordon W. "Pawnee Bill" Lillie, who had combined their traveling shows. This "Two Bills" show boasted unusual attractions, including a widely popular novelty act entitled "Football on Horseback."

The North Platte Tribune said: "One can hardly believe that the art of horse training has been perfected to such an extent that a game of football can be played by men on horseback, but that such is really the case will entertainingly [be] proven when the big exhibition comes to town."

"The ball used is of mammoth size, made of rubber, and by bumping it about the riders and their horses manipulate the sphere from goal to goal, playing the game under special rules. All the fine points of the regulation game of football are brought out in the 'horse play' of the Wild West, and it is said that the game played under these conditions is highly exciting and decidedly amusing."

The act was as popular in the East as it was in Nebraska and the West. After the show opened in Madison Square Garden in April of 1908, the New York Times on April 22 noted that the football act "took the audience by storm." The Times described the details of the game: "An immense ball is placed in the centre of the arena and two opposing teams of horsemen endeavor to push it to either end of the enclosure. To score a point it is necessary to push the ball between goal posts. Last night the game was between a team of cowboys and a team of Indians, who didn't come from Carlisle [Indian School], but played the game with real Carlisle grit and audacity."

"When, after many at-

tempts the Indians succeeded in making their first score against the cowboys, the audience rose to its feet to shout its delight. When, to the surprise of every one, the Indians scored a second time, leaving their opponents defeated, the applause was terrific."

Special mention was made of the star performer, a horse named Maude. "It was Maude, who after each goal, was called upon to put the ball in motion again. Her rider would back her up to the ball, and she would

give it a kick creditable for an intercollegiate punter."

The Buffalo Bill Wild West and Pawnee Bill Far East was successful for a time, especially during its run as Buffalo Bill's farewell tour, but it ended in 1913 when creditors foreclosed on the show in Denver.

C. Ted Norder moved to approve the resolution authorizing the district to continue its participation in an interlocal cooperative with Educational Service Unit #5 and other school districts; authorizing such cooperative to issue bonds on behalf of the District in a principal amount not to exceed \$100,000 to finance the cost of any item of hardware or software used by the District in providing for the delivery of information, including the purchasing of upgrades or related improvements to information technology for the operation of libraries operated by the District; delegating the authority to determine the principal amounts, maturity dates, interest rates, redemption provisions and other terms of such bonds; imposing a tax to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds; designating the bonds as qualified tax-exempt obligations; authorizing certain actions and documents; publishing notice of intent to issue such bonds; and prescribing other matters relating thereto.

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Prellwitz Presented National Weather Service 15-year Length Of Service Award

The National Weather Service proudly presented Michael Prellwitz with a 15-year Length of Service Award for his participation in the Co-operative Weather Observer Program.

Mike continues the climate history for the Hebron area, which started in January of 1886.

Mike has been responsible for chronicling the temperatures and precipitation for Hebron since 1998 when he took the station over from Rebecca Thomas. Prior to Rebecca, Gordon Wilson recorded the temperatures and precipitation for nearly 40 years, (September 1957 to February 1997) the longest serving observer for the Hebron area.

Since Mike took over in 1998, he has measured 424 inches of liquid precipitation as of the end of July 2013. During this time period, the wettest year was 2007 with 37.57 inches of precipitation while the driest year was 2009 with only 21.14 inches.

The 30 year annual average precipitation for Hebron is 30.44 inches. If you look back at the precipitation records dating back to 1893, you would find the most precipitation recorded in one year was 1902 with 46.01 inches while the all-time driest year was 1934 when only 12.35 inches was recorded.

Looking at the winter season, Mike has measured over 434 inches of snow with the 2001-2002 season coming in at first place with 46.1 inches. The most snow in one month was fairly recent, (Dec 2009) with 19.8 inches. Temperature-wise, the warmest temperature Mike has recorded is 108 degrees, which occurred in July 2006 while the coldest temperature was -15 degrees in January 2010.

July of 1954 had the warmest reading with 113 degrees while -34 degrees, reported in February 1899, was the coldest. If the nation did not have dedicated cooperative observers, such as Mike, we would not have such an extensive climate database for Hebron or anywhere else across the nation.

When Mike took over the weather records, his monthly reports were mailed to the National Weather Service Office in Hastings. He also made daily reports using a programmable phone where

each element had its own code. With changing technology, Mike now enters his data online daily, with comments for each day as far as what type of weather occurred in the past 24 hours, like a weather diary.

Years from now people will be able to go back to see what kind of weather Hebron had, other than just the temperatures and precipitation. At the end of the month his reports are digitally downloaded to the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C., and the Nebraska State Climatologist after being quality controlled by the National Weather Service.

In addition to recording the temperatures and precipitation, Mike also downloads 15 minute data from a Fischer & Porter recording rain gauge at the end of each month.

This piece of equipment used to use a punch tape mechanism that had to be manually changed at the end of the month. Back in late 2009 it was upgraded to a new digital measuring device where the data is downloaded onto a SD card and emailed to our office.

Mike's observations are used in support of the forecast

and warning programs in the Hastings office. They are also included in a temperature/precipitation summary product issued for public and media use each morning. The precipitation and snowfall reports are also portrayed on the daily precipitation maps.

During especially heavy rain and/or snow events, the information provided by Mike and other cooperative weather observers across south central Nebraska and north central Kansas, is used to put together weather summaries which are then issued for use by the public, news media and various other users.

Mike is among an elite group of over 10,000 volunteers across the nation who record temperatures and/or precipitation every day. Their climate data are used in every aspect of our national economy.

Just a few of the many users are transportation companies, the insurance industry, agriculture, water resource management and manufacturing. Their many years of dedicated reports are the cornerstone of the normal/means and extremes used on a daily basis.

in the fifth grade at Deshler, two of the grades tested were above the state average of percentage of students that met or exceeded the standards. The third grade class had 93 percent of its students meet or exceed the standards. Bruning-Davenport's best scores out of the four classes with data was the seventh grade who had 90 percent of students who met or exceeded the standards.

Science
Science tests are given to fifth, eighth and eleventh grade students. In this subject area, Thayer Central was above the state average for percentage of students meeting or exceeding the standards for all grades tested. The fifth grade had all of the students in the class meet or exceed the standards. Deshler schools were missing data for the fifth and eighth grades for the science test. The eleventh grade had 62 percent of the

students meeting or exceeding the standards. The fifth, eighth and eleventh graders at Bruning-Davenport all had over 70 percent of their students reach the same mark.

Writing
Fourth, eighth and eleventh graders take the writing test. Once again, all grades at Thayer Central were able to rank above the state average for percentage of students meeting or exceeding the standards. Ninety percent of the eleventh grade class managed to meet or exceed the standards. For Deshler, the eleventh grade class had 77 percent of the class reach the same point. Seventy-nine percent of eleventh graders at Bruning-Davenport were also able to meet or exceed the standards.

Individual student results will be given out by the districts soon.
