

## MUDECAS TOURNNEY

### Eagles men struggle

The BDS Eagles went 1-1 to finish down at the annual MUDECAS tournament in Beatrice last week.

#### Exeter-Milligan

The Eagles were able to defeat Exeter-Milligan, 46-32, in the loser's bracket after Pawnee City defeated them 41-35 in the first round of the tournament.

In the contest against the Timberwolves, BDS jumped to an early lead in the first period and went into the break 25-12 by controlling the boards. The Eagles had 30 rebounds through the four periods while holding Exeter-Milligan to 19.

BDS's Michael Houchin snagged 10 rebounds on his own. "Mike had a big defensive challenge to face and he did a nice job of keeping his focus on that," said BDS coach Fred Kluck. "And he still got on the boards to help us down inside."

In the game, the Eagles used 12-23 field goals and 13-24 freethrows while holding Exeter-Milligan to 10-27 field goals and 3-7 freethrows.

Ryan Tietjen led the way in shooting with 17 points while adding 11 rebounds and six assists. Kendrick Holeman added 12 points.

#### Pawnee City

The BDS Eagles fell to Pawnee City in the first round of the MUDECAS tournament Jan. 10 at the Beatrice Auditorium. The eight-team Class A competition touted a tough schedule for the Bruning-Davenport/Shickley squad who was seeded 7th.

Pawnee used all of the second half to take away the Eagles' lead who were 11-8 in the first period and 17-16 at the break. Pawnee won the game 41-35 giving BDS its third loss of the season. The Eagles fell to Giltner prior to the MUDECAS tournament and fell to Deshler in the first half of the season. Ryan Tegmeier led the

Eagles with 21 points and nine rebounds. The team was good for 24 rebounds against Pawnee's 20 and shot 15-33 field goals with 3-7 freethrows. Pawnee City shot 16-39 field goals and hit 8-13 freethrows.

Solid efforts from Bridgette Baden, 18 points and 14 rebounds, and Kinsey Tietjen, 15 points and eight rebounds, kept the game in the Titan favor. Claire Timmerman dished out five assists.

"As a team we shot the ball very well, hitting 32 percent of our shots from the field and were 12 of 19 in freethrows.

#### Sutton

For the second night in a row, the Lady Titans got things rolling after a shakey start to the game. Trailing the first three periods, the Titans rallied in the fourth to go 15-6 against the Fillies and secure the game.

"I can't say enough about the composure of our girls down the stretch," Coach Long said. "Sutton cut a seven-point deficit to four points on a three-

pointer by Maria Van Kirk with 45 seconds remaining in the game. At 25 seconds left, Jasmine Kovacs went to the line for a one and one, connected on the first and then rebounded her own miss on the second and scored a top-point basket to put the us up by seven again."

Kinsey Tietjen led the attack with 18 points, 10 rebounds and four steals. Bridgette Baden had a good night chipping in 13 points and pulling down 12 defensive rebounds to record her second double-double in as many nights. Claire Timmerman again led the team in assists recording seven on the night.

# Pages of the Past...

From The Hebron Journal-Register

1882

## 130 Years Ago

Better get vaccinated. Only five banks in this county.

Three newspapers and three saloons only in Thayer County.

A "smile" in the barroom makes tears in the home; remember that, young man.

Thirty-two business houses in this county handle groceries in considerable quantities.

There are 57 schoolhouses in the county, several of which are large and expensive buildings.

The corner lot belonging to Mr. Paine, on Lincoln Avenue, is spoken of as a suitable place for the town hall.

Not a marriage license has been issued in this county for the year 1882. We are not going to raise a row about the matter, however.

The Hubbell Times office is to move up to Hebron in a few days.

Ice men all over the country are spreading their four-inch smiles to see the ice crop ripening. It was feared for a time that the chinch bug, the wet weather and the January thaw would reduce the yield in three bushels per acre.

John G. Rice, one of the old and well known settlers of the county died of consumption.

A prisoner named Lewis Worthington, escaped from the penitentiary some time since. Some time ago he stopped one night in Chester where he committed several small thefts and burglaries. Constable Tom Malowney set out after the convict and succeeded in capturing him in a freight car at Hubbell after which he was turned over to the warden of the penitentiary.

The citizens of Hebron met and decided to build a good town hall and reading room to cost about \$2,500 to \$3,000. It was also decided where the buildings would be erected and what plan will be adopted. The plan which now meets with most approbation was drawn by John Hughes and contemplates a frame building 36x84 feet. Of this, 20 feet will be cut off from one end for a stage and 16 feet off the other end for an entrance hall and free reading room and library. The studding to be 18 feet long with a basement under one end for a supper room, etc. A 20x36 gallery will cover the reading room and entrance hall, thus giving a seating capacity of about 600.

The small-pox scare has extended all over the state.

A.H. Trowbridge started east to Hancock, Mich., where his father, wife and one month old son will welcome him.

Otto Seibolds of Peoria, Ill., will move from that place to his farm four miles west of Friedensau.

Mrs. Maria Correll has now moved into her new building where she will be glad to see her friends and many new customers.

There are 15 drug stores in the county.

Only eight church edifices in this county. Eleven hardware establishments do business in this county.

Everything that's good and cooked to a turn — that's what Mrs. Huse feeds her boarders on. And the reputation of the Gettis house continues to spread.

W.B. Robberts had traded his dwelling house to Miles Heath for a team. He has moved his family into the house belonging to Mr. Jas. A. Soule. Rumor says that Bill is arranging to start a "boarding house" in the near future.

Mr. Bailey will surpass Dr Piggott in amount of real estate investments if he does not let up on land purchasing soon.

The church festival for the benefit of Rev. McDonald was a pleasant affair. Receipts about \$30.


## 10 Years Ago

## Ross Takes Bard's Lines For Our Times

The following article is taken from *The Salt Lake Tribune, Salt Lake City, Utah*. Roma Menke submitted this story about her niece, Aden Ross (Kathy Ross), the daughter of Gerald and Ida Ross, former Hebron residents. Ross was a young child when she moved with her family from Hebron to Utah.

Aden Ross is only one of the most seasoned drama professionals who would dare take characters from six of William Shakespeare's best-known plays to create a cast of her own creation.

Ross has spent 25 years teaching the Bard at the University of Utah, Westminster College and Utah State University. "Lady Macbeth" is the Utah playwright's 25th produced play.

Ross had to let the first draft of what became "Lady Macbeth," cool on the windowsill before she could perfect it.

The play had its first reading at the 2004 Utah Shakespeare Festival's New American Playwrights Project. Plan-B Theatre Company producing director Jerry Rapier, said that the script was very angry. She had put all her political rage into her title character because of the U.S. invasion of Iraq that had just happened.

"Lady Macbeth" was then reincarnated. The work goes beyond one political figure into an entire political and economic environment for the company's upcoming world premiere on Oct. 27. The play's fast and furious dialogue burst with wit while

the outrage over the U.S. invasion remained palpable.

"The best revenge is comedy," Ross said. "It's a comic version of Occupy Wall Street. It's not an open diatribe, but underneath it all is inane leadership. Once you love Shakespeare, and get energized enough, the play can write itself. And it pretty much did."

With Ross' earlier draft, heavy on references to the Iraq invasion, the new script references a disappearing middle class, tax and banking schemes, unemployment and religious and ethical systems that seem no help.

"The Merchant of Venice" shout-outs to various other Shakespeare plays, as Ross spotlights Lady Macbeth as a power-hungry figure. As a queen of Scotland is bent on expanding her reign.

Lady Macbeth is sympathetic as someone who cannot see outside her own set of circumstances. She's a power-hungry King Lear.

Ross' play will ring familiar even to those who've never read even one of his plays, says director Rapier.

Director Rapier says, that Shakespeare's works remain timeless thanks to — rather than in spite of — the specificity to Elizabethan times.

"I live just a half block away from where the Occupy SLC protesters have camped in Pioneer Park," he said. The things I hear coming out of that park are almost the same as what I hear in rehearsals."

## Prescribed Burn Training Workshop Scheduled

Pheasants Forever along with the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission will be hosting a day-long training to discuss prescribed burning techniques. This training will be a basic training for landowners with limited knowledge and experience of prescribed fire, or is a good refresher for those that have not had a recent training. Landowners in Thayer, Jefferson, Nuckolls, and Fillmore counties are encouraged to attend.

Implementing more prescribed fire to manage grasslands is a big boost to grassland health and wildlife populations, but should only be done after proper planning to make sure all safety concerns are addressed. While there are many reasons to prescribe burn, most of the recent increased interest in burning has come from producers wanting to control the spread of red cedars in their rangeland that reduces grass production for cattle, or from landowners needing to complete required management of land enrolled in CRP.

Others who have attended similar workshops in the past are also interested in improving wildlife habitat, controlling other unwanted plant species, preventing potential for wildfires by removing built-up residue, or they just simply want to know more about burning because rela-

tives, friends, and neighbors are doing it.

The basic training will provide presentations on when, why, and how to conduct a prescribed burn as well as how to write a prescribed burn plan. Fire behavior and safety considerations will also be discussed. The Basic Training Workshop is being held in Deshler on Friday, Jan. 20, from 9 a.m. to 4:15 p.m., in the south meeting room of the activity center on the Thayer County Fairgrounds.

Besides the above topics, avenues for gaining the proper equipment for conducting a safe prescribed burn through Prescribed Burn Associations will also be discussed. Those interested in attending are asked to pre-register for a lunch count, although walk-ins are welcome.
