## Thayer Central Speech sets bar high

The 2019 Thayer Central Speech Team is going to look a lot like the 2018 team.

Last year's Titan Talkers graduated only two seniors while earning third place at the Class C2 meet.

Returning to the team is a strong core of upperclassmen, led by nine seniors: three-time state medalist Maggie Harris; state medalist McKenzie Johnson; state medalist Holly Timmermann; Dakota Cherney, Yong Wang, Bridget Linton, Dylan Fischer, Keegan Casey and Sierra Hatcher.

In total, Thayer Central will have 31 students from Grades 9-12 competing this year.

'Our kids come in for practices and expect two things: growth and excitement," Thayer Central Coach Justin Bomar said. "We have good numbers across all grades and the older kids have really bought into the mindset that potential will only be met with purposeful practice."

## **County** moves on truancy

On the Thayer County Commissioners' agenda Dec. 5 was time to review and approve an application for a community-based grant for juvenile services to address truancy for the 2019-2020 school year.

The commissioners had Casey Thieman from the Seward County Attorney's Office on a conference call while they went through the application, which provides for an Attendance Support Case Manager. Thieman is one of the developers of the program, which has been adopted in several counties.

The grant application was approved for submission to the Nebraska Crime Commission. A budget summary lists the total cost of the program at \$17,782 and \$16,004 requested with a \$1,778 match.

The case manager position is funded through 10 percent of a Seward County grant; 20 percent of a Jefferson County grant; 10 percent of a Jefferson County community-based enhancement grant; 15 percent of an interlocal agreement between counties; 40 percent of a Thayer County grant; and five percent of a juvenile services grant.

The support program reviewed the graduation rates in Thayer County as 94.74 percent for Thayer Central; 100 percent for Deshler; and and 93.75 for Bruning-Davenport.

On attendance, Thayer C recorded 95.81 percent; Deshler, 96.09 percent; and Bruning-Davenport, 95.72 percent.

In 2016, the Nebraska Risk and Protective Factors Survey recorded 43.9 percent of seniors said learning was important to their futures, and 28.1 percent enjoyed being in school.

To reduce truancy, schools must address specific factors impeding attendance such as, parental involvement and meaningful sanctions or consequences for truancy, which is included in the attendance support program.

This year, the schools began the program in August and as of Dec. 1, had 30 referrals. One of the 30 referrals enrolled in school. The program serves youth from ages 12 to 18.

"This action to develop a comprehensive one and three year plan for juvenile services was instituted in the spring of 2018 at meetings between the three Thayer County schools and myself with organizations that had developed programs to deal with attendance issues in other counties," Thayer County Attorney Dan Werner said. Werner has pressed charges against at least one parent in the past for attendance issues.

Werner agreed to use \$6,000 of unused funds from his county budget to kick-start the program locally, the schools provided \$4,000, and the commissioners made another \$1,000 available.

Thayer County entered into an agreement with Jefferson County to provide the attendance program via an interlocal cooperation agreement.

The program involves students and their parents, parenting classes, setting goals and available resources.

This is the third child this estimable family have lost and the blow fell so heavily on the mother as to completely prostrate her and she was unable to attend the funeral...A gentleman came into this office yesterday and requested us to announce that if the parties who stole his turkey will make known their name he would send them some cranberry sauce to eat with the fowl.

## 1918

Edwin J. Frey writes to his father from Base Hospital No. 17, Dijon, France. He says the soldiers did well what they went to do in France and that he is feeling fine and dandy.

Miss Ella Ferguson, who teaches at Wood River, came home, the school having been closed by the flu and Miss Ferguson was taken sick with the popular epidemic after reaching home.

The community has been subjected this week to an annoying and dangerous condition in the shutdown of the city light and power plant, on account of the burning out of the dynamo at the pumping plant. The printing offices have had no use of Linotypes or presses, the garages had to stop work, and in fact all industries requiring power have been at a standstill for several days. There have been no street lights, while residences and business houses have had to resort to candles and lamps. Some water testing plants had to put out plants for the lack of water and the lack of water supply has made citizens tremble at the thought of dire calamity, if fire should break out.

Last Thursday afternoon, Burdette Edward Bredwell, the 14-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Earl Bredwell, fell out of a high chair, injuring his right ear. The hemorrhage of the brain caused the little fellow's death the following morning. Previous to the accident, the baby had been hiding his face beside his apron and when his mother approached, he rose to his feet and tried to jump toward her. This leaves the bereaved parents' home childless, making a sad Christmas for the afflicted family. The funeral was held at the Presbyterian church last Saturday, interment being in Rose Hill Cemetery.

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

It's that time of year again...time for making our resolutions. Many of us make a resolution to start exercising and to get fit. Too often we abandon our goal before Easter. However, you will increase your chances for long-term success if you follow these five simple tips.

**Determine Your Readi**ness: Are you both physically and mentally ready to start an exercise program. If you worry about being healthy enough to start a fitness regiment, talk to your doctor. Once you have been physically cleared, consider vour mental readiness. While there are many factors to consider, three often determine your success:

- Your confidence in your exercise ability.

-Encouragement and support you receive from those closest to you.

 Participating in an enjoyable form of exercise.

Create a Plan: Before you start your exercise program, answer three questions. - When will you exercise?

Identify three days and times that are convenient for you and stick with those days so you are working out at the same time each week. What type of exercise

will you do? The best type of exercise is one you enjoy. Don't worry about what everyone else is doing; pick an exercise that works for you.

- How much time will you spend exercising? Start with as little as 10 minutes per session and slowly build up to at least 30 minutes per workout.

Bring a Friend: If a friend has also resolved to start exercising more in the New Year, start your fitness journey together. A friend will keep you accountable and increase your chances for success. Try to find an exercise you both enjoy. This might be a challenge, but it's worth it since an exercise partner provides you with a support system, a positive social experience and inspiration. There will be times when you don't feel like working out and a partner can be just the motivation

you need to get going. Take It Easy: Think of your resolution as a lifelong commitment to a healthier lifestyle. You are much more likely to be successful if you start out slow. For instance, you may see people exercising at a very high intensity, but you should start with low-to-moderate intensity workouts. You may know people who train six days a week, but it's fine to start with three. You may see people engage in a diverse array of physical activities, but a 15-minute walk three days a week is a great place to begin.


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## **Belvidere**

## Hospital named shaken baby prevention education champion

Thayer County Health Services (TCHS) in Hebron was recently recognized as an Abusive Head Trauma/ Shaken Baby Prevention Education Champion. To become an AHT/SBS Prevention Hospital Champion, the hospital signs a pledge, creates or updates an AHT/ SBS policy, provides yearly education to hospital personnel, educates parents with evidence-based AHT/SBS materials in accordance with Nebraska Revised Statute 71-2103, and incorporates The Crying Plan into post-

discharge patient calls. "The stresses of parenthood can be intense, but with proper education we are ensuring parents know the right way to deal with their new role," said Division of Public Health Deputy Director Judy Martin. "This is a transformative initiative that impacts children in their first year of life, but affects the rest of their life."

"TCHS nurses are passionate about supporting the campaign to strengthen the communities' awareness of life altering effects of Abusive Head Trauma/Shaken Baby Syndrome. We hope to provide the necessary education and support to prevent children and families from living with the devastating effects of Abusive Head Trauma/Shaken Baby Syndrome (AHT/SBS)," said Chief Nursing Officer, Jamie Koch, RN, BSN. "Participating in this campaign will also give us as nurses the knowledge and skills needed to inform parents and communities that AHT/SBS is 100 percent preventable."

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) worked with the Nebraska Hospital Association, the Nebraska Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Nebraska Perinatal Quality Improvement Collaborative, and the Brain Injury Alliance of Nebraska to launch the Nebraska AHT/SBS Prevention Education Hospital
