Winter conditions blamed in accidents

Tom Lohmeier says he's doing okay if a little shaken after escaping serious injury in a wintery accident Thursday morning, Jan. 31, near the Jefferson County and Gage County line that left a Fairbury woman dead.

Lohmeier, 61, of Hebron, was headed east on Highway 136 in his 1999 Ford 3/4-ton pickup when westbound Suzan L. Debourge, 54, of Fairbury, started to slide on snow and ice in her 2000 Suzuki Vitara SUV into Lohmeier's lane. Lohmeier, unable to stop in time, ran into the passenger side of the oncoming SUV.

According to the Gage County Sheriff's office, strong winds creat-

ing white-out conditions and an icy roadway were factors in the 10:50 a.m. crash. Debourge was pronounced dead at the scene.

Lohmeier was taken to Beatrice Community Hospital and treated for a bruised knee and an abrasion on his forehead. Two passengers in the Lohmeier vehicle were not injured.

A wintery mixture of snow and rain moved into the area Tuesday evening creating deep slushy conditions on roadways as temperatures hovered just above freezing. Overnight, the temperature dropped into the teens as a cold front moved in on stiff breezes. The mixture of rain and snow quickly turned to all snow overnight leaving roadways ice and snow packed by Wednesday morning. Local

areas received 4-5 inches of snow on top of frozen slush; road conditions were bad enough to cancel schools throughout Thayer County and surrounding areas.

On Thursday, although most roads had been plowed, windy conditions continued to blow snow onto roadways.

Locally, two non-injury accidents were blamed on the road conditions. In Deshler, Zebediah T. Webber, of Deshler and Terri L. Hillman, of Deshler, collided in the Fifth St. and Pearl St. intersection. According to an accident report on file at the Thayer County Sheriff's Office in Hebron, neither driver could get their vehicles stopped due to the icy road conditions.

Webber's 2003 Chevrolet suburban had \$3,500 in damages, while

Hillman's 2002 Buick Park Avenue did too. Neither driver was injured.

In Hebron, Jason M. Hudson, of Belvidere, and Jolynn K. Hacker, of Hebron, collided at the Union Ave., and First St. intersection. Hudson, traveling west on Union Ave., in a Norder Supply Inc., 2007 Chevrolet pickup, was unable to stop at the intersection stop sign and slid into the crossroads due to snow on the

road. Hacker, who was southbound on First St. in her 2003 Buick Sedan, was unable to stop quick enough to avoid the collision. Both vehicles are reported to have \$3,000 in damages.

Neither driver was injured. Forecasters are predicting another round of wintery mix this weekend.

Commissioners to hear housing study results

TCEDA (Thayer County Economic Development Alliance) would like to invite the public to a meeting with the County Commissioners to present the results of the recent Hanna:Keelan Associates Housing Study. This meeting takes place at 10 a.m. on Feb. 13 at the County Courthouse.

This county-wide housing market study researched the demand for housing and rental property in Thayer County. It will give strategies on how to satisfy this demand, including building new homes as well as rehabilitation of existing homes. It also provides a step by step action plan to address the housing concerns based on goals specific to the region.

The presentation of the study is open to the public and we urge everyone to attend as this research will provide possible solutions for many of the concerns of the citizens of Thayer County.

The County was awarded in 2011 \$16,500 in CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) funds to conduct a county-wide housing study with strategies for affordable housing. The study was conducted in an effort to create a favorable atmosphere and realistic approach to housing development activities within Thayer County and its communities. The County of Thayer is the lead administrative agent for the project funded in part through the CDBG program in the planning category and matching funds from Thayer County, TCEDA, area businesses, and participating communities.

As part of the project, the housing study advisory committee was created to provide input into the study process. The advisory committee includes representatives from the 11 municipalities located in the county, TCEDA and representatives from business and industry within the county. An interlocal agreement defines the partnership and responsibilities of each entity for this process. The final study is complete and includes findings from surveys conducted in the area, listening sessions, qualitative and quantitative data collected and goals and action steps to address housing needs in this county.

All interested parties attending the meeting will have an opportunity to be heard regarding the project. Written testimony will also be accepted at the public meeting or may be sent to the County Clerk, Thayer County Courthouse, 225 N. 4th St., Hebron, NE, 68370. Written comments must be postmarked on or before Feb. 11, 2013.

Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$148,983.87 in sales tax for the month of November after showing a 7.8 percent increase in net taxable sales over last year. For November 2012, the county had \$2,708,792 in net taxable sales - up from \$2,511,671 in 2011.

According to Hebron Clerk Jean Nagey, the City of Hebron collected \$16,698.34 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,372,796 for the month of November. That shows a decrease of 3.5 percent in net taxable sales over last year. The motor vehicle tax (\$1,935.01) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$14,763.33) goes into the sales tax fund.

Eight TC Officials Attend State Workshop

Eight Thayer County officials attended a two and one half day conference conducted in Kearney Dec. 12-14 for Nebraska county officials.



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American Heart Association Sodium Swap Challenge

Did you know that by reducing your sodium intake during a three week period, you can change your sodium palate and start enjoying foods with less sodium? That is why the American Heart Association is asking you to take its sodium swap challenge. They want us all to step up to the plate, recharge our taste buds and give our heart-health a boost with a new low sodium diet.

The average American consumes about 3,400 milligrams of sodium a day. This is more than twice the 1,500 milligrams recommended by the American Heart Association. Changing your salty ways may be difficult, especially since you have acquired a taste for salt, but don't worry - making the swap or taking the challenge doesn't have to be hard. With the help of the Salty Six (common foods that may be loaded with excess sodium that can increase your risk of heart disease), you'll be able to identify, and keep track of the top food culprits.

To get started, you need to get familiar with food labels and nutrition facts regarding the foods you eat. It is also recommended that you track your sodium consumption over the first two days, so you can get an idea of how much you are eating. Then over the course of the next three weeks, you can use the Salty Six as your guide to help lower your sodium intake.

Week 1 - Start by tackling your consumption of breads and rolls as well as cold cuts and cured meats. When one piece of bread may have as much as 230 milligrams of sodium and a serving of turkey cold cuts as much as 1,050 milligrams of sodium, it's amazing how fast you can reach the daily recommended 1,500 milligrams. Check your labels and look for lower sodium items. You should track your sodium consumption daily and log how much you've shaved out of your diet. Portion control will also make a difference.

Week 2 - Keep the momentum going! This week's foods should include pizza and poultry. If you're going to eat pizza, try to aim for one with less cheese and meats or lower sodium versions. You can even

try something different and add veggies instead. When cooking for your family use fresh, skinless poultry rather than fried or processed. Keep your eyes on the 1,500 milligrams of sodium each day and, again, log your results.

Week 3 - As you round out the last week of your challenge, your focus should now include soups and sandwiches. The two together typically make a tasty meal, but one cup of chicken noodle soup may have up to 940 milligrams. After you add all the meats, cheeses and condiments to your sandwich, you can easily surpass 1,500 milligrams in one day. This week, when choosing a soup, check the label and try lower sodium varieties of your favorites and make your sandwiches with lower sodium meats and cheeses. Also limit the condiments. Be sure to track your sodium and try to keep your daily consumption to less than 1,500 milligrams.

By the end of the challenge you should start to notice a change in the way your food tastes and how you feel after you eat. You might even start to lean towards lower sodium options and should be aware of how much sodium you are consuming in a day. Be sure to keep the Salty Six in mind and look for the Heart-Check mark on products in your local grocery store and menu items in restaurants. Products that are certified by the Heart-Check Food Certification Program meet nutritional criteria for heart-healthy foods and can help keep you on track during your challenge. (www.heartcheckmark.org)

Making an effort to reduce the sodium in your diet will help you feel better and will help you live a heart-healthier life. It is important to take the time to educate yourself. For further sodium tips, resources and encouragement during your own Sodium Swap Challenge visit www.heart.org/sodium.

Listening To Your Customers

Poor listening skills cost American business billions of dollars and is a primary cause of a salesperson's failure. Effective listening goes beyond merely hearing what the other person is saying to actually getting the meaning of what is being said.

According to researchers Rosemary Ramsey and R.Sohi, the listening process has three parts: Sensing, Evaluating and Responding. The research study clearly supports the notion that the customer's perception of salesperson listening behavior plays a primary role in building trust with the salesperson.

Customers can perceive when a salesperson is actually listening to them by noticing if the salesperson maintains eye contact, focuses on the conversation and engages in other non-verbal communication. Listening skills may not determine the "satisfaction" that the customer has with the salesperson, but it can determine whether or not they trust the salesperson.

As many businesses have learned, retaining existing customers is more efficient

that getting new ones. When a customer feels that a salesperson is honest and sincere, they are likely to be satisfied in their dealings with him or her. Similarly, trust in the salesperson increases customers' anticipation of future interaction with that person and whether or not they want to do business with the person.

The research findings also have implications for the hiring and training of sales personnel. It should be important to look for good listening skills when interviewing a person for the job. Then take the time to train the new employee for better listening skills by using sensing evaluating and responding. Training should not only be addressed at the initial training of the person's employment but should be reinforced throughout their career.

The salesperson who asks what the customer needs, listens to the response, and creatively provides a solution will build a better relationship with customers and that could be very beneficial to the business.




