Tidbits

District to save big on greenhouse

Superintendent Drew Harris told the Thayer Central Board of Education Monday evening a Monsanto grant for \$25,000 will go toward purchasing a greenhouse.

That, in addition to a \$1,500 Rotary grant, will allow the district a huge savings.

Amy Harris wrote the Monsanto grant.

Other than labor and set-up, the district will pay just \$400 for the greenhouse.

In other business, new athletic director Mark Leonard said the blackout event days will be Sept. 12, 15 and 21 for volleyball, football and cross country, respectively.

The blackout event will be held to increase school spirit and encourage parents, who will receive black T-shirts, to rally at games other than the ones their athletes participate in.

One of the bigger events will be a Child Cancer Awareness night with gold T-shirts and balloons, sponsored by Adam and Jennifer Mostek. The time and date will be announced in the *Hebron Journal Register*.

Elementary principal Kurk Wiedel reported eight desks are needed for the growing preschool classes. He also said students will be taking physical education for 25 minutes every day.

Middle and high school principal Tom Kiburz said the science teachers attended a workshop for the solar eclipse event Aug. 21. A sack lunch will be served to students so they don't miss any part of the event. Harris said he knows of some schools that cancelled school for the event.

Infinity to play free concert in Deshler

The classic rock tribute band, Infinity, will play a free concert at the Thayer County Fairgrounds Aug. 19 at 7 p.m. Gates open at 6:30 p.m.

The concert, sponsored by Reinke, will feature classic rock cover tunes from artists such as Led Zeppelin, AC/DC, Journey, ZZ Top and Foreigner. The band also plays Bruno Mars, Maroon 5 and Black Crowes.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Aug. 26

A Household Hazardous Waste Collection will be held Aug. 26 in Fairbury at the county shop, 1415 A St., along Highway 136.

Items accepted will be cleaning products, lawn and garden chemicals, small quantities of farm chemicals (No more than 6-2.5 gallon containers), paint, used oil, fluorescent light bulbs and other items.

Materials must be brought in disposable containers no larger than five gallons or 50 pounds.

No tires, appliances, science lab chemicals, asbestos, wood preservatives, explosives or commercial quantities will be accepted.

Council seeks solution for service

Since January of 2014, Hebron has been Bruning's lifeline for ambulance service and the Hebron City Council is seeking relief for taxpayers through an agreement for expenses.

"We need to sit down with them and work out the final figures. We think Bruning is about 20 percent of the total people we serve," Councilman and chairman of the finance committee Larry Fangmeier said about the village and its surrounding rural area. Bruning had a population of 279 in the 2010 census and 271 in the 2016 count. That number doesn't cover the rural residents.

Fangmeier thinks Hebron is Bruning's best option with trained personnel in emergency medical services.

Bruning was stripped of legally hauling patients in its ambulance by the county's EMS medical director, Dr. Bryan Hubl, because they are short on emergency medical technicians and the ambulance is outdated.

A short term agreement signed in 2014 did not come to fruition. Part of the agreement was Bruning would pursue more training while Hebron used one of its ambulances to service Bruning.

"We figured our cost for equipment ownership, housing the equipment, training costs and insurance divided among everyone we serve was a little less than \$2 per month per individual," Fangmeier said.

Hebron bills medicare, medicare and insurance of which Hebron receives a percentage of and there is the occasional donation, which is for operating costs such as fuel and repairs.

Hebron houses two ambulances in case an ambulance is needed while the other one is out. Trips to service Bruning can take up to several hours, depending on the hospital patients are transported to.

"Obviously, Hebron is our priority," Fire chief BJ Linton said. "It's been a long process trying to work this out for a long time. Something must be done. We don't mind helping them out."

Fangmeier was at the Aug. 2 Bruning village board meeting and asked for an interlocal EMT agreement. According to village minutes, the agreement is under board review and was tabled.

Two calls placed by the Hebron Journal-Register to Bruning's village chairman were not returned.

Tietjen strives to serve state

It's never about her. She proudly wears the crown and "Miss Nebraska" sash, but the mission is more about shaking the hand of a veteran or meeting a little girl who has never seen Miss Nebraska.

"That's the kind of mentality I wanted to take as Miss Nebraska," Allison Tietjen said. "This is about the great state of Nebraska and I want to represent it to the best of my ability."

Indeed, her platform about veterans has been a long time coming since Tietjen spurred a statewide movement in schools to raise funds for Honor Flights.

And this Sunday at Tietjen's send-off party at the National Guard Headquarters near the Lincoln airport, it will be local talent from Deshler, high school senior Amanda Schultz, who will sing.

"There are so many talented small town girls in this state," she said.

The party is from 2 to 4 p.m., and will be Tietjen's salute and fundraiser for her trip to the Miss America contest in New Jersey. She leaves Aug. 29.

It's a big deal, she said, because

she can only compete once. "But in the grand scheme of life, there will be more (big deals)," Tietjen said.

The send-off party is free and there will be a freewill offering at the dessert table. Tietjen will model her Miss America wardrobe and play her signature talent show piece on the piano.

The party, hosted by National Guard Captain Doug Carlson and Bill and Evonne Williams of Patriotic Productions, will also feature a live auction.

One prominent auction item is two tickets to the first Nebraska home football game against Arkansas State Sept. 2. The lucky bidder will watch the game from a skybox suite.

Two tickets to the UCLA Husker volleyball game is another auction donation.

Competition for Tietjen at the Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City begins Sept. 6. That evening, she will don her evening gown and swim wear. The following night, Tietjen will once again sit down at the piano.

On Sept. 8, she will answer an onstage question. Everyone will

be on the stage Sept. 10 as the top 15 contestants are announced during the live show on ABC.

Before she leaves, Tietjen wants to ensure the support she has received is properly acknowledged.

"I would love to say thank you for all the support, especially in Chester," she said. "They painted my name on the side of a building!"

Last year's Miss Nebraska, Aleah Peters, cannot believe the support she has seen for Tietjen.

"My Miss America sisters do not nearly have the support I do because they're from big cities," Tietjen said. Peters is from Omaha and Tietjen's mother, Amy, said Peters was envious.

"She said, 'This is the way it should be,'" Amy Tietjen said. "It's very positive PR for our county."

For Tietjen, the Miss America contest will be a win-win because she will come back as Miss Nebraska.

But, it won't be about her. "I want to promote the state. It's not about me," she said.

Lucas Hoge comes back home

As a kid, he sang in Thayer County wherever they would let him and today, Lucas Hoge is stoked his latest work, "Dirty South" claims the No. 1 spot on Billboard's top selling country album of the week.

The Hubbell native will be at the Byron Bash Aug. 19. He takes the stage at 8 p.m., with his dad Ken and brother Heath and at 9, Hoge and his band will perform.

"It will be good to be back home," he said from Spokane, Wash., Monday.

He was close two weeks ago as Hoge and his band played the Belleville, Kan., fair.

"We're going to treat the Byron crowd to the best show we possibly can," he said.

In addition to his album selling at No. 1, "Dirty South" is No. 5 on the Billboard top country albums chart, which includes sales, streams and single track sales, moving up from No. 12, according to a press release.

As an extra bonus for Byron, Hoge introduced an opening act contest for performers to submit videos of themselves.

Neah McMeem of Superior and Emily Freeman of Olathe, Kan., won the contest and will perform three songs each at the Byron Bash.

"This is something we came up with," Hoge said. "The people in Byron thought it would be a good idea, too and the radio stations got in on it."

Hoge had nothing to do with

choosing the winners, but he did watch all the submissions, he said.

The Byron Bash is a sort of revival for the community.

"They used to have summer events in Byron," Chris Heitmann said.

Heitmann, Tara Kuhlmann and Charlotte Tietjen met one night and with Hoge's ties to the area, they wondered if he could play the Bash.

"He was back one year for the fair. It was a packed house," Heitmann said.

It's going to be a good ol' street dance and Heitmann said a lot of people will also be coming home for the show. She said someone from Sutton called for eight tickets.

Events leading up to the show start Aug. 18 with a coed softball tournament. The next morning, a

scavenger hunt on the history of Byron with golf carts and ATV's will be held. Also on Aug. 19, the Byron Volunteer Fire Department will hold a water fight. A dunking booth, grain pile dig, games for children and Little Tuggers Tractor Pull are planned.

The bash was made official with Jay Moeller's hand crafted crown tent for the beer garden and a pulled pork meal by Tille's Bar and Grill.

Tickets are on sale at Western National Bank in Byron, Heitmann Corner Market and Tillie's. Buyers can call 402-768-3100 for tickets as well or purchase them at the gate.

Hoge said he is excited to hang out in the area again and gave a sneak peek into his show.

"I like to tell stories behind my songs," he said, like he and the four other guys who left the farm for the first time and finally went to the beach, where they saw all the girls.

His song, "Flip Flops" tells the rest of the story.

Hoge's music reaches outside of the United States, too.

"We've been to Ahman, Jordan, Kosovo and London," Hoge said, naming three of several foreign venues for the Armed Forces Entertainment Wrangler National Patriot Tour. "It's just huge to go over there and say thank you to our service people, a big thank you."

His "Dirty South" tour will include iconic destinations, such as Sun Records in Memphis, the French Quarter in New Orleans and the Florida Everglades.

130 Years Ago

A row of hitching posts has been set on Fourth Street between Lincoln Avenue and Jefferson Avenue. The arrangement of posts on the by streets will prevent an obstruction of teams on the main street on busy days.

Last Thursday, J. J. Kern's cattle barn, at Friedensau, was struck by lightning and burned. The barn was 100 x 25 feet in size and contained a quantity of hay, oats and barley which were also destroyed. Strenuous efforts were made to extinguish the fire but without avail. No stock was burned. The damage was about \$500.

Richard Ellison Jr., son of Richard Ellison of Hebron, died at San Jacinto, Calif., on the 25th of July, of billious fever. His death was very sudden.

The new store building at Bruning station, soon to be occupied by Johnson Brothers of Belvidere, with a stock of general merchandise, will soon be in readiness for them.

Director Des Islets, in a communication in last week's Belvidere Tribune very positively asserts that the Lincoln & El Paso Great Diagonal railroad is a "sure thing."

Mrs. Ivy Wetherald is attending to her husband's interests as bookkeeper at the elevator during his absence.

W. J. McKenzie has opened his tailor shop in the Dimick grocery building and is ready for business.

Commencing on the first day of this month, the stores in this place adopted the rule of closing at 7:30 p.m.

J. Cropsey of Belvidere precinct reports the sale of wool from 608 sheep amounting to \$960.

Oats are irregular in yield, from 20 to 40 bushels.

H. W. Cornell, for a number of years one of Belvidere's prominent business men, will again engage in business there, opening out about Aug. 27, with a line of clothing, boots and shoes, and gents' furnishing goods. Since his former engagement he has traveled extensively over the United States and it speaks well for Belvidere that he has returned and resumed business in that town.

The naughty editor of the Davenport Telegraph exposes too many family secrets. He says in his last issue: "We amputated our mustache this week and now our wife positively refuses to swap spit with us any more."

Died: July 27, Herbert H., infant son of J. W. and M. K. Burden, aged five months and 15 days...About five miles northwest of Chester, of abscess, and other ailments, July 31, little Cora A., daughter of Wm. and Missouri Horney, aged five years, six months, 18 days...Died, of quick consumption at her house, 3 1/2 miles north of Hebron, Aug. 8, Mrs. Mary Gragan.

110 Years Ago

A. Huntsman has received an import of 10,000 finely colored post cards of Hebron and vicinity. They are really artistic. He has also a shipment of souvenir china.

The Hebron Chautauqua opened most suspiciously Tuesday. The owners of the various automobiles formed a parade at 2 o'clock and the Kilties band was then taken to the grounds, making an imposing parade with the nine machines. The Hebron Band had kindly consented to act as an escort to the Kilties, but through some oversight they were permitted to stand on Main Street and watch the others go by. The appearance of the grounds and the rendering of the program was delightful. Many from town and other places are camping out, and the rows of tents look showy among the trees. The concerts by the Kilties exceeded anything yet given in Hebron. Wednesday's speaking was a disappointment, but the rest of the numbers are being well received. The management thought 25 tents would be enough for the chautauqua, but there was such an unexpected demand that it became necessary to wire into headquarters for 14 additional tents. All next week will be full of treats in the way of entertainments.

Just to show their young lady friends how to cook, the Bachelor Bunch gave a party at the chautauqua grounds Wednesday evening. About 20 young people enjoyed the spread, the phonograph music, etc.

1917

100 Years Ago

S. A. Biehn, who joined the Navy nine years ago, now transferring from San Francisco, stopped off at Hebron Wednesday for a few days visit with boyhood friends in the old home town. "Pat" as his friends call him, has had many interesting experiences in Uncle Sam's fleet. He took part in the Nicaraguan campaign in 1912 and was in the west coast of Mexico during the late trouble. In his various travels, he found Brisbane, Australia, more like the U. S. than any foreign country. China was of interest. He is in love with the sea life and is rapidly winning promotions.

A former Hebron boy, A. C. Graves, is being sent to France to restore devastated regions. He is in the 8th Reserve Engineers.

A large crowd of Hebronites attended the Chautauqua at Belvidere Sunday. This first chautauqua at Belvidere has been marked by splendid programs and a fine attendance.

Gilead: Marie, the 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry George, died last Thursday. She had been sick for about a month, having had scarlet fever, diphtheria and several abscesses in the head.

The railroad under an ancient government land grant act, secured 100 feet each side of the track. They now propose to fence that in, and wherever a county road runs closer than that, the company will lease 50 feet of the road to the county. If more than that is required on account of bridges or culverts, the railroad will move their fence further in. No charge is made to the county for these leases, except the filing fee for the papers. The representative of the G.I. road stated to the commissioners that it would cost \$30,000 to fence in their right of way in Thayer County alone to say nothing of the immense sums involved in all the other counties. One wonders why this vast expenditure is made, if there be no flaw in the old railroad land grants which were secured in an era of official graft and scandal. If the present move be merely to further cement title to land that should never have been taken from the people, then the commissioners should be exceedingly careful in signing a "lease" which might waive title to interest to the lands. It is said that fencing in this right-of-way will shut off some farmer's orchards and will take in some buildings in Carleton.

He was busily engaged in throwing dirt through an opening he had found in the foundation of the house. The youngster's cries brought forth his mother who had some difficulty in driving the animal back under the house. Proper medical treatment was at once administered and Monday a slight swelling was still in evidence, but on Tuesday all indications of any ill effects were gone. 'Twas thought the animal had young underneath the house and became enraged at the intrusion of the lad.

Nebraska set for prime viewing of solar eclipse

This summer, citizens and travelers throughout a large portion of Nebraska will have the chance to see a rare celestial event—a total solar eclipse.

On August 21, the moon will block out the sun's light, causing a total solar eclipse across approximately 468.4 miles of Nebraska from the border with Wyoming to Lincoln, Beatrice and Falls City. An influx of out-of-state visitors is also expected to come to Nebraska to witness the event.

Nebraskans should make plans early to determine where they will view the eclipse, where they will stay and how best to avoid the extra traffic congestion.

“As Nebraska is a prime viewing location, we all anticipate large crowds, which may cause heavy traffic on Nebraska interstates and highways the day of the solar eclipse. As many local communities have planned weekend events, large crowds may be possible over the weekend leading up to the actual day of the eclipse,” said Nebraska Department of Transportation Director Kyle Schneeweis. “If you are interested in seeing the eclipse, we recommend planning well in advance so you can avoid the anticipated traffic.”

Nebraska will be one of 14 states from Oregon to South Carolina to experience the path of the August 21st total solar eclipse. Approximately 200 million people—a little less than two-thirds of our nation's population—will be within a day's drive of the path of the eclipse.

Please follow these tips to drive safely on the day of the solar eclipse:

- Don't stop along the

interstate or park on the shoulder during the event.

- Exit the highway to a safe location to view and/or photograph the eclipse.
- Don't take photographs while driving!

- Don't try to wear opaque eclipse glasses while operating a vehicle.
- Turn your headlights on--do not rely on your automatic headlights when the eclipse blocks out the sun.

- Watch out for pedestrians along smaller roads. People may be randomly parking and walking alongside the roadside in the hours around the eclipse to get the best view.
- Prepare for extra congestion, especially on the interstates in the eclipse's path, on the day before, day of, and day after the eclipse.

- Check traffic conditions on www.511.nebraska.gov or through the Nebraska 511 app available for download for Android and Apple devices.

A travel restriction will be in place around the dates of the solar eclipse. Oversized loads will not be able to travel on Nebraska highways and Interstate 80 from sunset August 18 until sunrise on August 22.

Nourishing advice for back to school

Getting your child ready for school is always a busy time for parents. In addition to getting new books and school supplies, preparing your kitchen with nutritious foods is also important in preparing them for learning. Research shows eating a healthy diet is key to a child's development, school performance, and overall health.

Breakfast is the most important meal of the day for children. A school day should start with a healthy breakfast that includes at least three of the food groups (bread and cereals, protein, milk and dairy, fruits and vegetables, and fats). An example of a balanced breakfast for kids is eggs, toast, fruit and milk. To beat the morning rush at home you can have hard boiled eggs and a fruit salad ready in the fridge.

Eating breakfast every day is also important in maintaining healthy body weight. Breakfast makes you less likely to eat high-calorie snacks during the morning. Eating a well-balanced breakfast also improves a child's intake of fiber, vitamins and minerals, especially iron and vitamin C; these nutrients are essential in a balanced diet. In fact, a good breakfast provides 1/4 to 1/3 of the day's energy and nutritional needs.

When making your kid's meals, focus on quality carbohydrates. Be sure to include whole grain or enriched grains that are low in added sugar like breads and cereals (aim for less than 10 grams of sugar per serving of cereal). Quality carbs from grain-based foods and fruit are nutrient-rich and provide the brain with a steady supply of energy to facilitate learning.

Children who eat a healthy breakfast tend to perform better on tests. They also show improved academic performance, have a longer attention span, better attendance and decreased hyperactivity in school.

Skipping breakfast can make your child feel tired, restless or irritable by mid-morning. Breakfast helps children have the energy throughout the morning that will help him/her concentrate better in class. This also means fewer trips to see the school nurse or missed days from school.

Omega-3 fatty acids are important throughout all stages of life. They help maintain a healthy heart, have a positive

impact on brain function and cognitive development, and play a key role in eye health and visual development.

A study by the University of Colorado showed that children who were leaner reported eating more polyunsaturated fatty acids (found in oils such as canola, olive and corn), which include omega-3 fatty acids. Having your child eat foods such as salmon, tuna salad, nuts and dark green leafy vegetables will help them get enough of these important nutrients.

Unfortunately, many packaged snacks that appeal to a child's taste buds are loaded with sugar, artificial colorings and preservatives. Parents should find a few healthy staple snacks you know your child will like and keep them on hand when hunger hits.

Be sure to read the ingredient list to see how much sugar is in the product; don't just trust the marketing wording on the front that may be misleading. Ingredients are listed in descending weight order, so if sugar is one of the first ingredients, this item is not a good choice.

Finally, it's extremely important to keep your child hydrated to prevent fatigue and keep concentration levels strong. Good hydration can help them maintain a healthy weight as dehydration can mask itself as hunger and can cause them to overeat. Skip the sugary energy drinks and sodas and give your child a glass of water instead. If your child gets bored with plain water, add some slices of citrus, berries, or a bit of 100 percent juice to the water.

Health alert for area lakes

The state has issued health alerts for toxic blue-green algae at Bluestem Lake and Pawnee Lake, both in Lancaster County, Swan Creek Lake (5A) in Saline County, and Willow Creek Reservoir in Pierce County. Maple Creek Recreation Area Lake in Colfax County was found to have above normal E. coli levels.

The public is advised that swimming and activities

which could cause accidental ingestion of water are not permitted when a health alert for toxic blue-green algae is posted. The designated swimming beaches are closed. While recreational boating and fishing are permitted, the public should avoid activities that could cause accidental ingestion of water as well as full immersion in water.

The risks to humans come from external exposure (prolonged contact with skin) and from swallowing the water. Symptoms from external exposure are skin rashes, lesions, and blisters. Symptoms from ingestion can include headaches, nausea, muscular pains, central abdominal pain, diarrhea and vomiting.

High E. coli levels in a lake may be indicative of sewage contamination. However, affected lakes are not posted for no swimming because it has not been declared unsafe. Rather, this notice is issued so the public is aware that the higher E. coli levels may increase the risk of illness when swimming in the affected water.

If you experience health symptoms, notify your physician. You can also contact the Nebraska Regional Poison Center at 800-222-1222 for more information. Testing results for all lakes can be found on the NDEQ website at <http://deq.ne.gov>

Nancy founded Nebraska Polio Survivors Association in 1984 and was its initial director. She didn't allow her disability to stop her from accomplishing her goals, learning to deal with her handicap, which lead her to write books to help other people in her situation. One of her books "Of Myths and Chicken Feet." She also wrote newsletters and articles for Post Polio Health International that can be found on the web. Their main office is in St. Louis, Mo.

Nancy was an avid reader, and always stayed alert to what was going on.

She was a past Honored Queen of Jobs Daughter Council 57 of Hebron and member of the Presbyterian Church in Hebron.

She is preceded in death by her parents; and brothers, Stanley, Joseph and William Baldwin.

She is survived by her husband Bill of 50 years; nieces, nephews, and friends.

Following Nancy's wishes she was cremated and there will be no service at this time.

Belvidere

The third week of August has arrived! By the time everyone reads this the kids will be back in school. Times were that the first day of school never started until the end of the month-if then. Sometimes it was even after Labor Day. Just as the County Fair was always after the second week of August and the State Fair mainly in September.

Seems as though everything changes, all but the calendar set events such as Christmas and Easter. However, when the first day of school arrives, the emotions and excitement are still the same. For the parents sending their first born or the seasoned mom and dad sending their senior for their last high school year. The excitement seems a little more emotional than a couple generations ago. Perhaps the parents of today are more realistic and serious about the passing of time.

A memory of mine is when a little kindergarten girl rode on the bus instead of walking home on her first day. She was nowhere to be found. That happened when kids went to school in our town.

According to Jackie Williamson, curator of the Museum, the 1926 school year began with 171 students going to school here in Belvidere. In that Fall, new Dodge school buses were purchased. They were bought periodically down through the years. The first Reo buses were bought in 1920. None, even if they were new, looked any different. It had a new motor and chassis but the same old bodies were mounted on the new model motor and wheels. Up until 1952, they looked the same, black bodies with yellow trim. A contract drawn in 1924 said the school buses were not to exceed an average of 18 miles per hour.

At a young age of six, there are memories of benches that vertically lined each side of the bus. The trip was about seven miles to Belvidere. It is no wonder most of the high

school games were played only in the county. What fun it would be to have one of these old buses in the neighborhood. It would make a terrific parade entry!

A funny thing happened when the inspector came to town accompanied by the County Supt. H.E. Barbee to inspect the school buses and routes which they traveled. The group was in a bus about two miles from town on the north route and it broke down and had to be towed back to town. Of course, just like all situations, it had never before happened. No wonder they take them to town nowadays.

In May of 1876, the Hebron Journal reported that in Thayer County there were 384 males and 328 females who attended school. The highest pay was to male teachers at \$50.00 a month and to female teachers it was \$40.00 per month. Nowadays a substitute teacher gets over \$100 a day. There were 44 school districts.

How many get sentimental in the fall when the days remind you of the time that you were in school? School was so much fun and I would do it all over again as the words to one song states.

Randy and Dianne Waldmeier represented Belvidere in the parade at the Plymouth celebration on Saturday night.







Cottam has been swinging clubs since he was five years old.

During middle school, he started playing more serious and ended up finishing his high school career with a Class C state tournament win on a three-hole playoff to sink the birdie in the second extra hole.

Cottam likes the sport because it's more of an individual accomplishment.

"Everything that happens depends on me," he said. "I spent countless hours practicing and trying to get better."

Spending time picking up moves has shown in Cottam's young career.
