Board calls for public input

The Thayer Central Board of Education presented the past, present and possible future of district facilities to a crowd of under 30 people in a Jan. 24 meeting meant to invite public comment on how the district should move forward.

The past covered recent improvements, including eight new classrooms, tornado shelter and computer room, secured entryways, playground areas and bringing all students together on the same campus. Additional upgrades the Thayer Central community has made are the high school and elementary gym roofs, along with new roof on the northwest corner of the high school, keyless locks, new storage areas under stadium bleachers and varsity locker room improvements.

Elementary principal Kurk Wiedel spoke on the benefits to having all his students together with middle and high school students.

He said the family atmosphere has increased since the move from the primary building.

"We're able to share and use shared staff better," he said. "We appreciate the security of the building."

Wiedel is concerned about safety and said connecting the buildings is important.

For the present, the district's scheduled improvements were discussed. Those include the high school chemistry lab, middle school restrooms remodel and elementary classrooms in the original building.

The district's debt schedule was also explained, starting with a

Shrimp farm to upgrade

As Dietrich Brinegar prepared to give yet another tour at Nebraska Shrimp Farm in Carleton Jan. 26, he told a small crowd it is his dad's fault he started the business.

"He showed me an article and I couldn't stop thinking about it. I researched and visited a couple of shrimp farms," he said.

RDM Aquaculture in Indiana is where Brinegar orders his shrimp from.

"They helped us in setting up the system and the mechanics of it," Brinegar said.

The shrimp are about 40 to 50 days old when he receives them. They are transferred into tanks at Nebraska Shrimp Farm. Brinegar has 16 tanks and eight more are set to go in.

On one wall will be the farm's nursery Brinegar is planning. The nursery will allow him to receive 10-day-old shrimp and he won't have to rely on suppliers.

"I'm excited for the nursery to get going. Right now, we are depending on our suppliers," he said.

Suppliers in Florida and Texas were affected by the hurricanes and are in a lull.

Stocking was missed in December and will be in February.

"March is the next batch," Brinegar said.

Drought increases in country

According to the federal drought information website, about 70 percent of Nebraska is abnormally dry and although a winter storm blanketed some parts of the state to the Great Lakes, the dry conditions in the Southwest and Southern Plains continue to push north, catching Nebraska in the middle of below normal precipitation from the southwest and drought to the north.

The unique weather conundrum includes drought to the north and northwest extended into Montana and the western Dakotas.

It subsided some last fall, but not enough, University of Nebraska-Lincoln Agricultural Extension Climatologist Al Dutcher said.

"What I'm more concerned about is this spring," Dutcher said. "If we don't see the precipitation in the Rockies, we will take a hit on our pastures."

Below normal snow-pack in the Rockies is feeding the Arkansas and Missouri Rivers. La Nina weather effects only add to the problem.

The risk for drought is only increasing, Dutcher, whose background is in meteorology, said.

More irrigation may be needed to compensate for an inadequate snow-pack.

"Someone this year is going to experience drought," he said.

Storm activity predicted to the east of Nebraska leaves the Cornhusker State high and dry, Dutcher added.

Farmers can still produce healthy yields, but it will come at a cost if grain prices don't rise to offset increasing irrigation, resulting in a narrow profit margin.

Wheat fields could also be affected, placing a demand on hay.

One of Dutcher's concerns is the western third of the state's battles with snowstorms in April and early May will result in reduced weights, increased feed costs and lost calves.

"Those are nightmare scenarios, but if the snows don't come, now you're looking down the road at what your pastures are going to do," he said. "Either way we go, it's going to cause problems."

He imagines most producers would prefer snowstorm activity rather than the loss of pasture. He advises them to watch the weather patterns over the next couple of months.

"The likely scenario is we will

see the drought expand. I would really try to have a plan in place," Dutcher said. "It's always good to have a management plan in place, wet or dry."

The national climate outlook is backing the drought expansion theory. Temperatures in the Rockies are above normal, adding to the below normal precipitation. Snow-pack is less than 80 percent of what it should be, and Dutcher said if the theory develops, it will develop rapidly.


As the drought drops off toward an El Nino fall, the state will enter a temporary "recovery" period that could hamper harvest.

Last fall was a widespread of intense rainfall, but after Oct. 10, conditions were exceptionally dry and if it hadn't been for the intense rain, Dutcher said he suspects the entire state would be covered in drought.

As it stands, most of Nebraska is under a drought with non-drought areas in the northwestern part of the state and a strip across the center stretching to the Missouri River near Yankton, S.D. and dipping south a tad.

Because the atmosphere does not simply switch directions,

The Odd Fellows have purchased new furniture for their use, and the use of the Knights of Pythias and United Workmen.

The large number of weddings which have recently occurred in this county indicates, among other things, that the climate here appears to afford about the right temperature for the successful growing of the Love-plant.

A number of charitable ladies of Hebron met on Monday and organized the "Hebron Benevolent Society." The object of the society is to relieve destitution and suffering by extending material assistance in the nature of fuel, food and clothing to those in need.

F. J. Hendershot has put in his supply of ice for next summer.

A large quantity of ice is being shipped from this place by car to Geneva.

Wm. Hill has put up 150 tons of ice.

There will be 53 Sundays in 1888. This will give us an opportunity to be one fifty-second better at the end of the year than we were at the beginning.

At the regular meeting of the school board Monday evening it was decided to circulate a petition calling for a special meeting, for the purpose of voting on a proposition for bonds to erect a \$15,000 school building.

The editor of the Journal started Tuesday morning for Des Moines, Iowa. Gov. Thayer requested his attendance as a member of the staff. The occasion is the inauguration of Gov. Larrabee of Iowa. The Governor of Nebraska was invited to attend the ceremonies accompanied by his staff and with the hearty goodwill and courtesy for which the Chief Executive of this state is distinguished, the invitation was accepted.

Mr. Lennon, the marble cutter, reports business is good.

Charley Foreman has filled his ice house. It contains about 200 tons.

All the men and teams available are finding employment in putting up ice at present.

North Hubbell Notes: We learn that Omar Hazzard traded his town property for a stock of hardware in the town of Davenport.

From the amount of building rock being hauled into Hebron this winter, it is fair to anticipate an extensive building boom in the spring.

The local dealers, Roland and Goodman, have offered very convincing arguments in favor of the power mode of farming and have been successful in selling five outfits of the McCormick-Deering make to farmers in this and adjoining neighborhoods. From the Lincoln Journal: William H. Jennings of Lincoln, a veteran of the Civil War, called at G.A.R. headquarters at the capitol

Saturday. Mr. Jennings formerly lived at Davenport, and represented Thayer county two terms in the state senate. He engaged in banking for many years. He was a member of the Crockett Brigade, an Iowa organization that saw much service in the war. He said he had read that Congressman Edward Howard of Nebraska had introduced a bill in Congress to pay expenses of transporting northern and southern soldiers to Washington for a reunion. "Mr. Howard says the last vestige of regional feeling has disappeared," said Mr. Jennings. "I am willing to meet the Confederate soldiers any time and any place, on one condition, which is that the meeting shall be under the stars and stripes and not under the rebel flag. It is now impossible to display the stars and stripes in Washington without the rebel flag in conjunction. Senator Norris has introduced a similar bill in the senate.

William VanBurn, who was accompanying Howard Alvord in the truck, sues Rathbun for \$75 hospital and medical expense and \$1,000 for injuries. Nebraska Master Gardener volunteer program begins

Do you love spending your time outside during the spring and summer months? Do you love to garden? As we dream of warmer weather, we begin to think about planting our gardens and taking care of our lawns. If you are the type of individual who loves to garden and volunteer, the master gardener training is just what you need.

The Nebraska Master Gardener program is a horticulture related volunteer training program based in many counties throughout the state. It has been part of University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension since 1976.

Master Gardener volunteers are trained by UNL Extension faculty and staff. They contribute time as volunteers working with their local Extension office to provide horticulture-related information to their community.

Participants are required to complete 40 hours of training and 40 hours of volunteer service throughout the first two years of their involvement in the program. Master Gardener volunteers retain their certification through 10 hours of annual training and 20 hours of volunteering each year.

Volunteer hours can be completed through a number of various options. Volunteer hours can be gained by: planting and maintaining demonstration gardens, collecting data on research projects, helping with county and state fair activities, speaking to community groups, leading garden tours, collecting plant samples, answering phone questions at the extension office, and teaching

youth programs.

The topics to be covered during the Master Gardener training in 2018 include: Teaming up with Community Gardens, Rots and Spots, Vegetable Gardening, Wildlife Management, Extending Your Gardening Season, Landscape Management, and Insects. The content of the topics is focused on the home gardener, but those employed in the green industry are also welcome.

This will be seven weeks of classes that meet on Tuesdays, from 6:30-9:00 p.m., from February 6 to March 20, at the Gage County Extension office in Beatrice. The classes will also be offered at the Saline County Extension Office in Wilber on Wednesdays, from 1-3:30 p.m., from February 14 to March 28.

The classes will fulfill 20 hours of training. The cost of this training is \$15 for returning master gardeners and \$170 for new master gardeners which includes the cost of the book, a nametag, and a t-shirt.

There are options for MG training within other counties. If you are outside the Beatrice or Wilber area and would like to become a Master Gardener, please contact Nicole or your local Extension Office.

Heart disease kills more women than all forms of cancer combined, and it kills more women than men. It's often called the Silent Killer because heart disease victims often don't even know they have it, so they don't get treated or make healthy lifestyle changes.

A single visit to their healthcare provider can give women a head to heart view of their overall health. Their doctor can give them valuable information on their risk factors and how to prevent heart disease.

All women need to understand how women are different from men when it comes to the heart. Understand the differences can help women take control of their heart health.

How is heart disease different in women and men?

- High Blood Pressure: Women with high blood pressure are at a higher risk for a heart attack than men. Too often the heart attack symptoms in women go undetected for long periods of time because they are mistaken for other health conditions.

- Emotional stress and depression: There is growing

evidence that women, who have a lot of stress or those experience depression, are at great risk for developing heart disease. Depression can increase a woman's risk of having a heart attack by 50 percent.

- Heart attack: The symptoms for a heart attack in women can be different than what men experience. Chest pain is often not a symptom for women. For women a heart attack may be pain in their shoulder, back or even jaw pain. Women may even mistake a heart attack for heartburn or the flu.

Women who have suffered a heart attack seem to have more damage to their coronary arteries and have more blood vessel issues. For women, both the rates of recovery and those of proper treatment decrease drastically, especially in ethnic women - black and Hispanic, to be more exact.

Go Red for Women is part of the American Heart Association's efforts to help save women's lives. The most important message they want women to know is that 80 percent of heart disease in women is preventable. Studies have shown that through education and prevention, more women are beating heart disease than ever before.

Please join the American Heart Association and Thayer County Health Services this Friday, February 3, by wearing red. By wearing red, you will not only be helping to raise awareness, but you will also show the women in your life that their heart health matters.

How long do you think the numbers will stay consistent when you don't know what is for lunch?



Lady Eagles win tourney

the effects of La Nina will overlap into the second half of the spring season, where moisture is expected to make up for the dry period.

But those odds are low to make up for the deficit, Dutcher said.

"If it turns aggressively wet, that puts problems on calving and planting," he said.

Critical areas of the state and country are reporting no trace of moisture.

"It is widespread," Dutcher said. "Lots of them are anywhere between 80 and 100 days (before precipitation)."

To qualify for measurable precipitation, moisture must equal to 1/100th of an inch over a period of 100 days.

"There can be a mist in the air or it can mist all day and

you still won't have 1/100th of an inch to qualify," Dutcher said.

Intense dry areas are northeastern New Mexico, southeastern Colorado, southwestern Kansas, Western Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle.

People in the Texas Panhandle never really recovered from the Dirty 30's, Dutcher said.

"We will be watching to see if this trend continues. We still get dust storms and historically, that is an area of some of the worst droughts in US history," he said.

He hates to be a "Debbie Downer," he said, but producers and all those associated with them should prepare.

"You don't want to be blindsided," he said.

Why most farmers don't plow their fields

Ever wonder why more and more farmers are leaving "trash" in their fields after harvest? Those corn stalks, corn cobs and leaves are called "residue"—and they are helping farmers improve soil quality and manage their crops and fields in the face of extreme weather events.

Plowing the soil has been compared to a tornado ripping through a city. While that may be an extreme analogy, plowing does disrupt the living organisms in the soil and exposes more of the soil to the air, which accelerates evaporation and loss of essential soil moisture and nutrients.

As a result, many farmers have adopted no-till or minimum tillage practices which leave residue in the field—and that leads to a wide range of benefits:

- Residue captures snow during the winter which improves the moisture profile in the field.

- Residue provides soil stability to help reduce erosion from wind and rain.

- During spring planting, the residue helps retain moisture to help the new seeds germinate and the young plants thrive.

- Decaying residue adds nutrients and organic matter to the soil, which improves

overall soil health and reduces the need for additional fertilizer.

- Reduced tillage means fewer trips across the field which reduces soil compaction and energy consumption.

Some farmers put cattle on their cornfields in the fall and winter to graze on the stalks and residue. The manure from those animals adds nutrients and organic matter to the soil as well.

No-till and minimum tillage practices are also helping farmers cope with the advent of extreme weather events such as torrential rains and extreme drought by preserving the integrity of the soil, reducing erosion and retaining as much moisture in the soil as possible.

"Clean, groomed fields at planting time used to be a matter of pride for farmers in my grandfather's time," said Brandon Hunnicutt of Giltner, a farmer-director on the Nebraska Corn Board. "But farmers are always adopting new practices, technologies and ideas to help ensure sustainability and preserve our resources for generations to come. No-till fields may not look as pretty as the pristine, tilled fields of the past, but the benefits clearly outweigh the aesthetics."

Assistance for ag producers available through Conservation Stewardship Program

Agricultural producers wanting to enhance current conservation efforts are encouraged to apply for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP).

Through CSP, USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) helps private landowners build their business while implementing conservation practices that help ensure the sustainability of their entire operation. NRCS plans to enroll up to 10 million acres in CSP in 2018.

While applications for CSP are accepted year round, applications must be received by March 2, 2018, to be considered for this funding period.

Through CSP, agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for actively managing, maintaining, and expanding conservation activities like nutrient and pest management, cover crops and tree plantings—all while maintaining active agriculture production on their land.

CSP also encourages the adoption of cutting-edge technologies and new management techniques such as precision agriculture applications, on-site carbon

storage and planting for high carbon sequestration rate, and new soil amendments to improve water quality.

Some of these benefits of CSP include:

- Improved cattle gains per acre;
- Increased crop yields;
- Decreased inputs;
- Wildlife population improvements; and
- Better resilience to weather extremes.

NRCS recently made several updates to the program to help producers better evaluate their conservation options and the benefits to their operations and natural resources.

New methods and software for evaluating applications help producers see up front why they are or are not meeting stewardship thresholds, and allow them to pick practices and enhancements that work for their conservation objectives.

These tools also enable producers to see potential payment scenarios for conservation early in the process.

Does ethanol reduce my miles per gallon?

Ethanol contains less energy (BTUs) than petroleum-based gasoline. That difference is negligible in lower ethanol blends such as E10 or E15. (Many consumers actually report improved gas mileage and performance with ethanol blends above E10, especially with E15 and E30.)

Because of the lower energy value, you may see a slight drop in your gas mileage when you use even higher blends such as E85. However, the price advantage of higher ethanol blends needs to be taken into account when you make your fuel choice.

Shrimp...

The farm is like a big experiment and time consuming, he said.

"It's a challenge every day. It's basically a big experiment you're running. The water can get out hand pretty fast," he explained.

Brinegar tests for 12 things every day to balance the water quality in the tanks, which look like swimming pools.

The shrimp are hormone and antibiotic free, and instead, probiotic that fights disease.

The only ingredients added to the tanks take care of viruses and nitrogen levels.

Brinegar said they add feed, sugar for extra carbon, lime and baking soda.

He said the learning curve in general is hefty and the time commitment is more than he realized.

"It's intensive," he said.

They've worked out a lot of kinks and the farm is garnering attention through word-of-mouth.

The shrimp are in a separate area from the retail room that features Nebraska Shrimp Company apparel.

For the tour, two types of cocktail sauces were available for testing. Brinegar said they are still working on a cocktail sauce because of requests.

He also gave a demonstration on how to peel shrimp and recommended cooking it whole before peeling because the shell comes off cleaner and the shrimp is tastier.

\$66,000 final stadium payment scheduled for Nov. 15.

Two payments are remaining on the HVAC system — \$167,300 to be paid Dec. 15 and \$161,160 scheduled for Dec. 15, 2019. The debt may be able to pay off in full this year.

For the elementary addition, \$730,000 remains. The district has two years to pay the amount, but will pay it off in August instead.

In other words, the district will be potentially debt free by December.

The district's remaining needs map out a future of connected buildings through a hallway, new band room, vocal room, weight room, high school locker rooms and gymnasium. Expanded seating for the cafeteria is also listed.

"We would like to see a new facilities committee. We are not saying we want this in the next couple years. We want to get together with

a committee and talk about it," Superintendent Drew Harris said.

Comments from the public included the district needs a long-term approach to upgrades because going step by step is too costly.

Approximately five people in the group showed interest in being on the facilities committee.

A couple of people were concerned the board's meeting for input was part of a "hasty timeline" from the special meeting Jan. 18 to the Jan. 24 meeting, and it should have been better advertised for a good sample of the public and feedback.

Board president Curt Mumm said the projects do not have to be completed in the next couple of years.

But, he said Thayer Central is serving every preschooler in the district and coming into a cycle of special needs children, which requires space.


