Last week, the Hebron Journal-Register reflected on 2018 with news articles from January to June. This week, articles from the months of July through December in 2018 are covered.

July

Cattlemen's Ball funds for cancer research were still rolling in with the 563 centerpieces made by Nancy Hofts and other volunteers for the ball's main tent June 1-2.

The centerpieces were on sale during the ball and after as the proceeds climbed past \$13,000 and were marked down to half price.

Hofts said her volunteers were "harvesters," collecting items for the centerpieces, such as wheat, rye, ears of corn, worn cowboy boots, hats, ceramic pieces and lariats.

The annual Pony Express re-ride June 29 was featured in the July 4 issue with riders saddling up in Oak in temperatures hovering around 100 degrees.

Local riders, picked up the trail for the ride to Highway 53, but first they autographed the Mochila, which was used by Pony Express riders to carry the mail.

Alice Heinrichs, a 25-year veteran of the re-ride, said 2018 was the first time riders were late to a destination because of the heat.

They met early, so as to attend the other Christmas exercises... The Baptists had a prettily decorated Christmas tree laden with presents. A program, consisting of songs, recitations, etc., was nicely rendered...At the Presbyterian church the platform was tastefully decorated with evergreen trees and a chimney. A cantata was successfully rendered in which the little folks and Santa Claus had a good time...At the Christian church a picturesque cabin has been built with logs upon the stage, and looked very realistic with its snow covered room, chimney and window. Bricks for the chimney, made of card board, were filled with treats for the Sunday school children, who each received a brick at the conclusion of the cantata.

(The Alexandria Argus) Alexandria Celebrates Peace with Victory - Nov. 14, 1918: Two Beeves Are Roasted and Served to Big Crowd...High School Boys Hang Kaiser in the Old Argus Tree During the Afternoon and is Burnt in a Pyramid of Flames in the Evening. Never before in the history of Alexandria was there such a historical event to celebrate a "World's Peace for Victory" as there was at this time. Never before was there such a crowd of people gathered within the village of Alexandria on such a short notice. Never before had a celebration been planned in such a short time and carried out so successful as the big celebration at Alexandria

Tuesday night. Every town from 15 to 20 miles around was represented by a number of people to help celebrate the greatest event in the world's history--next to the crucifixion. Is it any wonder that people are rejoicing when it means no more dread

of the casualty lists of our noble boys. Dr. G. A. Birdsall had been selected master of ceremonies and the program being in the open air on Harbine and Fourth streets. F. W. Cory, the mayor, turned over the keys of the city to the celebration. Revs. J. W. Longnot A. C. Spencer, W. H. Stickell, J. B. Butter and Dr. H. J. Newell gave short talks. The Alexandria band, high school and singing led by A. L. Watson furnished music for the evening. The parade was on Harbine from Third to Fifth streets. The following banners were in the procession: Alexandria community service flag, high school service flag, the grades service flag, boys Victory club flag, girls Victory club flag, cart carrying the dummy of kaiser and the rough burial box. The dummy was placed in the coffin and the coffin laid in the rough box and hoisted on top of the funeral pyre and everybody went wild. The moral is that militaryism is at an end and the world is free. About fifty of the Belvidere Home Guards put on a fine drill and demonstrated scaling the wall. Belvidere has the best drilled Home Guard team in this part of the state. It is estimated that there were four thousand people at the jubilee.

1929 **90 Years Ago** The average corn yield in

Nebraska this year will be 21.7 bushels, and 81 percent of the entire crop will be merchantable said bankers of the state in their mid-month crop report.

1969 **50 Years Ago**


VFW Post No 5328 in Hebron purchased the Lincoln Avenue Cafe and was opening to members and guests.

New Child Passenger Safety Law Starts Jan. 1

Car seats and booster seats protect your kiddos in the car. Starting January 1, 2019, Nebraska's child passenger safety law changes to help keep children safer as they travel. According to the new law:

Children must ride rear-facing up to age 2 or until they reach the upper weight or height limit allowed by the car seat manufacturer.

Children up to age 8 must ride in a correctly installed car seat or booster seat.

Children up to age 8 must ride in the back seat, as long as there is a back seat equipped with a seat belt and is not already occupied by other children under 8 years old.

Children 8 to 18 years old must ride secured in a seat belt or child safety seat/

'Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children in Nebraska," said Judy Martin, Deputy Director of Public Health for the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. "As children get older, their risk increases because they're moved from a safety seat to a seat belt only too soon or they're allowed to ride in the front seat where an airbag could cause injury. That is why it's so important to choose the right seat and know the law to help keep your child safe at every age

To make sure you're using a car seat or booster correctly, have it checked by a certified child passenger safety technician. Blood is traditionally in short supply during the winter months due to the holidays, travel schedules, inclement weather and illness. When the weather is as cold as it has been, it makes it a difficult time for blood centers to collect blood donations because donors stay at home. A reduction in turnout can put our nation's blood inventory critically low.

National Blood Donor Month has been observed in January since 1970 with the goal of increasing blood and platelet donations. The Red Cross urges healthy donors who have made a commitment to donate during the winter months to keep their appointments. Each appointment kept, and each donation given, offers hope to a patient in need.

Daily, approximately 39,000 units of blood are required in hospitals and emergency treatment facilities for patients with cancer and other diseases, for organ transplant recipients, and to help save the lives of accident victims.

For the nearly 5 million people who receive blood transfusions every year, your donation can make the difference between life and

nated every 56 days, which equals six times a year or more importantly eighteen lives were helped. Platelets can be given every seven days – up to 24 times a year. Donated blood only has a shelf life of 42 days. Therefore, it is so important to have donors who give regularly.

Just one donation - one pint - can help save up to three lives. By becoming a regular blood donor, you can really make a difference in your local community.

Giving the gift of blood is a simple way to make a big difference. To be eligible you must:

Be age 17 or older

- Weigh at least 110 pounds - Have not given blood within the past 8 weeks

- Be in good health

Thayer County Health Services hopes everyone will celebrate National Blood Donor Month by donating blood and encouraging others to do so too. They further encourage you to make donating blood part of your regular routine throughout the year.

Atrial fibrillation is the most common heart arrhythmia, affecting 2.7 million Americans. Anyone is eligible. Cost: \$10

Peripheral Arterial Disease Screening:












Lady Titans win first round

Year in review...

Honored as Nebraska Pioneer Farmers at the Thayer County Fair were the Yoachims and Joe Hergott families.

Dave Bruning was selected for the 4-H Meritorius Service Award and 4H Seniors, Amanda Schultz, Ethan Meerkatz and Skylar Knigge were recognized.

Stones from a historical barn near Davenport were donated to the Thayer County Museum to build a blacksmith shop on its grounds, but the stones didn't move themselves — volunteers brought equipment to remove and haul the stones.

Michael Zlab made a hydraulic device to slam the sides of the mortar and separate the stones, some of which were 24 inches long and a foot long.

The first Big Sandy Creek Festival was held in Alexandria with a barbecue cook-off and mud volleyball tournament. Winning the cook-off People's Choice award was Totally Smoked. Marc's BBQ won for brisket and Blue Ribbon BBQ won for pork butt and ribs.

A hunting exposition at Hebron's Archery range drew Nebraska Game and Parks, businesses and patrons, some of whom hadn't aimed for years, like Lynn Thumann.

September

Queen candidates for the Carleton Milo Ball included Grace Souerdyke, Mary Ruth Dodes, Leah Schmidt, Mickael Halverstadt, Brianna Barton and Holly Timmerman.

A paraeducator at Thayer Central, Loretta Kenyon, was one of four paraeducators in Nebraska to win an award.

Kenyon is a teacher who cares about all students, not just those in her class, teacher Laurie Fischer said.

The Chester Community Club revived itself to hold more events for the community, such as Theater in the Park and annual festivities for Halloween and Christmas.

The Belvidere Woman's Club welcomed new members, Olive Van De Walle from Bruning and Gail Gillian from Deshler.

The Cattlemen's Ball hosts, Randy and Becky Hergott and Rob and Natalie Marsh announced \$1,747,961.89 had been raised for cancer research with \$1,550,961.89 of the total donated to the Fred and Pamela Buffett Cancer Center in Omaha.

Thayer County Health Services received \$75,000 for a 3D Mammography machine as part of the 10 percent donated back to local communities.

Also receiving local donations were 56 organizations including fire departments, law enforcement, hospitals and schools in four counties.

Brianna Barton was crowned the 2018 Milo Queen in Carleton.

The Thayer Central Lady Titans marked a record of 15-0 on the volleyball season.

The Hebron Municipal Airport was planning a grand opening to celebrate years of service and improvements. The airport was established in 1942.

Improvements included a new fuel tank for self-operation and new concrete on the airport's taxiways.

Candidates for the Nebraska Unicameral, Incumbent Dist. 32 Sen. Laura Ebke and Tom Brandt, held a debate at the Majestic Theatre that

focused on rural issues.

Both candidates were

available for discussion following the debate that was moderated by Thayer Central teacher, Justin Bomar.

Photographer Art Whitton caught a small film crew visiting Chester for a documentary on Janet Brusseau, who was found murdered from blunt force trauma and asphyxiation.

John Mooney was convicted in her death after pleading no contest to first degree murder and sentenced to 20 years in prison.

Jim Kenner was recognized by the Hebron Rotary Club for the volunteer service he has provided at Arrowhead Gardens Aboretum.

Kenner regularly weeds, waters, mows and trims trees at the arboretum.

Club members said when the Rotary takes on a project, Kenner will be working on it before everyone else.

Bruning-Davenport students buried a time capsule in Bruning to be opened in 2042.

In the capsule, students included Class of 2019 photos and documents, elementary student hand prints and other items.

October

The graves of Civil War soldiers were remembered with markers as the Sons and Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War performed a ceremony in the wind and rain at Belvidere Cemetery.

Thayer County Museum Curator, Jackie Williamson spoke at the ceremony and said the 38 graves of all Civil War veterans now have markers.

Subway and Mid America Vision had milestones as Dr. Andrea Steele-Bauman took over operations at the vision center and new owners bought Subway and hired general manager, Chad Essex.

Mylah Rose, a clothing store based in Geneva, opened a new satellite store in Hebron on Lincoln Avenue. Owner Nicole Schoenholz said she has customers in the Hebron area and decided a shop was needed.

Schoenholz said Mylah Rose will be an asset to Hebron.

John Christensen, a senior at Bruning-Davenport launched a website from a template, so visitors could purchase Eagle athletic wear and clothing designs from the days when Bruning and Davenport were separate schools.

The Hebron Chamber of Commerce held a meeting with representatives of Thayer County communities to develop a plan for the 32-LIFE Campaign, which zeros in on county-specific attractions and events.

Those attending the meeting suggested a county-wide website and social media page for businesses, economic incentives for businesses and more youth involvement.

The Thayer Central boys and girls cross country teams qualified for state at the district meet in Hebron.

The girls were first and the boys, runners-up.

Bruce Mammen bowled his ninth 300 game at Blue Valley Bowl.

Winter came early Oct. 14 when the area was hit by the fifth earliest snow on record for Grand Island and the fourth for Hastings.

The Hebron Municipal Airport open house yielded a few surprises when 24-year airport authority board member, Marlowe Huber, received an admiralty in the Nebraska Navy from Lt. Gov. Mike Foley.

Huber was also recognized for his years of service to the airport.

New Thayer County Emergency Manager, Colt Farringer, was named as the 2018 Weather Ready Nation Ambassador for making flood safety a priority.

The third annual Oregon Trail Run marked over 240 runners from 22 different states that have traveled to Hebron since the event

began

This year, running events began with a 2K fun run geared toward elementary students and their families. Over 50 students and parents from Thayer County schools participated and attended the spaghetti feed afterward prepared by the Sacred Heart Knights of Columbus.

The American Bankers Association announced Fred Bruning would receive the Bruning Award for contributions to agricultural banking.

The Bruning Award is named after Fred's father, Frank Bruning, and recognizes the lifetime achievement of individuals for their leadership and outstanding dedication to rural banking for farmers, ranchers and businesses.

Frank was the first recipient of the award 21 years ago. Fred is a fourth-generation banker.

Ghosts, goblins, witches and other characters trickled into Alexandria State Recreation Area for the annual Trick-or-Treat event.

Campers decorated and set props for the approximately 200 trick-or-treaters.

November

The Nov. 6 mid-term general election resulted in new District 32 Senator, Tom Brandt, who defeated incumbent Sen. Laura Ebke by more than 400 votes.

Results also showed more Nebraskans voted for medicaid expansion than not.

Thayer Central held its first full length musical, "Emma!"

The musical starred Maggie Harris, Dakota Cherney, Yong Wang, Dylan Fischer, Holly Timmerman, Mickaela Anderson, McKenzie Johnson and many others.

The musical drew about 850 people.

The Bruning-Davenport/ Shickley Lady Eagles took the Class D2 state volleyball championship at Bob Devaney Sports Complex.

The championship also noted Coach Kari Jo Alfs 100th win on the court, along with four seniors, Jadyn Kleinschmidt, Sera Johnson, Caitlin Mosier and Emilie Schardt.

Sam Baysinger of Boy Scout Troop 175 became an Eagle Scout in a ceremony at Hebron Bible Church.

Baysinger focused on marking the graves of Civil War veterans for his project.

Lloyd Holtzen, DuWayne Holtzen and Dale Wittrock received Quilts of Valor during the Bruning-Davenport Veterans program.

Area farmers were storing beans as the trade situation with China remained in the negotiating stage.

December

New Hebron Mayor Doug Huber presented outgoing Mayor Shane Day with a gavel to recognize Day's service to the city for eight years.

Patrice Hoffman of Edgar was the winner of the Hospital Guild's 2018 quilt raffle. Her bounty was a Christmas quilt pieced together by hospital employees and hand quilted by Janet Voss of Carleton.

Thayer County Health Services sponsored free movie matinees during the Christmas Stroll. Employees and volunteers from clinics lent their time to run the theater during the matinees, including CEO Dr. David Burd, who worked a second showing of "The Grinch," after the first showing sold out with over 140 in attendance.

"Oceans of Grass," a documentary that follows ranchers in the Sandhills through four seasons, was shown at the Majestic Theatre for free, thanks to local businesses and Thayer Central FFA.

Georg Joutras, the docu-

mentary's maker, was also at the theater to answer questions after the showing.

Dirt work signaled the end of the demolition of two buildings on 4th Street in Hebron, which were deemed unsafe. The council worked through the project for much of the year, meeting with the owners and owners adjacent to the buildings.


Thayer Central formed an
