



Wiedel: 'Center new era in preventative medicine

The Korff Fitness and Wellness Center dedication Sunday will play a critical role in comprehensive health care as Thayer County Health Services moves forward, Chief Executive Officer David Burd said at a dedication for the center Sunday.

Burd was the first to speak and while new to the position, he has seen a level of support for the hospital above other communities in Nebraska. Prior to coming back to Hebron, Burd worked with the Nebraska Hospital Association for approximately 12 years.

"We are fortunate here. Not every town has that level of support. There are truly a lot of folks who have dedicated a lot of time and effort — the county commissioners, hospital board, foundation, hospital guild and many others," Burd said. He also praised the hospital's medical and support team.

The outstanding support comes at a time when health care faces perhaps its greatest challenge in recent years.

"Many rural hospitals are struggling as Medicare and Medicaid and insurance companies reduce what they'll pay for health care services," Burd noted.

Rural hospitals may now be even more dependent on contributions

than ever, such as the \$6.9 million gift from Glenn Korff that brought the wellness center to reality.

Gratitude resonated throughout the dedication program with hospital board president, Loren Wiedel, taking the audience back to Glenn Korff's father Paul and several others who were instrumental in starting the hospital in 1946.

"Then, in the 1960's, Paul and other community members initiated the bond project that became the hospital," Wiedel continued. "Over the years, we have continued to partner with the hospital through three renovations and a fourth one starting. We cannot say enough, thank you. We truly appreciate it."

Glenn Korff's brother, Ken, was also in attendance for the ceremony.

"I think it's a wonderful, a wonderful contribution, for future generations. I wish them all God-speed for their health," he said after ceremony.

The Foundation for TCHS also played an important role and president Steve Anderson said Hebron was lucky to have such a facility.

"It's second to none. For a small town to have the equipment, facility and staff — we're very lucky. We need everyone to come out here and use it, or at least come and have a look," Anderson said.

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held in front of the wellness center, which is on the north end of the hospital and faces 1st Street.

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Flying career about to take off for senior

There is a tiny airstrip in Montana for hikers to scale a mountain accessible only by airplane. The airstrip is on Riley Templin's list.

"Flying lets you go places," he said.

Templin, a senior at Thayer Central, will soon fly for his private pilot's license, his ticket to a career in agricultural aviation.

He was always interested in aviation and his mother's cousin is in the Blue Angels. Templin began working on his career in December of 2015 in Lincoln.

"Flying is expensive, but it's like paying for college," he said.

After he started learning the craft in Lincoln, Templin saw he could do the same in Hebron at the airport. It would save him time and money.

"I met with Steve one day and it just made sense," Templin said about Steve Bateman of Chocks Away Aviation.

He began working with Bateman in April and took his first solo in September.

"September 29, 2016," Templin clarified.

Templin's education was at times sporadic because of flight expenses. He went without lessons sometimes for a full month to build up funds from working for the Meyers Aerial Service ground crew.

When he had the time, Templin flew with Bateman in a 1981 Cessna 152, Bateman's personal plane. It was smaller than the 1991 Piper Templin flew in Lincoln and reacted differently to wind.

After a pre-solo flight test and meeting other requirements, Templin said Bateman was confident he could fly and land on his own. He is able to turn around a point, which is a circular maneuver around a point of interest, such as a grain bin or a pivot.

He can make an "S" turn, too, with one wing up while correcting for the wind.

"Everything is about wind with flying," he said.

He was renting Bateman's plane and decided to join the Blue Valley Flying Club.

"Now, I am flying a club plane. It's like the one in Lincoln, but older," he said.

Flight experience is measured in hours and Templin is at a little over 40, the minimum needed for a pilot's license.

A couple of months ago, Templin took the 60-question private pilot

written exam. But, he said the 60 questions are pulled from close to 1,000 questions and test takers need to know the answers.

The next step will be Templin's "check ride" with a flight examiner in Beatrice. Templin will fly the Cessna over. Bateman will first have to endorse Templin's log book. The check ride is a two-part test — oral and flying.

The toughest part for him will be the diversion.

"I will have to divert to an unplanned airport," he said. His examiner will create a scenario for the emergency landing.

"Within a matter of two to three minutes, I will have to know where we are going to land, calculate the distance and keep the plane flying at the same time," he said.

Templin said currently, more pilots are needed.

"There are a lot of people losing interest in aviation. The community is really special. Anyone that flies is passionate about it," he said.

"Flying lets you go places."

1887 130 Years Ago

W.L. Thompson has disposed of his stock of merchandise to a company, composed of S. Sherock, Wm. Ellsworth, W. L. Thompson and Benj. Young. The new firm has incorporated under the name of The Farmers' Commercial Company, with a capital stock of \$10,000.

Hurrah! Hurrah! We sound the jubilee on the completion of the Great Rock Island Road. The C.K.&N. Division of the R. I. Completed to Hebron today. An event which will stand forever in the future history of Thayer County. Today is the proudest day in the history of Hebron. "The Great Rock Island" is no longer to be hoped for--it is here--and judging by the hundreds of people assembled at the new and elegant depot, we should say that Hebron rejoiced. The first engine is an immense machine, splinter new and bears the initials, "C. K. & N. R'y." In large letters on the tender the significant words, "The Great Rock Island Route." All the rolling stock bears the same words. The rails are of steel and direct from the North Chicago Mills.

M. A. Persons, who has been in the grocery business at this place from some time past, is selling out his entire stock in job lots, preparatory to leaving Hebron. He leaves on account of the poor health of Mrs. Persons. He has accepted a position with Saxton, Offerd & Colby, of Topeka, Kan., as traveling salesman for their fine horses.

Davenport Doings: Saturday last was warm enough for the bees to fly...Wm. Barber, a young man in the employ of Mr. J. M. McReynolds, died Saturday night last, after a short illness of brain fever...Mr. M. Bolton, president of the Bank of Davenport, accompanied by his new bride from Iowa, came in on Wednesday morning's train.

Hubbell Hits: Our hog men paid as high as \$4.20 for hogs last week...John A. McFarland is prospecting for coal on his own account...Mrs. Ward, wife of our popular restaurant man, was quite severely burned Saturday morning. Cause--something wrong with a gasoline stove.

Belvidere: Put Bliss's little boy has been very badly poisoned by wearing highly colored stockings.

1897 120 Years Ago

It is said there are counterfeit silver dollars in circulation in this city; well, we are gratified to learn that there is even a semblance of money in circulation.

The parties implicated in the holiday cutting affray have forgotten, forgiven and foresworn all enmity, plead guilty, taken their little fine, buried their grievances, and made up.

Nine years ago Jan. 12, 1888, was the day of the memorable Nebraska blizzard when so many lives were lost on the broad prairies. This year's anniversary gave a sufficient taste of a blizzard by the blow and bluster which kept the air filled with snow until the sleet set in and chilled even the wind into submission.

Schults is putting up ice from a large pond north of town, therefore, Henry and Herman are absent from school...On Jan. 21, the bell of the German Lutheran Church announced that John Wilhelms of Iowa and Tena Wilhelms of Bruning were about to close up their Books of Life on the "Single Entry" plan, and to begin anew on the "Double Entry" science, each to admit a partner who was to share the gains and losses equally. May they have a profitable partnership and each year find the "Present Worth" increased...Elder Wheeler is still explaining Adventism at the Remer building while Rev. Hawkins expounds Methodism at the church.

1907 110 Years Ago

The home of Andy Callegar is quarantined, the little girl having scarlet fever.

Johnny Dill, who makes his home with John Segin, fell through the ice on the river last Saturday afternoon and as he was going under for the third time was bravely saved by Frank Stewart, who also went through, but was pulled out by the others.

Mrs. Lisa Meyers Hoover died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Sheeler, five miles east of Hebron on Jan. 21, being at the time of her death 84 years, 1 month and 23 days of age. Burial was at the Bethel Church cemetery, five miles northwest of Carleton.

The obituary of James Gates who died at West Liberty, Iowa, at the home of his son, Albert E., Jan. 4, appears in this issue. Grandpa Gates made his home here with his son, C. M. Gates, and his daughter, Mrs. F. J. Hendershot, for several years. He had reached the ripe age of 94 years, 10 months and 16 days.

About a quarter past eight on Wednesday evening, Hebron citizens were shocked on finding the lifeless body of Mrs. W. A. Lockwood, who had laid dead on the floor in her home about 24 hours before being discovered.

Mrs. David Olds, a prominent pioneer of Thayer County, and a former resident of Carleton, died Dec. 26, 1916, at Powell River, B.C., Canada, at the age of 80 years, 5 months and 8 days. Her husband, David Olds, who died three years ago last March, formerly claimed to be the first subscriber to the Hebron Journal. Mr. and Mrs. Olds moved from the east and located on a farm near Carleton in 1871. He later opened a general store in Carleton and his wife had a millinery shop. They were charter members of the M. E. Church of Carleton. She sang a beautiful soprano.

With fuel shortages reaching the critical stages in many parts of the northeastern United States, southern Nebraska and residents of Thayer County can count themselves fortunate in that their heating fuels seem to be in sufficient quantities to outlast the cold winter. In parts of the country, factories and schools are being forced to shut down in an effort to conserve heating fuels. According to officials of Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Co. and local suppliers of propane fuel, that isn't likely to happen locally.

A settlement between defense lawyers for Rosemary Harris and the Thayer County Attorney's office led last Wednesday, Jan. 26, to a plea of guilty on a reduced charge of manslaughter. Harris had previously been awaiting trial in District Court on a charge of first degree murder in the death of her common-law husband, Herbert Crane. In concluding their justification to the court for the reduction in charge County Attorney Hubbard said that, "It is possible that having a trial might result in a conviction of a higher degree than manslaughter but on the other hand it is quite possible that a trial would result in a failure to get a conviction of any charge whatsoever..." Sentencing was tentatively set for March 3 in District Court.

"We're going to be faced with two choices--raise taxes or eliminate services," Hergott said.

Eagles take third in tourney

On Jan. 23, the BDS Eagles Boys Basketball team opened play in the Crossroads Conference Tournament with McCool Junction as the team's first round opponent.

Due to weather, the two teams were unable to play their regular season game, so this was the first look they had at each other this season.

The game started slowly with both teams playing sound defensively.

Neither team could really get in a rhythm and the first half ended with the Eagles holding a slim 15-13 lead.

"Normally when you hold someone to 13 points for a half, you go into the break feeling pretty good about your chances," Head coach Fred Kluck said. "We really missed some opportunities to put a few more points on the board, so the halftime speech was mostly about taking advantage of good scoring chances."

The Eagles did just that, outscoring McCool 25-14 in the third quarter and breaking open the game to finish with a 58-39 advantage.

Three Eagles were in double figures with Kale Kleinschmidt leading the way at 14 points. He also pulled down a team high eight rebounds and led with four assists and three steals.

Caden Norder added 13 points and John Christensen came off the bench to provide 12. Anthony Beavers scored nine; Brett Holtzen added six; and Garrett Schardt had four to close out the scoring.

In the semifinal round, the Eagles met up with Cross County, that also had a weather-related postponement, although the regular season game with Cross County was rescheduled for Feb. 2.

The semifinal game ended with disappointment and despite holding the lead for the majority of the game, the Eagles let it slip away and lost in double overtime.

"We really had a couple of chances to get the lead to a safe place when we were up seven or eight points," Kluck said. "They just wouldn't let us get that margin up to double digits. They played solid defense and it seemed like when they needed to hit a big shot they did it."

The Eagles played well, early jumping out to a 17-13 first quarter advantage, but by the half, CC had cut the margin 26-24.

The Eagles pushed the lead back up to seven with about two minutes to go in the third, but were outscored 8-0 down the stretch, including a banked in 3-pointer as the quarter ended and CC held the lead 37-36 entering the final stanza.

"That was a big turning point I thought," Kluck said.

The first overtime went back and forth with Beavers hitting a huge 3-pointer to tie the game late.

"Despite the outcome, I really felt like Anthony played easily his strongest game of the year so far," Kluck said. "He scored well, rebounded well and played really sound defense to help keep us in the game."

Cross County played for a final shot at the buzzer, which they missed to send it to a second overtime.

This time, CC hit free throws to ice the victory and the game ended with CC holding a 67-57 lead.
