Additional funds for Region B...

Southeast Nebraska Region B has been chosen to receive an additional \$22,865 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the area for this fiscal year. The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

A local board representing different entities will determine on Feb. 6, how the Southeast Nebraska Region B funds are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service organizations in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds.

Southeast Nebraska Region B has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds to three agencies last year who provided 974 meals for 1964 individuals, 146 nights of shelter for 15 individuals and assisted with partial payments of 63 rent or utility bills for 148 individuals.

City Council hears from different groups

The Hebron City Council met for its regular monthly meeting on Feb. 3. During the meeting, council members spoke with many different organizations.

Although work has already begun on the community orchard, a group of students from Thayer Central have an idea to take it one step further and they presented it to City Council members Monday night.

The group had an idea to create a community garden. They spoke with council members about how they could do it and the items they would need.

The idea is still in its first step, but the students hope to start out by doing research about whether or

not this is something that would be useful in the community. Council members moved to support this idea.

The group also heard from B.J. Linton, Hebron Volunteer Fire Department Chief and members of the Bruning Volunteer Fire Department. Due to a shortage of trained EMTs in Bruning, Hebron has been covering the Bruning area when it comes to transport to hospitals. EMTs from Bruning are currently being trained so Linton said it is expected that this will be a short term arrangement.

Terry Olson from the Secrest Library also spoke with council members about improvements at the library grounds. Olson presented a list of projected expenses but council members decided to

table any further action to see if any of the work could be done by city workers.

Council members also got to see the changes on a new plan for the community center from JEO Consulting group. The changes that the group had discussed making a few months ago have been added along with a revised budget. Now decisions need to be made about other details. The group decided that the steering committee has the authority to do this as long as it doesn't change the functionality or budget.

Linda Hudson and Steve Delay from the Thayer County Visitors Committee also addressed the group about the possibility of adding a welcoming center within the community center. The center

would allow travelers to stop and gain information about the community. The council decided not to make a decision on this yet, but see if it would be a feasible idea once the structure is built.

In other business, council members:

- heard from Loren Goedeken about the senior legion state tournament.
- moved to accept the bid from Gary Hintz for the demolition of 127 South 2nd Street.
- heard from Karl Wiedel about possible One and Six projects in Hebron.
- discussed concerns about hangar use and FAA regulations at the airport with Joe Hergott and Andrew Fangmeier from the Hebron Airport Authority

School Board prepares options for public meetings

The Thayer Central School Board of Education will host two public meetings on Feb. 9 and Feb. 10. On Feb. 9, the meeting will be held at 3 p.m. The following day the meeting will take place at 7 p.m. Both will be held in the high school gymnasium.

From these meetings, the group hopes to come out with an idea of what the public thinks about three different plans meant to improve the current facilities for the entire district, said Thayer Central superintendent Drew Harris.

The first of the three plans meets the goal of moving all students to one location. It also connects the

buildings with a new gymnasium set between the two buildings. This also helps create a better tornado safety area for the students and faculty. More classrooms would also be added with this plan. They would be added to the intermediate building. The plan also includes improvements to the technology building. Although not included in the current option, the plan allows for possible future renovation of the old gymnasium to an auditorium.

The second plan adds much of the same benefits, but it doesn't include a new gymnasium. In place of the gymnasium additional classrooms would be placed in between


the intermediate and high school buildings. This plan would still allow all the students to be located on the same campus. A new metal building would be constructed east of the intermediate building. This new building would allow space for a weight lifting room. In addition to the classrooms, this option would also feature renovation of the locker rooms along with new music rooms. Bleachers may be replaced in the intermediate gymnasium if this option is chosen.

The final plan allows for improvements to current facilities with the majority of the improvements to the primary building. The changes with

this plan would include five new classrooms, a multi-purpose room and renovations to the primary gymnasium. These renovations to the gymnasium would allow for a secured entrance and an area for administration. Changes to the other facilities would try to right some issues with security, locker room, flooring and other needed improvements throughout the intermediate and high school buildings.

The hope from the board is to find an option that Thayer Central patrons want to move forward with, Harris said. That is why the group hopes to get input during the

1884

130 Years Ago

B.F. Stump has started a new lumber yard at Davenport. D. Samoissette of this precinct raised 3,500 bushels of corn last season. Hendershot & Son shipped two carloads of fat cattle to Chicago. A communication appears in this issue from the bright young town of Harbine. The county commissioners refused the petition for a saloon license at Belvidere. The unusual but merry jingling of the sleigh bells has been heard for several days. Dr. T.D. Bristol opened a sebaceous tumor on the head of Mrs. Jacob Hendershot. Guy Putman of Illinois is one of the new residents of Belvidere. Ed Peppinghausen of Kiowa has rented his farm and gone to Wisconsin. A brother and brother-in-law of Emmett Brothers of Gilead precinct have arrived to locate. John W. Edwards, formerly of this place, is now a Methodist preacher at Alma, Harlan County, this state. T.V. Rhodes, a brother and in the employ of M. Rhodes of this place, has gone to Blue Springs after his family and will locate here. Hiram Cornell of Alexandria precinct, one of the early settlers of Thayer County and the first merchant at Meridian (1869) leaves this week for California, accompanied by his wife. Ed. F. Talmadge of Belvidere was a caller this week. He reports Belvidere flourishing and predicts a first-class boom for that young city this spring. M.A. Caudy of Kiowa, returned from Chicago where he had gone with cattle. He reports indications of a heavy immigration to Nebraska from Illinois in the spring. J.J. Malowney has started to Kansas on his annual tour. We noticed as he drove by that his overcoat pocket was full of past due notes and chattel mortgages. We presume that next week or in the near future, Nebraska will be honored with a similar tour. Harbine (Now Byron) Boorman & Waite's store is crowded with customers from morning until night. They are taking advantage of the low prices. Ward Bros. have sold their lumber yard at this place to parties from Atchison, who are putting in a full line, and are selling at bottom prices. The Miles house has changed hands. Mr. Beauchamp taking charge will try and keep up the former reputation of the house.

1894

120 Years Ago

Creviston & Shearer paid out \$485 for labor in putting up ice. The roller skating club had possession of Fletcher's hall. Hebron school district receives \$481.69 from the state school apportionment. Last week a party of skaters went on the river as far east as the longitude of Gilead. A number of men fishing in the Little Blue had their pictures taken with their trophies. The town of Davenport is much agitated over an alleged scandal. The first spring shower made its appearance. Seventy additions to the Christian Church at Belvidere have been reported. A six months hog was sold in Belvidere that dressed 269 pounds. The M.E. people will build a large and expensive church in this city in a year or so. Shafé Kautzman, the original Davenport editor, has returned to that breezy town and is at the helm of the Journal. The Hebron Planing Mill managers state that they are ready to make anything out of wood. They wouldn't say so if they did not mean it. Deputy Postmaster Guy Roper is a success. He is the most pleasant, most accommodating, most efficient and blondest young man in the post office. Charles Nickolls has received his new seven horsepower gasoline engine for his new machine shop. It is a fine piece of machinery. Frank Helfrich has gone to Blue Springs to take a position in the King Press Drill manufactory. Some sacrilegious person stole

the silver communion set from the Christian church at Belvidere. It was valued at \$15. Reports of remarkable success in fishing continue to reach us. It is said 1,000 fish have been caught through the ice south of the creamery. Dennis Cannon is said to have caught 65 pounds in one day. The Rev. W. Heetal, Lutheran pastor at Byron, performed the ceremony uniting Henry Hoops and Miss Anna Huihner, both of Thayer County. J.C. Anderson of this city, with nursery stock of all kinds, is rapidly growing a first class nursery to be known as the Hebron Nursery. The second house built in Hebron was the Proctor Hotel, 1871. It still stands on the corner of Lincoln Avenue and Third St., and, with the three-story annex constitutes what has since that date successively borne the names Ebling Hotel and Commercial Hotel. The first about two months ago necessitated the closing of the hotel for repairs. It now blossoms out as The Werner House, with a new "mine host and hostess," Mr. and Mrs. J.J. Werner, who will spare no pains to make their guests comfortable. The project to tap the Little Blue River up near Kiowa and bring the water by a canal to Cemetery Hill where it would have a fall of from 75 to 100 feet, if put into execution, would afford several thousand horse power. The company could furnish electrical or wire rope transmitted power to run Wetherald's mill. Extensive manufacturing plants could be furnished all the power needed, and an immense water supply could be had for fire protection. Numerous and beautiful lakes would be created where ever the course of the canal crossed a ravine, and Hebron would be the Lowell and the Chautauqua of Nebraska. Friedensau Henry Beckmann has abandoned farming and opened a harness shop in Deshler where he is doing a lively business. The Friedensau mill, which compared favorable with any mill in the county formerly, has dwindled down to a feed mill, changed hands again and is now taking a long rest from work. Carleton About a dozen cases of measles are reported in the Stackhouse's neighborhood. P.B. Walter's children were sent to school when coming down and serious times are expected out there, on that line, this winter. Davenport The flour war between our grocers has been declared off, the price having been advanced to 60 cents per sack. Chester C.A. Lawrence is busily engaged in packing ice. He has it shipped in from Hebron and expects to put in about 100 tons. Deshler Mr. Ulrich intends to have a sale soon and will leave for his old home in Wisconsin. J.W. McConnell, our ex-postmaster and retired merchant, left for his home at Greensburg, Ind.

one car of cattle and one emigrant car. Their families left over the Rock Island via Fairbury. Davenport The Davenport and Kiowa telephone line has now been extended to Deshler. Mr. Keim and family from Kirksville, Mo., cousins of the Keim boys here, arrived with their car of household goods and will farm the Selby place west of town. Hubbell M.C. Smith has rented his farm for a term of years to Tom Cassidy. John Lowe who made his home with his uncle, M.C. Smith, for the past three years, returned to his home at Toulon, Ill. Gilead Uncle Henry Knappe died at his home northeast of this place after a lingering sickness of some years. He was laid to rest in the Alexandria Cemetery. There was a shocking fight in the saloon at Gilead about 9 o'clock Tuesday night, wherein the bartender, W.M. Garber had the first finger of his right hand bitten off at the first joint. Garber's little finger on his left hand was also chewed, and his face badly cut. It is said the dismembered finger was later picked up from the floor of the saloon. The preliminary hearing of the culprit was continued.

1914

100 Years Ago

Mr. and Mrs. James Hartley celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at Belvidere. Mr. and Mrs. Hartley moved to Carleton in the fall of 1871. Some time between closing time Saturday and Monday morning, thieves entered Ralph Pryce's grocery store and helped themselves to coffee, lard, tobacco and cigars. A call was made to Beatrice for Dick Fulton to bring his bloodhounds over, but they have been unsuccessful so far. Sheriff John Byrne was fined ten and costs in Police Judge Whitney's court on a charge of drunkenness. Byrne pleaded guilty to the charge and paid his fine. Before a crowd of 250 basketball fans, the Hebron High School boys' basketball team triumphed over the fast Fairmont five by the score of 35 to 33, while the Hebron girls' team lost to Geneva girls, 20 to 25. Both contests were real games from the word go. The girls' game which was played first, was exceptionally good for a girls' game. Ruth Kilpatrick was the principal point-getter for Hebron as were Ruth Massey and Wauneta Lodgsdon for Geneva. Nellie Trumble, the little left guard of the Hebron team, was the individual star of the girls' game. The boys' game was the best. The class of basketball played by these two teams could well be envied by any school. Although a little rough at times, the boys kept the spectators enthused from whistle to whistle by their marvelous basket throwing and good team work. Harry Lawless and Captain Hill were the principal counters for the home team, while Titchner and Moul were the main counters for the visitors.

1924

90 Years Ago

Deshler was the scene of a bold and daring holdup when a 16 year old boy who had been employed with the pipeline crew swaggered into the pool hall of Herbert Schreek and at the point of a pistol demanded the surrender of the contents of the cash till and safe. The total loot amounted to approximately \$128 cash and about \$300 in checks. He was able to make a clean getaway in the darkness but was apprehended the following morning going on foot

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50 Years Ago

Coach All Lowe's Hebron High Bears pulled off one of the greatest comeback victories in recent Bear history as they upended coach Gene Armstrong's top ranked Minden Whippets, 67-62. Krueger was the big gun for Hebron, pumping in 32 points, 23 of them in the last half. Krueger was followed in the scoring by LaVonne Kassebaum with 13, and Darrell Bowen with 10, six of Bowen's points coming in the final minutes of the last quarter when the Bears made their final surge to victory. Minden was led by Roy Nelson's 25 points and by sharp shooting John Lund who finished with 21 tallies. The Chester Bulldogs held on to a narrow margin through the final three quarters to upset top-seeded Alexandria in the annual Little Blue conference Tournament held at Hebron. Final score was 51-49. This year's Wilber Crop Clinic will cover a range of timely topics for today's crop producer. The educational program is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m.

Speakers from UNL extension and private industry will cover cutting edge agronomic and management topics, said Randy Pryor, Extension Educator in Saline County and program host.

In the morning, Al Dutcher, UNL Climatologist, will kick off the event and review the current "La Nada" weather pattern and explain its effect on agriculture this spring.

Brad Lubben, UNL Extension Economist will have the latest information on the Farm Bill legislation.

Glyphosate resistant ragweed and waterhemp will continue to become problems, lessons from Fremont and David City, will be covered by Extension Educator Lowell Sandell in the UNL Weed Sci-

ence Department.

Extension Educator Randy Pryor will be presenting on an emerging issue in Southeast and South Central Nebraska, sulfur deficiencies in crops that are beginning to show up.

The women in our lives; mothers, wives, daughters, sister and friends, should learn their cardiovascular risk and take action to live longer, healthier lives.

Heart disease in women has been called the "Silent Killer" because it often has no noticeable symptoms. It's more deadly than all forms of cancer in women combined. Since the first National Wear Red Day in 2003, there have been tremendous strides in the fight against heart disease in women.

Through research and education there are now:

34 percent fewer women who will die from heart disease, saving 330 lives every day.

More women are taking ownership of their health by developing healthy lifestyles:

23 percent more Americans are aware that heart disease is the number one killer of women.

15 percent more women have quit smoking, and high cholesterol has declined by 18 percent.

Women no longer pay higher premiums than men for health coverage and 20 states have programs for low-income women to get screenings for heart disease and strokes.

More gender-specific guidelines when it comes to dedications.

Gender-specific medical research is up.

The first step toward heart health is becoming aware of your own personal risk for heart disease. Some risks, such as smoking cigarettes, are obvious: every woman knows whether or not she smokes.

But other risk factors, such as high blood pressure or high blood cholesterol, generally don't have obvious signs or symptoms. Women need to

gather some information to create their personal "heart profile."

A crucial step in determining your risk is to see your doctor for a thorough checkup. Your doctor can be an important partner in helping you set and reach goals for heart health.

If you already are being treated for heart disease or heart disease risk factors, ask your doctor to review your treatment plan with you. When your doctor asks you questions, answer as honestly and fully as you can. While certain topics may seem quite personal, discussing them openly can help your doctor find out your chances of developing heart disease.

If you already have heart disease, briefly describe each of your symptoms. Include when each symptom started, how often it happens, and whether it has been getting worse.

If you don't understand something your doctor says, ask them to explain it better. Be especially sure you understand how to take any medication you are given.

If you are worried about understanding what the doctor says, or if you have trouble hearing, bring a friend or relative with you to your appointment

Although there has been improvement in education and awareness regarding heart disease in women, still more needs to be done. 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

Heck, I don't need to change oil in this car of mine. I'll just run it until the motor seizes up, then either overhaul it or get a bicycle.

Our real teeth, like a good car or truck, can last quite awhile. Unlike motor vehicles, our teeth can usually last a lifetime. Dentures can be compared to bicycles. Many people will let the car slowly turn into junk, and then go through the expense and misery of getting dentures. And when they hop on that plastic bike, they sure are disappointed. As the bike is much slower and harder to deal with, dentures provide ten percent of the original biting power.

If I let my brake shoes grind clear down instead of just replacing the pads, I may have to spend a lot more when I damage the rotors. Instead of spending \$135 to fix a tiny cavity, why would I wait two years, and then spend 1000 bucks on a root canal and another 900 on a crown? If I cannot afford that rescue treatment, I will likely opt to have the Doc take out the tooth. Do that enough times, and I am forced to ride a bike from then on.

A proper cleaning of the teeth, or prophylaxis, is like an oil

change. I know of very few people who would run their motor oil forever. Even if a person has no insurance, it makes much more sense to find the hundred bucks for a cleaning every six months or even a year, rather than waiting to overhaul the mouth or settling for a bicycle.



said. "Mary Ridder had called and asked if some of our students could help them lead bulls into the ring, and we were happy to help."

Practical experiences such as helping prep and lead bulls enhanced the overall marketing and live evaluation skills gained by students, Smith said. Prospective NCTA
