terms, he said the day-to-day city operations – street repairs, water service – are what mattered.

first began serving on the Hebron

"It wasn't the big things. The big things make news or headlines, but it's our infrastructure that is one of the most important accomplishments a good government does," Fangmeier said.

There wasn't a specific reason Fangmeier first ran for a council seat.

"I felt like I could bring something to the table," he said.

Fangmeier grew up south of Gilead and after serving in the US Navy, he and his wife, Lori, married and moved to Hebron. They raised two sons who now live in Lincoln, Tyler and Trever.

There had to be a recount the first time Fangmeier ran because the winning candidate died suddenly before he could take his seat.

Fangmeier was on the fire department at the time. He served for another year and decided he couldn't do both, so he left the department.

"I made room for someone else," he said.

Shortly after, Fangmeier established the firemen's appreciation awards banquet for Hebron Fire and Rescue.

He said there was a time when the city considered leasing its electrical system to Norris Public Power.

"I was not a proponent of that. It turned out we kept it under our control," he said.

The vote to retain the system

"Our revenue would have gone

away," he added. Over the years, the council has never been polarized, he said.

"We're always able to reach a common ground and find a consensus somehow," he said. Council members are civic-minded citizens who are willing to cooperate and work together for solutions.

He served the longest with new mayor Doug Huber and former mayor, Randy Hergott. Fangmeier had appointed Huber to his seat while Fangmeier served as interim mayor for a spell.

Additional successes of the council include its ability to maintain approximately \$2 million in cash reserves.

"It's been a good cash reserve over the years. It lays the groundwork for keeping our city up," he said. The city frequently maintains its infrastructure without borrowing a lot of money.

It's never a good time to leave the council, he said.

"Generally speaking, if you take a snapshot in time, there's always something that needs started, something you're working on and something that needs to be finished. There is no good time to leave," he said.

Councilmember Kurk Wiedel said Fangmeier's service was commendable.

"Larry always did what he felt was right. His professionalism and dedication to this community will be missed," Wiedel said.



One of the projects the city council worked on in the past year were dilapidated buildings on 4th Street. The demolition is nearly complete. Once the hole is filled, which should be soon, the barricades on the street will be removed. The street and sidewalk will also be cleaned by the city.

# Life in the Sandhills portrayed in film

Oceans of Grass, a documentary following ranchers in the Nebraska Sandhills, took viewers at the Majestic Theatre through four seasons of the lifestyle from the ranchers themselves. They told the story.

It took director, Georg Joutras four years to make the film, which was shown at the Kansas City FilmFest earlier this year. The film has since sold out in Broken Bow, and shown at the Ross Theatre in Lincoln and the Hastings Imax. Kearney had a showing as well.

He said the sponsored showing in Hebron is unique.

"It is a testament to community pride. They wanted to bring it in and made it happen," Joutras said.

Joutras is many things, but all art. The former owner of an art gallery at the Burkholder Building in Lincoln's Haymarket is also an author, producer, editor, colorist and promoter.

"Oceans of Grass" is his first feature-length film. He is currently under hire for other films, one of which is about an alien abduction in Wisconsin.

His Lincoln gallery closed in 2008, Jourtras was on to other projects. In 2014, he received a gift, a GoPro camera.

"That's how this started - with a tiny \$300 camera," he told viewers in a brief discussion after the movie.

For a year, Joutras shot footage at the McGinn ranch south of Dunning with his GoPro. Joutras had first visited the ranch in 2003 and wrote a book released in 2007,

"Way of Life." He had met Laron McGinn, an artist of abstract western scenes.

After a year of shooting, Joutras invested in professional equipment and shot the year all over again.

He was encouraged - 'This is really great, you have to keep going,' he was told.

The next two years were spent preparing the film for release.

"It was a labor of love," he said. "I've been all over the world. Everyone in Nebraska is a cut above."

Joutras filmed 120 days of working cattle and the McGinns' day-to-day lives of serving their community, Laron McGinn's brush strokes, the never-ending job of fixing fence and a sad family tragedy, all sprinkled with the natural beauty of seasons in the Sandhills from the ground and above.

"The drone was perfect for aerial shots. A wonderful piece of equipment, he said.

Condensing four months of footage down to 90 minutes wasn't that bad, he said.

"When I was editing, it kind of made itself. I trimmed it down to three hours first," Joutras said.

He wanted to tell the bigger story of life on the ranch.

"I think it gives a good view of what agriculture is really about," he said.

The McGinns said they loved it.

"It shows them how they really are. Nothing was staged. I wanted to bring that to the film," Joutras said.

Last Friday evening he hired a team at that place and left the impression with the liverymen that he was going to Hardy to get a girl to help in their establishment. He drove around to the rear of the hotel building, loaded his wife and other valuable belongings into the rig and left for Chester. Here he put the team into the livery barn and took one of the early morning trains for parts unknown. It is understood that he left several bills behind from citizens of our neighboring villages. He is supposed to have made a good amount of cash during the recent carnival and had a good opportunity to pocket it all. Hubbell: The Village Board met Tuesday night and on motion it was decided to elect a marshal. Alden Luce was appointed and sworn in and instructed as to his duties which are to see that the law is enforced in respect to drunkenness and vulgar and profane language on the streets of Hubbell...Mr. and Mrs. Martin Bowman visited relatives and friends at Woodward, Mooreland and Alva, Okla., the past week. Mart says some of the country is fine. It wouldn't be just to most of the country to print what he thinks of the other part.

Hugh McDonald of Belvidere died from pneumonia in France. He was formerly a lieutenant in the Belvidere Home Guards, before entering into larger military activities for Uncle Sam.

Louis Brown, Joseph Boyes and Richard McKenzie were on their way Sunday to visit at the Butler home north of town. On reaching the hill by the Houts home, the steering wheel caught and Richard lost control of the car, running into a ditch and throwing the boys out. Joseph and Richard sustained only a few cuts, but Louis was bruised in the back, and was unable to be in school for several days.

The sad news was received Sunday morning of the death of Karl Brungardt, age 22 years, who was in a cantonment camp at San Antonio, Texas. He was machinist in the aviation department and his death was caused by flu. Prior to enlistment he was a broommaker. He leaves a wife and one child.

E.E. Frost is home from a three months stay in Sheridan county. Mr. Frost reports that the town of Gordon, containing 800 inhabitants, had 130 deaths from influenza several weeks ago and fatalities were still occurring. There were between 1700 and 1800 cases of the sickness in that town and surrounding country. Martial law was declared, and no one was permitted to appear on the streets without a written permit. Every available person was drafted to nurse the sick.

If you have underage guests, keep all alcohol in a central, visible place, where they can't "sneak" a drink. Never ask children to serve alcohol at parties. If at all possible, stop serving alcohol 90 minutes before the end of the party. You can always end the party by serving coffee and dessert. Funeral services will be held on December 14. at Peace Lutheran Church in Deshler, at 11 a.m. Officiating will be Pastor Rich Stevenson.


