

Love of agriculture keeps producer at home on the farm

Neal Voss loves his job, even when the alarm goes off four hours after his head hits the pillow, even when he's making his way across a slushy field to check on a newborn calf, and especially when his four-year-old son Toby wants to tag along to "help" with chores. It's all part of making a living in Nebraska, and the way he sees it, if you have to make a living, you may as well make a living doing what you like.

"I came back to the farm because I love it," he says. "In fact, I never wanted to leave, but I had to for awhile so I could go to college."

The farm Neal refers to is a six-generation cattle production business named for his forefathers. Voss Farms sets a little west of Bruning and it's where Neal learned to raise and care for animals, work with and maintain all types of farm machinery, plant, grow and harvest crops; in short, it's where he received his preliminary education in the field of agriculture.

Today, however, as farms become more industrialized, machinery more complicated, animal science more focused and financing more about the business end of the farm instead of the household, a secondary education is almost a must for anyone stepping into the agricultural field - even for those born and raised on the farm.

"I went to the Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture at Curtis," the 2002 Bruning-Davenport graduate says, "and got my degree in Agriculture Production Systems with an emphasis on natural resources, agriculture, and beef production."

After that he spent a year as a crop scout for Aurora Coop, then landed a job selling feed and managing the feed mill in Byron from 2006 to 2009.

But, home is where his heart was and even though his job at Byron was keeping him in agriculture, it still wasn't the farm. "I've been home for two years now," he says, "which is where I always wanted to be from the start."

Voss Farms produces, raises and sells Gelbvieh cattle. In 2005, Neal says, he started selling bulls at the Cattleman's Classic, an annual beef show and sales event taking place at the Buffalo County fairgrounds in Kearney. Also, Neal said he has been working with Flying H Genetics in Arapaho to sell the farm's registered bulls.

Right now, like many cow-calf farms, Neal, his brother Cory, and father Leroy, are calving, but since Cory is still in school, the chores fall to Neal and the rest of his family.



"We check them every two hours," Neal says, "to keep the cows and calves healthy and to keep accurate birthing and genetic records."

This winter has been a kind one, Neal comments, in that temperatures have remained mild and precipitation has been minimal. "We're having a nice calving season. It hasn't been too cold, and the calves have been doing well. We just had a second set of twins recently," he said.

Neal joined the Feeders about six years ago; his father Leroy has been a member for 30 years. "It's an honor and a privilege to belong to such a great group," he said. "I like that the organization supports and promotes our local youth organizations and the beef industry. We give scholarships to high school students and provide trophies and ribbons to 4-H kids at the fair."

In fact Neal and his wife, Hebron native Tara (Orvis), are both passionate about 4-H having gone through the organization as youth and maintaining their membership as leaders today. "I credit my 4-H leader Leonard Johnson for being a positive influence for my attitude toward agriculture," Neal said. "He was my mentor and I want to carry on that tradition; I want to help youth stay actively involved in their communities through 4-H. I want to show them what farming can mean."



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USDA Rural Development Funding Announced

State Director, Maxine Moul today announced that USDA Rural Development has selected five recipients in Nebraska to receive business development assistance through the Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) program.

"In his State of the Union address last week, President Obama was clear that we need to do more to create jobs and promote economic growth. These projects will provide financial returns and help create jobs for agricultural producers, businesses and families across the country," Moul said. "This funding will promote small business expansion and entrepreneurship opportunities by providing local businesses with access capital, technical assistance and new markets for products and services."

The five Nebraska project are:

Hickman: Knotted Wood Distillery received \$49,950 for marketing support of locally produced distilled brand whiskey made from locally grown corn, wheat and milo. The product will be marketed locally in Nebraska to retail outlets, restaurants and end-users.

Martell: Robinette Farms, LLC received \$24,944 to support the marketing of locally produced vegetables to retail food establishments, wholesale food providers, and consumers. The funds will be used to develop an on-line procurement system for ordering directly from Robinette's.

North Platte: Feather River Vineyards received \$49,998 to assist in the marketing of the winery. Feather River wants to expand its sales in Kearney, Hastings, Grand Island, Omaha and Lincoln.

Plainview: Nebraska Waters, LLC received \$300,000 to promote its locally grown trout throughout Nebraska. The trout are grown on their

farm near Plainview.

Rural Lincoln: Hollenbeck Farms received \$258,250 to market locally grown all natural beef raised on its farm. Currently it is selling to local farmers markets and local retail outlets. The funds will help increase its customer base and increase the number of beef processed and delivered to the consumers.

Funding of individual recipients is contingent upon meeting the conditions of the grant agreement.

The Value-Added Producer Grants announced total more than \$40.2 million. Funds may be used for feasibility studies or business plans, working capital for marketing value-added agricultural products and for farm-based renewable energy projects. Eligible applicants include independent producers, farmer and rancher cooperatives, agricultural producer groups, and majority-controlled producer-based business ventures. Value-added products are created when a producer increases the consumer value of an agricultural commodity in the production or processing stage.

USDA, through its Rural Development mission area, administers and manages housing, business and community infrastructure and facility programs through a national network of state and local offices. Rural Development has an active portfolio of more than \$155 billion in affordable loans and loan guarantees. These programs are designed to improve the economic stability of rural communities, businesses, residents, farmers and ranchers and improve the quality of life in rural America. Care of the Newborn Immediately After Calving

Delayed passage through the birth canal in the face of a faltering placenta compromises oxygenation of the calf. Although the calf is able to breathe as soon as its nose passes the lips of the vulva, expansion of the chest is restricted by the narrow birth canal. This situation is seriously aggravated when continuous forced traction is applied.

As soon as the calf's head has passed the lips of the vulva, traction should be interrupted, the nostrils cleared of mucus and cold water applied to the head.

Again, when the calf is completely delivered, primary attention is directed toward establishing respiration. Mucus and fetal fluids should be expressed from the nose and mouth by external pressure of the thumbs along the bridge of the nose and the flat fingers underneath the jaws, sliding from the level of the eyes toward the muzzle.

The common practice of suspending the calf by its hindlegs to "clear the lungs," must be questioned. Most of the fluids that drain from the

mouth of these calves probably come from the stomach, and the weight of the intestines on the diaphragm makes expansion of the lungs difficult. The most effective way to clear the airway is by suction.

Respiration is stimulated by many factors, but only ventilation of the lungs, allow us to render help immediately. Brisk rubbing of the skin and tickling inside the nostril with a piece of straw also has a favorable effect. The phrenic nerve can be stimulated with a sharp tap on the chest slightly above and behind where the heartbeat can be felt.

DCP, ACRE Program Enrollment

Thayer County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Jay VanWesten, reminds producers that enrollment for the 2012 Direct and Counter-cyclical

Program (DCP) and the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program began on Jan. 23, 2012 and will continue through June 1, 2012.

VanWesten said producers must sign a new contract annually for each of these programs and all signatures must be obtained by the deadline.

"We encourage producers to call and set up an appointment to begin the enrollment process as soon as possible," VanWesten said. "This will allow adequate time to obtain all necessary signatures before the June 1 deadline."

The 2008 Farm Bill states that no 2012 advance direct payments for DCP and ACRE will be issued. Direct payments are paid at a rate established by statute and are expected to be made in October 2012.

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BOLD News about Lean Beef

KEARNEY, NE – Thanks to checkoff-funded research, science continues to document a growing number of healthy benefits in lean beef, while toppling some long-held negative beliefs along the way. The latest misperception to be scientifically unseated is the idea, still common among some Americans, that beef is bad for the heart.

Instead, the new checkoff-funded BOLD study (Beef in

an Optimal Lean Diet) offers substantive evidence that eating lean beef daily as part of an overall healthy diet can actually lower cholesterol – and is as effective in doing so as the most recommended heart-healthy diets, which often emphasize plant proteins and limit beef.

“This is great news to share with consumers,” said Kaiti George, a Registered Dietitian and Director of Nutrition and

Education at the Nebraska Beef Council. “They can eat lean beef every day if they choose and feel confident that science supports beef’s healthy benefits, which now include cholesterol-lowering effects. And it tastes great!”

With 29 lean beef cuts now available, Americans have a variety of healthy options, from steaks and roasts to lean ground beef, George added.

BOLD was a human clinical trial conducted by researchers at The Pennsylvania State University. Participants following BOLD diets consumed up to 5.4 oz. of lean beef daily. At the end of five weeks, they experienced a 10 percent drop in LDL (or “bad”) cholesterol, and a drop in total cholesterol levels. The BOLD results were comparable to the gold standard of heart-healthy diets, the DASH diet (Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension) which was also consumed by study participants for comparison. Many of the BOLD menus incorporated recipes from the checkoff-funded Healthy Beef Cookbook.

Checkoff dollars were allocated to study the impact of lean beef on heart risk factors when red meat, including lean beef, became increasingly restricted in dietary recommendations for heart health. Previous checkoff-funded nutrition research suggested DASH unnecessarily restricted lean beef, according to Shalene McNeill, PhD, RD, executive director of human nutrition research for NCBA, which contracts to manage checkoff programs.

“However, until the checkoff funded the BOLD work, we

didn’t have a comprehensive study that would validate the benefits of adding more lean beef to the DASH diet and other diets like it that were being recommended most often to maintain or improve heart health,” McNeill added.

The BOLD study is a prime example of how checkoff research works to help drive beef demand by pursuing and publishing the scientific evidence that ultimately persuades consumers and influencers that lean beef is not only good, but good for you, said Steve Hanson, a beef producer from Elsie, NE and chairman of the Nebraska Beef Council Board of Directors.

“The checkoff is the only research initiative focused solely on establishing and communicating the beneficial role of beef in the diet and addressing nutrition misperceptions,” Hanson explained. Unlike the research conducted by many private industries, the ultimate goal of checkoff research is to publish results in peer-reviewed scientific journals, thus creating a public record of the results.

“Checkoff nutrition research is invaluable,” Hanson added. “It takes on the kinds of questions that no one else is studying and provides the answers we as an industry need.”



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
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

Titan team takes fifth at SNC

Trevor Hartley claims title

The Thayer Central Titans finished fifth at the Southern Nebraska Conference tournament Friday, Feb. 3. The annual meet took place at Fillmore Central in Geneva.

Leading the way for the Titan team was senior Trevor Hartley who took the championship in the 182 weight division. Hartley, who entered the tournament on a 33-2 record, defeated Ken Burkhardt of Milford by an 8-5 decision in the final round.

"I thought we wrestled well," said Thayer Central coach Brett Larson, "although we started out a bit slow. We finished strong though."

Third place wins went to four Titans including Michael Feulner, Cody Krula, Dalton Kenning and Jamie Lange.

Feulner, at 152, managed to defeat Andrew Bader of Centennial, 6-2, in the consolation round to take home the bronze medal. The senior entered the SNC tourney on a 24-9 record.

Krula, at 138, earned his bronze after pinning Tanner Whitton of Wilber-Clatonia in 1:52. The sophomore entered the SNC tourney on a 28-10 record.

Kenning, at 132, finished third after defeating Ryan Zurcher of Wilber-Clatonia by a decision, 7-4. The junior entered the SNC contest on a 16-5 record.


And rounding out the bronze medal wins was Lange. At 126, the sophomore defeated Raul Garcia of South Central by a pin of 57 seconds to claim the consolation victory.

Junior Clayton Hintz, wrestling at 145, rounded out the Titans scoring after finishing fourth in his wrestling series of the day. He fell to Travis Shore of Wilber-Clatonia, 4-3, in the consolation round of the meet. Hintz entered the tourney on a 25-13 record.

Also wrestling for the Titans was senior Colby Remmers at 160 who went 0-2 on the day.

"We are starting to be more physical and control our positions and ties," the coach added. "This time of year it is a good time to start tightening things up a little and that's what the kids have been doing over the last three weeks. Going to Columbus for districts will be fun and the kids are looking to compete against some strong competition."

D-1 District Wrestling will take place Feb. 10-11 at Central Community College at Columbus. Seventeen schools will be represented at the tournament.

"We came out and played possibly our best half of the year," said Thayer Central coach Dennis Johnson. "Five different players scored in that first quarter." 
Shelby-Rising City
