County Board discusses cemeteries

The Thayer County Board of Commissioners met Aug. 21 to talk with organizations and discuss topics on the agenda.

Thayer County road superintendent Richard Heinrichs started the meeting out speaking with the group about current projects at the roads department. Among the list were spraying of the ditches, equipment repairs and tree removal. Discussion also took place about moving the wooden railroad car that is currently sitting on a lot on First Street. The group hopes to move the car to the Thayer County Museum to be used there as part of an exhibit.

In other business, petitions had been filed to ask the county to take over three cemeteries located in the county. The three cemeteries were listed on the petition as needing care. A separate petition had to be filed for each cemetery.

After speaking on the phone with the current caretakers of the Keim Cemetery, commissioners voted to accept the petitions for Letterman and Hebron Pioneer cemeteries. The county will now be in charge of taking care of those two cemeteries. The current caretakers of the Keim Cemetery wished to continue mowing and tending to the area.

Commissioners also met with Bryan Schardt, county weed superintendent. He asked the group for a letter of support for a grant that would help with the excavating project of the Little Blue River.

In other action commissioners:

- moved to approve inventories as submitted by appointed and elected officials.
- approved the lease of a new copier for the county clerk's office from Eakes Office Plus.

Hebron native donates \$8 million to UNL

On Aug. 20, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln School of Music announced an \$8 million gift from UNL alumnus Glenn Korff to the University of Nebraska Foundation. The gift from the fourth-generation Nebraskan creates a permanently endowed fund to provide annual support for students, faculty and programs within the school, which is part of the Hixson-Lied College of Fine and Performing Arts.

A native of Hebron, Korff lives in Boulder, Colo., and graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1965 with a chemistry major and was a member and former president of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. His passion for performing arts began on the university campus as a member of Kosmet Klub, a male musical and comedy ensemble, in which he was a set designer. He received an MBA in finance from the University of Pennsylvania in 1968 and enjoyed a long career in the area of finance and investments, retiring from Goldman Sachs.

In honor of Korff's generosity, the school will be named the Glenn Korff School of Music, pending approval by the NU Board of

Regents.

"We will be proud to link in perpetuity the name of Glenn Korff with our School of Music and the outstanding programs and performances it provides," UNL Chancellor Harvey Perlman said.

Each year, 25 percent of the expendable income from the endowed fund will support undergraduate and graduate students within the school through scholarships, fellowships, international engagement activities and grants for opportunities to hone their skills. Another 25 percent will support the school's faculty through awards to support teaching initiatives, scholarly research, creative activities, professional travel and more while also creating the Glenn Korff Endowed Chair, the recipient of which will be selected based on national and international accomplishments.

The remaining 50 percent of the fund's annual support will be directed to the school's academic and program activities, which may include support for concerts, recitals, tours, competitions, academic conferences and more.

"I am grateful to be able to make this gift to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln School of Music," Korff said. "I feel it will be beneficial for musical presentations, dance and the performing arts, including the 'Pride of All Nebraska,' the Cornhusker Marching Band. I am honored to be able

to make this contribution in order to provide future programs that will enlighten and entertain families and generations of Nebraskans for years to come."

In announcing the gift to faculty, Charles O'Connor, endowed dean of the Hixson-Lied College of Fine and Performing Arts, said it was a historic moment for the students, faculty, staff and alumni of the School of Music.

"The School of Music has a rich tradition of excellence at this university, and this generous gift from Mr. Korff is an important investment in the school's future," O'Connor said. "Our students and faculty perform and compete at the highest levels, and this gift affirms that."

"We could not be more thankful and grateful for Mr. Korff's generosity and commitment to the University of Nebraska."

John W. Richmond, director of the School of Music, said: "I don't think it's possible yet to fully comprehend the many ways this extraordinary naming gift will transform our School of Music as a teaching institution, as a cultural catalyst, as a center for research in music and as a place of international synergy for music and dance. What I can say with absolute confidence is that the impressive growth and transformation we have enjoyed in the last decade -- and it has been

Southern rust confirmed in Thayer County

The southern rust crop disease has been confirmed in Thayer County according to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln CropWatch.

Southern rust is a disease that affects the corn crop. One indication of the disease is sudden development of yellow flecks on the leaves of the corn. These flecks have been known to show up in early stages of the disease.

Cooler than usual seasonal temperatures this summer may have slowed the spread of the disease in the earlier part of the season. Although with warmer temperatures along with high humidity recently, the spread of the disease has been rapidly increasing according to CropWatch.

The disease is also spread through the wind blowing spores to other fields.

Since the first confirmations in July, 22 other Nebraska counties have been added to the list of those with confirmed cases of southern rust.

1883

130 Years Ago

There are 70 organized counties in Nebraska.

E.J. Huse will lay out an addition to Hebron on the south.

It is reported that the Chester Enterprise has suspended publication.

Frank Hutchison is harvesting a fine crop of 50 acres of broom corn.

W.J. McAnally of Belvidere announces that he has Marble Head line for sale.

The county has paid Annie O. Mitchell \$285 for a quit claim deed to the county poor farm.

Quite a number are inquiring if Thayer County is to have a fair this fall. What answer shall we make, gentlemen officers?

The town of Powell, about eight miles west of Fairbury, has been started by the St. J & W R.R. A side track has been built and a post office established.

The town of Harbine is going ahead. A town hall, windmill, pump, and reservoir, and a new elevator are among the recent improvements.

The county commissioners denied the petition for a road through Mr. Buller's farm, east of Hebron, and leave the road where now located on the section line.

Dr. B.R. Smith reports a severe accident to a young man by the name of Connor, son of the superintendent of the cheese factory. He split his foot with an ax.

J.J. Malowney informs us that he has 185 acres of corn and not having sufficient crib room, he talks of applying to the county commissioners for a lease of the "corn crib" up in the draw northeast of town.

The fine gas pipe railing around the basement stairway of Hendershot & Son's new building was not made in New York. It was made in Hebron. William M. Barger was the chief engineer and Jones was his worthy right hand assistant.

It is about time the Hebron Fire Company reorganized. It has been about two years since the company held a meeting. Wake up, boys, and prepare for the dangerous fall campaign. The editor will join as a "high private in the rear rank."

A citizen of LaPorte, Ind., writes to Postmaster Fitchpatrick for information. Among other things he intimates that he would be willing to accept a piece of government land near town. We smilingly take occasion to say to this gentleman and others that the government lands in this county were exhausted about ten years ago.

This building is 26x72 feet in size and is two stories high with basement. It cost \$8,000. The walls are of beautiful, cream-colored magnesia stone. The front of the lower story is iron, with large double thick French plate glass. Throughout, the building is conveniently arranged and handsomely furnished for the large stock carried by this firm.

Among the new business enterprises we take pleasure in introducing to the public The Nebraska Loan & Mercantile Company of Hebron. M.H. Weis, president; F.L. Gibbs, secretary and treasurer.

Walter J. Parmley, who has for a long time creditably filled the position of deputy county treasurer, has resigned his position in order to attend the university of Madison, Wisc. Capt. James Carson of Lynchburg, Va., is visiting his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. P.F. Burruss of Belvidere.

Mr. and Mrs. H.W. Cornell of Belvidere returned from a trip to Clinton, Iowa, where they attended a large spiritualist camp meeting.

Silas Morin of Lake Linden, Mich., a landowner in this county, was visiting D. Correll's land on Spring Creek and expects to become a resident of Thayer County next spring.

The B&M railroad surveyors have run their survey north of Hebron, intersecting the St. J&W R.R., about two and one-half miles west of Belvidere.

An extra side track is being put in at Chester to afford facilities for unloading iron and ties for the Chester and Hebron branch of the Nebraska & Colorado Railroad.

It is said that notification has been received at Chester of the shipping at that point from Lincoln of 500 carloads of material for the new line.

It is thought the railroad from Chester to Hebron will be in running order in about three months time — in time to ship some of the enormous crops of this section.

The rights of way from the resident land owners between Chester and Hebron have been obtained. The grading engineers arrive at Chester.

An infant child of Eugene Templin of Chester, died.

Quite a number of our citizens went to Bruning to attend the dedication of the Lutheran church at that place. The church was built at a cost of \$4,000 and is entirely paid for.

Starbuck & Sykes were paying \$44.25 for hogs, which was the highest price paid in the county.

Hank Vieselmeyer of the real estate and insurance firm of Vieselmeyer Bros., left on his bicycle for a trip through Thayer and Gage counties. When last heard of he was in Beatrice.


50 Years Ago

Bipolar Disorder Facts

Bipolar disorder, sometimes called manic-depressive disorder, causes mood swings that range from the lows of depression to the highs of mania. When you become depressed, you may feel sad or hopeless and lose interest or pleasure in most activities. When your mood shifts in the other direction, you may feel euphoric and full of energy. Mood shifts may only occur a few times a year, or as often as several times a day. They may last for a few hours or for several months. The mood swings of bipolar disorder can also be mild or extreme. In some cases, bipolar disorder causes symptoms of depression and mania at the same time.

Although bipolar disorder is a disruptive, long-term condition, you can keep your moods in check by following a treatment plan. In most cases, bipolar disorder can be controlled with medications and psychological counseling (psychotherapy).

Bipolar disorder is divided into several subtypes. Each has a different pattern of symptoms. Types of bipolar disorder include:

Bipolar I - Mood swings that cause difficulty in your job, school or relationships. Manic episodes can be severe and dangerous.

Bipolar II - Less severe than bipolar I. You may have an elevated mood, irritability and some changes in your functioning, but generally you can carry on with your normal daily routine. Instead of full-blown mania, you have hypomania — a less severe form of mania.

Cyclothymia - This is a mild form of bipolar disorder. With cyclothymia, hypomania and depression can be disruptive, but the highs and lows are not as severe as they are with other types of bipolar disorder.

The cause of bipolar disorder is not completely understood. We know that it runs in families. It may also be affected by your living environment or family situation. One possible cause is an imbalance of chemicals in the brain.

The symptoms of bipolar disorder depend on your mood swings. In a manic episode, you may feel very happy, energetic, or on edge. You may feel like you need very little sleep. You may feel overly self-confident. Some people spend a lot of mon-

ey or get involved in dangerous activities when they are manic. After a manic episode, you may return to normal, or your mood may swing in the opposite direction to feelings of sadness, depression, and hopelessness. When you are depressed, you may have trouble thinking and making decisions. You may have memory problems. You may lose interest in things you have enjoyed in the past. You may also have thoughts about killing yourself.

Bipolar disorder is hard to diagnose. There are no lab tests for it; you can only run tests to rule out other causes for your symptoms. Instead, your doctor or therapist will ask detailed questions about what kind of symptoms you have and how long they last. To be diagnosed with bipolar I disorder, you must have had a manic episode lasting at least a week (less if you had to be hospitalized). During this time, you must have had three or more symptoms of mania, such as needing less sleep, being more talkative, behaving wildly or irresponsibly in activities that could have serious outcomes, or feeling as if your thoughts are racing. In bipolar II disorder, the manic episode may be less severe and shorter.

Many medicines are used to treat bipolar disorder. You may need to try several before you find the right combination that works for you. Regular check-ups are important so that your doctor can tell if your treatment is working. Counseling for you and your family is also an important treatment. It can help you cope with some of the work and relationship issues that your illness may cause. Charting your mood is one way you can start to recognize your symptoms. If you learn what triggers your mood swings, you may be able to avoid them. Too often people stop taking their medicines during a manic phase because they feel good. This is a mistake. It is important to take your medicines regularly, even if you are feeling better.

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
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

BVCA Awarded HHS Grant

Community Action of Nebraska, including Blue Valley Community Action Partnership, has been awarded a grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to fund a statewide network of Marketplace Navigators to assist families and individuals enrolling in health insurance under the Affordable Care Act. The Navigators will be available to assist families, individuals and small businesses purchasing health insurance coverage through the federally operated Health Insurance Marketplace.

The grant provides \$562,457 to initiate communication and outreach regarding the new Marketplace insurance options and to support businesses and families through the enrollment process. In addition, the Navigators will reach out to Nebraskans to provide information about the requirements and benefits of the Affordable Care Act. The grant provides for 10 full-time positions across the state and the training of 62 certified Navigators.

The Marketplace is a new way for families and business to compare health coverage from a variety of insurance companies and select a plan which meets both their needs and their budget. With one application, a family can see all their options, and enroll.

"The insurance plans in the Marketplace are offered by private insurance companies. This is not government-run health care," said Roger Furrer, executive director of Community Action of Nebraska. "The benefit is that the plans can no longer discriminate against a person based on

a pre-existing condition or other factors, such as gender," Furrer added. In addition, the Affordable Care Act allows for tax credits and cost sharing options which will be available to families with limited incomes.

The open enrollment period begins October 1, 2013, and coverage will begin January 1, 2014. Visit <http://www.healthcare.gov> to sign up for notifications and to learn more about your insurance options through the Marketplace.

Encourage Healthy Food Choices at School

Healthy eating is important for strong bones, teeth, muscles and a healthy heart for children. Children who have a healthy diet perform better in school. How can you help encourage your children and grandchildren to make better food choices in school if they have the opportunity to choose foods in school lunches?

Research shows that children are more likely to eat healthy foods such as fruits and vegetables if they take part in regular meals at home. To help your children understand good nutrition, think about how they can be involved in creating family meals. We all have busy lives, and are often rushed.

When there is an opportunity to eat a meal at home, have children help in deciding what to fix, and then do tasks such as making a salad, chopping vegetables, stirring the pot, and or setting the table. When

they help, think of fun ways to present the food, for example create faces on the plates with fruits or vegetables or making smoothies.

Make sure that you have healthy food choices on hand such as fresh fruits and vegetables. Choose 100 percent juice and low fat milk as beverage choices instead of sugary drinks without nutrients. Encourage children to try new foods at home.

As they are getting ready for the school day in the morning remind them to "try one new food on the lunch line," "eat one more fruit," "eat one more vegetable," "drink milk with lunch," or "eat at least one whole grain at lunch."

By their involvement at home and with encouragement to try new foods away from home will help to expand their food choices and hopefully have a well-rounded diet.
