Harris medals in third for Class D, season ends

Titan Hank Harris placed third in the state for Thayer Central and Class D via a 4-3 decision over Robert Muench of Sutherland.

Harris (220, 40-11 going in) was the only Titan wrestler to medal. He scored 17 points. His first round was won with a 13-2 major decision over Ben Cantu of Morrill.

Darik Holt of Superior took Harris with a 6-4 decision in the quarterfinal.

Then Harris beat Jon Escalante of Winside out in the second consolation round because of an injury at the 2:34 mark. For the third consolation round, Harris garnered another winning decision (5-4) over Seth Wentworth of West Holt and in the consolation semi round, a 10-4 decision was made in Harris' favor over Anthony Starr of Southwest.

"Hank had a fantastic Saturday," Titan Coach Dan

Desmond said. "The kid he beat got second last year."

Desmond said he was proud of all five wrestlers, who each won a match.

"I'm very proud of how they competed at conference and continued. We asked them to give it their all each match and they did," he said.

In the 126-pound class, Keegan Casey (39-7) took Brady Gracey of Mullen to the mat in 2:27. He lost the quarterfinal to Dylan Swenson of Oakland-Craig to a 13-6 decision, but turned around to win by major decision (13-3) over Sean Mann of Winside. The third consolation round went to Mitchell McKibbin of Bayard in a 4-2 decision.

Damian Stewart (28-24) at 132 pounds lost the first round Andrew Herley of Neligh-Oakdale in a tech fall in 5:19. Stewart won the first consolation round against RJ Tutlam-Hazen of Medicine

Valley after Tutlam-Hazen fell in 3:57. In the second consolation round, Stewart lost to Jacob Johnson of Archbishop Bergan because of an 18-10 major decision in Johnson's favor.

Elliot Epstein (160, 35-16) was up for his first consolation round when he won by decision (10-6) over Bryce Running Hawk of Hay Springs. The first round went to Chandler Donscheski of Palmer in 3:02 and the second consolation round was handed to Breydon Mlady of West Holt via a 6-0 decision.

Dietric Kenning (182, 33-20) won his first consolation round by a 5-3 decision against Gage Herbert of Guardian Angels Central Catholic. His first round went to Cody Downey of Southwest in 1:49. The second consolation round was won by Seth Racicky of Ansley-Litchfield in 1:13.

Junior Megan Grote got hot in the third quarter, scoring the first nine points of the quarter for the Eagles.



Caden Norder who had a solid all-around performance, scoring 10 points, grabbing eight rebounds, passing for six assists, and taking away three steals.


Noel Gines added seven points while Garrett Schardt, Hunter Krehnke and John Christensen each scored six.



Burd identifies issues facing rural hospitals

Two weeks into the chief executive position at Thayer County Health Services, David Burd noticed the "ton of talent" in the hospital's medical staff and the need to evaluate areas of the hospital for improvement and growth.

"We want to fill in the gaps and continue to make sure we're providing high quality services," Burd said.

"My ultimate goal is TCHS is the provider of choice for everyone in Thayer County and surrounding areas."

If the hospital is going to be successful, everyone must be on the same team and that includes the public, Burd added.

It also includes the current and coming challenges, such as the uncertainty with the future of the Affordable Care Act and reductions in Medicare/Medicaid cost-based reimbursement.

"The healthcare landscape down the road might look very different. The environment is uncertain," he said.

"The president's discussion of repealing and replacing ACA - we don't know what that really means."

He said the ACA, although not perfect, has been a law since 2010 and while he

isn't sure what the best path forward is, he acknowledged people are worried.

"It is justified," he said.

Such a law affecting health care for millions of people might just be Burd's cue to tap his experience in state and federal legislation.

"I believe in being active. Hospital leaders have a responsibility to participate in policy development and advocacy," he said.

For 12 years, Burd worked on finance policy issues, was the chief financial officer and vice president of finance at the Nebraska Hospital Association.

Before the association, Burd worked directly in hospitals and was also TCHS's chief financial officer in the late 1990's.

Burd's professional training includes several years in financial roles with Bryan Health.

He's in familiar company with hospital and state agency leaders, the legislature, congressional delegation and regulations.

"It puts me in a good position to be successful," Burd said about his background.

The shrinking cost-based reimbursement to rural hospitals meeting critical access standards as stipulated by the Centers for Medicaid and Medicare Services will con-

tinue to gnaw at Burd while he sees smaller hospitals struggle with the cuts.

Much of the reimbursement comes from federal programs, Burd said. He believes the federal government will be looking to reduce its deficit and the pressure to slice programs may affect rural critical access hospitals like TCHS.

In addition, Burd said commercial insurance companies are adjusting their costs for care.

"We will have to adjust and do more with less," Burd said.

Doing more with less means optimizing other funding sources, like contributions.

"There is a lot of support there," Burd said.

He wants to see those needing services to look to TCHS and that means its outlying clinics in Deshler, Chester, Bruning, Davenport and Milligan that continue to be evaluated to make sure patient needs are being met.

"We are looking at ways to market those clinics and beneficial to the people who live there," Burd said.

As he settles in, Burd said he is always working. The hospital is currently transitioning software for patient care, records and billing, and construction for the cafeteria and kitchen is ongoing.
