Murray assigned first murder case

Benjamin Murray of Germer, Murray and Johnson, was assigned to defend Aubrey Trail, the 51-year-old man charged with the first degree murder of Sydney Loofoe, 24, and improper disposal of human skeletal remains.

Murray and his father, Joe, were appointed to defend Trail, who along with Bailey Boswell, 24, are accused of Loofoe's murder. The case is currently in Saline County, where Trail and Boswell rented an apartment in Wilber.

It's his first murder case, but Murray has defended Class I felonies that carry life terms before.

"Most of the procedural stuff is the same for any case from the lowest to the highest," he said.

He'll consult with Joe Murray on what he doesn't know since his father has defended capital punishment cases before. Joe Murray has practiced law for 44 years.

Murray said the court most likely appointed both of them because it's easier to have two attorneys from the same office.

The case has gone national. Murray talked to CNN. He was also contacted by the Washington Post and 48 Hours.

It certainly is material for a

program like 48 Hours. Loofoe was reported missing Nov. 16, 2017. The probable cause affidavit filed in Saline County Court June 11 states Boswell saw Loofoe sometime after Loofoe left work Nov. 15, 2017. That night, Loofoe's cell phone was pinged near Wilber, where Trail and Boswell lived.

A search warrant served at the apartment Nov. 19, revealed walls that appeared to be wiped down and the landlord's remark about a "strong odor" of bleach the day Loofoe was reported missing, and the following day.

Meanwhile, Trail and Boswell were on the move, traveling to several towns in Nebraska, Iowa and Missouri. They were also communicating with reporters in Nebraska via video and telephone.

Police, the FBI and US Marshals caught up to Trail and Boswell in Branson, Mo., and transported them to Saline County in early December.

On Dec. 4, part of Loofoe's remains were discovered in rural Clay County. More remains in garbage bags would eventually be recovered. Officials believe Loofoe's remains were disposed of Nov. 16 because the investigation showed

Boswell accessed her Tinder dating app in the area. She had met Loofoe through the app, using the alias, "Audrey."

A camera at the Home Depot in north Lincoln also showed Trail and Boswell purchasing tools and supplies Nov. 15 believed to have been used in the dismemberment of Loofoe.

An autopsy determined her death was caused by homicidal violence, including strangulation.

The affidavit states Trail acknowledged to investigators he strangled Loofoe with an extension cord. He said Boswell cleaned the apartment and helped him dispose of Loofoe.

Trail and Boswell were also wanted for bilking a Kansas couple out of approximately \$400,000. They were sentenced in U.S. District Court — Boswell to five years in prison and Trail for 10 — in Lincoln last week.

For now, Murray said there is a pretrial hearing Aug. 20 and motions, if needed, will be filed. Trail pleaded not guilty in Loofoe's death.

He has just one box of evidence and is expecting a lot more from the Lancaster County Sheriff, Nebraska

Asbestos report needed for buildings

The Hebron City Council heard from John Levendofsky and Alan Johnson about the crumbling buildings they own on 4th Street, which have made it to the city's list of nuisances and are slated to be demolished.

"My plan is to tear it down," Levendofsky said about his building. "But we can't really do anything until that report is done."

Johnson chimed in the asbestos inspection was completed last week. Mayor Shane Day then made a call to the inspector and said the report should be done next week.

Levendofsky also said the sidewalks would be damaged during the demolition and will need replacing.

Johnson asked the council if it could help with the junk vehicles and camper tops behind the building.

"We don't want anything to do with this," city attorney Joe Murray said. "That is your responsibility."

"Everyone in the neighborhood is going to benefit from this process," Councilmember Larry Fangmeier said.

On another property at 310 Jefferson Ave., Councilmember Kurk Wiedel told owner Tim Hartley the problem is a revolving story line.

"I wouldn't rent that property," Wiedel said.

"I had it sold once and they backed out. It has been cleaned up for at least two weeks," Hartley said.

"Why don't you get rid of the property? I have people interested in buying it," Wiedel said before the council tabled the matter until September.

Family members of a third nuisance property at 220 S. 6th St., were at the council meeting as well. The owner of the property passed away and his son, who is the military in Wisconsin, was the sole heir. Since the owner was never served, the council tabled the property, along with a second property for the same owner at 340 S. 6th St.

A new owner is waiting to close on the nuisance property at 535 Jefferson Ave. He plans to begin construction on that day.

"In two or three months, it will be done," he said. The property will be a rental. The council tabled to allow 30 days for the purchase and construction to begin.

In other business, former city clerk, Marcy Welch, attended the meeting to ask about her days of sick time. Last month, Welch was told she shouldn't have to ask by councilmember Tim Pickering.

Regardless, there was a brief discussion before the council ruled the issue would be on September's agenda because it didn't have a majority of elected members to take a vote.

Councilmembers, Robert Dodes and Doug Huber were not at the meeting. Councilmember Denese Sudbeck was planning to abstain again because she worked in the city offices as a temporary treasurer. Sudbeck abstained last month on Welch's termination.

In other business, Gilead and Belvidere fire departments entered into an annual agreement with Hebron for \$2,000 each.

Next year, Hebron will celebrate its 150th birthday, chamber director Jana Tietjen reported. She also told the council about the upcoming Hunting Expo Aug. 26.

"He had a lot to show us, like old engines," Kirchhoff said.

Kirchhoff was driving a green Oliver 770, circa 1959, from Estherville, Iowa.

"I've been on quite a few drives. I was on five last year and this is the fourth one this year," he said.

Bohling was on his 1950 Farmall.

"We've got a little bit of ev-

erything here. We do have a good variety," Bohling said.

Several of the drivers also embark on the 400-mile Tractor Relay of Nebraska every year.

This year, the caravan welcomed a driver from Alliance.

The annual tractor caravan has another part to it — Ron and Carol Krupicka's 1930 Model A that used to be Harry Weddel's.

Krupicka said he tries to tag along for the antique tractor ride each year. His "rat rod" Model A is part of his collection of vintage

Pages of the Past...

1888 130 Years Ago

Wednesday, Aug. 1, will be long remembered among local events, as the first excursion to Hebron by special train. At 10 o'clock the train of six coaches filled with picnickers from Fairmont, Geneva, Strang, Bruning and Belvidere arrived and were met at the train by a large number of Hebron people.

Orders were asked for and received to allow the train to proceed half a mile beyond town, near the picnic grounds on Spring Creek, where the excursionists got off the train and proceeded with lunch baskets to the grounds.

Here much work had been done by the energetic committee in charge -- Messrs. Gates, Hendershot and Steele, Seats, platforms and a liberal supply of ice water had been provided. A dam had been made in Spring Creek, affording a long narrow lake for boating purposes and several boats had been brought over from the river.

After the crowd had arrived, the people were called to order by Rev. Blayney, and J. F. Gates was elected chairman. E. M. Correll was then called on to make the address of welcome, after which the convention part of the proceedings was adjourned until 2 o'clock. In the meantime sociability, amusements and the ever welcome picnic occupied the time.

At 2 o'clock the meeting was again called to order and addresses by Rev. H. S. Wannamaker of Geneva and Rev. Blayney, Rev. Barger and J. F. Gates of Hebron, after which the children were all served with ice cream, and the Geneva band favored the audience with a series of fine selections.

A number of picnickers went bathing, many tried fishing and a large number took rides on the steamboat which made trips every half hour.

At 6:30 o'clock, in the afternoon, the train backed down from Hebron to the picnic stopping place and the excursionists again got aboard. Instead, however, of getting away, they were compelled to sidetrack here and wait until about 11 o'clock for another engine, the one they had not being able to overcome the grade up out of the valley. The excursionists were warm in their praise of the Hebron groves, streams and people.

1898 120 Years Ago

Carleton: A lodge of the Sons and Daughters of Protection was organized here last night with the following officers: L. H. Waterman,

president; Mrs. Millie Hitt, vice-president; Mrs. Etta Yearnshaw, past president; W. G. Palmer, secretary; Mrs. Etta Yearnshaw, treasurer; W. Hickok, marshal; Mrs. Mary Quockenust, I.G.; C. E. Yearnshaw, O.G.; Rev. C.P. Metcalf, Chaplain. This lodge starts out with 12 members...Ethan Allen has enlisted under the stars and stripes to fight the enemies of Uncle Sam...Frank Deaver has enlisted in the U.S. army and will follow old glory during the present trouble with Spain...General Weyler, the Spanish butcher, was hanged in effigy in the public square here last night and his limp form was shot full of holes and afterwards burned to ashes and his ashes scattered to the four winds of heaven so to speak. While we do not approve of the act, we do not see any particular harm in the boys having a little fun. Care should be taken so that the news will not reach the general or he may become frightened and not come over to fight the U.S., which would be a sad disappointment to a large number of our soldiers. Keep it quiet boys...Arthur C. Smith received a telegram last Monday notifying him that he could secure a place in the Nebraska volunteers, if he would present himself at once. Art lost no time in making his preparation to avail himself of the opportunity, by tying his team to the fence made haste to leave on the morning train... We now have a fullfledged saloon in our midst and are running a little side show to the hell Satan runs for the unregenerate...The town board meeting Friday night, at which the ladies presented their remonstrance against a saloon, was a disgrace to a civilized community. The town board was not alone to blame. Much might be said on both sides of the question.

Gilead: A Supreme Court of Honor No. 707 was organized here on last Saturday evening...The Presbyterian minister of Alexandria has promised to preach here occasionally if Gilead's good people desire. I would say here, "We do"...The medicine show here is very good. The ladies nail driving contest on Tuesday eve was a very curious feature...Mr. Marschal has set the Gilead citizens a good example of public spiritedness, by purchasing the lumber and laying a good sidewalk the length of his lot. "Still there's more to follow." Amen and amen.

1908 110 Years Ago

During times of adversity the true human element comes to the surface,

manifesting itself in deeds of kindness and real charity. After the cyclones, it seemed as if all the victims neighbors were good angels in disguise, assisting and caring for the unfortunate and distressed.

H. J. Struve of Deshler performed a splendid act of worthy philanthropy after the cyclone. Out of gratitude that the broom factory and his personal possessions had been spared, he presented checks to all the sufferers from the Kansas line to the Blue.

1918 100 Years Ago

After caring for the children for a period of six months, the action can be legalized for adoption.

What is a concussion? A concussion is a type of traumatic brain injury that is caused by a blow to the head or body, a fall, or another injury that jars or shakes the brain inside the skull. Although there may be cuts or bruises on the head or face, there may be no other visible signs of a brain injury.
 You don't have to pass out (lose consciousness) to have a concussion. Some people will have obvious symptoms of a concussion, such as passing out or forgetting what happened right before the injury. But other people won't. With rest, most people fully recover from a concussion. Some people recover within a few hours. Other people take a few weeks to recover.



happen while participating in any sport or activity such as football, boxing, hockey, soccer, skiing or snowboarding.
 What are the symptoms? It is not always easy to know if someone has a concussion. You don't have to pass out (lose consciousness) to have a concussion. Symptoms of a concussion range from mild to severe and can last for hours, days, weeks, or even months. If you notice any symptoms of a concussion, contact your healthcare provider.
 To help protect young student athletes, the Nebraska's Concussion Awareness Act became effective July 1, 2012. It mandates concussion education for coaches, parents and players. It also sets rules of play for youth suspected of having a concussion, spelling out how coaches will handle suspected concussions and that young athletes are not allowed to return to play until written approval from an appropriate licensed healthcare professional and the youth's parent or guardian is obtained.
 The new mandates are in place because concussions are serious business. If there is any indication that an athlete may have suffered a 'ding' or "blow to the head," it is imperative that they be properly evaluated for a possible concussion to avoid any problems down the road. One of the best ways to deal with head injuries is to be prepared. Know the facts, and have an action plan ready.

It's important to know that after a concussion the brain is more sensitive to damage. So while you are recovering, be sure to avoid activities that might injure you again. In rare cases, concussions also cause more serious problems. Repeated concussions or a severe concussion may lead to long-lasting problems with movement, learning, or speaking. Because of the small chance of serious problems, it is important to contact a doctor if you or someone you know has symptoms of a concussion.
 What causes a concussion? Your brain is a soft organ that is surrounded by spinal fluid and protected by your hard skull. Normally, the fluid around your brain acts like a cushion that keeps your brain from banging into your skull. But if your head or your body is hit hard, your brain can crash into your skull and be injured.
 There are many ways to get a concussion. Some common ways include fights, falls, playground injuries, car crashes and bike accidents. Concussions can also

Squirrel season a great introduction for new hunters

Small game, particularly squirrel, is a great way to introduce youth or novices to hunting. Skills, equipment and licensing are more basic than other types of hunting.
 "A hand-me-down .22 rifle or smaller gauge shotgun and almost any hardwood stand of trees can offer a successful endeavor for a new hunter," Nebraska Game and Parks Commission Hunter Education Coordinator Jackson Ellis said.
 Squirrel season - Aug. 1 through Jan. 31, 2019 - is the first of Nebraska's fall hunting seasons. This leaves the hunting woods available to novices and their mentors.
 "The skills that can be learned in pursuit of these tree-dwellers can quickly have you advancing to larger game species, such as turkey and deer, once your confidence and experience grows," Ellis said.
 Nebraska residents younger than age 16 can harvest squirrels without a hunt (small game) permit or Nebraska Habitat Stamp. Residents 16 and above and all nonresidents require the permit and stamp. A Hunter Education certificate is required for anyone age 12 through 29 who hunts with a firearm.
 Squirrels may be hunted statewide, but no hunting is

allowed on state refuges and sanctuaries. The daily bag limit is seven squirrels, and the possession limit is 28.
 Before a hunt, scout locations for trees that bear mast, as it could pay off when it is time to hunt. Squirrels prefer to eat the nuts of oaks, hickories and walnuts. They will eat other types of nuts and fruit when preferred food types are not available.
 Experienced and inexperienced hunters alike should follow the basic rules of firearm safety:
 -- Treat every firearm as if it were loaded.
 -- Always point the muzzle in a safe direction.
 -- Be sure of your target and what is beyond it.
 -- Keep your finger outside the trigger guard until you are ready to shoot.
 "Taking a new hunter along on a squirrel hunt in the woods also develops a novice's sense of stewardship of natural resources and appreciation for conservation," Ellis said.
 Hunt permits may be purchased at OutdoorNebraska.org. Read the 2018-2019 Small Game Guide at Outdoornebraska.gov/guides for more hunting information.

Betty's wishes were to be cremated.


