It's official, say members of the Arts Council of Thayer County (ACT). The Majestic Theatre will be closing its doors and reopening as a new entity. "The new Majestic will be managed and operated by ACT," says council member Deb Cossaart. "It will be updated with digital equipment for sharper images, better quality and newer movies. In the future, ACT also hopes to host concerts, plays, student activities and events aimed toward the entertainment and inspiration of county residents and visitors."

ACT members are county residents who are excited to explore the possibilities that the theater can bring to help make the vision into a reality, Cossaart said. Currently the group is underway to establish organization as a non-profit entity before taking over management of the business.

"The anticipated date for reopening is Feb. 1," she added.

ACT member Crystal Fangmeier said the transition is taking place so quickly due to the support of several individuals. "Carla Gebers, (current Majestic owner) is helping the group learn the ropes of the theater business," Fangmeier said, "and Lois (Struve) Pederson (Struve Enterprises) has also been very helpful in providing for a smooth and quick transfer of the building to the Thayer County Arts Council."

The group does anticipate that the theater will shut down prior to ACT assuming management to allow for some maintenance such as fixing the roof, painting and other "chores" facing the group. Until then, Gebers will continue to operate the business

Chester man killed in Kansas crash

A Chester man was killed Wednesday morning after crashing into a semi tractor trailer on U.S. 81 near Belleville, Kan.

Stuart D. Sutton, 76, of Chester, was attempting to cross the highway at 9:31 a.m., Wednesday morning about one mile north of Belleville, when he ran his 1998 Chrysler sedan into a northbound 2005 Peterbilt semi truck being driven by Jack E. Zaloudek, 74, of Kremlin, Okla.

According to an accident report submitted by the Kansas Highway Patrol, Sutton was in the crossover lane between the southbound and northbound lanes of U.S. 81 when he entered the northbound lanes to cross to Marble Road. He drove his vehicle into the driver's side of the semi.

He was not wearing a safety belt and was ejected from the vehicle where he was found dead at the scene. His body was transported directly to the Bachelor-Surber-Dart Mortuary.

Zaloudek, who was wearing a

seatbelt, was not injured.

Sutton owned and operated Chester Spray, Inc., in Chester. Find his obituary inside this issue.

Deshler man charged with sex assault of minor

Two charges of sexual assault of a child were filed against Justin L. Schmidt in Thayer County this week. The 38-year-old Deshler man also faces two counts of incest. All four charges are felonies.

According to an arrest summary on file at the Thayer County courthouse, Schmidt is accused of assaulting his child between the dates of May 1, 2010 and May 1, 2011.

He is currently in jail on a \$250,000/10 percent bond. He is scheduled to appear for his arraignment in December.

1882

130 Years Ago

C.G. Peil of Davenport has sold his hardware store to G.G. Pratt, Mr. Peil will leave Davenport in the spring.

Elsewhere in our columns will be found the dissolution notice of Savage & Coffman, attorneys at law. Mr. Savage will continue the law business.

We announce with sadness the death of W.J.G Davis, a respected citizen who resided about five miles southwest of Hebron on Dry Creek. During his residence in Thayer County he had won the good will and respect of all who knew him by his intelligence, honesty and straight-forwardness. His illness was short and severe. His body was followed to its final resting place by a long procession of neighbors and friends who desired to testify by their attendance their appreciation of his good qualities.

Esquire Hendershot, one of the most successful trappers in the west, captured a beaver near town. Judging from their destruction of small timber along the streams, the beavers are again getting numerous.

Christmas and New Year's are rapidly approaching. It is time for you to buy presents for the children and pay the editor.

County Clerk A.F. Clemons advertises in this issue for sealed proposals for the superintendency of the poor and the working of the county poor farm for the term of one year from March 1, 1883.

The two families we spoke of in our last issue, as having been burned out by the overturning and burning of their canvas house on wheels and the destruction of their feather-renovating apparatus, are still staying with kind-hearted citizens on Dry Creek who are doing all in their power to alleviate their wants. Mrs. Hasbrook succeeded in raising some money by subscription for them.

The History of Nebraska, just published by the Western Historical Company of Chicago, Ill., is a complete history of Nebraska from the earliest territorial times down to the present. It is a large and elegantly bound work of 1,506 pages, printed on heavy tinted paper, sewed with silver thread and finely illustrated. Price, \$12.50.







Distracted Driving

Each day, more than 15 people are killed and another 1,200 people are injured in crashes that involve a distracted driver. Distracted driving is driving while doing another activity that takes your attention away from driving. These activities increase the chance of a motor vehicle accident.

There are three main types of distraction:

- Visual - taking your eyes off the road
- Manual - taking your hands off the wheel
- Cognitive - taking your mind off what you are doing.

Distracted driving activities include things like using a cell phone, texting, and eating. Using in-vehicle technologies (such as navigation systems) can also be a distraction. While any of these distractions are dangerous, texting while driving is especially dangerous because it combines all three types of distraction. Texting takes a driver's attention away from driving for longer periods than any other of the distraction looked at.

How big is the problem? In 2009, more than 5,400 people died in crashes involved a distracted driver and about 448,000 people were injured. Among those killed or injured in these crashes, nearly 1,000 deaths and 24,000 injuries included cell phone use. The number of drivers reportedly distracted at the time of a fatal crash has increased from 7 percent in 2005 to 11 percent in 2009. Younger, inexperienced drivers under the age of 20 account for the highest proportion of distraction-related fatal crashes.

A recent CDC study examined the frequency of two major distractions: cell phones and texting.

With cell phone they found 25 percent of drivers reported they "regularly or fairly often" talk on their cell phones while driving. 75 percent of drivers between ages of 18 to 29 reported that they talked on their cell phone while driving at least once in the past 30 days,

and nearly 40 percent reported that they talk on their cell phone "regularly" or "fairly often" while driving.

When the study looked at texting or e-mailing while driving, it found 9 percent of drivers reported texting or e-mailing "regularly or fairly often" while driving. 52 percent of drivers between the ages of 18-29 reported texting or e-mailing while driving at least once in the last 30 days, and more than 25 percent reported they text or e-mail "regularly" or "fairly often" while driving. When drivers read or send a text message, their reaction time is doubled. When asked to respond to a flashing light while texting behind the wheel, drivers were more than 11 times more likely to miss the light altogether.

To prevent texting while driving, many states have enacted laws such as banning texting while driving or using graduated driver licensing systems for teen drivers to help raise awareness about the dangers of distracted driving. Nebraska does not currently have a ban on handheld devices, but there is a statewide ban on all texting while driving.

Although many of us know texting while driving is dangerous, we still do it. That is why nationwide individuals, businesses and other organizations have begun a campaign to raise awareness and get drivers to sign a no texting pledge. This pledge is for all texting, sending and receiving while driving. The "It can Wait" campaign asks drivers to read the last text message they sent or received aloud. Then ask themselves if reading or responding to that text message from behind the wheel would be worth the risk of getting into a car accident or "Can it wait."




