## Fire board approves billing

The Hebron Rural Fire Board adopted a measure to bill for rural blazes at a meeting Dec. 2.

In the event of a fire, the rural landowner would receive a bill before turning it over to an insurance company.

"If they're already paying for insurance that includes fire, we want to utilize that resource instead of digging into someone's pocket," District 5 Board President Steve Tietjen said.

The volunteer fire department is trying to recoup some of the funds it is investing in fuel and equipment upkeep. Taxes are not sufficient enough to cover the department's expenses, especially when trucks go for nearly \$400,000.

It's not just fires. Tietjen said there are numerous accidents on the highway involving people from out of town, or if a truck blows a tire, a member of the department will direct traffic or help in another way. Fire vehicles could be parked for hours at a call.

"No one is receiving compensation for that," Tietjen said, except ambulances, which have billed for several years.

Fire Chief BJ Linton said emergency medical billing stayed the same for quite a few years until fuel prices rose.

Billing charges are divided between trucks, equipment and supplies.

A pumper truck, for example, is averaged in the industry at \$500 per hour. A grass rig is \$150 while an aerial ladder truck is \$750.

Bunker gear on the equipment list runs \$2,100 per hour. The Jaws of Life are \$250 an hour.

Foam runs anywhere from \$95 to \$165 per five gallons, depending on the class of foam used. Safety flares are \$10 each.

The fire board entered into a contract that will keep prices the same until changes are needed. In addition, the board can terminate the contract at any time.

The key is open communication with the public to remind them the bills are coming.

"Some people don't realize that this is in their policy," Tietjen said.

At the meeting, board members asked about fires or accidents that need mutual aid.

Currently, Hebron is the only department in the area to adopt billing for rural incidents. An agreement with other departments will iron out a split on mutual aid calls.

Hebron would receive a lump sum check from the billing and determine how to dole out percentages for mutual aid. One board member suggested billing could be incorporated into existing mutual aid agreements.

Tietjen said charging will also help with the department's ongoing expenses, such as insurance and other bills.

The Hebron Rural Fire Board works within a perimeter around Hebron. North and south boundaries are Roads G and Q. East and west boundaries are Roads 6600 to 5600.

## Council to modify dangerous dog law

The Hebron City Council said Monday it will revisit the city's dangerous dog ordinance, following a discussion that included members of the public on what constitutes a dangerous breed of dog.

The ordinance prohibits specific breeds of dogs that have been deemed dangerous — pit bull, bull terrier, Staffordshire bull terrier, American pit bull terrier, American Staffordshire terrier, chow, doberman, rottweiler, wolf and wolf hybrids.

The council included the issue on its agenda for the Dec. 7 meeting because of complaints, City Administrator Chris Fangmeier said.

The meeting was held at the Stastny Community Center as a trial run to see if council meetings could draw more attendance in a larger space. Turns out, there was quite a crowd, which thinned out after the discussion on dogs.

Councilman Kurk Wiedel wanted to know how the city should differentiate between safe and dangerous dogs.

"Where do you draw the line?" he said.

One couple recommended the city ticket owners who do not take precautions for the public's safety. The couple own a pit bull mix breed and have no worries the dog will harm anyone. They want the city to stop grouping dog owners and their dogs under a dangerous umbrella.

Thayer County Sheriff David Lee said if the city rules certain breeds

vicious, then the sheriff's office will have no choice but to enforce the law.

"I see both sides of this," he said. "The simplest of muzzles will keep an animal from biting."

"What we've got here is the sheriff has offered a compromise. If you're going to have this (dangerous) dog out, have a muzzle," Mayor Shane Day said.

Several dog owners at the meeting said they weren't allowed to license their dogs with the city because the dogs were on the dangerous list.

One owner said he had registered his pit bulls with the city for years and couldn't last year because now, they're on the list. He had copies of past years when he was allowed to register his pit bulls.

"Responsible dog owners should be OK," City Attorney Joe Murray told him.

"I think we should focus more on the dog and owner than the breed," Councilman Larry Fangmeier said.

In other business, several properties were declared nuisances by the city.

Property owner Dennis Phelps, whose trailer house is in the group, said his isn't the worst property in town. He presented the council with photographs of properties in Hebron.

"I spent two hours driving around town and taking photos," he said. "If you're going to do it for one, do it for all."

Phelps said there seems to be a common thread on the warnings he's been given because the fire

department wants his lots for a parking area.

"If you want the lots for parking, make an offer," he said.

But Hebron Fire Chief BJ Linton, who was at the meeting, said that Phelps' claim was simply not true.

Phelps asked the council for a three-month extension to repair the trailer and garage. He said he lives in Wahoo and works full time.

Wiedel asked about the milk tank on Phelps' property.

"The fence is not fixed," Wiedel added. "Personally, this does not need an agenda, guys. Declare this property a nuisance. He's had ample time to take care of this."

Wiedel said the property has been an issue for five years.

"We're not giving him three months," he said.

Phelps will receive a copy of the resolution to declare his property a nuisance and will have 15 days to complete the repairs.

Nothing will happen until the January meeting, Murray said about enforcement.

In another matter, Steve Anderson approached the council about increased parking at the Stastny center.

At large events, parking may overflow to 13th Street's paved shoulder. In addition, a grassy area has been earmarked for vehicles.

The council also had requests for two liquor licenses - Brand X and C and M Supply will be reviewed Dec. 17 at 12 p.m. during a special meeting of the council.

Additional items may be on the agenda for the special meeting.

## Keilwitz recalls 30 years of business at Pioneers Inn

The Pioneers Inn in Gilead has seen a lot over the last 30 years.

"People will stop in looking for their relatives buried in the cemetery or they're just looking for a place to eat," Owner Karen Keilwitz said.

Most of Keilwitz's business has been word of mouth.

"There's a lot of them," she smiled.

She and her husband Lyle bought the restaurant's 1887 building, that used to house and feed railroad workers, from Kevin Coordsen, who was

going into the airforce.

After throwing around a few ideas, the couple decided to call their new venture Pioneers Inn, or Pioneer Inn without the "S" as some folks call it.

They could see the town needed a restaurant. Besides, Keilwitz had always liked to cook. She liked people, too.

A high tin ceiling in the building's main room is evidence of days gone by when Gilead had a schoolhouse, elevator, gas station and the Hopalong was right next door.

The two businesses complemented each other and shared card tournaments, Keilwitz said.

Five years ago, Keilwitz knew she would have to close for a while. The floor and coolers were failing and it became a matter of safety. A state inspector had also told her to do something about the ceiling.

"We were closed for 10 days," she said. In that time, the community of Gilead came together for its only restaurant.

About 20 to 30 volunteers came in to tear up the floor and clean. Through donated labor and a community fundraiser, Pioneers Inn reopened.

Customers come in droves for the Inn's burger night when the restaurant easily serves over 100 people.

"Those are home-pattied," she

said about the burgers and most everything they cook or bake like pie. Her sister-in-law, Mary Flagle, makes the pies.

Sundays are big, too, with weekly buffet specials for the noon and evening meals.

After Jan. 1, Keilwitz will shrink the restaurant hours a bit and close the kitchen earlier. She said winter nights aren't terribly busy and it's tough finding help.

But she'll be open every morning at 8 a.m. for her coffee crowd.

Back when the elevator was open, Keilwitz said it was nothing to cook

The new Christian church at Belvidere will be dedicated next Sunday. Eld. Gleason will assist in the ceremonies and other citizens of Hebron will likely attend.

We hop all our farmer friends have provided suitable shelter for their stock this winter, and safely housed their machinery. If so, they can afford to laugh at the blustering storms.

Freeman & Mall have just received a costly and elegant hearse from the Rock Falls Manufacturing Company of Sterling, Ill. The body and running gear of the vehicle are painted a glistening black to represent polished ebony, and are silver mounted throughout. The sides of the body part consist each of a single piece of French plate glass. Inside, the woodwork is painted a gloss white. Heavy gold tassels and fringe and fine silver-plated bouquet holders and lamps give it a rich appearance. On top there are urns and plume holders, which with the beautiful black and white plumes, form a fitting ornament to the whole.

There was reported at this office this morning an incident, which, even though it may not a present prove a bonanza, may lead to developments that will discover gold in paying quantities. Albert Degner, who resides on this farm at Friedensau, about six miles west of Hebron, recently killed a duck. Upon opening the gizzard of the duck, a piece of gold, about the size of a grain of corn was discovered. Mr. Degner had been hauling sand from the banks of the river to do some plastering, and whether the duck picked the shining particle from the pile of sand, or whether it picked it up while rummaging along the river, is not known. The gold was well polished from the action of the sand and particles in the gizzard. Any other metal of this nature but gold would have turned black by the action of the acids in the stomach of the duck.

Alexandria: By a deal that was made this week between Geo. H. Danforth and A. C. Hubbard will move to Montana as soon as he can shape his affairs. He has bought the Danforth stock of clothing and will ship it to Modana where his son-in-law, W. C. Ovelman, lives, and intends to follow with his family and make his home there in the future. Mr. Hubbard is an old settler and good citizen and we dislike to see him go. Mr. Danforth gets the farm of Mr. Hubbard.

The War Department has notified the Thayer County Non-Stock Coop. Labor Association that the Side Camp at Hebron will be de-activated at the expiration of the present contract. The expiration date is Nov. 15. The first POW's were brought to Hebron early in December of 1943 by private individuals. In June of 1944, the Labor Association started operation as a cooperative and contracted for agriculture labor with the War Department. At the closing of the camp, the Labor Association has a membership of 370. P. W. labor has been a big help to the farmers in this area during the shortage of farm labor and there has been a heavy demand for their service. The POW's from the Hebron Side Camp will be sent to the base camp at Atlanta for repatriation to Germany.

# Stone trial set for February 16-19

Robert B. Creager, who is representing Harold Stone of Davenport, told Thayer County District Court Judge Vicky Johnson there won't be any plea agreements in the first degree sexual assault of a child charge Stone is facing in Thayer County District Court. Creager made the statement as Stone attended a pretrial hearing Dec. 3.

Stone, 58, entered a not guilty plea in September on the charge. He was arrested in June.

The case is being prosecuted by the state attorney general's office. Thayer County Attorney Dan Werner said he had a conflict of interest and requested a special deputy prosecutor.

Stone isn't due back in court until Jan. 7 when the district court judge will rule on a motion filed by the state to limit or prevent evidence from being introduced by the defense.

Stone's trial is scheduled for Feb. 16-19. Johnson returned two additional charges to Thayer County Court for a preliminary hearing, one of which will address child pornography.

First degree sexual assault of a child carries a penalty of 15 years to life imprisonment.

## ADDITIONAL ORDERS

Andrew B. Collins was revoked for his probation set Nov. 6, 2014 and modified June 12 on theft.

Collins had the chance to resolve his issues, Werner said.

Defense Attorney Benjamin Murray said Collins is not making excuses and everything he did was drug-related.

Collins said he has weaned himself off drugs and needs one last chance to prove himself to his children, family and the court.

Johnson said it is clear the problem is drugs and Collins is not a good candidate for probation.

Johnson sentenced Collins to serve not less than 18 months or more than 24 months. He was given credit for 49 days served and ordered to give a DNA sample if it had not already been taken.

Collins also pleaded not guilty to distribution of a controlled substance and failure to appear.

Brenda G. Williams had her probation extended and modified for another six

months. She began her probation Feb. 5.

Werner said clearly, the problem is alcohol.

Williams said she has engaged a sponsor and will continue aftercare and going to meetings.

Johnson said Williams must pay for chemical testing and monthly probation fees, continue her aftercare and working with her sponsor. She must provide proof she attended treatment.

Darren L. Vogel will spend not less than 20 months or more than 36 months in jail for strangulation and 300 days for domestic assault despite a letter from Vogel's victim.

Werner said the victim's statements were inconsistent with her earlier statements that Vogel had assaulted her.

Murray said the victim has given five different accounts on the initial incident, and Vogel wanted to be considered for probation to take care of his underlying drug and alcohol problems.

Johnson said she is thoroughly convinced Vogel perpetrated a crime of violence and he has a long history of "pushing the envelope of that violence." She said he has 19 infractions on his record, past probation has gone unsuccessful and the current offense was drug-related.

Vogel signed a Notice Upon Conviction of a Crime Involving Domestic Violence form. It is now illegal for him to possess a firearm.

He was also ordered to submit DNA and his fingerprints.

Gary F. Little III asked the judge for another chance at probation, stemming from a theft charge.

Murray said Little missed his probation requirements because he isn't allowed to drive, and he is prepared to fully comply.

Little added he is employed and if he lost his job, he would also lose his ability to pay child support.

Johnson said his probation effort was "much less than stellar."

He was sentenced to not less than 200 days in jail with 99 days credit.

Little was also ordered to submit a DNA sample, which was completed.

# National Impaired Driving Prevention Month

December is National Impaired Driving Prevention Month. In the past couple of decades, we have made great strides in spreading the message that driving drunk is dangerous and is a serious public health risk to everyone on the road.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), it is estimated that one-third of all traffic-related deaths were the result of impaired driving. This amounts to one death every 51 minutes.

Impaired driving accidents can be avoided by making smart choices. If you are at a holiday party, think about how much alcohol you consume and have arrangements and back-up plans if you are impaired and unable to drive a vehicle. x

However, driving is not just impaired by alcohol consumption. Our ability to safely drive a motor vehicle can also be impacted by drugs; illegal and prescription drugs. When you drive drunk or drugged, you aren't just putting yourself at risk, you are endangering everyone in your vehicle and on the road.

If you're hosting a party this holiday season, take steps to keep your friends safe and make sure no one from your party drinks and then drives. To help reduce the risk of alcohol-related driving accidents this holiday season, using the following tips can help you and your friends stay safe:

- Let your guests know ahead of time how you feel about drinking and driving and their need to be responsible about their alcohol consumption.
- As guests RSVP, remind them of the importance of a designated driver.
- Plan activities to engage your guests and take the focus away from drinking.
- Provide plenty of high-



protein foods, like cheese and meats, to help slow the absorption of alcohol and to keep guests from drinking too much on an empty stomach.

- Avoid salty snacks like potato chips and pretzels that can cause guests to drink more.

- Offer unique, non-alcoholic beverages, or "mocktails," for designated drivers and others who prefer not to drink alcohol.

- If preparing an alcoholic punch, use a fruit juice instead of a carbonated base that speeds the absorption of alcohol into the blood stream.

- Make sure you have designated drivers or plan to drive intoxicated party goes home yourself.

- If necessary, make arrangements for guests who have had too much to drink to stay over.

Remember, if you are the host, you are responsible for the safety of your guests, and in some cases, their actions when they leave your party.

Good hosts don't drink too much. They also never serve alcohol to someone under the legal drinking age. If you have underage guests, keep all alcohol in a central, visible place, where they can't "sneak" a drink. Never ask children to serve alcohol at parties.

If possible, don't let guests mix their own drinks. If a guest is drinking too much, offer to refresh their drink with a non-alcoholic version.

If at all possible, stop serving alcohol 90 minutes before the end of the party. You can always end the party by serving coffee and dessert. This will help give your guests time to get sober before leaving.

Responsible holiday hosting helps to ensure that you and your guests have fun celebrating, but also staying safe and avoiding senseless tragedies. Planning ahead will help insure everyone at your party has a safe and Happy New Year.

## Father Hupp WMA reopened at Whooping Cranes' depart

Father Hupp Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Thayer County has reopened to the public following a temporary closure that was in place to protect whooping cranes using the area.

Six whooping cranes present at the WMA since Nov. 13 left the area and continued their migration south on Dec. 1.

Whooping cranes are an endangered species and their wild population totals only about 300 individuals. The entire population migrates through Nebraska each spring and fall between wintering sites along the Texas coast and breeding areas in northern Alberta. Whooping cranes are protected by both the federal Endangered Species Act and the Nebraska Nongame and Endangered Species Conservation Act.

The whooping crane occurrence at Father Hupp WMA is notable because it is one of the longest stopovers, totaling 19 days, recorded in Nebraska during fall migration. It is also only the third time whooping

cranes have lingered into December in Nebraska during their fall migration.

The wetland at Father Hupp was restored in 2013 and current management has focused on providing habitat for migratory birds.

"Without the collective efforts of a number of individuals and partners, the beneficial habitat these endangered birds enjoyed during their extended stay would not have been available to them," said Scott Taylor, the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission's wildlife division administrator.

Partners on the wetland restoration project included Ducks Unlimited, the Rainwater Basin Joint Venture and the Nebraska Environmental Trust. A portion of the project was funded by a grant from the North American Wetlands Conservation Act.

The Commission appreciates the cooperation and assistance of the public and landowners during the closure and whooping cranes' stopover.

## Free Food for Seniors

CSFP provides nutritious foods to seniors who are age 60 or greater who live in Nebraska and are under the program income guidelines.

Then came retirement, and plans for restoration projects in his dream garage. But a year later plans changed and a different direction was in store. A slowly progressing muscle disease was a life changing diagnosis. Dale fought the deteriorating episodes and a new focus began. Computers and photography became new hobbies. Dale could make his computer do things no one

designed it to do. He could add people to photos even when they hadn't been there. He rigged a remote for his camera to use when his fingers no longer would bend.

His power chair took him lots and lots of places—but he couldn't run away from home, because he couldn't cross the railroad tracks. He got stuck in the sand in California, and stuck in the mud in Nevada. He rolled down Fisherman's Wharf in San Francisco. He did surprise folks in Silver Dollar City when he took a corner around a tree on two wheels. But he had the most fun spinning circles on the main floor of Pershing Auditorium at an Eastern Star fancy do. He and his chair danced with his granddaughters at their weddings.

He enjoyed his new tv/computer room on the back porch. He listened to blue-grass gospel music and watched Netflix daily.

The day before he died he went for a ride. He drove his chair out the back door, down the ramp, across the back yard, and went two yards over to check out the garage project at Littrell's.

Sallie wouldn't let him drive in the front door on the carpet, so he came in the back door, was lifted and settled in his big chair. Then Sallie could hose off the mud, pine needles, leaves, and chunks of grass gathered on his adventure. The fact that he was wearing only a silk night shirt, no socks, and didn't fasten his seatbelt, never bothered him in the least. He just said he wanted to check out the project, and enjoyed the ride. Sallie was scared he'd fall out of his chair going through the mud.

Dale served on many boards in the Davenport community, including Lion's Club, Masonic Lodge, Eastern Star, United Methodist Church treasurer, and was Web Master for the Chevrolet Nomad Association.

Dale always said you teach your children by setting a good example, and he always did.

He is preceded in death by his parents and his much loved grandson, James Cannon.

He is survived by his wife, Sallie; daughters, Laurie and her husband Gary Johnson, Carol Cannon and Darla Pfeifer; son, Darrin and wife Kelly Pfeifer; seven grandchildren, four great grandchildren, many cousins, a community of friends, and 500 members of the Nomad world in the USA, Canada, Sweden, New Zealand and Australia.


Against South Central Unified NE District 5, Casey was over Jeremiah Uldrich with a fall in 2:23.

Holtzclaw took Luke Searle down in 2:34 for six points.


Koch was over Jaekob Spitz in a 3-2 decision as was Harris, who won against Colt Rademacher in a major decision of 11-2.

# Bridge project \$2 million and climbing

A road nearly two miles east of Bruning will have to wait until spring for a much-needed crowning to negate a dip in the middle that collects water, Thayer County Commissioner Dave Bruning said.

Thayer County Road Superintendent George Gerdes said the department is aware of the problem during the commissioner's meeting Dec. 2, and has seen photographs of the road.

Gerdes reported the depart-

ment is currently fixing the soft spots on Road 6900 south of Highway 4 and that Speece-Lewis Engineers is ready for bidletting on four box culverts for two bridges on River Road. The county will advertise for the bids later this month.

Gerdes also said the Spring Creek bridge on 1st Street has officially been named the "Hebron South" project by the Nebraska Department of Roads. Recently, an environmental study at the site concluded endangered wildlife is not an issue, furthering the

project to its next step.

The commissioners briefly discussed Hebron South, which is currently about \$2 million.

"And climbing," Bruning added.

The county will owe 20 percent of the unknown total under the federal match.

Hebron South is a result of the May storms. The week of the storm, repairs were roughly estimated at \$750,000.

"They added a \$10,000 paperwork fee in there," Com-

missioner Chris Frye said.

Bruning said when he talked to NDOR Engineer Larry Legg, Legg said 80 percent of the final cost will be taken care of "right off the top."

Gerdes also let the commissioners know he is bringing in a couple of new employees and will lose one to retirement at the end of the year. Bruning verified there are 22 employees at the roads department, counting Gerdes.

In other business, Jana Tietjen told the commissioners student-crafted power point presentations are spreading the message of the Thayer County Health Coalition and drawing new volunteers.

Some of the coalition's grant funding requires the coalition to work with the Nebraska State Patrol on sobriety and compliance checks.

A sobriety checkpoint was held Nov. 20 next to Highway 81. Officers directed southbound traffic off the highway to the scale south of Hebron. Trooper Tim Pickering said.

The public wasn't given prior notice of the sobriety check because it wasn't tied to a state grant, Pickering said.

Only checkpoints working off a state grant, such as "Click It or Ticket" require the public be informed beforehand.

Pickering said the checkpoint produced one violation for no proof of insurance.

"Fourteen vehicles came through that night. There was no volume of traffic," Pickering said. Tietjen said the weather was freezing that night.

Because of the low volume, Pickering said troopers worked the county for the rest of the evening, producing two log book violations; four speeding citations; one registration citation; two driver inspections; and two insurance violations. Four warnings were issued for speeding.

On compliance, the state patrol attempted to check 20 establishments, but 11 were closed. A 19-year-old female attempted to purchase alcohol at nine establishments. She was successful at the Pioneer Inn in Gilead.

All other establishments refused to sell to the 19-year-old, which is an improvement from a prior compliance check that netted five of 11 businesses, Tietjen said.

The commissioners also met Nov. 25 and signed an interlocal agreement for the Southeast 911 region, which includes a number of counties and the cities of Lincoln and Beatrice.

Thayer County Emergency Manager Bill McPherson said the commissioners needed the agreement signed to move forward with the county's share of costs.

The agreement requires Thayer County to be a public service answering point for \$70,546.49. Equipment share is \$13,319.24 and a population-based fee will be \$658.97. All costs will be paid from the 911 reserve fund.

McPherson said the agreement is the most cost effective for the county.

"If we go in with Lincoln and Beatrice, we won't lose local control. We're just sharing hardware and software," McPherson said.


