## Council spends meeting promoting Hebron

Promotion seemed to resonate during Monday evening's Hebron City Council meeting.

From downtown improvements to the new walking trail to business incentives and economic development, the council covered promoting Hebron like a blanket.

Even Chamber of Commerce Jana Tietjen stepped in to note Cortland's revitalization.

"All the buildings have been redone and most have awnings," Tietjen said.

Councilman Kurk Wiedel said Red Cloud has improved its downtown to the point of habital living spaces.

"People are living upstairs again," Wiedel said. "They fixed up an area of Red Cloud."

He said Ravenna has a nice incentive plan, and Hebron might want to offer new businesses free memberships to the chamber of commerce. Tietjen said the chamber already grants a free membership.

Wiedel said the city could pick up a second year free for businesses.

He scratched out a plan to suggest ways Hebron could attract new businesses. Discussed was no interest loans for cosmetic improvements to buildings and the availability of free land for development.

"The City of Hebron will provide potential businesses with free land," Wiedel suggested. "We're going to give them incentives to develop. We always talk about this and never make a decision."

"Why wouldn't we want to extend that to an existing business?" Councilman Robert Dodes asked about the no interest loan.

"The context here is new business incentives. Let's stay focused on this," City Attorney Joe Murray said.

"If I own land out by the community center and we have a new business that wants to come in there, we are fools if we don't try to leverage that," Wiedel said.

Also haggled was property tax relief and free hookups to sewer lines.

Wiedel said Republic County in Kansas does out funds for property tax relief.

Councilmembers will meet with

Murray to further lay out a solid plan for new businesses.

On the walking trail, Councilman Tim Pickering, also a member of the Walkability group, explained 12 people helped to complete phase one on Fourth Street.

He said Blue Valley Lutheran Homes is on board with the trail, but would like clarification on injury liability.

Pickering said the Walkability group has laid out four phases to lengthen the trail. The final phase would connect the existing trail to the river.

The end spot could be a canoe launch point into the river and a fishing hole, however, engineers would have to be involved.

"We don't want to do engineers," Wiedel said.

The trail committee is looking for-

ward to meeting with the Little Blue Natural Resources District for possible grant funds.

Tietjen wanted to know if there was an available map of the trail and mentioned she is receiving a lot of calls for rentals in Hebron. She had a list of landlords who rent homes and apartments.

Then, Tietjen said they would like to somehow log visitors to the porch swing in Roosevelt Park.

Dodes said they might want to run it like camping registrations, where visitors fill out a card and drop it in a slot.

Tietjen put a call out for old photos of the porch swing.

She also said the Hebron porch swing T-shirts are on sale at Hintz's Cheese and Crafts and Amanda's Cottage.

Something new, Tietjen said, are the retail brochures with coupons. She said Casey's went through a stack of the brochures in just a few days and merchants are reporting coupons have been used.

On the Christmas Fair scheduled for November, Dodes suggested they place vendors in the downtown activity center and Stastny Community Center to draw people downtown.

On Stastny, director Blythe Norder gave a report and discussed rates for renting out specific parts of the building such as, the kitchen and outdoor patio area.

Wiedel said the center received a positive compliment from John Deere, which has held several meetings there.

"She serves as a really nice representation for that facility," Wiedel said.

## Mass tort attorney holds meetings on Syngenta

The Syngenta saga continues on with an attorney from Minnesota rolling through Thayer County to hold informational meetings on a mass tort lawsuit representing over 40,000 individual plaintiffs against the Swiss-based agri-business.

"We sent out letters to all corn farmers," Attorney Christopher Poynor said of the meetings he is holding in every corn-producing county three times a day. Prior to visiting Hebron last week, Poynor held meetings in Hastings, Sutton

and Superior.

No one showed at the Hebron stop, which was held at the Stastny Community Center July 28. Poynor said attendance has been unpredictable.

That may be because the issues with Syngenta have permeated the corn-growing community across the nation since 2014.

The mass tort, which is similar to a class action lawsuit — except the violation stems from a single defendant — was filed in March of 2015 in Hennepin County, Minn., and covers the genetic trait, MIR162, used in corn seed by Syngenta to combat insects.

China, the United States' largest single corn customer at that time, began refusing corn imports, which resulted in a market plunge. Corn prices went from \$7 a bushel to less than \$3 and has never recovered.

Syngenta is accused in the lawsuit for using the trait "without adequate precautions to prevent contamination of the U.S. corn and corn seed supplies; with the knowledge that (Agrisure) Viptera and Duracade corn would contaminate other non-genetically modified corn; with the knowledge that such contamination would likely affect the United States corn and corn seed supply; and with

the knowledge there was substantial risk of contamination of the United States corn and corn seed supply earmarked for export."

The lawsuit also contends the Syngenta committed common law negligence; tortious interference with prospective economic advantage; and violation of the Minnesota Uniform Deceptive Trade Practices Act.

Poynor said Syngenta told the United States Department of Agriculture it would design a stewardship program to put strict controls on the seed so it wouldn't infiltrate the general grain supply. Once Syngenta was approved for the program, it failed to place controls on the genetic corn.

According to a Cargill news release on its website, Cargill alleges Syngenta did not wait for China's approval on the product. Cargill filed a complaint in September of 2014 in Louisiana state court because that's where Agrisure Viptera left the United States shores' bound for China.

"Syngenta also put the ability of U.S. agriculture to serve global markets at risk, costing both Cargill and the entire U.S. agricultural industry significant damages," the president of Cargill Grain and Oilseed Supply Chain North America, Mark Stonacek, said.

The National Grain and Feed Association stated the loss suffered by farmers and U.S. exporters was up to \$2.9 billion as China entered a 13-month moratorium on accepting corn.

Poynor said Syngenta told the Wall Street Journal it had received approval for Agrisure Viptera.

"We need to hold Syngenta accountable. You can't play with the price of a commodity like that," he said. "On the analysis we've done, we're looking at \$.62 to \$1.30 per bushel for recovery."

# Pages of the Past...

## 1886

### 130 Years Ago

Vote for the railroad bonds Aug. 12 and secure competition.

Teams are going east through Hebron nearly every day to Fairbury to work on the Rock Island railroad.

Wetherald Bros. intend to start their new machinery next week. They have tested all of the machinery and pronounce it all right.

E. C. Dimick has purchased the ice cream outfit of Mr. Downen, and will continue to serve the people at the stand occupied by his predecessor.

The Thayer County Agricultural Society have purchased the south half of the southwest quarter of section 8, town 2, range 2, from B. F. Young for \$2,000.

Mr. Gerard, living near Hubbell, died last week after a short illness. His disease was very complicated, originating from a sprained ankle received when a boy.

Rev. W. R. Pierce administered the ordinance of baptism to sever persons on last Sabbath p.m. at Foster Ford; Mrs. Apel by immersion and the remainder by sprinkling.

The new St. Joseph barber, George A. Dorn, is doing a fair business in the Gilly building. He carries a stock of candies and cigars.

If you ask what is the news, the answer is that the Chicago & Rock Island is coming.

Who will oppose the bonds? First, those who have done little thinking for themselves, and second, those who prefer to buy the produce of the farmer at a low price to feed to stock.

Bonds mean money in the treasury and \$650,000 worth of taxable property added to the Hebron, Gilead and Spring Creek precincts, besides the increased value of the property now in these precincts.

One cannot help but mark the change that is constantly going on in the minds of our people regarding the bond question. At first there were quite a number who objected. Now, scarcely a dissenting voice is heard.

The new Methodist Church at Belvidere is to be dedicated next Sunday. This is a fine building 30 x 50 feet, is neatly finished and when completed with bell and furniture, organ, etc., will cost about \$2,000. Mr. Henry Warren was the boss builder, and has exercised great skill and care. The plans were furnished by the M. E. Church extension society.

Quite a number of our well-to-do farmers are feeling rather out of sorts about the daring of hunters in killing the stubble ducks (prairie chickens) which have grown and been fattened upon the grains they have raised. There is altogether too much recklessness on the part of hunters. A man certainly has the right to control his farm, and should be consulted by others who wish to take such liberties.

North County Line Notes: George Enslow is going to Ohio with a dry goods and grocery store...Bart Odell and George Whitman Sr. are selling fat beeves to the butcher at Strang. The price paid is three cents per pound.

All is quiet at Belvidere at present. The survey has been extended through town, and the grade stakes are set. One of the farmers of Belvidere precinct thus expresses himself: "We see the same spirit on the line from Hebron to Strang that is often manifest. Had the B&M asked for bonds or right of way they would have received it, but as they come on their own hook, they are extravagant in their charges for damages."

## 1896

### 120 Years Ago

Carleton: A. M. Dyer has been busy this week opening Gregg's elevator, and we are informed that he will have charge of it during the fall and winter.

Hubbell: We are pleased to know that our fellow townsman, Harvey Ford, has been allowed pension of \$12 a month and has received \$800 arrearages. No more worthy and deserving soldier were the blue during the rebellion...Pryce Owen started Tuesday to the north part of the state on a visit to a daughter. He got as far as Hebron where he was taken sick with the flux and

had to be brought home.

## 1906

### 110 Years Ago

Three hobo printers were in town Monday.

M. Bennett caught 15 catfish Wednesday.

Blackberries arriving daily on the 4 o'clock train.

Supt. Allen reports that Thayer County will be short about 25 teachers this year.

S. Fulton went to Grand Island Tuesday to enter the Old Soldiers Home at that place. He was accompanied by his daughter, Vera, and Comrade J. W. Hughes.

Mrs. I. M. Fry returned yesterday from Canada. Nebraska is good enough for her. Nothing can surpass the drawing power of home ties and old associations.

Gib Herrick returned Tuesday from Canada. He concluded that country was not good enough for him, so threw up his homestead under the sovereignty of King Edward and came back to live under the dominion of the Stars and Stripes.

Mr. Durham, who bought F. S. Johnson's store, has now sold out to Hutton & Bullock. The firm owns six merchandise stocks over the county.

A. L. Drinkwater and F. H. Harbican were down from Geneva Sunday in the six-horsepower automobile which Mr. Drinkwater has purchased for use in his livery stable. The editor acknowledges a pleasant spin.

Chas. Craig has purchased a 10-horsepower Cadillac automobile for his livery stable, and has been putting on airs this week. It carries six persons and is a dandy.

Doctor and Mrs. J. Lewis Webb are settling themselves in the old Mrs. Kleppinger property just east of the business part of the city. The doctor is a son of Dr. J. L. Webb of Beatrice, one of the oldest physicians in the state. The doctor is opening his office at his home for the present.

Hubbell: The B&M is having a side track put in at this station. The track will be over one-half mile long and will accommodate 100 or more cars. Frank Thomas' gang are now doing the grading.

Chester: A. W. Hindman and Chas. Briels went to St. Joseph, Mo., last Sunday. While there Asa purchased a Cadillac automobile and will now enjoy himself riding around in his new auto.

Carleton: Have you seen Mr. W. W. Lichty's new automobile buckboard? The chances are good that there will be several cars in and around town soon.

## 1916

### 100 Years Ago

The city authorities have been using a stop watch to stop speeding inside of the city limits. Several have been charged to appear before His Honor, Police Judge Whitney.

While coming to town with a load of wheat yesterday morning, Mr. Ehlers found Bert Archer in the roadway, bruised and covered with dust, about two and one-half miles out of town. Bert left town on his bicycle about 6 o'clock, to work at the Juedes farm. Bert claimed that an automobile struck him. He must have lain unconscious for about two hours.

Editor A. D. White of the Bruning Booster shows symptoms of plutocracy, having purchased a new six-cylinder Grant with which to chase down delinquent subscribers. Mr. and Mrs. White drove to Hebron yesterday, accompanied by Mr. Hewitt, who was teaching Mr. White to tame the blame thing so it wouldn't buck or balk with him. Mr. White takes charge of the Booster next week, and is now moving the plant into the Hewitt building.

Miss Dorothy Gallant turned out the blaze in a gasoline stove and ignited the gas, and the flames instantly ignited the gasoline can in Miss Dorothy's hands. She dropped the can onto the floor and her hands were burned slightly. The city's siren whistle soon had citizens and the fire lads at the fire. Neighbors with buckets extinguished the blaze in the kitchen, and the fire department made short work of the fire in the ceiling.

Sam Carpenter and John Wiggam of Belvidere came to Hebron Monday and filed

complaint against Stewart Reed's son for running automobile contrary to law, he being only 15 years of age.

Patrick J. Clifford died from the effects of sunstroke at his home in Hebron July 23, after an illness of 15 days.

Aug. Buck, six miles south of Hebron, has started work on his new frame bungalow.

## 1926

### 90 Years Ago

Hebron golfers claim one of the oldest, perhaps the oldest, golf clubs in the state of Nebraska, outside of the cities of Lincoln and Omaha. As early as 1912 or 1913, a few men got together, organized a club, with a course at Avalon Springs farm, which was then owned by the late Dr. Boyes. The arrangements for play were very crude as the membership was so limited that no extensive course could be laid out. The members of the first organization were Dr. Boyes, Dr. Ring, W. T. Hewitt, W. E. Boyes, D. E. Marsh, C. E. Day, Earl Young, C. C. Boyes, with possibly a few others whose names have been forgotten.

They played at the Avalon for several years, others being interested in that time, and the increasing popularity of the game attracting new players. About the year 1915, with a few new members, it was decided that a course more easily reached would be more desirable. A tract west of Hebron, just beyond the mill was leased and a short course laid out, making it necessary to double on several holes. At the end of three years enthusiastic playing, the members decided a larger course could be provided. The membership had increased materially and the club leased a 50-acre tract in Mrs. Zutter's pasture a short distance south of Hebron on the Meridian Highway. The topography of this tract made it ideal for use as a golf course, and considerable improvement has been made since that time.

Christ Christensen, 68 years old, was found dead in his farm home about two and one half miles southwest of Hebron, Thursday morning, when his brother, Hans, arrived from Soldier, Iowa, in response to a letter urging him to come. It is believed that the death was natural, resulting, probably, from a sudden attack of illness.

Monday evening about 6 o'clock, a heavy hail storm started in Thayer County near Bruning and moved in a southwesterly direction mowing down all vegetation in its path. From reports obtained at the present time, the principal damage was around Bruning and then a jump was made to the Friedensau district. The storm did much damage northeast of Bruning in the direction of Ohio. Byron and locality was struck also, either by the same storm or another one.

Alvin Ehlers, a young farmer residing north of Belvidere, was killed by lightning during the electric storm Monday evening. He was working with a threshing crew on the farm of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Anna Henrichs, six miles north of Deshler. He had finished pitching a load of bundles to the threshing machine and was standing on the rack when he was struck and knocked from the wagon. Alvin was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Emil Ehlers, pioneer residents of Friedensau. He leaves a wife and little daughter.

Miss Ruby Bergan, the daughter of Mrs. Evan Townsend, narrowly escaped death by drowning last Sunday in the river near the hydro-

electric plan. She was unable to swim and was using an inflated tube for floating and paddling across the deep places. She lost hold of the tube and sank. Warren Heimer pulled her out after she had gone down the second time.

M. Payses saw on Academy Day the culmination of another of his plans for a better Hebron College and Academy. This plan was the purchase of a fine electric pipe organ. The complete desire was realized when it was entirely paid for June, 1926.

## 1936

### 80 Years Ago

(The Alexandria Argus) Fire completely destroyed the barn on the Mrs. Blanche Jacques residence property in Alexandria last Saturday afternoon. It undoubtedly was caused from the sparks from a rubbish pile near the barn, which was thought put out. The fire made one of the hottest ever witnessed here, the barn burning up in a very short time. Attention was turned to protecting the house and other buildings. Fire sparks set fire to the roofs on the Edson Cane and Mrs. John Edwards residence, and men were stationed on the roofs to immediately put out the fires.

Fourteen counties in Nebraska, included Thayer County, have been added to the list of drouth areas by the agriculture department's drouth committee.

Following the lead of other villages and cities, milk in Alexandria took a 1c raise the first of August, advancing from 9c to 10c per quart. This is due to the extreme seriousness of the feed situations caused by the drouth.

## 1946

### 70 Years Ago

On Aug. 8, the Hebron Ball Diamond will be the scene of one of the worst massacres of the national pastime--baseball--in history. The reason for the above statement is the fact that Hebron Business (Wo)Men will tangle with the Hebron Town Team.

W. E. Herndon, 66, died on Thursday morning as a result of being run over by a team of young horses, Wednesday evening. Mr. Herndon lived south-

west of Hebron. The team, hitched to a mower, became frightened and started to run. He stepped in front of them to stop them. They knocked him down and ran over him. He was taken to the Fairbury hospital in the Hill ambulance. He died early Thursday from his injuries.

Appearing at the Majestic on Tuesday, Aug. 6, will be Texas Mary and the Texas Rangers.

## 1956

### 60 Years Ago

A two-car crash five miles northeast of Hebron took the life of a 31-year-old Hebron farmer and seriously injured a Hebron rural mail carrier. Homer Dittmer, father of three small children, was killed instantly in a near head-on collision and the driver of the other car, Harold Shearer, 60, a rural carrier here for 34 years, suffered severe injuries. The accident occurred at the top of a small hill on a gravel road three and a half miles east of the Norris sub-station on Highway 81. Both cars were complete demolished by the impact. The Dittmer vehicle remained upright, while the Shearer car rolled over at least once.

# Strength Training

If you want to reduce body fat, increase lean muscle mass and burn calories more efficiently, strength training should be part of your overall fitness program. For all of us, lean muscle mass naturally diminishes with age. Strength training can help you preserve and enhance your muscle mass at any age by helping you:

Develop strong bones. By stressing your bones, strength training can increase bone density.

Research suggests that regular strength training and aerobic exercise may help improve thinking and learning skills for older adults.

Strength training can be done at home or in the gym. Common choices include:

Body weight. You can do many exercises with little or no equipment. Try pushups, pullups, abdominal crunches and leg squats.

Resistance tubing. Resistance tubing is inexpensive, lightweight tubing that provides resistance when stretched. You can choose from many types of resistance tubes in nearly any sporting goods store.

Free weights. Barbells and dumbbells are classic strength training tools.

Weight machines. Most fitness centers offer various resistance machines. You can



also invest in weight machines for use at home.

It is important to know you will gradually increase the percentage of fat in your body if you don't do anything to replace the lean muscle you are naturally losing over time. If you have a chronic condition, are older than age 40 and or you haven't been active recently, check with your doctor before beginning a strength training or aerobic fitness program.

When beginning strength training, first warm up with brisk walking or another aerobic activity for five or 10 minutes. Cold muscles are more prone to injury. You should also choose a weight or resistance level that tires your muscles after 12 to 15 repetitions. When you can easily do more repetitions, gradually increase the weight or resistance.

To give your muscles time to recover, rest one full day between exercising each specific muscle group. Also, be careful to listen to your body. If a strength training exercise causes pain, stop the exercise. Consider trying a lower weight or trying it again in a few days.

Fitness centers have been designed to help you reach your strength training goals. As you incorporate strength training into your fitness routine, you will see an improvement in your overall strength. As your muscle mass increases, you'll likely be able to lift easier and for longer periods of time, even if you're not in shape when you began.

## Health alert ended for Big Indian Creek Lake, Swan Creek Lake 5A

The health alerts for Big Indian Creek Lake in Gage County and Swan Creek Lake #5A, (also known as Willard Meyer Recreational Area) in Saline County have ended. The beaches are open and swimming and other recreational activities can resume.

In the meantime, new alerts for Toxic Blue-Green Algae have been issued for Kirkman's Cove in Richardson County and Iron Horse Trail Lake in Pawnee County. The swimming beaches are closed at these locations. While recreational boating and fishing are permitted, the public should avoid activities that could cause accidental ingestion of water as well as full immersion in water.

The risks to humans come from external exposure and from swallowing the water. Symptoms from external exposure are skin rashes, lesions and blisters. Symptoms from ingestion can include headaches, nausea, muscular pains, central abdominal pain, diarrhea and vomiting.

Blue-green algal toxins have been known to persist in water for several weeks after the bloom has disappeared.

If you experience health symptoms, notify your physician. You can also contact the Nebraska Regional Poison Center at 800-222-1222 for more information. Testing results for all lakes can be found on the NDEQ website at <http://deq.ne.gov>

## Syngenta...

Syngenta claimed the lawsuits "were without merit," and "Agrisure Viptera has demonstrated major benefits for farmers."

Poynor said Syngenta's actions affected the entire corn spectrum from farmers to landlords, elevators and transporters.

"You don't have to have planted the Syngenta seed to be involved," he said. "The damage was done to everyone's corn price."

Two former presidents of the National Corn Growers Association have conflicting opinions on the lawsuits.

In an March 2015 agrisure.com article, one of the former presidents said the complaints were warranted because, "what happened was significant."

But former president and Kansas farmer, Ken McCauley, called out to farmers who are being recruited by attorneys to say, "no, no, no."

Farmers are "sending the wrong signal by joining the lawsuits," they are "selling biotechnology providers down the river."

According to agrisure.com, McCauley called farmers involved, "ambulance chasers," on Facebook.

Poynor said the toughest part of the case is listening to farmers. He knows of one whose family was affected by the 1980s Farm Crisis. The \$7 corn helped the farmer buy back land lost in the crisis.

"Now, he's right back where he started," Poynor said.

## Migratory bird hunters must register for HIP

Hunters of migratory birds are reminded of their requirement to register for the Harvest Information Program (HIP). Registration began Aug. 1.

HIP registration is required of residents age 16 and older and all nonresidents who plan to hunt migratory game birds in Nebraska between Aug. 1, 2016 and July 31, 2017. These birds are doves, ducks, geese, snipe, rail, coots and woodcock. Among those who must register in Nebraska are hunters registered in another state and holders of lifetime, 64-and-over veteran, and 69-and-over senior permits.

HIP, which is required by federal regulation of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, helps wildlife managers estimate the number of migratory birds harvested each year. Those estimates help biologists set limits and seasons.

Register for the free program at [OutdoorNebraska.gov/HIP](http://OutdoorNebraska.gov/HIP) or call toll-free at 877-634-8687. Registered hunters are assigned a number that they must carry with them while hunting.

## Upland bird harvest up in 2015

Nebraska's upland bird harvest saw a big increase between the 2014 and 2015 seasons, and hunter participation was up as well, according to results from the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission's annual hunter harvest survey.

Pheasant harvest was up by 26 percent. During the 2015 season, 166,285 rooster pheasants were harvested, compared to 131,423 during the 2014 season. Quail harvest increased by 73 percent, with 91,472 quail harvested in 2015, compared to 52,947 birds in 2014.

In addition, resident small game permit sales were up in 2015 by two percent and non-resident small game permits were up by 23 percent.

"To see such large increases in upland bird harvests shows that our pheasant and quail populations are rebounding from the harsh drought of 2012, and that hunters are taking notice," said Karie

Decker, interim Wildlife Division Administrator for the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission. "We are hopeful this is the beginning of an upward trend."

Early reports indicate that 2015-16 overwinter survival was good for pheasants, quail and other upland game in Nebraska. The April Rural Mail Carriers Survey showed population levels similar to last spring. A second Rural Mail Carriers Survey, combined with pheasant and quail breeding surveys, will provide more details about this fall's upland game outlook.

Additionally, earlier this year, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission unveiled The Berggren Plan for Pheasants, an aggressive and innovative five-year pheasant management plan. The Berggren Plan strives to provide the best pheasant hunting experience for the most hunters by growing pheasant populations and increasing the quality and

quantity of upland bird habitat. Habitat improvement work has already begun in several areas across the state, with much more to be done in the coming years.

"This is an exciting time to be an upland game hunter in Nebraska," Decker said.
