Monsanto awards

Bruning-Davenport

The America's Farmers Grow Rural Education program, sponsored by the Monsanto Fund, has awarded Bruning-Davenport with a \$10,000 grant to enhance students' computer science skills for grades two through 12.

The project goal is to give students fundamental knowledge so they have the necessary skills as they head to post-secondary schools or into the labor force.

If the district can provide introduction to these skills, including coding, it is believed the district can offer students a larger perspective of their future and meet the needs of 21st century businesses, which would include agriculture.

"We are excited to take the next steps toward bringing coding into our classrooms," Bruning-Davenport Superintendent Trudy Clark said.

County offices pitch insight for budget talks

Thayer County Clerk Marie Rauner said holding expenditures in check and reimbursements for the larger expenses like Spring Creek bridge has the county sitting well in terms of spending.

Rauner said the inheritance tax was still coming in and would help with any shortfall the county might have.

But Rauner doesn't foresee issues — departments regularly return funds to the coffer and according to the county's budget authority, Brian Blobaum, the commissioners are conservative.

Preliminary budget discussions took up much of the Thayer County Commissioners' agenda Aug. 17 as the commissioners heard from multiple departments at the request of the three commissioners, David Bruning, Chris Frye and Dean Krueger.

"We're trying to be proactive," Bruning said about the budget.

As department heads spoke to the commissioners, they also gave the commissioners a peek into the unique circumstances of each department.

District Court Clerk Stacey McLaughlin mentioned two people from Thayer County are in drug court on Mondays in Saline County.

McLaughlin said the monthly fee for drug court is about \$40 and split

with Saline County. If drug court participants do well, they earn gift certificates, which Saline County pays for, McLaughlin said.

The Thayer County Assessor's Office saw a dip in personal property from \$102,956,901 in 2014-2015 to \$99,765,417 in 2015-2016.

Assessor Karla Joe said the farm community isn't buying new equipment because of low grain prices and equipment bought in the past has depreciated.

Her budget will increase this year as \$238,230 was requested from the \$193,457.66 budgeted last year. As a preliminary figure, the commissioners recommended \$193,230.

Joe said her office may license a third person for the geographical information system mapping program.

The assessor's office is the only county entity to require certification by the department of revenue through continuing education.

Unlike other assessor offices in Nebraska, Thayer County keeps their parcel review work in house. Staff works throughout the summers to inspect farms, acreages, commercial and residential properties, and improved parcels.

"We choose to be there ourselves because we can pull our record and see exactly what we did," Joe said. "It makes the conversation between the property owner and this office a

lot easier."

Joe said another county in the state paid \$162,000 to hire an appraiser for the work her office is already doing.

The county had an outside source step in before. Joe said error after error was discovered in the reports.

"We found house additions that were never on record. You have to get out of your car to see that," she said, adding buildings in Hebron had been incorrectly measured.

For the Veteran's Service Office, Marlin Bauhard said his budget hasn't had any significant changes.

It's best to keep the VSO local, Bauhard said.

"I have people drop in and out (of the office). The goodwill does go away if you have it somewhere else," he added. "Most people appreciate the fact we have a VSO."

The number of new veterans returning from active duty is low, Bauhard said. He suspects some veterans don't return to Thayer County if their employable skills don't match the county's job opportunities.

Bauhard said his budget hasn't changed much, however, he mentioned the theft of grave markers and flags as well as lawnmower damage to the markers.

"No one really pays attention until right before Memorial Day," he noted, meaning it could be some time before the thefts are discovered.

Thefts are reported to the VSO for replacements.

Bauhard said grave marker thefts are taking place all over the country. As a result, grave markers, which cost the county \$25 to \$40 per marker, have transitioned to plastic in some areas.

Sheriff David Lee told the commissioners he is planning for a salary increase to keep from losing people to area counties.

"We need to keep wages competitive to other counties," Lee said.

His office will be hiring a new deputy.

Budgeting for insurance took a step in the county coffer. Instead of listing insurance for each department's budget, the county lumped the \$655,000 for health, dental and life insurance for 55 full time employees into the miscellaneous general fund.

In other business, the commissioners set a public hearing for Aug. 31 at 10 a.m., to hear from the public on Country View subdivision because the county is considering abandoning road maintenance due to the county's equipment, which is not made for size of the subdivision's roads.

Another public hearing at 11 a.m., will focus on the approval of Aksamit Resource Management's wind measurement tower.

Also on Aug. 31, the commissioners will hear from Blobaum on a budget update and set the levy.

Final week approaches for Thayer Central addition

Thayer Central preschool and elementary students will take in their new learning environment as the school unveils the addition for an open house Sept. 2 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. The public is also invited.

A dedication for the addition is planned for mid to late September as Thayer Central Elementary will be officially welcomed to the school campus.

"We appreciate everyone's patience this year while we're under construction, but it will be well worth it," Superintendent Drew Harris said.

He said the last two and a half weeks of construction will be busy, but "things are moving along."

Harris walked through the project last week, making his first stop on the west side of the now, former Intermediate building.

He pointed to the area carved out in the parking lot for parents dropping their students off. He said other than that, the parking lot will stay the same and once again, a barricade will separate the south parking lot from the north.

Inside the former Intermediate building, the gym was packed with supplies from the classrooms under construction, but offset by new bleachers in Titan colors.

Harris said the bleachers were paid for by leftover booster funds from the outdoor stadium work.

In the first hallway to the east of the west entrance, Harris said it will all be re-carpeted and a drop ceiling installed throughout.

The existing building will then be finished with those improvements, Harris said, along with the

new fixture and tile upgrades to the restroom facilities.

Down the hall, an open space that held temporary classrooms and computers was emptied out.

"This will be all library space," Harris said.

Two classrooms were remodeled and the special education room was expanded by cutting a door out that leads to another room.

A new sprinkler system was also installed.

Harris continued down the hall to the new computer room, which is encased by cement blocks for the

tornado shelter that could hold 140 students in the event of inclement weather.

"In a lockdown situation, this room could be secured as well," Harris said.

The new classrooms are airy with one accent wall painted in color to match the carpet outside the respective doors.

Harris said they are using purple, teal, yellow, orange and green to color coordinate for preschoolers and elementary students. The preschool and kindergarten rooms are about 20 percent larger than they used to be

and each have their own restrooms.

Then, Harris stepped into the entrance area to the new Thayer Central Elementary, with its outdoor intercom system located at both sets of doors.

The inside doors to the classrooms are also secured.

The new office walled off by glass will support the nurse, administration, staff conference room and preschool office.

Harris also pulled attention to the outdoor playground, which has

1886

130 Years Ago

E. A. Flood has sold his 160-acre farm two miles south of town to W. H. Kimber for \$4,000.

The old Blue Valley Bank building will be moved out and a new brick erected in its place the full size of the lot. Wright & Co. have the contract.

The R. I. has put in side tracks at Fairbury and the St. J. & R. I. is hauling supplies, etc., from St. Joseph and men are at work all along the line to Hebron.

The members of the Catholic Church, under the direction of Mrs. J. C. Helfrich, gave a dance and supper last evening to secure means to assist P. Strigel to obtain medical aid for his eyes.

North County Line Notes: Strang citizens have been without the honor (?) of a saloon. They just run down to Ohio to fill their jugs... At the tournament in Alexandria we had the pleasure of meeting A. Adams, treasurer of Fillmore County, and an old resident and first postmaster of Ohio... A little child of Mrs. Kettle's died one day last week.

1896

120 Years Ago

County Sunday School Rally: It was a grand success and the largest parade ever seen in Thayer County. Last Wednesday was the day set for the annual union picnic of the Sunday Schools of Thayer County. Active preparations had been made for several days previous.

About half past 11 o'clock, the procession was formed at the courthouse square by O. P. Hendershot, marshal, with assistant marshals, R. J. Town of the Presbyterian, A. D. Hall of the Methodist and A. J. Morris of the Christian schools, headed by the Hebron Military Band.

We can only give a synopsis of the different division of the procession, as it was so long a detailed account would be impossible. The decorations and floats were not only beautiful but many of them were unique and original in design. The procession took 45 minutes in passing a given point.

The following Sunday Schools were represented in the parade: Belle Prairie Union, 12 conveyances; Belvidere Christian Sunday School, 28 wagons and buggies; Carleton Methodist Sunday School, 13 conveyances; Stoddard Sunday School, 17 wagons; Ebenezer S.S., 13 wagons; Methodist S.S., 20 conveyances; Spring Creek Union S.S., 4 teams; Presbyterian Sunday School, 15 wagon and carriages; Christian Sunday School, 28 conveyances; Pleasant Mound S.S., 11 teams.

After the procession, the floats were photographed by Mr. Griffin in front of the churches on the corner of Olive Avenue and Fifth Street, after which all participated in a basket dinner. In the afternoon, an interesting program was carried out. In the evening, appropriate exercises by the various schools were given and stereopticon entertainment was given.

1906

110 Years Ago

Carpenter Beisner has been putting up a new barn on John Currier's fine farm.

The Central House and the Palacine Hotel have each purchased a handsome "bus" for the use of their patrons.

Fred Brown is the carrier on the new rural route, No. 4, and is unquestionably the handsomest carrier on that route.

Jesse Morehead and Leva Skaggs went to Belleville last week where they were married. Their fathers accompanied them to "give their consent" to the marriage of the minors, each being about 17 years of age. The bride's father made her a present of his farm. Returning to Hebron the young couple received the usual charivari and festivities.

The "New York Bloomers" boated they would skin our boys, but got it put over them in Wednesday's game on a score of 4 to 3 in favor of Hebron. The "Bloomers"

(supposed to be a nine composed of women) had several females, also several males wearing wigs, and the rest just plain men!

Chas. W. Woltemath and family departed last Tuesday for their new home at Bellevue, Nebraska, where they have moved that Miss Eva may enter Bellevue College, in which she holds a scholarship. This estimable family will be missed among their large circle of friends in Thayer County and particularly in Hebron church work. Mr. Woltemath resigned his position at the electric light plant and his faithful attention to duties has brought him a much more desirable home.

Liberty Ridge: Wheat is a big crop in this locality this year, 2,750 bushels were threshed out for H. L. West, and 1,800 bu. for Wm. Schroeder.

Chester: We believe before many months pass by Chester will have one of the finest school buildings in the county. On Aug. 13, an election is called to vote bonds for the new building and we haven't the least doubt but what they will carry, for every voter knows we need the new building and need it bad... This community was shocked Wednesday morning by the rather sudden death of Harold Vernon Forsdick, 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Forsdick, who lived two miles northwest of Chester. The little fellow was a prime favorite with all who knew him. The sickness which carried away the fair young life was malarial dysentery, and began only six days prior to his death... Death again visited our community on Wednesday morning, this time claiming the 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Weaver, who live two miles northeast of town. Virgil Weaver was born Aug. 21, 1904, and died Aug. 2, 1906, after a brief sickness of 20 hours.

Carleton: We are informed that Miss Mary Gilbert, living northwest of town, was married Wednesday night to E. D. Gunn. Brave girl; most women are afraid of a gun.

1916

100 Years Ago

Lars Jaspersen of Ruskin recently visited his daughter, Mrs. Kohl, and he talked interestingly with a Journal reporter about conditions when he settled on his homestead two miles south of Ruskin, 46 years ago, and he still resides on that homestead.

When W. J. Thompson of Tacoma, Wash., visited Hebron several weeks ago, he read with much interest the D.A.R.'s book on Pioneer Reminiscences of Nebraska and the chapter by J. L. Webster, telling of the last buffalo hunt in Nebraska, reminded him of the last buffalo hunt in Thayer County, so he called at the Journal office and laughed heartily at the humorous situations in that episode. Mr. Thompson said that he saw buffalo from the townsites here in 1871, and frequently saw deer on the streets of Hebron, as late as the fall of '74 or '75.

Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Ten Broeck are rejoicing over the birth of a daughter, July 27. Mrs. Ten Broeck will be remembered as Miss Hazel Orendorff of Hebron. This is the fifth living generation. The child's great-grandmother, Mrs. A. L. Orendorff, and great-great-grandmother, Mrs. Champney, still reside in Hebron, the latter being 95 years old.

The city council met Monday and awarded the contract for building the two cement bridges on Canal Street to J. McDonald of Hebron for \$1,260. The salary of Harry Beard, light and water commissioner, was raised from \$75 to \$80 per month. Fred Johnson, day engineer, was raised from \$70 to \$75 and Ed Haffner, night engineer, from \$60 to \$65 per month. The council made a levy of 7c per front foot for the extra sewer tax.

The oppressive summer heat instead of keeping people from the chautauqua the past week seems to have driven them to the tent to forget their worries. Innumerable fans have kept time to the musical numbers

and bursts of laughter have punctuated the sighs of discomfort. From a standpoint of management and talent, it has been a decided success. Financially, it more than paid out, the guarantee of \$600 having been easily met by the sale of the tickets.

On Tuesday the city officials met with the county commissioners to arrange for lights on the courthouse tower. It is planned to have four search lights, each of 750 candle-power. Each light will throw a shaft of lights a half mile distant. The cost will be about \$200 installed, which the county will pay and the city will furnish free the electric current to illuminate it.

Autos still have competitors. Max McMahan has a fine saddle and driving horse, five gaited, which he purchased of Dr. Hefflin of Gower, Mo., for family use.

George H. Hays reports an unfortunate lack of freight cars on the Rock Island to handle the wheat crop; the car situation on the Nelson branch being the worst since the line opened. It is said to be a case of "rotten" distribution of cars by higher officials, who ordered all empties sent to the Kansas division. During all of last week, the busiest time of the crop year, there was not an empty car here except three cars of lumber, made empty.

Chester: One of the saddest deaths that has occurred in this community for some time was that of Mrs. John Brumbaugh, which occurred Sunday night at their home west of Chester, who gave up her life while comparatively young. The infant baby born to them Sunday morning lived but a few minutes. The mother and child were laid away in the same casket.

1926

90 Years Ago

Today marks the opening of Hebron's big six-day chautauqua.

Hollis Eugene Hill, the 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hill of Ohio, received injuries last Saturday that resulted in his death a few hours later. He was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Hill.

The belated report of the wedding of Harm Harms and Miss Pauline Titus of Cleveland, Ohio, occurred July 20, but it was impossible to get an authentic report until this week.

Hebron College and Academy prospects are good for this year. A large attendance is expected.

1936

80 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) A wind storm, accompanied by rain, caused some damage at farm homes west of town Friday afternoon. Small buildings were blown apart at the Casey Bowen, Paul Reiss and E. L. Taylor homes. The windmill at the Taylor farm was also badly damaged. The power line west of town was broken causing Belvidere and neighboring towns to be without lights for several hours.

Two Thayer County Veterans--Pvt. Harry Lang, 28, Tank Destroyer, 28 months overseas service concluded in Germany, wearer of Purple Heart and six battle stars, of Alexandria; and T-Sgt. William H. Damm, 30, Armored Division, 36 months overseas service culminated in Italy, and wearer of four battle stars, of Carleton, were among overseas veterans pouring into Miami Army Airfield by Air Transport Command planes returning more than 1000 daily from far-scattered battle fronts.

Memorial services for Lavonne V. Doehring will be held at Grace Lutheran Church, Hebron, Sunday. He was killed in action April 21.

Richard Hildenbrand, a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Fred I. Bergan, of Hebron was reported officially as killed in action while serving as a Seaman, Second Class on the USS Saratoga. In February, he was reported as missing in action following an attack on the Saratoga near Iwo Jima when 123 men were reported killed or missing.

Pfc. George Koerwitz arrived in the Philippines May 6, 1945, and is now assigned to the 38th Quartermaster Co., 38th Infantry Division.

Master Sergeant Dean Horner of Davenport was recently awarded the Bronze Star Medal. He is stationed in Europe with the U.S. Army Signal Corps.

National Breastfeeding Month

Studies have shown breastfeeding is the best way to feed your baby. Scientifically the evidence keeps mounting that breast milk is superior to all other forms of infant feeding.

As a long-time advocate of breastfeeding, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) wants to raise awareness about the long term health benefits breastfeeding can have for both mother and baby.

Some studies also suggest that breastfeeding may offer protection against diabetes, obesity and asthma among others. Research further supports the role breastfeeding has in the development of a baby's immune system and how antibodies they receive from their mother protect them against infection.

In addition, there are also proven benefits for the mother. Research indicates that breastfeeding can help a mother return to her normal weight quicker and reduce her risk of several medical conditions; type 2 diabetes, ovarian and breast cancer. There may even be a decreased risk of hip fractures and osteoporosis in the postmenopausal period.

As a nation, we all benefit when mothers breastfeed. Recent research shows that if 90 percent of babies were breastfed exclusively for six months, nearly 1,000 deaths among infants could be prevented.

The U.S. would also save \$13 billion per year because medical care costs are lower for fully breastfed infants than never-breastfed infants. From an economic standpoint, businesses should actively support working mothers who breastfeed because it leads to less parental absenteeism for illness, reduced their healthcare costs and allows them to attract and retain highly qualified working mothers.

There are also potential environmental benefits to breastfeeding. Increasing

breastfeeding would reduce the need to dispose of formula cans and bottles, and the energy demands associated with the production and transporting of formula.

With this growing body of evidence and increased support from health and medical professionals, breastfeeding rates in the U.S. are on the rise.

However, the duration of breastfeeding remains a challenge, especially among women who work outside the home. Women who work full-time start breastfeeding at virtually the same rate as all mothers, 69 percent, compared to 70 percent. But by the time their infants are six months old, breastfeeding rates for full-time working mothers drop about 25 percent below those of mothers who do not work outside the home.

Economic, cultural, and even political pressures are often involved in a mother's decision regarding infant feeding. However, the AAP firmly adheres to the position that breastfeeding ensures the best possible health as well as the best developmental and psychosocial outcomes for the infant.

Having support from peers (friends and family) and the local community can be vital in a mother's decision to breastfeed. Breastfeeding is the natural way to assist in the optimal infant and child health, growth, and development.

Zika Update

While the local-transmission Zika is NOT an issue in Nebraska, this is not the case for other areas of the nation.

The number of local-transmission Zika cases in Florida has nearly doubled in the past week, jumping from 17 cases on Aug. 8 to 30 cases on Aug. 15.

Meantime, Texas reported a Zika case linked to travel to Miami. Texas also reported its first Zika-related infant death on Aug. 9.

Most, but not all, of the Florida cases have been linked to a one-square-mile area in north Miami known as the Wynwood district. Investigations are ongoing.

Meantime, all county health departments in Florida have started offering free Zika risk assessment and testing to any pregnant women who would like to be tested.

Additionally, CDC issued a travel advisory urging pregnant women to avoid travel to the one-square mile area in north Miami, and that pregnant women in that area be tested for Zika. It is the first time in recent history CDC has issued a travel warning of any kind within the continental U.S.

Money is being shifted away from other health care programs to pay for the fight against Zika. For example PHS just received notice that they have lost \$150,000 in funding for the Saving Rural Heart Program through which AED devices are being placed in the five PHS counties and residents are being trained in CPR.

Hunters help the hungry; Meat processors to accept deer donations in September

Hunters may begin donating deer to the Hunters Helping the Hungry (HHH) program Sept. 1 at 18 processor locations around the state. Three additional processors will accept deer for the program starting Nov. 12.

Hunters pay no processing costs for deer accepted by processors for this donation-driven program.

The HHH program provides ground venison to Nebraskans in need and is funded solely by tax-deductible contributions. Hunters should first talk with processors but may keep antlers, head and cape and donate the rest of the deer. Processors accept only whole deer in good condition to ensure a good yield of pure ground venison.

Time to prepare for September hunting

Summer is winding down, and that means it's time to gear up for fall hunting. Nebraska's archery season for deer, and small game seasons for rabbits, doves, snipe, rail and grouse opens Sept. 1.

Nebraska Hunter Education Coordinator Wendy Horine says hunters should prepare for upcoming seasons by checking to see they have the proper equipment and ensure it is in good working condition.

"Match the proper ammunition to your firearm and make sure guns are clean and free of debris," she said. "Check strings and cables on bows for wear, and spend as much time as you can practicing on the range before venturing out. But with the excitement of preparing for a hunt, sometimes safety is overlooked."

Horine reminds hunters to follow these basic safety rules:

-- Always tell someone where you are going to hunt and when you expect to be back.

-- Practice muzzle control with firearms; never point a firearm at anything you don't intend to shoot.

-- Practice arrow control with bows; always be aware of where a razor-sharp hunting broadhead is pointed and never draw and point a bow or crossbow at anything you don't intend to shoot.

-- Treat every firearm as if it's loaded.

-- Always be sure of your target and what is beyond it; never shoot at sounds our shadows.

-- Never touch the trigger of a firearm or release an arrow

from a bow or crossbow until you are sure of your target and ready to shoot; once released, you can't take back the shot.

Tree Stands: Those who hunt from tree stands should always use a fall arrest system rated for your personal weight.

"According to the Treestand Manufacturers Association, tree stand accidents account for 36 percent of all hunting accidents," Horine said. "Ropes or other homemade devices are dangerous and should never be used as a substitute for a fall arrest system. The few extra minutes it takes to use a fall arrest system could save your life."

Before using a tree stand, check for metal fatigue on all joints and welds. Check metal stands for rust and wood stands for rot. Make sure there are no missing bolts and nuts, and look for deterioration due to age or poor storage condition.

Hunter Orange: Although archery hunters are not required to wear hunter orange during the early season, they are required to wear it if they continue to archery hunt during the November firearm season. "All hunters should wear hunter orange as a precaution in the field," Horine said. "Hunter orange makes hunters more visible to others in the field and is proven to save lives."

Juniors to take college entrance exams in lieu of test

Area teachers and administrators are charting how well their students performed in the spring on the Nebraska State Assessments, which tests students in grades three through eight and eleven in reading, writing and math, and grades five, eight and 11 in science.

Percentages of results are rated basic, proficient or advanced.

Thayer Central will most likely discuss the scores at its next data retreat.

"We have our teachers look at strengths and improvements and set goals based on how well their students did," Elementary Principal Kurk Wiedel said.

"They break the tests down to attack more areas of study," High School Principal Tom Kiburz said.

Wiedel and Kiburz have seen consistent improvements in every class since 2011.

For example, third grade students in 2011 scored a 94 percentile in reading. Five years later, that same class of eighth grade students is sitting

at 100 percent proficiency. And, for 2016, 83 percent of third grade students met or exceeded the reading assessment. Out of 83 percent, 37 percent exceeded.

In the reading program at Deshler, 42 percent of 82 percent exceeded scores.

Deshler Secondary Principal Josh Weber said the school uses the Nebraska Department of Education's Checks for Learning.

The checks are essentially practice questions and tests students can use to emulate the NeSA skills and concepts, Weber said.

But, Weber warned being immersed in the NeSA results could overshadow the effects of student engagement and higher level critical thinking.

"Some schools have achieved extremely high proficiency levels, but it has come at the cost of student engagement and best practice," Weber said.

Weber also pointed out for small schools like Deshler, one or two student scores can skew the results.

"Kids that move into the district bring in scores from other schools. That skews the

results because they didn't learn here," Wiedel said.

At Bruning-Davenport High School, Superintendent Trudy Clark verified Weber's observation as one student wasn't present for the test and was counted as not clinching the math and science benchmarks.

"So if we discount him, we had three out of 15 that didn't meet the benchmark," Clark said.

Bruning-Davenport had 34 students excel in reading and 26 in math. The total tested was 92 with 37 percent exceeding in reading and 29 percent in math.

Keeping in mind the margin of error that feeds off student absences on test day, Bruning-Davenport third grade students achieved 93 percent in math and reading, respectively.

Fourth grade went 67 and 75 percent in proficiency; fifth, 70 and 90 percent; and sixth grade was 50 and 67 percent. Clark said only six students are in the sixth grade.

In seventh grade, 77 percent of students were proficient in reading and 69 percent in math. Eighth grade was 90 and

80 percent and 11th grade, 78 and 67 percent.

Clark said Bruning-Davenport has a strong math program that uses consistency from kindergarten to the eighth grade. In addition, Clark said a strong math teacher is key.

On the other hand, the school's recent research-based reading program had to change, Clark said.

"While we did well, I think we could have done better. We have adopted a different program this year. I believe we do fine," Clark said.

While the NeSA test is helpful to teachers for gauging how their students are doing, Weber said results are not necessarily helpful to students.

"The are just given a scale score for each area and this scale score once again does not provide much detailed information," Weber said.

Deshler had 82 percent of elementary students cross the line to proficiency and beyond in reading. The school combined elementary and secondary scores for this report.

In math, 75 percent of students met and excelled. In science, 76 were proficient.

For secondary grades, sev-

enth, eighth and 11th, Deshler students were 75 percent, 74 percent and 69 percent proficient in reading, math and science, respectively.

Writing scores, also part of the NeSA assessment, were not released by NDE. Technical glitches at the time of the online tests have prompted officials to focus on how the test should be administered.

The state is moving away from writing, Kiburz said.

"Now, it will be mixed into reading," he said.

Wiedel said the scores aren't meant to be punitive and serve as tools to help students.

"We bring them in after school and have them work on those areas," Wiedel said.

"We give them the test and we do something about it."

The school had approximately 20 students that didn't meet the benchmarks.

Third grade students were 87 percent for meeting math requirements.

Ninety-four percent of fourth grade students met reading standards while 79 percent met math standards.

In fifth grade, 81 percent, 94 percent and 94 percent of students met reading, math

and science benchmarks. Additional grades performed over eighty percent in reading and math, and science where applicable.

One hundred percent of eighth grade students met and excelled in reading.

Eleventh grade students fell between 70 and 80 percent in all three subjects. On average, Thayer Central 86 percent of students were proficient in reading; 84 percent in math; and 83 percent in science.

Forty-eight percent of students exceeded reading goals; 34 percent exceeded in math; and 83 percent in science.

Kiburz said juniors will no longer participate in the NeSA assessment and will take college-entrance exams instead.

Weber said ACT scores in Deshler show students performing above the state average in English, math, reading and science.

For English, Deshler students were 2.2 points higher than the state average; .4 in math; .1 in reading; and 1.4 in science.

Drug prices keep rising with no end in sight

Recently a tweet from Lauren Sausser, a fine health reporter I know in South Carolina, caught my eye. "Crazy drug prices became personal. My dad will start Keytruda regimen on Friday, \$15,000 per infusion, once every three weeks indefinitely." The high cost of pharmaceuticals had hit home!

Her 61-year-old father, Jim McCallister, who lives in Spartanburg, S.C., had been diagnosed with a melanoma discovered during a routine skin exam a few weeks earlier. It had spread to his lungs. Doctors recommended the drug, which uses the body's immune system to attack cancer cells and has showed promise in treating aggressive melanomas.

McCallister's employer-provided insurance is paying for most of his treatment, and the family is looking into Merck's co-pay program. In the meantime, McCallister faces several thousand dollars of out-of-pocket costs.

McCallister may be lucky cost-wise. But the fact remains: Somebody is paying for the high cost of Keytruda and other new drugs coming on the market. Sausser said her dad asked if insurance would cover the drug. "The doctor told him they would find some way."

That's the nub of the dilemma. For many like McCallister, there may be help, often from the drug companies themselves in the form of patient assistance plans. Remember drug company AstraZeneca's ads for some of its costly drugs: "AstraZeneca may be able to help?"

Sometimes state or local government programs, private charities, nonprofit agencies, or coupon programs help patients pay for their drugs. Patients who can't get help from any of those sources often go without.

None of the assistance programs, however, attack the underlying prices for the drugs, which pharmaceutical makers can set according to what the market will bear. They can pretty much do whatever they want with little pushback from those who end up paying the bills - governments, insurers and patients. The U.S. has no cost controls, and government doesn't negotiate drug prices the way many other countries do.

So the price of commonly prescribed drugs like the EpiPen, a shot that stops life-threatening allergic reactions, has risen to more than \$600 for two pens. In 2009 two pens cost \$100. The price for Abilify, an antipsychotic, has risen 113 percent between 2007 and 2014, and the cholesterol-lowering drug Crestor has climbed 103 percent over the same time period, according to The Campaign for Sustainable Rx Pricing, a group of employers, insurers, and unions that are trying to

raise public awareness of high drug prices.

That helps explain why Medicare recently reported its spending on prescription drugs increased more than 17 percent in 2014 even though the number of claims from the program's 38 million beneficiaries rose only 3 percent.

Medicare's prescription drug law was never meant to pay all a person's drug expenses. This year once a beneficiary and her drug plan have paid \$3,310 for medicines, she reaches the coverage gap where she must pay the cost of most of her drugs. If she spends, out of her own pocket, another \$4,850 for drugs this calendar year, she qualifies for catastrophic coverage and pays only 5 percent of all her remaining drugs for the year.

The trouble is that with prices so high, it's easy to end up in the coverage gap paying out-of-pocket. Even protection offered by catastrophic coverage may not be enough. That's especially true for people taking high-priced specialty drugs.

In 2013, about three million people were in this predicament. "Not a lot of people pay above the threshold, but those who do can pay through the nose," says Tricia Neuman, senior vice president of the Kaiser Family Foundation.

Escalating drug prices affect everyone - even those not taking expensive drugs or not on Medicare. High drug prices affect all insurance premiums sooner or later.

Not long ago I spotted a letter to the editor in USA Today from Heather Block, age 53, who has Stage 4 breast cancer. She was calling for patients to organize and build a network to help craft solutions for the problem of skyrocketing drug prices.

I talked to Block about this. Her zeal and interest in organizing patients reminded me of the early days of the consumer movement in the 1960s when citizens organized to pass legislation to make the marketplace safer and more fair.


With drugs, Block says, it's hard to organize people because of drug assistance programs that take the sting out of prices and make patients less willing to work against the companies, the presence of disease advocacy groups funded by the pharmaceutical industry, and a general reluctance to speak up for fear of jeopardizing their own health and survival.


