## Fangmeier recalls serving eight terms

Councilman Larry Fangmeier first began serving on the Hebron City Council in 1986.

This month, he stepped down as a result of the Nov. 6 election.

As he recalled the past eight terms, he said the day-to-day city operations — street repairs, water service — are what mattered.

"It wasn't the big things. The big things make news or headlines, but it's our infrastructure that is one of the most important accomplishments a good government does," Fangmeier said.

There wasn't a specific reason Fangmeier first ran for a council seat.

"I felt like I could bring something to the table," he said.

Fangmeier grew up south of Gilead and after serving in the US Navy, he and his wife, Lori, married and moved to Hebron. They raised two sons who now live in Lincoln, Tyler and Trevor.

There had to be a recount the first time Fangmeier ran because the winning candidate died suddenly before he could take his seat.

Fangmeier was on the fire department at the time. He served for another year and decided he couldn't do both, so he left the department.

"I made room for someone else," he said.

Shortly after, Fangmeier established the firemen's appreciation awards banquet for Hebron Fire and Rescue.

He said there was a time when the city considered leasing its electrical system to Norris Public Power.

"I was not a proponent of that. It turned out we kept it under our control," he said.

The vote to retain the system

was not unanimous. It would have made the council's job simpler had the system been leased.

But, the city would have dismissed a system that pays for itself as well, Fangmeier said.

"Our revenue would have gone away," he added.

Over the years, the council has never been polarized, he said.

"We're always able to reach a common ground and find a consensus somehow," he said. Council members are civic-minded citizens who are willing to cooperate and work together for solutions.

He served the longest with new mayor Doug Huber and former mayor, Randy Hergott. Fangmeier had appointed Huber to his seat while Fangmeier served as interim mayor for a spell.

Additional successes of the council include its ability to maintain approximately \$2 million in cash reserves.

"It's been a good cash reserve over the years. It lays the groundwork for keeping our city up," he said. The city frequently maintains its infrastructure without borrowing a lot of money.

It's never a good time to leave the council, he said.

"Generally speaking, if you take a snapshot in time, there's always something that needs started, something you're working on and something that needs to be finished. There is no good time to leave," he said.

Councilmember Kurk Wiedel said Fangmeier's service was commendable.

"Larry always did what he felt was right. His professionalism and dedication to this community will be missed," Wiedel said.



One of the projects the city council worked on in the past year were dilapidated buildings on 4th Street. The demolition is nearly complete. Once the hole is filled, which should be soon, the barricades on the street will be removed. The street and sidewalk will also be cleaned by the city.

## Life in the Sandhills portrayed in film

Oceans of Grass, a documentary following ranchers in the Nebraska Sandhills, took viewers at the Majestic Theatre through four seasons of the lifestyle from the ranchers themselves. They told the story.

It took director, Georg Joutras four years to make the film, which was shown at the Kansas City FilmFest earlier this year. The film has since sold out in Broken Bow, and shown at the Ross Theatre in Lincoln and the Hastings ImaX. Kearney had a showing as well.

He said the sponsored showing in Hebron is unique.

"It is a testament to community pride. They wanted to bring it in and made it happen," Joutras said.

Joutras is many things, but all art. The former owner of an art gallery at the Burkholder Building in Lincoln's Haymarket is also an author, producer, editor, colorist and promoter.

"Oceans of Grass" is his first feature-length film. He is currently under hire for other films, one of which is about an alien abduction in Wisconsin.

His Lincoln gallery closed in 2008, Joutras was on to other projects. In 2014, he received a gift, a GoPro camera.

"That's how this started — with a tiny \$300 camera," he told viewers in a brief discussion after the movie.

For a year, Joutras shot footage at the McGinn ranch south of Dunning with his GoPro. Joutras had first visited the ranch in 2003 and wrote a book released in 2007,

"Way of Life." He had met Laron McGinn, an artist of abstract western scenes.

After a year of shooting, Joutras invested in professional equipment and shot the year all over again.

He was encouraged — "This is really great, you have to keep going," he was told.

The next two years were spent preparing the film for release.

"It was a labor of love," he said. "I've been all over the world. Everyone in Nebraska is a cut above."

Joutras filmed 120 days of working cattle and the McGinns' day-to-day lives of serving their community, Laron McGinn's brush strokes, the never-ending job of fixing fence and a sad family tragedy, all sprinkled with the natural beauty of seasons in the Sandhills from the ground and above.

"The drone was perfect for aerial shots. A wonderful piece of equipment," he said.

Condensing four months of footage down to 90 minutes wasn't that bad, he said.

"When I was editing, it kind of made itself. I trimmed it down to three hours first," Joutras said.

He wanted to tell the bigger story of life on the ranch.

"I think it gives a good view of what agriculture is really about," he said.

The McGinns said they loved it.

"It shows them how they really are. Nothing was staged. I wanted to bring that to the film," Joutras said.

## National Impaired Driving Prevention Month

December is National Impaired Driving Prevention Month. In the past couple of decades, we have made great strides in spreading the message that driving drunk is dangerous and is a serious public health risk to everyone on the road.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), 29 people in the United States die every day in motor vehicle crashes that involve an alcohol-impaired driver. This amounts to one death every 50 minutes.

In the last two weeks of December, the number of people killed in alcohol-related crashes is even higher. The risk of driving after drinking alcohol increases during the holidays--don't become a statistic this holiday season.

Impaired driving accidents can be avoided by making smart choices. If you are at a holiday party, think about how much alcohol you consume and have arrangements and back-up plans if you are impaired and unable to drive a vehicle.

However, driving is not just impaired by alcohol consumption. Our ability to safely drive a motor vehicle can also be impacted by drugs; illegal and prescription drugs. When you drive drunk or drugged, you aren't just putting yourself at risk, you are endangering everyone in your vehicle and on the road.

If you're hosting a party this holiday season, take steps to keep your friends and family safe and make sure no one from your party drinks and then drives. To help reduce the risk of alcohol-related driving accidents this holiday season, use these tips to help you and your loved ones safe:

- Let your guests know ahead of time how you feel about drinking and driving and their need to be responsible about their alcohol consumption.
- As guests RSVP, remind them of the importance of a designated driver.
- Plan activities to engage your guests and take the focus away from drinking.
- Provide plenty of high-protein foods, like cheese and meats, to help slow the absorption of alcohol and to keep guests from drinking too much on an empty stomach.



- Avoid salty snacks like potato chips and pretzels that can cause guests to drink more.

- Offer unique, non-alcoholic beverages, or "mocktails," for designated drivers and others who prefer not to drink alcohol.

- If preparing an alcoholic punch, use a fruit juice instead of a carbonated base that speeds the absorption of alcohol into the blood stream.

- Make sure you have designated drivers or plan to drive intoxicated party goes home yourself.

- If necessary make arrangements for guests who have had too much to drink to stay over.

Remember if you are the host, you are responsible for the safety of your guests, and in some cases, their actions when they leave your party.

Good hosts don't drink too much. They also never serve alcohol to someone under the legal drinking age.

If you have underage guests, keep all alcohol in a central, visible place, where they can't "sneak" a drink. Never ask children to serve alcohol at parties. If possible, don't let guests mix their own drinks. If a guest is drinking too much, offer to refresh their drink with a non-alcoholic version.

If at all possible, stop serving alcohol 90 minutes before the end of the party. You can always end the party by serving coffee and dessert. This will help give your guests time to get sober before leaving. Responsible holiday hosting helps to ensure that you and your guest have fun celebrating, but also stay safe and avoid senseless tragedies. Planning ahead will help ensure everyone at your party has a safe and Happy New Year.

Glenn's future plans are to attend UNL and then to Iowa State to be a veterinarian.

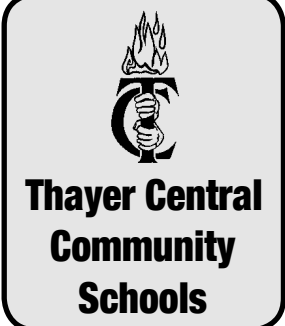

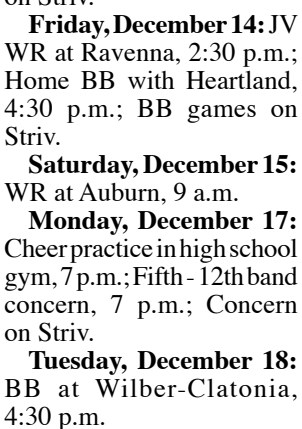

# Titans form digital athlete club

Earlier this year, Peru State College announced it was looking into esports, electronic sports for a new wave of athletes — digital.

It seems the wave has hit high schools. Last month, the Thayer Central Board of Education approved exploring the phenomenon that has evolved into regional tournaments from a laptop or desktop computers.

The board wants to ensure electronic gaming doesn't interfere with activities already in place at the school.

The Titan esports team is in its infancy and headed by art instructor, Ryan Waters. He's holding two practices per week for about 90 minutes each time.

"The lab also opens up at 7:40 a.m.," he said.

Waters was being pestered by students to start something as early as January.

"It was bigger than I thought. There are well over a dozen schools currently active and they have organized clubs with a coach," Waters said. Some clubs may be self-organized by the students.

And Striv TV has started an esports association with leagues for electronic gaming. A survey on the esports website asks students if they

would be interested in starting or joining a club.

Waters first heard about competitive electronic gaming from a fellow educator, who confirmed esports was growing in popularity.

"He said they were doing an esports club and competing with other schools, and he was just trying to get ahead of the curb," Waters explained.

He said he isn't being paid as a coach.

"It's not a budget like an athletic program," he said. "But I have 15 kids signed up and more asking. If I've got good interest, I could make it into a solid program."

Esports is a staple at Midland University, which hosts tournaments and has an esports stadium. The university also awards scholarships.

Digital athletes compete as a team in constant communication with each other while attempting to master electronic games like StarCraft or League of Legends.

"What sold me on the idea of this was we're teaching the same skills we're getting on the field, using problem solving, reason, but it's in a different environment," Waters said.
