New website shows electric bill savings

Wind Is Water, a nonprofit organization has launched www.NebraskaPowerToChoose.org, an interactive website Nebraskans can visit to see an estimate of how much money they could save if the state had a competitive arena for ratepayer dollars.

"Unfortunately, as we all know, Nebraskans don't have competition for their electricity bills, Michael Matheson, Wind Is Water Executive Director, said. "With the low electricity prices from the energy market, that is mostly due to low cost renewable energy and low natural gas prices, Nebraskans are not receiving the benefits of lower cost electricity. In Nebraska, we are mostly stuck in the last century and huge rate increases since 2009 have increased rates more than they should have risen."

Wind Is Water claims Nebraskans have suffered several million dollars in rate increases since 2009. The increases have affected seniors living on fixed incomes, working families who need the money for clothes, gasoline and home improvements and have caused businesses to be less competitive, preventing new hires and facility improvements.

The website serves consumers, who can compare what they are over-paying to what a competitive provider would charge, given they had a choice.

"This is a non-partisan issue and one of simple fairness. The ability to choose works for all Nebraskans," Matheson said.

Bruning-Davenport gears up for beef

In a state where cattle is the top commodity and outnumbers actual people nearly four to one, Producer Gina Hudson wonders why more Nebraska students aren't eating homegrown beef in their school lunches.

After hearing Thayer Central's Nebraska beef to school lunch plan, Hudson started researching the concept for Bruning-Davenport and asked Mark Jagels, another producer to help her.

Bruning-Davenport School was receptive to the idea of giving students a better protein product, Hudson said.

The school board gave its stamp of approval in October, Superintendent Trudy Clark said.

"It will be used as an educational piece as well," Clark said.

"We're really wanting to hit the agricultural education part of it," Hudson said.

Clark said Bruning's FFA program is strong and Agricultural Teacher Siera Meyer is more than willing to work with the club's mission.

Not only will students eat Nebraska beef, they'll learn about how that beef made it to their plates and its nutritional value.

Hudson said there are great advantages to the program.

Jagels said they are educating the next generation on the importance of a healthy diet.

They organized the Bruning-Davenport Beef Boosters Club to start raising funds for a three-year plan to implement Nebraska beef in the school's lunches.

Hudson said they estimated the program would need \$25,000 to sustain itself for three years.

She said they have raised half through donations made to the Beef Boosters Club through the Bruning and Davenport community foundations.

The club will use McClean Beef, a United States Department of Agriculture certified processor, to purchase and process the beef.

Hudson said the McCleans are excited to be included. Her goal is for

the McCleans to have an entire pen of cattle earmarked for the school's lunches.

Bruning-Davenport Principal Erik Sokol is excited as well.

"We're flexible as far as the educational component of it. I know a lot of people have put in the effort to make this possible to do something great for our kids," he said.

Jagels said the ongoing goal is for parents, patrons of the school district and businesses to continue to see the importance of serving Nebraska beef

and become a part of the process.

Along with educating students about beef, they will also learn crop production, Jagels said.

The educational portion of the program will give children an understanding of the different practices out there, he said.

"It's about respecting each other's practices, whether it's conventional or organic," Jagels said.

"It's nice for the kids to hear what beef can do for them," Hudson said.

Ray Kirkland has opened The Variety Store, a catch-all of old, new and handcrafted goods at 328 Lincoln Avenue.

It was just last month Kirkland started cleaning the building out to make room for his inventory, which ranges from furniture to antiques and china to personal items and Christmas decorations. He was ready to open in just under two weeks with the help of his family, who filled the store's shelves.

Business has picked up a little every day, Kirkland said.

The building isn't quite ready - Kirkland said the walls will be painted.

"We still have a lot of work to do," he said.

Behind the front part of the store are three large rooms and additional space between Kirkland and the building to the west.

Originally from Texas, Kirkland said he spent his entire life in the oil business. But his grandfather's antique store was an inspiration.

"And here it is," he said.

His first dollar earned is tacked on the wall. Kirkland said he feels

"Everybody's been great to us," he said.

One of Kirkland's pastimes is added to the mix of framed pictures that line the walls, three different sizes of vintage egg baskets, lamps and porcelain dolls.

Kirkland builds furniture decorated in a western flavor.

"It's just something I've always done," he said.

He handcrafts saddle racks, origi-

nal looking hat racks and cedar boxes with rolltops. Kirkland's NFL cedar boxes have sold well too, he said.

The shop's hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., every day except Tuesdays and Sundays.

On Tuesdays, Kirkland can be found helping out with the Food Bank of Lincoln's stops in the area, along with his mother, sister and brother-in-law.

"I like to give back a little bit," he said.

He'll also give back through the shop's excess inventory. Kirkland said he plans to donate the items to Things and Stuff or Blue Valley Community Action.

"There's good people at both places," he said.

1885

130 Years Ago

Friday was rather windy! Hon. M. Savage has been appointed manager of the opera house.

Commissioner J. G. Lyford has gone to Massachusetts to visit his wife and children.

The fire-limit ordinance ordained by the Board of Trustees of Hebron appears in this issue. The board is doing wisely and well in thus providing for the future protection of the town.

The side walls of the opera house are being braced to prevent their spreading by the weight of the roof. If the fault is in imperfect workmanship, the contractor is probably liable for damages.

During the past week, a force of men have been busily engaged in excavating a cellar in H. M. Coon's business lot, opposite S. H. Coon's drug store. Mr. Coon will erect a two-story brick building 23 1/2 ft x 80 feet, that will cost about \$4,500 when completed.

The new packing house of Coon Brothers will be opened early next week. Mr. David Coon and C. B. Coon are the proprietors, and Ben Hill is the foreman. The house is a neat structure, and is divided into several compartments, viz: cutting, butchering, etc. About 100 hogs a day can be manipulated and turned into sausage, bacon, long clears, hams, shoulders, etc. The house is very compact and well arranged. A 15-horse power engine and boiler supply the power necessary to run the machinery. Messrs. Coon will invite the public to inspect the working of the establishment. Last Sunday some boys or men stole all the steam fixtures and threw them into an adjoining well.

The members of Rescue Hook & Ladder Company are under obligations to Artist Griffin for a copy of his fine photographic view of the ruins of the fire. It is a little token that is appreciated by the boys, and when framed will be of the past and warning for the future.

The silk hat platoon of Hebron is organized and the following have become members: C. C. Fletcher, John Dorsey, Clat Alexander, Harry Casad, Jacob Werner, Arthur Past.

The Blue Valley Band is becoming first-class in every particular. Much is due to Harry Casad.

The Belvidere band has engaged the services of Harry Casad as instructor. Mr. Casad is one of the finest cornet soloists in the state, and we congratulate the Belvidere boys upon their good fortune.

The post office is now located in the McLaughlin building. Thompson Brothers are occupying their new store building on Lincoln Avenue. John Segin will open his restaurant this week in the building recently occupied by A. J. Skipper.

120 Years Ago

E. A. Hopper & Co., is a new firm at Gilead, having bought the stock of H. Blanken at that place. They will stock up and carry everything usually found in a general merchandise store.

The "Garmire Twins," Beatrice and Bernice, entertained about 40 of their little friends last Saturday, the occasion being the seventh birthday of the twins. Games, refreshments and a good time generally made the day one long to be remembered by the little ones.

Dr. F. E. Fannan started Wednesday for Colorado, and after a brief stay there will

go to California, hoping the climate may benefit his failing health, and his many friends join him in the hope. An able dentist is left in his office to attend to the work there.

Ed. Shearer, among his many other business enterprises, is finding time to build large ice houses at the river, to store the ice which he will need for his extensive orders next summer.

A surprise party was given Byron A. Young, Wednesday evening, in honor of his 26th birthday. About 40 persons were present.

Married: Mr. Franklin J. Hole of Hebron, Neb., and Miss Agnes C. Atwood, of Mt. Clemens, Mich., were married at the home of the bride's mother at Mr. Clemens, Nov. 27th. Mr. and Mrs. Hole immediately started for their western home stopping a few days with friends in Chicago and St. Louis, arriving in Hebron on Tuesday. They went to the home already furnished by the groom, corner of Olive Avenue and Ninth Street, and have commenced housekeeping.

Mr. Thomas Robinson and Miss Agnes McIntyre, of Stoddard precinct, surprised their friends on thanksgiving by going to Beatrice and being married.

John A. Jury, residing about 4 1/2 miles northeast of Hebron, reports the loss of a dun mare, which, owing to the circumstances surrounding the death, is very deplorable. The horse was in good, healthy condition on last Friday night when Mr. Jury attended to the horses. On Saturday about noon, he went into the field to get the mare to drive to town, but failing to find her, he came to town with another horse. When nearing home he saw the mare lying dead, about 18 rods north of the stable. On examination it was found that the horse had been shot in the breast, between the forelegs, evidently aimed at the heart. Mr. Jury is satisfied in his own mind who did the dastardly deed, but he lacks the necessary proofs to convict the man. He therefore offers a \$50 reward to proofs that will lead to the man's conviction.

1925

90 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) Rev. Lammert Redelfs is having a busy time with his pastorate at Obetz Junction, Ohio, a suburb of Columbus. He accepted the post on Feb. 15 of this year and since that time has doubled his Sunday School attendance. Thirty-four adults were confirmed into membership last week.

G. W. Philippe slipped on the icy sidewalk and fractured his rib this week. He is laid up for repairs at present.

Harry Rasher, who has acted as agent for the Standard Oil Company here for the past two years, resigned that position this week. This week the family moved to Belvidere where 'tis said Harry will take a similar position with the Casper Oil Company of that village. Harry is a good man for his employer, and a desirable citizen whom we regret to lost from our community. Herman Philippi has taken the position with the Standard and may decide to give up farm life and move to town to care for his new work.

A few farmers in this vicinity have begun the harvest of their corn, but the majority are just getting things in readiness. The quality is reported excellent, and the quantity is going to be very satisfactory on many farms, while others report much to the contrary.

J. H. Casper informs us that he has discovered a 60-bushel field of corn in Thayer county. He accompanied a party from Deshler to the Ed Uphoff farm, eight mil southeast of Bruning and looked over a 50-acre field which he is sure will make 60 bushels per acre, and he believes is the best in Thayer County. The field is on new ground that was planted to wheat last fall. The wheat failed to materialize and was planted to corn with the above-mentioned prospects.

1935

80 Years Ago

A permanent concrete base was constructed this week for Bruning's Christmas tree, which for years has stood at the main intersection during the holiday season. Anchoring of the 30-foot tree has always been a problem. Rasmus Madson, local blacksmith, devised a self-locking strap iron and concrete base for the tree this year, which, when not in use, is covered over, leaving no obstruction in the street.

Members of Bruning's village board expressed extreme dissatisfaction with the quality of work done by WPA labor on the new village park at the regular meeting of the trustees Tuesday evening. "That fountain looks more like a bump on a log than a fountain, and it will have to be rebuilt or a new one erected before spring. It's a disgrace to the park," was the concensus of opinion Tuesday night. Members of the board decided to confer with WPA officials in regard to the ornament.

A livestock commission sales barn came close to actuality in Bruning this week when several business men and farmers pledged over \$2,000 for its construction. Promulgators of the sale are Fred H. Bruning, Roy A. Carter and J. W. Crays. Nothing has been done at this writing, definitely, but it is understood the group will organize a stock company to handle transactions and also provide for the erection of the building.

Best Safety Tip: Wear your Seatbelt!

As we approach the holiday season, we are reminded of the tremendous role safety plays in our lives. Hopefully, we all practice safety each time we get behind the wheel of a vehicle, but sometimes despite our best efforts, we find ourselves in situations where our safety is compromised. Maybe it's another driver not paying attention or a small distraction that takes our eyes off the road for just a split second.

In Nebraska wearing your seatbelt is the law. The driver, each front-seat occupant in the vehicle and all children six years of age and less than 18 years of age must wear a seat belt. Besides wearing your seatbelt being the law, there are still people who apparently believe the law doesn't apply to them or they are immune to the laws of physics. If a vehicle is traveling at 60 miles per hour, its contents and passengers are also moving at 60 miles per hour. If that vehicle suddenly stops, wearing a seatbelt can mean the difference between life and death.

The passengers in a vehicle are its most valuable contents and seatbelts are designed to keep them in place. In a crash, unbelted passengers fly toward the point of impact and collide with anything in their path: dashboards, windshield or steering wheels. While it's dangerous to smash into a dashboard or windshield, it can be more dangerous to be "thrown clear." Thrown clear of what? Telephone poles, trees, or oncoming traffic? Thrown through what? The windshield or door? Airborne objects maintain momentum as they travel without control over where or how they will land. In a collision, passengers launched from a vehicle are 25 times more likely to die.

In a vehicle accident, the safest place to be is inside the vehicle, attached to the vehicle's seat. It's the seatbelt that keeps passengers in place. In a collision, the one part of the vehicle that stays reasonably intact, no matter how battered the rest of it may become, is the vehicle's seats. Newer vehicles are equipped with airbags that work in con-



junction with seatbelts.

For high speeds, night time driving, and bad weather, many passengers do buckle up, but the fact is that most fatalities occur in dry, sunny weather, at speeds under 40 miles per hour and within 25 miles of work or home.

Perhaps you are a safe driver in control of your vehicle, but there are a lot of other drivers not in control of their vehicles. Drivers who've drank too much, are sleepy, or are distracted. You can't control other drivers. Seatbelts are your best protection against those drivers. Buckle up and protect yourself so you don't become another statistic in an accident. Seatbelts save lives! This statistic is proven over and over every day.

Deer sightings cause of three accidents

On Nov. 29, Heather M. Gregson of Jacksonville, Ark., was driving her 2004 Ford Mustang northbound on Highway 81 near Belvidere and slid on a bridge, skimming the guard rail. She hit the guard rail again while attempting to get back on the road. The car was towed, but the damage is unknown.




Pat and Betty reported no new information from Jefferson County Historical Society in regard to needed repair at Historic Dist. 10.
