Case dismissal...

Juston L. Schmidt was released from jail last week after Thayer County Attorney Dan Werner dismissed his case and district judge Vicky Johnson signed the order. The 38-year-old Deshler man was accused of two counts of sexually assaulting a child and two counts of incest, all felonies.

"The charges were dismissed with the ability to refile," said Werner, "and an investigation into the case is continuing."

Schmidt was being held at the local law enforcement center on a \$250,000/10 percent bond since his arrest in November.

Emergency Center...

Thayer County Emergency Management is seeking volunteers to assist with setting up and managing an Emergency Volunteer Center.

An Emergency Volunteer Center is used to manage volunteers who may show up to help out in case of a disaster such as a tornado strike in one of our communities.

Volunteer Partners of Nebraska will conduct training on setting up and managing the center at the Thayer County Courthouse; the date in January is yet to be determined.

Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$168,865.11 in sales tax for the month of October after showing a 19.5 percent increase in net taxable sales over last year. For October 2012, the county had \$3,070,270 in net taxable sales - up from \$2,569,867 last year.

According to Hebron Clerk Jean Nagey, the City of Hebron collected \$23,610.69 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,691,374 for the month of October. That shows an increase of 14.2 percent in net taxable sales over last year. The motor vehicle tax (\$3,048.20) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$20,562.49) goes into the sales tax fund.

The Department of Revenue releases figures approximately three months later than the actual month being profiled. November figures will be released at the beginning of February 2013.

Clarks retire after 41 years of service

Western Auto store stays open under new ownership

Hugh and Linda Clark are locking a familiar door in Hebron, but not without opening a new one. The couple quietly closed the Hebron Western Auto store on the last day of 2012 after deciding to retire. The door had been swinging both ways for 41 years.

"We opened Western Auto in 1971," Hugh noted gesturing around the familiar store. "We bought the building in 1976."

It's a building that has graced Hebron's downtown district since 1889. Clark is only its second owner, he said adding that C.C. Fletcher built it. "It was vacant for about five or six years before we moved in," Hugh said. "And I know Holiday Drugs

Teens hurt in crash

Two teen passengers were injured after the driver of a 1992 Cadillac left the road and crashed head-on into a tree near Deshler, Dec. 27. According to the accident report kept on file at the local law enforcement center, the extent of the injuries for both is unknown, but Jedediah D. Blackburn, 18, of Bradshaw and Morgan R. Harms, 18, of York were transported to Thayer County Health Services by Deshler Rescue. Both were riding in the backseat of the vehicle owned by Steven T. Schulte of Bruning.

The driver, Darrell D. Schulte, II, 22, of Bruning, and another unidentified passenger riding in the front seat were not hurt. Alcohol and snow are suspected in the crash which happened on Road 5200 near the Little Blue Bridge at 9 p.m.

According to the report, Schulte was traveling too fast to negotiate an upcoming curve in the road and went straight ahead into the tree. Snow on the road was listed as a factor in hampering the turn. None of the vehicle's occupants were wearing seat belts, but the airbag deployed in the front seat. No one was thrown from the vehicle; however, Blackburn and Harms were unable to leave the scene without assistance.

The vehicle sustained \$19,000 in damage.

Housing survey winners announced

Final report next month

Gaylord Rachow of Davenport, Renste Moeller of Byron, and Dorothy Boss of Deshler, were the winners from the housing study surveys drawing by Hanna:Keelan Associates.

The trio were among the 400+ surveys that were returned as part of the survey conducted for the county-wide housing study being prepared for the Thayer County Commissioners with the assistance of TCEDA (Thayer County Economic Development Alliance).

Funding for this study was made possible by a CDBG grant awarded by the Nebraska Department of Economic Development to Thayer County with a match by TCEDA local business partners, Midwest Bank, City of Hebron, City of Deshler, Village of Bruning, and the Village of Carleton.

The final report on this study will be presented by Hanna:Keelan to the public on Wednesday, Feb. 13, at 10 a.m., at the Hebron courthouse in the district court room on the third floor. Representatives from city and village councils from all Thayer County communities, Thayer County businesses, and the public are encouraged to come to the meeting to learn about the results and recommendations from this housing study.

1883

130 Years Ago

Thayer County has 32 road districts.

Hubbell has over 300 population and is only a three-year-old.

One of the best business towns in the county is Friedensau.

Ed. S. Past has just received a new caligraph or type writing machine.

Wiesel & Proctor have recently put new machinery in their Meridian Mill.

The chandelier and a portion of the stage scenery for the opera house have arrived.

We saw a man with two heads on his shoulder the other evening, but we didn't think it much of a curiosity. One of them belonged to his girl.

We are requested to announce that the First National Bank is doing business in its elegant new building, and will welcome its patrons to its new quarters.

The secretary of the treasury has authorized the coinage of a new five-cent nickel piece of new design, a little larger and thinner than the present coin.

E.H. Geisler of Friedensau is improving his hardware and furniture store and adding largely to his stock. He also rented the store of J.J. Kern and is running both establishments.

County Commissioner B.F. Stump says that if people don't believe generosity springs spontaneously in his bosom, and grows there with tropical luxuriosity, to just come into his store and see him give away hats and caps.

The county commissioners estimate the expenses of the county to be an amount not to exceed eight mills on the dollar valuation, assessment of 1883, for county general fund, four mills for county bridge fund and two mills for county road fund.

The talking over the telephone line between Lincoln and Omaha, a distance of 60 miles, is said to be as distinct as if the two points were only a block apart. Forty cents is charged for five minutes talk. Now for a line from Belvidere to Hebron.

The county commissioners at their last session accepted the bid of David J. Nebbergall for taking charge of the county poor farm and overseeing the poor. He takes the place so capably filled by Mr. Carhart during the last six years. Mr. Carhart declined having the position any longer, preferring to move on his farm in Spring Creek precinct.

Sheriff M.S. Ferguson has resigned his office and Deputy Sheriff A.W. McKinney has been appointed and qualified for the position.

One of the most enterprising and successful businessmen of this county is H.J. Struve of Friedensau. One secret of his success is his liberal use of printer's ink. In this connection we call attention to his new standing advertisement in this issue. Among his later business extensions is the purchase of the harness and saddlery stock and business of Joseph Sittler. He has employed Mr. Sittler to work for him and informs us that their many orders in this line are growing the full capacity of this department.

George Hole of Alexandria, agent of Hole & Hall of Osceola, Iowa, has a proposition from these gentlemen to the citizens of this place, for the building, furnishing and running of a first class creamery.

F. Kingsley has returned from an extended trip to Michigan and New York.

Prairie Star
Our school this winter is taught by L.W. Apley, a newcomer with us, but he proves by the interest in the school to be a first-class teacher.

Frank Bruning, who owns the south half of section four has just shipped in a carload of lumber and will soon build a fine residence on his place.

Davenport
We are getting the nobbiest post office in the state. It has 250 boxes. John Heffley does the work.

H. Lambert has opened Teters' building and opened a restaurant, and is doing a good business.

The windmill of J.N. Arm-

strong will be ready for work during this week. He will keep all kinds of feed and the best flour in the market on exchange.

1893

Ben L. Terry, a long-time resident of Alexandria, passed away in the yard of his home.


Clara Belle Lee, wife of Thomas D. Shugart, died at her home northwest of Alexandria, aged 43 years.

Southeast Nebraska Region B Awarded Federal Funds

Southeast Nebraska Region B has been chosen to receive an additional \$22,975 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the area for this fiscal year. The selection was made by a national board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from The Salvation Army; American Red Cross; Council of Jewish Federations; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; and United Way Worldwide.

The local board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country. A local board representing similar entities will determine how the Southeast Nebraska Region B funds are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service organizations in the area.

The local board is responsible for recommending

agencies to receive these funds. Under the terms of the national board grant, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

To acquire a proposal application or for further information, contact Ardith Hoins, Local EFSP Board chair, Blue Valley Community Action Partnership, 402-729-2278 no later than Tuesday, Jan. 15 at 3 p.m. Southeast Nebraska Region B has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds to three agencies last year who provided 7,903 meals for 514 individuals, 28 nights of shelter for six individuals and assisting with partial payment of 107 rent or utility bills for 323 individuals.

January Is National Blood Donor Month

If helping others was on your list of resolutions for this New Year, there is one way you can help others and maybe even save a life. This won't cost you any money and won't take too much of your time. By taking the time to give blood during January - National Blood Donor Month, you can accomplish your resolution and make a real difference in someone's life.

Blood donations are important all year long but especially during the winter months due to the holidays, travel schedules, inclement weather and illness. January in particular, is a difficult month for blood centers to collect blood donations. A reduction in turnout can put our nation's blood inventory at a critical low level.

Because many patients need blood on a regular basis, not just after accidents or surgery, it is important to have regular donations of blood throughout the year. In the United States, the Red Cross is the largest supplier of blood and blood products in the country. About 4 million people give blood to the Red Cross each year. The American Red Cross is not funded by the government. They rely on donations of time, money and blood to keep the organization running.

What are the requirements to give blood? Blood donors must be at least 110 pounds and in general good health. In Nebraska donors must be at least 17 years old. You can donate blood about every 56 days, or six times per year. Those donating platelets can do so more often.

Donating blood takes only about 15 minutes from start to finish. Donors fill out a registration form and answer some questions regarding their medical history. A member of the staff will take your temperature and blood pressure,

check your iron levels, and then get you started on giving your pint of blood.

Giving blood is safe, because new sterile materials are used for each donor. The blood taken from a donor is quickly replenished by the body, so the risks involved are minimal. The only thing you can really get from donating blood is a great feeling that comes from helping someone else.

One unfortunate fact about donated blood is that it has a limited shelf life. Depending on the component, the shelf life normally is about 42 days for red blood cells to five days for platelets. Many times, after a disaster such as 9/11 or Hurricane Katrina, well-meaning people will rush to give blood, creating a supply too large to use at that time. The Red Cross has to manage its supply carefully to make sure they collect enough blood, but not too much to result in some being unused.

We all should donate blood on a regular basis. If you have a rare blood type, it becomes even more important that you consider becoming a donor. Donors can sign up with the Red Cross to receive reminders about upcoming blood drives in the local area. Don't wait for someone to tell you there is a shortage of blood to decide to give. Don't wait until there is a public tragedy to give. Every day there is a patient somewhere having a private tragedy.


The children greeted Santa and followed him into the warmth of the Legion Hall, where they had a one-in-one visit with jolly old Saint Nick.


