## City Council moves forward in plans for community center

City Council members faced a hefty agenda on Monday night. Discussion continued on many topics such as nuisance properties and the community center along with a few new topics.

**Library Lawn Improvement**  
One of the new topics was brought up by Terry Olson, librarian at Secrest Library. Olson gave an update on usage in the library. The library has issued 42 new patron cards since the beginning of the year and checked out thousands of items. Olson also brought the library lawn issues to the council's attention.

"The library lawn has become a weed patch," she said.

There has been nothing other than mowing and occasional spraying done since she began as librarian, Olson said.

The solution presented by Olson was killing off the weeds and re-seeding the grass. Once the weeds

are gone, the library would like to put in a sprinkler system. After looking at estimates for this system, the council voted to allocate \$4,200 to the project. The decision of who does the work is up to the library board's discretion.

**Community Center**  
Talk about the community center continued on Monday night. Funds from the trust have been deposited in the city's account and a contract has been signed with JEO Consulting. The steering committee has begun meeting and will convene again before September's council meeting.

With the time required for the decision and bidding process, it may be April or May of next year before construction on the building could actually begin, council member Beth Goldhammer said.

**Public Nuisances**  
In other business, the council discussed updates on many properties that have become public nuisance. In addition to those properties, the members also have found more

properties that need attention from the owners and decided to begin the process of public nuisance hearings.

**Leadership Community Grant**  
A new grant is being sought by the city council. The grant would provide money for store fronts to be fixed up downtown. Before the city would be eligible for the grant, they must first become a leadership community. The grant also involves drafting a community plan. Steps are being taken to start the process for the grant.

There are some limitations to what the grant money can be used to fix in the downtown area. Since the grant is called the "main street revitalization grant," it is unclear whether it can be used for all stores in the business district or just for stores on the main street.

If the city does receive the grant, there are more steps to be taken before they would start to use it.

"We would do nothing until we go to all the businesses and ask what do they want done," council

member Kurk Wiedel said.

### Equipment Upgrades

Upgrades need to be made to a couple of different kinds of city equipment. Chris Fangmeier, city utilities superintendent, spoke with council members about upgrading a skid steer and bucket truck. The council requested more information about getting a used bucket truck, but moved to trade in the skid steer at Hebron Implement.

Another area that needs upgrades are the tennis courts. With many cracks and problems with the court surface, something needs to be done to keep them usable.

Council members decided to research what needs to be done to improve them while they are still in a fixable condition.

Kollath brought home three medals from his division of competition. He received first place in Men 30-34 javelin and shot put. Kollath also received second place in the discus throw.

Issac Else of Belvidere placed 11th in his age group in the Energy 5K.

The Hebron Pee Wee baseball team also participated in the games and placed fourth in its division.

Other local participants in the games were Nancy Vogel of Hebron who participated in bowling in the women's singles division. Clarence Baden took part in the cycling event.

Final participation numbers were still being tabulated as late entries trickled in, but Nebraska Sports Council Executive Director Dave Mlnarik said that as of the last day of competition there was total of 12,186 entries. This was the highest number since 2009.

### Over 25 attend ag tour in Thayer County...

Jerry Lahners answers questions during the Diversified Ag Tour that made stops in Thayer County. The farm is a certified organic farm in which he utilizes a crop rotation of corn, soybeans and winter wheat. Cover crops are also planted between his grain crops. Lahners' farm was the second of four stops on the tour. The group began the tour at Open Sky Farm near Alexandria. The farm, operated by Jon and Jamie Joachim, focuses on grass-fed cattle and an intensive grazing system on their tall-grass prairie. The third stop was Stones Thoreau in Davenport. Harold Stone has begun a certified kitchen and a farmers' market and is developing a food distribution system to provide fresh and frozen local produce and meals to the regional community. The final stop on the tour was Farmstead Flowers near Bruning. It is operated by Aaron and Megan Hird. They are a local source for "cut flowers" for the region.

# Pages of the Past...

## 1883

### 130 Years Ago

Thayer County points with pride to its schools, crops, stock and natural and material advantages, and invites the inspection of homeseekers.

M.M. House, who has been spending several months at Grand Forks on the Red River at Grand Forks of the north, in Dakota, reports crops poor in that region, and states that the recent immense immigration "boom" of that territory has collapsed.

Attention is called to the new advertisement of Almy & Burden who have established a lumber yard at Hebron. These young men have shown much foresight in engaging in this enterprise and will receive a liberal support.

On the 14-acre nursery and orchard of Benjamin Young in Gilead precinct, are to be found fruit, forest and ornamental trees of the varieties best adapted to this climate, also small fruit, ornamental shrubbery, hedge, etc. He is making a speciality of the Wealthy apple.

Dr. J.J. Piggott of Belvidere has bought the James Murrell farm, the southwest quarter of section three on township four north range two west, making the 12th farm he now owns in that township. He prophesies that within 24 to 36 months, all improved land in Thayer County will be worth from \$25 to \$30 per acre.

Quite a number of the settlers interested in the Knevals land cases, have negotiated money at 7 1/2 percent with which to purchase of Mr. Knevals a title to their own lands.

The courthouse is being repainted on the outside and the court room is to be ceiled with inch flooring.

Thayer County has 65 school districts.

A brickyard would pay well at this place, 40,000 bricks are wanted.

An individual calling himself Dr. Van Strand, and exhibiting the traits of a drunken tramp, has been here several days and has been put in the "cooler" by the marshal three times.

A flax mill is wanted here.

A woolen mill is needed to manufacture the large supply of wool.

### Davenport

It is Mr. Beam that purchased the NW1/2, 24-4-5 in place of G. W. Bearnas.

The dance on the second was a success, only the Edgar boys were a little full.

### Carleton

The German Lutherans purchased the Fadden property and will fit up one of the houses for a church and schoolhouse.

Charley Whitaker has returned to his first love, Thayer County.

Carleton is full of strangers. Every house in town is filled, and still there are calls for more house room.

W.J. Long will put in a stock of dry goods in connection with groceries.

### Friedensau

Mr. Brettman and family have just arrived from Germany. They are stopping with his son-in-law, F. Mesloh.

## 1893

### 120 Years Ago

H.J. Bemis reports that chinch bugs are injuring the corn.

Peddicord will have the King Press drill for sale soon.

Wetherald Brothers have been and are paying much more than the market prices for old wheat.

Deshler's new flour mill is now in running order. It has a capacity of 75 barrels a day.

Contractors are at work on the plans and specifications of Dr. Elder's new residence on Lincoln Avenue.

Quite an interesting display of aurora borealis was visible between nine and 10 o'clock last Sunday night.

The Carleton Reporter suspended publication last week for the purpose of reappearing as the Deshler Herald.

The city council is considering a proposition to lay a three-inch pipe to the B&M depot and stockyards to furnish water to the railroad company.

The Second Regiment band of this city has received orders

to report for duty at Grand Island during the G.A.R. and National Guards encampment.

Mrs. LeRoy Johnson of Hubbell, wife of LeRoy Johnson, postmaster under Harrison's administration, died of neuralgia of the stomach, after an illness of six weeks. She is the daughter of Dr. L.R. Dobyns, a pioneer settler and proprietor of the Commercial Hotel in Hubbell.

While working at the new Catholic church, carpenter George Meyers met with an accident that came near terminating his earthly existence. A board falling a distance of about 30 feet struck him on the head, cutting a gash three inches long and temporarily disabling him from his work.

Dr. Elder of Hebron and Dr. McKinzie of Alexandria, removed a large fibroid polypus tumor from Mrs. Shipman, eight miles east of Hebron. She bore the operation with Christian fortitude and at present is doing nicely.

On last Friday evening at 9 o'clock the screaming of a woman caused the assembling of quite a crowd of people at the Commercial House. It was not long until the crowd was anxious to deal severely with the landlord who, because his wife had notified the saloon keepers not to sell him liquor, proceeded to choke and beat her. She escaped him and running into the street gave the alarm which was quickly responded to and had it not been for a few cooler heads we fear "mine host" would have been pretty roughly handled.

Died at the home of his son near Hebron, Christopher Engel, aged 76 years. The body was laid to rest in the new cemetery near Hebron.

### Belvidere

Mrs. Jas. Thompson has let the contract for the erection of her new residence to Wm. and Andrew Griffin of this city. The stone masons have commenced work on the foundation. It will stand on her lot just south of A.J. Barlow's residence.

### Chester

E.A. George left for his old home at Darlington, Wisc., and will also visit the fair during his absence.

### Carleton

George Lautenschlager, who is working for William Damm, was kicked by a horse while hitching up, sustaining a severe bruise over the eye.

Fred Loetterle while helping to thresh this week, had his hand caught in the cogs and two of his fingers were torn off.

W.S. Baxter, while helping Steve Mahaffey sink a well for him, lifted too great a weight and ruptured a blood vessel. He bled freely all afternoon, the hemorrhage was finally stopped by Dr. McGee.

Ed Gilmore fell from the roof of a granary, while working for W.S. Baxter, breaking his arm and spraining his wrist. He was stunned by the fall and remained unconscious for about 40 minutes.

The office of the Bruning Booster was moved from the opera house to the building vacated by W.A. Philippi.

## 1923

### 90 Years Ago

Sophia Wells, former Bruning resident, passed away at the home of her son, Dr. Wells in Axtell.

Earl Bruckert returned to Bruning from St. Joseph, Mo., where he had been employed in the railroad yards for three months.

Mrs. William McDonald passed away at the home of her son, Merton McDonald, in Belvidere.

Miss Florence Emmet was engaged to teach the seventh and eighth grades in the Belvidere school.

Postmaster Bruckert received an order to close the Bruning post office from 3 to 4 p.m., on August 10, which was to be the hour during which the body of the late president, Warren G. Harding, would be laid to rest at Marion, Ohio.

"Overland Jack" of Big Sandy, Texas, was in Belvidere for an hour or so last Sunday with his wagon which was hauled by five Texas goats. This gentleman has been on the road since 1909 with his goat wagon and has traveled 19 states. He makes a living by selling post card photos of his outfit at 10 cents each. He is about 35 years of age. When nine years of age he attempted to jump on a moving freight train when he was thrown under the wheels and both legs were cut off close up to the body.

## 1933

Major Quindry of the Bruning Air Base entertained Hebron business men at a stag dinner at Hotel Hebron.

Zella and Zetha Luke, twin sisters from Deshler, joined the WACS.

Capt. Osmyn McFarland wrote of being on a wild boar hunt in Africa.

Vernon Grass fractured his neck and vertebra when swimming in the municipal swimming pool. He was paralyzed from his shoulders down, and was rushed to a Lincoln hospital, where he later died.

Pvt. Virgil L. Murray of St. Regis, Mont., stationed at the Bruning Air Field, has been recommended for the Air Medal and Purple Heart decoration. He was one of nine men picked up by a Navy patrol plane from a raft after being seven days adrift in the South Pacific. Two of the men perished on the raft from exhaustion and delirium. One man leaped off the raft and disappeared. Another one died, and after a short service, his body was let slowly over the side.

## Health Alert Issued for Swan Creek Lake in Saline County

The state has issued a health alert for toxic blue-green algae at Swan Creek Lake 5A in Saline County. This is the only health alert currently in effect.

Weekly sampling has been conducted at 50 public lakes in Nebraska since the beginning of May. Samples taken earlier this week at Swan Creek Lake 5A were above the state's health alert threshold of 20 parts per billion (ppb) of total microcystin (a toxin released by certain strains of blue-green algae.) The alert will continue at the lake for at least two more weeks, because lakes that are on health alert must have two consecutive weeks of readings below the threshold before the alert is discontinued.

When a health alert is issued, signs are posted to advise the public to use caution, and designated swimming beaches are closed during the alert. Recreational boating and fishing are permitted, but the public is advised to avoid activities that could involve accidental ingestion of water and to avoid full immersion in water. People can still use the public areas for camping, picnics and other outdoor activities.

The lakes will continue to be monitored weekly throughout the 2013 recreational season. Sampling results for toxic algae and bacteria will be updated every Friday and posted on NDEQ's web site www.deq.ne.gov.

## National Breastfeeding Week

### Thayer County Health News

Studies have shown breastfeeding is the best way to feed your baby. Scientifically the evidence keeps mounting that breast milk is superior to all other forms of infant feeding. As a long-time advocate of breastfeeding, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) wants to raise awareness about the long term health benefits breastfeeding can have for both mother and baby.

Some studies also suggest that breastfeeding may offer protection against diabetes, obesity and asthma among others. Research further supports the role breastfeeding has in the development of a baby's immune system and how antibodies they receive from their mother protect them against infection.

In addition, there are also proven benefits for the mother. Research indicates that breastfeeding can help a mother return to her normal weight quicker and reduce her risk of several medical conditions; type 2 diabetes, ovarian and breast cancer. There may even be a decreased risk of hip fractures and osteoporosis in the postmenopausal period.

As a nation, we all benefit when mothers breastfeed. Recent research shows that if 90 percent of families breastfed exclusively for six months, nearly 1,000 deaths among infants could be prevented. The U.S. would also save \$13 billion per year because medical care costs are lower for fully breastfed infants than never-breastfed infants.

From an economic standpoint, businesses should actively support working mothers who breastfeed because it leads to less parental absenteeism for illness, reduced their healthcare costs and allows them to attract and retain highly qualified working mothers. There are also potential environmental benefits to breastfeeding. In-

creasing breastfeeding would reduce the need to dispose of formula cans and bottles, and the energy demands associated with the production and transporting of formula.

With this growing body of evidence and increased support from health and medical professionals, breastfeeding rates in the U.S. are on the rise. However, the duration of breastfeeding remains a challenge, especially among women who work outside the home.

Women who work full-time start breastfeeding at virtually the same rate as all mothers, 69 percent, compared to 70 percent. But by the time their infants are six months old, breastfeeding rates for full-time working mothers drop about 25 percent below those of mothers who do not work outside the home.

Economic, cultural, and even political pressures are often involved in a mother's decision regarding infant feeding. However, the AAP firmly adheres to the position that breastfeeding ensures the best possible health as well as the best developmental and psychosocial outcomes for the infant.

Having support from peers (friends and family) and the local community can be vital in a mother's decision to breastfeed. Breastfeeding is the natural way to assist in the optimal infant and child health, growth, and development.







### IT IS COUNTY FAIR TIME

I recently read an article written by Holly Martin, editor of the High Plains Journal giving us the perspective of what is right about 4-H. Holly has given me permission to duplicate her article with its great message.

Holly writes, "The cattle barn isn't all that big. The boy is sitting on his showbox next to his heifer. She's not all that big, but he only weighs 50 pounds if he has a couple of rocks in the pockets of his worn jeans.

When it comes time to lead her to the wash rack, he gets pushed around. He's doing well, but his dad is injured and he just hasn't been able to help the boy like he wishes he could have.

So it doesn't take long. Before the boy, or his parents, knows what is happening an older 4-Her jumps up to help him rinse. Later on, an older boy offers to help. And then two girls wonder if they can help him practice showmanship.

And so it goes. The older kids help him and he learns.

Not too far away, a little girl stands on the fence looking down at her pig.

"She was afraid of them at first," her mom says. But now, she's clearly comfortable. An older girl at least 10 years older leans down and says something to her. The younger girl hops down and picks up a hose and quickly cools her pig down from the stifling heat. It's obvious the older girl has been the younger one's guide—teaching her what to do but letting her become comfortable with what was once a scary proposition.

It happens time and time

again. Not only in this barn, in this county, at this county fair, but all over the country in other barns, at other fairs.

It happens in the kitchen, when one 4-Her shows another how to smooth the buttercream just right to get the even look she wants. It happens on the shooting range, when a teenager holds a shotgun showing the younger boy how to aim quickly.

It's yet another example of what is so right about the 4-H program. Young people take on the role of teachers to younger members. They become leaders, without even knowing it is happening. They remember being there—not knowing how to keep their pig from bolting out of the gate—and so they share what they have learned.

It's a legacy. The responsibility of that legacy is passed down every year with no formal ceremony or fanfare. The 4-Hers who have the honor today didn't ask for it. They simply knew that someone once helped them and that's what you do. It's what is right.

The 4-H program teaches service and kindness, but it isn't done by command. That service is taught through example. Young members watch, they learn and then, all too soon, they are the ones setting the examples.

Those older 4-H members become role models. They are the "good kids" parents of young children feel happy their child can emulate. And perhaps that's the best thing to watch: a younger child watching an older one doing what is right—not because it means they will win an award,

but because they have learned kindness and leadership by example. Some day, when those older 4-Hers become parents themselves, only then will they appreciate how important their acts were.

And the mom of the boy who received all of the help with his heifer? She will be eternally grateful for the kindness of those young people. It means more than they will ever know."—by Holly Martin, High Plains Journal.

partment, told council members that progress is being made on the addition to the fire hall and by the end of next week all the walls should be up. Many public donations were given to make the new addition possible.

### Other Business

In other business, the council members have been approached about the possibility of having more lawn mower races like the one during the Hebron Independence Day celebration. Although the races weren't a problem, the group decided against insuring the races. If races were to be held, the racers would have to sign some sort of waiver to provide their own insurance if an accident were to happen.

Council also approved the airport authority tax request for the budget year.

A settlement was also reached with James Summers concerning employment. The council will pay health premiums until the first of the year. After that date, there will be no salary or benefits.





# Melvin makes near-perfect steer wrestling run at Cheyenne

Friday, July 26, at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo couldn't have gone any better for steer wrestler Dru Melvin of Hebron.

Melvin stopped the clock in 5.9 seconds, the fastest time of the rodeo so far to win the first round of competition and \$6,619. And, he did it in front of a record-setting crowd of 8,500 fans. Melvin was not the only successful steer wrestler of the Day. Bray Armes from Ponder, Texas, was 6.6 seconds on Friday as well. They were both riding Armes' horse they call Sambo. Armes earned \$4,029 for a fourth place finish. Checks totaling \$10,648 were earned on Sambo with opportunity to earn more Saturday and possibly on Sunday.

Both men had their second round of competition Saturday and had a chance for a Cheyenne championship. It will be a busy time for Sean Mulligan who hazed for them. The hazer is responsible for keeping the steer running straight and giving the competitor good opportunities to get to the steer.

"I've had a pretty slow year," Melvin said. "It's been picking up lately, but it sure hasn't been what I'd hoped for. I needed this bad. Cheyenne is a great rodeo. It can make a big difference up in

the standings (Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association World Standings) because the rounds pay so good."

Melvin has earned checks here before, but has never been able to put two good runs together and qualify for the championship round.

In the final round, Melvin was able to finish with a time of 11.4 and earn fifth place.

His earnings in the final round were \$990.

Melvin is currently sitting 23rd in the world. The top 15 qualify for the National Finals Rodeo in December held in Las Vegas. Melvin has several rodeos left this summer and fall which could easily land him in the top 15.

# UNL Scholarships Awarded To Thayer County Students

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has awarded more than 1,600 scholarships to 2013 Nebraska high school graduates who will enroll at UNL this month. The total potential value of the scholarships is approximately \$15.3 million.

The scholarship winners from this area include:

Eric Nielsen of Deshler, home school, Regents, Nebraska Top Scholar and Honors Program Textbook, College of Business Administration, an accounting major.

Trenton Tietjen of Chester, Thayer Central High School, David Distinguished, College of Engineering, a civil engineering major.

Brian Looftjen of Chester, Thayer Central High School, David Distinguished, College of Engineering, a computer engineering major.

Cody Mumm of Chester, Thayer Central High School, James Canfield, College of Engineering, a computer en-

gineering major.

The total awards include 27 Chancellor's Scholarships, 387 Regents Scholarships (including 54 Nebraska Top Scholars), 98 Nebraska Achievement Scholarships, 149 David Distinguished Scholarships, 379 James H. Canfield Scholarships, 75 Chancellor's Leadership Class scholarships and 378 University Honors Program textbook scholarships.

Chancellor's and Regents scholarships are among the most prestigious awards granted by the university. Chancellor's Scholarships pay tuition for full-time students for four academic years, while Regents Scholarships pay tuition for up to 120 credit hours or the completion of a bachelor's degree, whichever comes first. Each scholarship has an equivalent cash value of approximately \$26,510. Funded in part by the Cooper Foundation, Chancellor's Scholarships also provide

\$2,000 in additional scholarship support for four academic years.

The students who were selected as Nebraska Top Scholars will receive at least \$1,500 per year in scholarship awards beyond their Regents Scholarship awards from UNL or the University of Nebraska Foundation, provided they meet renewal criteria each year.

David Distinguished Scholar awards offer full-time students \$3,500 annually for up to four years if they meet renewal requirements. David Distinguished Scholarships are funded from a trust established in 1973 by the late Adrian H. David, a Minneapolis attorney, in honor of his parents. Adrian David was a 1908 graduate of the NU College of Law. The trust also funds faculty research projects, placing a special emphasis on cancer research.

Canfield Scholarships, named for the chancellor who led the University of Nebraska to a position of national prominence in the 1890s, offer full-time students a one-year award of \$1,000.

Students admitted to the University Honors Program receive book scholarships that provide up to \$500 per year.

An individual student can qualify for one Chancellor's, Regents, Nebraska Achievement, David Distinguished or Canfield scholarship. Chancellor's Leadership Class and Honors Program book scholarships may be combined with other awards.

# As Heat Stress and Fair Season Arrive, It's Important to Manage Animals Carefully

A mild, rainy spring has yielded to heat, humidity and lack of moisture, and the state's livestock have begun to suffer the consequences.

Heat stress is hard on cattle and other livestock, especially when combined with high humidity and low wind speeds; those are precisely the conditions occurring in many areas now. Heat stress can reduce feed intake, weight gain, reproductive efficiency and milk production, while increasing susceptibility to diseases.

Signs of heat stress can include animals bunching, seeking shade, and panting, slobbering or excessive salivation, foaming around the mouth, open mouth breathing, lack of coordination and trembling, said Lindsay Chichester of University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension.

If such symptoms are observed, handlers should assume the animal is suffering from too much heat and immediately try to minimize the stress to the animal, especially by reducing handling or movement of the animal. Previous health of individual animals is an important risk factor, as animals with past health problems will be more affected by heat stress than animals with no prior health problems. These animals will generally be the first to exhibit signs of heat stress and be the most severely affected.

As county fair season gets under way, Chichester said, there are several things people showing animals should keep in mind, beginning with the heat index commonly reported by media outlets.

If the heat index is above 100 degrees, animals can tolerate it if shade is available and/or wind speed is at least 10 miles per hour, so show animals should be provided shade and/or moving air via fans.

If the index gets above 110 degrees, animals will stressed regardless of wind speed. Show animals should be in the shade with fans, especially market ready animals, and have plenty of access to water. If a heat index above 110 is predicted, livestock shows should be completed by noon. In addition, livestock that need to be moved or transported should be out of the facilities by early morning but certainly by noon, if possible.

If the heat index is above 115 degrees, avoid moving or handling market ready animals. Livestock show rings should be shaded with fans and misters; the show staff should consider postponing the show due to excessive heat.

If the heat index is above 120 degrees, no activity should occur for animals or humans.

During the heat of summer, livestock management must include providing: shade, ventilation and air flow, clean and cool water, wetting, cool water drench and sprinklers or hoses. Shade can be provided by trees, buildings or other sunshades.

In addition, the temperature can be lowered by spraying cool water on the roof and walls of buildings where the animals are being housed. Improved ventilation can be provided by fans or opening windows on a breezy day. Sunshades should be high enough off the ground (10 feet or more) to allow for

adequate air movement.

Chichester stressed that if one is wetting cattle, the droplet size should be large enough to wet the skin, not just the air. "A small droplet size will usually just wet the hair creating more humidity for the animal, thus not helping at all."

During times of heat stress, animals should not be subjected to too much activity, including movement or transportation.


