Pletcher served in command post

Dale Pletcher, who received an Ambassador for Peace medal from the Ministry of Patriots and Veterans Affairs for the Republic of Korea, has offered a clarification on his service:

He attended basic and leadership training at Fort Riley, Kan., and was in the 25th Division, 27th Wolfhound Regiment of the United States Army.

Dale served most of his time in Korea as company clerk in a command post, where they fought Chinese soldiers, not Russian soldiers. The bombarding sound from artillery caused Dale's hearing impairment.

Dale was on Kojedo Island guarding prisoners the last few weeks of his tour before taking the ship home. He was honorably discharged at Camp Carson, Colo., in August of 1952.

Spot rain left fields dry for harvest

The lack of early rain could affect dryland crops up to 100 bushels per acre on the corn, Larry Seaman of Norder Supply in Hebron said.

"The irrigated crop is good if they had adequate water," he said.

The dryland portion of the harvest will be a couple weeks ahead of schedule, he added.

Beans are benefitting from recent rains, but they also lacked moisture early on.

Lane Scheitel, grain origination specialist at Cargill said the area is dry with spot or fast rains not helping the situation.

He said there isn't a good gauge on yields.

Seaman agrees.

"No one has estimated the yield on the dryland crop," Seaman said.

"It will be spotty for yields on the dryland crops, Scheitel said.

Nationally, the United States Department of Agriculture National Agricultural Statistics Service predicts a record year for corn and soybeans, up four percent from 2017. Nebraska is one of eight states listed for higher than normal bushels of soybeans. Likewise, Nebraska is predicted to have high corn yields.

Manager at AGP in Chester, Roger Rumsey, said the corn under irrigation is looking good, but the dryland suffered because it was too hot during pollination. Some of the ears didn't fill and are smaller.

Recent years have seen good crops, Rumsey said. He's hoping the wind that left bushels of corn on the ground last year won't return this harvest.

"It affected the average quite a bit," he said.

Seaman said the national trade situation is affecting the market and causing lower prices.

President Donald Trump has called for other countries to negotiate trade deals that would benefit all countries involved.

"The harvest is coming in and doesn't have a place to go," he

Escapee captured, bulletins issued

The Nebraska State Patrol issued a bulletin Aug. 23 for Christian Reinke, 20, formerly of Hebron, who had escaped from the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services Work Ethic Camp in McCook.

Reinke left the camp at approximately 8:18 p.m. He is serving five to 10 years for a burglary in Nuckolls County and will be eligible for parole next year.

Law enforcement discovered Reinke had driven to Omaha in a stolen 1998 Chevrolet Suburban.

He was arrested the next day in Bennington.

Reinke had pulled into the parking lot at Bennington High School, which prompted the school to go into lockdown.

As this is their first trial, we wish them success, and think Hubbell can soon boast of as good a band as the county has...A heavy wind storm visited us Saturday night doing considerable damage to crops and buildings...The fruit crop which was very promising is looking rather blue.

Farmers generally feel good this year.

W. A. Rowe reports the sale of four windmills last week.

The Hebron Library Association is out of debt and has \$23 in its treasury. At the meeting Monday evening, a resolution to get new books was adopted.

S. T. Conner, proprietor of the Little Blue Cheese Factory, has built up a fine trade. He finds a demand for all the cheese he manufactures. On Wednesday he sold 218 lbs. here.

W. S. Livingood of Los Angeles, Cal., and A. G. Eisfeller, of Chicago, Ill., have sold their interest in the Carleton Times to its present editor, P. I. Livingood, who now takes sole control.

Belvidere: The present outlook for a saloon is very cloudy. One thing is certain—it is being strongly opposed by our sturdy temperance people. If it becomes a factor in our little village it will be through the trickery of its own advocates, who, of course, will certainly leave no stone unturned that will help their almost hopeless cause...There are black dogs, brown dogs, brindle dogs, shaggy dogs, happy dogs, unhappy dogs and yellow dogs to be seen on our streets every day regardless of the dog ordinance that was passed by our village councilmen a short time ago.

The cupola is on the jail. Bathing is fashionably these warm days.

Andrew, the infant son of Peter and Annie Olsen, died Friday and was buried Sunday.

Mrs. P. M. Teed's first trial of a gasoline stove resulted in a conflagration, killing two canary birds, burning the floor, safe and clock, also her left arm badly. The trouble arose from turning the valve the wrong way.

Joseph McCleary harvested 576 bushels of winter wheat from 14 acres, over 40 bushels to the acre. He sold his wheat at 65 cents a bushel, getting \$26.32 per acre, or more than enough from a single crop to pay for the land.

Samuells and family who moved to Havana, Mo., last March with the intention of remaining a year, returned last Friday and moved onto their fine farm a mile and a half north of Hebron which Mr. Samuells bought of Cash Gates. Mr. Samuells says his family is delighted to get back to Nebraska—to a land of sunshine and good roads, even if the crops are not quite as good as in Missouri. He has now one of the most desirable farms in the county and will begin permanent improvements.

There is one farmer in Thayer County who expects to make \$1000 from his watermelons. His corn is all right, too, diversify crops.

We understand there were three weddings in one evening at Belvidere last week.

W. T. Bryan, living northwest of Hebron, was a pleasant caller yesterday. He has threshed and has 1550 bushels of wheat, average 20 bushels to the acre, and 700 bushels of oats, averaging 34 bushels to the acre.

McKee & Peery have fitted up a neat bathroom in the rear of their barber shop, and are fully prepared to fill the wants of the great unwashed.

Lincoln Avenue is assuming metropolitan airs with its brand new telephone poles.

Mr. Lovercheck has erected a blacksmith shop on the lot just north of the brick livery barn.

Dr. J. H. Boyes has a professional card in the Journal, announcing the location of his office over Reynold's Drug Store.

Word reached us just before going to press that Carleton had a severe loss by fire last night. John W. Edward's livery barn was discovered to be in flames, and in 20 minutes was reduced to ashes. Nine horses were burned, five of them belonging to Mr. Edwards. Only one buggy was saved, and all the harness, etc., was destroyed. Jake Morrow's blacksmith shop was also destroyed, a portion of the woodwork and tools being saved. A curious coincidence is the fact that the barn and shop, which occupied this same location, were destroyed by fire just four years ago this month.

3-D Mammography



Thayer County Health Services is excited to announce they will have 3D mammography as a new service in September 2018. A new Hologic, genius 3D mammography machine is being installed and next week staff will be receiving training.
Like traditional mammography, 3D mammography uses X-rays to produce images of breast tissue in order to detect lumps, tumors or other abnormalities. The benefits of the 3D technology is it has the capability of producing more detailed images of breast tissue than with the traditional 2D exams.
Traditional mammography produced just two images of each breast, a side-to-side view and a top-to-bottom view. 3D mammography produces many X-ray images of the breasts from multiple angles to create a digital 3-dimensional rendering of internal breast tissue. This allows radiologists to view the breast in 1-millimeter 'slices' rather than just the full thickness from the top and from the side. The radiologist is then able to review reconstruction, one slide at a time, almost like turning pages in a book. This makes it easier for doctors to see if there's anything to be concerned about.
The 3D mammography procedure resembles that of traditional mammography. The procedure takes place in a private room and is conducted by a radiologic technologist. During the procedure, the woman is positioned before a 3D mammography machine and her breasts are held in place by two compression plates. The pressure placed on the breasts by the compression

plates is still like with a traditional mammogram. It can cause discomfort but it will only last for a few seconds.
When ready, the radiologic technologist will start the 3D mammography machine and a robotic arm will move in an arc over the woman's breasts as multiple X-ray images are taken. The dose is similar to film mammography and is only slightly higher than with a standard 2D digital mammography. The scan itself takes less than two to three seconds per view. The entire procedure takes approximately 10 to 20 minutes.
3D mammography can be used for routine screening mammography and may be particularly effective for women with dense breast tissue or those at high risk for developing breast cancer. Research suggests that radiologists are able to more accurately interpret results from 3D mammography in dense breast tissue, which can lead to fewer false-positive and false-negative readings.
Thayer County Health Services is committed to the fight against breast cancer. Having 3D mammography available for patients will make it possible to detect breast cancer in an earlier stage than with conventional mammograms. Detecting cancer earlier will lead to saving more lives. If you would like to schedule an appointment to have your 3D mammogram, call health care provider.

aerial support were en route to the scene, the vehicle left the parking lot and began traveling on Bennington Road.
Officers from the Bennington Police Department, Douglas County Sheriff's Office and Omaha Police Department also began to arrive on the scene.
Reinke was stopped by an officer near 144th and Bennington Road.
He was arrested for possession of a stolen vehicle and additional charges related to his escape.
Three others occupants of the vehicle were taken into custody for questioning and the investigation is ongoing.
In other news, the Seward County Sheriff's Office issued a press release that, along with the Milford Police Department, the sheriff's office was investigating reports of suspicious vehicles and individuals seen trying to contact young females in their communities and rural areas.
The sheriff's office stated not enough information had been received to believe there was an immediate threat to citizens.
According to the press release, a suspicious sea foam green van with Hispanic males was seen north and east of Milford Aug. 4. By the time a deputy arrived, the vehicle had left the area.
The following day, a local citizen reported individuals driving a sea foam green van attempted to locate a farm residence with the intent of purchasing livestock.
On Aug. 22, Seward police were alerted to a suspicious white van near Concordia University. An unknown

younger female was approached by the van's occupants. They tried to talk to her. She left without responding.
Another female had witnessed the incident.
That same day, Milford police were called for a suspicious van. A six-year-old girl was walking her dog in Milford when she observed a male individual with dark hair exit the van and walk in her direction.
The young girl reported the incident to a neighbor.
On Aug. 23, Seward police were alerted to a sea foam green van with 22-county plates parked at the Seward Walmart. A Seward police officer responded and located the van with 22-county plates, but found the van was silver, not sea foam green.
Closer to home, the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office released a report of an incident Aug. 24.
At around 9 p.m., a Jefferson County resident stopped to assist two stranded vehicles just north of 715th Road on Airport Road.
As the resident approached one of the vehicles, the driver said he had a dead battery and no jumper cables.
The resident was approached by two more men, who had walked out of the ditch. Three more also walked out of the ditch.
A passing motorist observed the males and stopped to assist.






