Cattlemen's Ball group largest ever

The 21st Cattlemen's Ball "Whip Cancer" at Hergott Farm June 1-2 will tuck yet another unique fundraiser under the arm of cancer research.

"There is no other event like this put on in rural areas. Hundreds of people volunteer," Dr. Kenneth Cowan, director of the Fred and Pamela Buffet Cancer Center, said.

More than \$13 million has been raised since the ball's inception. Funds are channeled directly to researchers and technicians, and are not spent on administrative costs.

Cowan spoke at a luncheon and tour attended by the 2018 planners, donors, potential donors and volunteers.

It was the largest group ever to visit the center. One hundred and seven people carried by two buses from Hebron to Omaha, were expected.

"Three-fourths of the group are already signed up to volunteer," Co-host for the ball, Rob Marsh, said. "We have such a great opportunity to bring so many people

from so many areas."

Indeed, people from 33 communities have offered a hand for the event that hopes to draw a crowd of more than 4,500.

"Cancer steals from our loved ones and friends and we are working together to fight," Marsh said.

The tour featured the cancer center's healing areas and a research lab. Marsh's favorite part was Leslie's Healing Garden with its heated paths.

One of the ball volunteers, Nancy Hofts, enjoyed the tour, but sees the cancer center from a different perspective. She had an appointment to see her oncologist this week.

"I think it will be a real bonus to everyone to have everything in one place," she said about the center. Hofts, who was expected to live three to six months in 2013 because of cancer, previously had appointments and a 16-hour surgery at different facilities.

The Fred and Pamela Buffet Cancer Center is all inclusive.

"It will be much easier on patients. The patient makes one visit and sees all doctors," Cowan said.

From imaging to clinic to surgical services, the center targets cancer under one roof.

Hofts, who now sees oncologists in Lincoln and Omaha every six months, is heading the interior decorating committee for the tents.

"Everyone I've asked to help has said 'yes,'" she said. The committee is working on decorating mason jars and small, wooden quilt blocks for the centerpieces.

"We're talking to teachers, FFA and other groups. We want to get the young people involved," Hofts said.

"That makes me feel good — it's Nebraskans helping Nebraskans," Marsh said.

Marsh is part of the core committee of seven couples, including co-hosts Randy and Becky Hergott, and Julie Katz and Karla Deepe. A list of responsibilities fall under each of the members from the electricity to security to the auctions and "Calf-For-A-Cure," the 2018 major fundraiser for cancer research.

There are several ways to fundraise with the ball. Nearly 200 items will be available for the

silent auction.

Live auctions begin Friday evening with some big ticket items, such as collector firearms, vacation packages and ATVs. The Farm and Ranch auction will feature equipment for cattle and additional items for landowners.

The goals for the 2018 ball are to raise at least \$1.5 million and sell 5,000 tickets to a ball organized by 500-plus volunteers.

Ninety percent of the proceeds are funneled to cancer research. The remaining 10 percent will be kicked back to services in Thayer County.

"If anyone wants to be a part of this, give us a call," Marsh said. He said the website, cattlemenball.com, is close to being finished. There is also a Facebook page, Cattlemen's Ball of Nebraska, Inc.

The tour reinforced the core group's take on the ball's importance, Marsh said.

"There are so many great things about the center," he added. "Our work on the ball and knowing that 90 percent of that money goes for a facility that is right in our backyard — there was an outpouring of support to go to the tour."

Art keeps Luttrell's passion healthy

Local artist, Jamie Luttrell, has finished another mural, this one at Long Crop Services heading out of Hebron on old Highway 81.

The 20-foot wide, 14-foot tall mural was started July 30 after Luttrell made some mock-ups of what Long Crop wanted.

She was limited to the times she could paint — Luttrell was on a scaffolding in the mornings and after 2 p.m., because the paint would dry too fast.

"That first week was perfect, cool and beautiful, but then the sun hits the metal door," she said.

While on the scaffolding, she was caught up in the detail and to take in the full picture, she stepped down and away from the scaffold

more than a few times.

"You exaggerate your shading and highlights because you can't see them far away," she said. "I was running down the driveway to look at it."

She finished the piece Aug. 19 and then applied a layer of clear coat to keep the colors from fading.

Luttrell has had a market for art in Hebron. She is currently survey-

ing an elevated barn door for her next piece.

"Hebron has kept me busy," she said. "So many people have an appreciation for art."

She has worked on indoor murals as well. Children's bedrooms are her favorites. Luttrell is no stranger to painting for children. She helped Artist Cindy Shinn paint for children at the Jennifer Reinke Public Library in Deshler.

"They're bright and whimsical," she said.

Luttrell said her market hasn't been exhausted.

"And I don't have to push my advertisement," she added.

Speaking of art, Luttrell doesn't think people should be so quick to say they aren't artists.

"Even cookies, that's art. I hate it when people say they aren't artistic," she said.

Bruning Breezes: H. C. Schultz has thoroughly refitted the Kalkwarf steam thresher and is getting all of the work that he can do... Dr. Dempster and family leave us this week and they will be missed very much by all, for he has taken an active part in everything going on in our village since he has been here. He goes to New York City, where he will study for a year on special practices before he locates again... Boyes Bros. visit us with vegetables every few days. The early gardens around Hebron are depended on by a great many around here for their early vegetables.

Geo. W. White, who with his family moved to Hershey, Lincoln County, several years ago, has moved back to Davenport to remain. After living in a land of alkali he finds old Thayer County good enough for him.

Fred L. Bruning, candidate for sheriff, comes before the voters of Thayer County with an announcement on the editorial page. He is well known in Thayer County,

having been manager of the Gregg Bros. Grain Co., at Belvidere, for the past 16 years.

H. L. Brown brought to town Wednesday, the first load of the season, of home grown watermelons. For several years, Mr. Brown has raised delicious melons and is always early on the market.

Through the efforts of the WRC, old Mr. and Mrs. Carter are soon to be admitted to the Soldier's home at Grand Island.

Mr. and Mrs. Kleppinger arrived Saturday from Iowa with their household goods, and will make Hebron their future home.

Mr. W. E. Benjamin has a card on the editorial page announcing his candidacy for the office of superintendent of public instruction. Mr. Benjamin bases his claims for the office on the fact that he has lived in the county for 18 years, and been a teacher about eight years; graduated in the scientific course of the Kansas Normal College and in the classical course of the Fremont Normal School; has been county surveyor for nearly two years, and last but not least has always been a republican.

1907

110 Years Ago

Editor Bryant moved that the editors of the county effect an organization. We second the motion.

Mrs. G. E. Lewis, after several months' visit with Hebron relatives, departed Monday for her home at Santa Barbara, Calif. She was accompanied as far as Colorado by Mrs. Ed Armstrong and children who will visit her brother at Fort Collins.

Great preparations are being made for Woodman Picnic Day. The committee has arranged for a balloon ascension, high dive, trade parade, a couple of ball games and attractions innumerable. You will be sure to be entertained.

The latest moving pictures out, will be shown next Thursday in the courthouse yard, free to everyone. They were leased for this occasion from a Chicago firm.

C. J. Fitzsimons sold his implement business to Hansen & Pierpont, of Beatrice, who will invoice about the 20th. Mr. Fitzsimons is a valuable citizen in the community and it is hoped he will again identify himself with Hebron's business interests.

1917

100 Years Ago

An event unusual and one of a kind that we never before knew to be chronicled was the double golden wedding anniversary celebrated at Davenport last Monday, when the four principals in a double wedding performed a half century ago again took the nuptial vows. Dr. and Mrs. C. M. Easton of Hebron and Mr. and Mrs. Geo. E. Lewis of Alhambra, Calif., being the principals in the unique and happy grouping. Fifty years ago, near Norton, Kankakee County, Ill., Dr. C. M. Easton and Geo. E. Lewis married sisters, Mary and Cora Armstrong.

A Big Law-Suit: Atty M. S. Gray of Davenport was in town Wednesday, starting action in district court proceedings wherein 20 claimants are suing the St. Joe and G.I. Ry.Co. for damages totaling about \$40,000 for losses sustained May 16, when sparks from a railway engine started a fire that wiped out a good portion of the business part of Davenport. The insurance companies that paid losses are also coming back into the railway company, so that the suits are complicated with many petitions.

Mrs. Sarah Barrett, an old-time Hebron resident, died in Iowa and was buried in Hebron on Wednesday.

1927

90 Years Ago

The Lockwood building will be remodeled for the occupancy of the post office with depth of 90 feet.

As a whole, the chautauqua program last week was of a high grade. The \$700 course excelled courses for which the town has paid \$1500. It is regrettable that more were not in attendance. The hard times and the urgent farm work cut down the patronage. If the circuit had been dated following harvest when money is "easier," doubtless both farmers and business men would have been liberal in the purchase of tickets. Each one of the businessmen signing the guarantee, "coughed up" \$10.20 to make up the deficit of \$306.

Mrs. James Haney of Kearney, remembered by pioneers as Alice J. Elliott, (a daughter of J. T. Elliott who homesteaded in Saline County in 1870), was in Hebron Saturday with her son, Albert James Haney, of Kearney, seeking the grave of the latter's grandfather, Thomas Haney, who was murdered in the Indian raid of 1867 on the place now known as the Durlfinger farm near the Fulton bridge, just southeast of Hebron. Mrs. Haney, who came to Hebron, Saturday, is the widow of the late James Haney, son of Thomas Haney, the murdered pioneer.

(The Alexandria Argus) Lola May, infant of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. DeFrain, was born Aug. 21, 1927, died August 25, 1927, age four days.

Miss Evelyn Bright assumed her new duties as postmistress of the Alexandria post office, the latter part of last week.

80 Years Ago

Clifford Pierce, son of Mr. and Mrs. Venus Pierce, living in Thayer County, 4 1/2 miles west of Reynolds, has been making an exceptional record as a jockey in Del Mar, Calif., and Agua Caliente, Mex., since he left Thayer County in June of 1935. Clifford has had 16 winnings, up to July 31, and has pulled down some good purses.

Two Thayer County boys, James Matheny, 23, and Floyd Matheny, 16, brothers, met a shocking death with five other boys in an automobile accident Sunday morning, on the highway 20 miles from Craig, Colo. The seven young men were driving at a speed between 70 and 80 miles an hour when they collided with a truck, and all were killed instantly. No one in the truck was killed. Their mother, Mrs. Cora Metheny, resides in the southeast part of the county, near Williams, where the young men were raised.

(The Alexandria Argus) Daykin took first money in the finals of the baseball tournament at the Alexandria picnic, when they defeated Ohioa by a score of 25 to 13 in a game which lasted almost the entire afternoon.

Chas. Woltemath of Belvidere passed away Monday, Aug. 2. The deceased was a half-brother of Henry and Ed Woltemath of this place. Mr. Woltemath was in the lumber and grain business at Gilead for many years. He spent the latter part of his life on the farm one mile east of Belvidere.

Oregon Trail school gets facelift: Betty Bulin, Alexandria, enjoys history; especially that of Thayer County, and more specifically that of Alexandria, the lost village of Meridian and a little known one-room schoolhouse. Listed in the National Historic Registrar as a school "historically and architecturally representative of the one-room, rural schoolhouse," typical of settlers in the 1800s, the building sits in pristine white two miles south of the Alexandria State Lakes along the Oregon Trail. But Betty's interest goes a little deeper than that. "My mother went to school there," she says, "and my father's sister, Alice Knigge taught there."

The Child Identification Program (CHIP) will be available at the annual Milo Day celebration in Carleton, Saturday, Sept. 8. The program is sponsored by Nebraska Freemasons, in cooperation with the Nebraska Sheriffs Association and Nebraska Dentists, Dental Hygienist and Dental Assistants association and is free to the public. The program, making its first appearance in Thayer County, addressed the alarming fact that over one million children are reported missing in the U.S. every year. In Nebraska, 5,000 were missing in 2000. The program has identified more than 226,284 children since its inception. The identification kit, which is given to the child's family for safekeeping, includes a videotape of the child, fingerprints, bite impressions, a DNA cheek swab, and digital photograph. None of the information is passed to anyone, organization or otherwise, but the parents of the child.

What constitutes an emergency

Starting on September 11, Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) will begin offering extended hours on Mondays at the Hebron Clinic until 6:45 p.m. Offering extended hours along with walk-in/same day appointments during regular clinic hours will provide patients with more flexibility in receiving their healthcare.

TCHS is very proud of the many healthcare services they provide locally. One important service is access to emergency medical care. In a life threatening emergency, the hospital emergency room is available, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

An important question you might ask is, "What constitutes an emergency?" According to the by-laws of the TCHS medical staff, an emergency is "the presence of significant trauma, eye injury, pregnancy, chest pain, acute dyspnea, acute abdominal pain, coma, new onset seizure, or cardiopulmonary arrest." Acute dyspnea is further defined as "air hunger resulting in labored or difficult breathing."

It is normal to have some dyspnea due to vigorous work or physical activity; however, unexplained dyspnea should be examined by a physician. Cardiopulmonary arrest means the heart is no longer beating and there are no respirations present.

Unexplained chest pain is also a condition requiring immediate attention. While this is not an all-inclusive list of emergency conditions, it should be considered a guideline for the type of situations that are true emergencies and should be addressed immediately in an emergency room.

The Department of Health and Human Services estimates that between 13.7 and 27.1 percent of all emergency department visits are non-emergent. In other words, they do not meet the criteria to be a true emergency as defined above. You might ask "Why is this important?" "Aren't emergency rooms open anyway?" "Does it really matter that all visits aren't true emergencies?" "Aren't ER physicians paid to be on call?"

There are several impor-

tant reasons why it does matter. The first reason is because when medical personnel are busy in the emergency room with a non-emergent patient, they are not available to care for inpatients that are acutely ill.

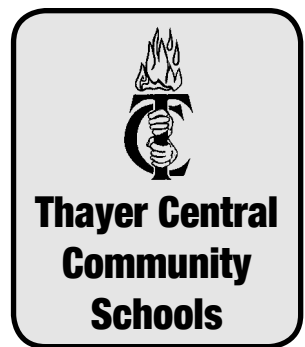
In addition, physicians are often called to the emergency room to see a patient that may have had a non-emergent condition for days and has decided to come to the emergency room instead of making a clinic appointment. This practice not only costs the patient more, but it also drives up insurance premiums.

When the emergency room is used in lieu of the clinic, the cost to the payer source goes up as well. This means higher medical costs for you, the insurance companies and the Federal government if the patient receives Medicare or Medicaid. The end result is the cost of healthcare keeps going up and becomes more expensive for all of us.

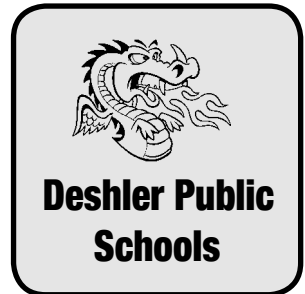
In the emergency room, you may have to wait several hours for care if your illnesses or injuries are not life-threatening. This is because patients are seen based on the severity of their condition. As healthcare costs rise, it is important we all work to find ways to help reduce healthcare costs. Ask yourself, "Am I using the emergency room for non-emergent care?" Using the emergency room in this manner is not a very cost effective way to receive your healthcare.

The TCHS emergency room plays an important role in meeting your healthcare needs. However, for non-emergent care, TCHS has six medical clinics available. Using the clinic in Hebron and the five other medical clinics in Bruning, Chester, Davenport, Deshler, and Milligan, for your non-emergent care, ensures you receive the appropriate healthcare services while preserving the availability of the emergency room and minimizing healthcare costs.

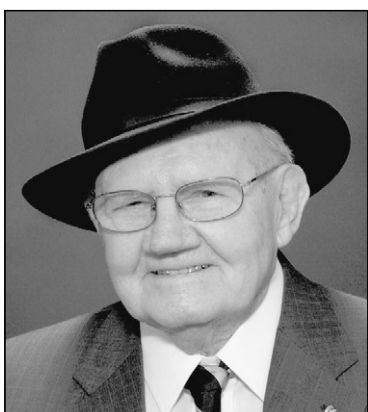

Four returning starters top off Titan volleyball team

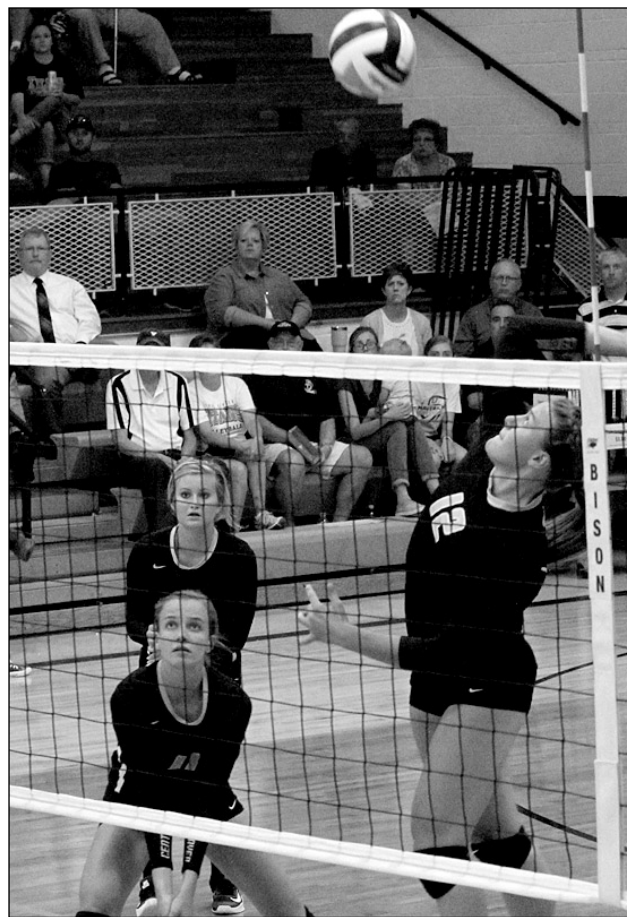

"He stood strong as well as controlled the line of scrimmage," Ardissono added.

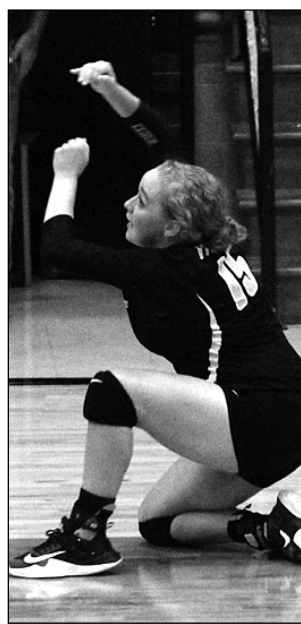

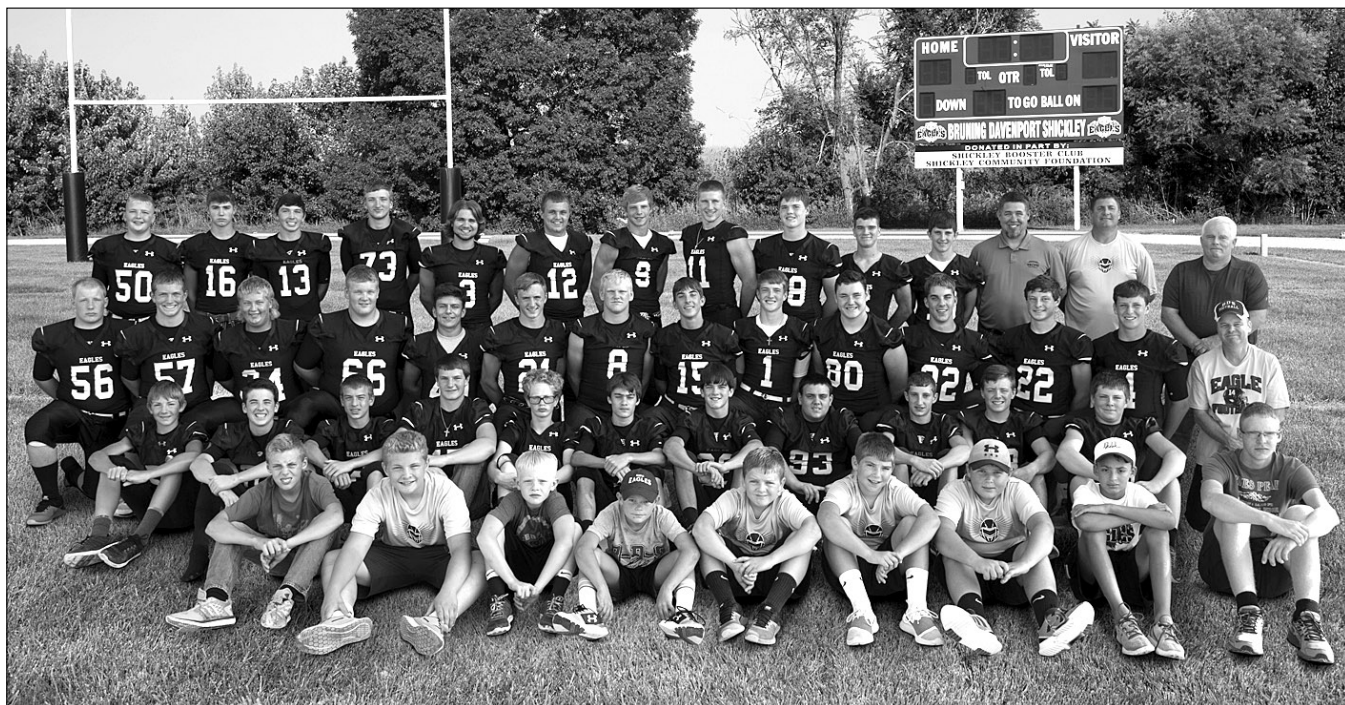

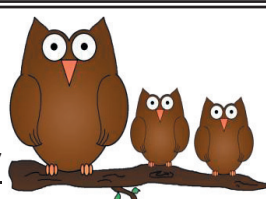
