School to hold public meeting Jan. 24

The Thayer Central School Board of Education will hold a public meeting Jan. 24 at 6 p.m. in the high school gymnasium.

The board met Jan. 18 for about two hours to organize the public meeting, Superintendent Drew Harris said. Harris and the board members are looking forward to hearing from citizens of the district on what they want in their facility of Thayer Central Community Schools.

"The board is not going in with set notions. We would love to have people share their thoughts," Harris said.

At the meeting, Harris and the board will share improvements made thus far and scheduled maintenance projects, plus payments already made on a variety of projects, and the district's needs for the future.

Needs include a connecting walkway from the elementary to the high school, a potential new band room to free up space in the shop area for more classes, separating the weight room from the wrestling area, potential new locker rooms that would double as tornado shelters, expanded seating for the cafeteria, expanded parking and a new gymnasium for competitions.

"Our goal is to find out what the public wants," Harris said. "We're trying to represent that."

Zoucha elected to three-year term

Alan Zoucha of Carleton was elected to the Farm Service Agency Committee to represent Local Administrative Area 1 for three years.

He was scheduled to take office this month to join the existing committee members to "deliver programs at the county level and work to serve the needs of local producers."

Committee evaluating prison reform

The judiciary committee in the Nebraska Legislature continues to chip away at the state's correctional conundrum.

Committee chairman and Dist. 32 Senator Laura Ebke said the goal is to find solutions without placing the public safety at risk.

Coming out of the committee are two legislative bills — LB676 for the temporary release of inmates for treatment, sponsored by Sen. Bob Krist, and LB841, sponsored by Sen. Patty Pansing Brooks.

"We have to find other ways to rehabilitate people who aren't really a threat, like non-violent prisoners," Ebke said. She used forgery and unarmed robberies committed by people who weren't deemed violent.

An inmate with a five to 10 year sentence who may be eligible for parole could be held back because the required steps to be paroled weren't met. Violence reduction training, addiction recovery or mental health issues are required steps for parole.

Ebke said the key is timing in relation to sentences. If an inmate is ready for parole, that inmate should be working to check that last requirement in order to be released.

"We have lots of inmates on work release. They can leave for the day. If we can't get people eligible for parole through certain programs, then maybe we ought to consider letting them leave for treatment during the day for short periods," Ebke said.

The Nebraska prison system is close to 156 percent capacity, which must shrink to 140 percent by July of 2020, otherwise the governor will have to declare an emergency.

Ebke said 125 percent is thought of as ideal and 140 percent is the top edge of manageable.

Another bill, LB672 would provide medical release for aging inmates who are no longer a threat to society. The bill would also target those who are bedridden or have cognitive issues.

"They're pretty harmless. I think we have 30 to 40 people throughout the system," Ebke said.

As for Ebke, she has several small bills, but her priority is LB299 for Occupational Board Reform Act for professions and occupations. The bill draws attention to licenses that may or may not be necessary and looks for a way to "harmonize" provisions in licensing.

A constituent brought her a second priority — LB790, which would allow mobile hair and nail salons.

The current regulations require these services to have physical addresses. The bill would allow hair and nail proprietors to operate mobile salons.

"We introduced this for the cosmetologists and nail techs, but the barbers came to us and said they wanted it, too," Ebke said.

She said the bill would especially help people in rural areas, where people might not have access to shops.

Current statues don't account for changes in technology, hence, mobile businesses.

Under the bill, mobile salons would provide evidence to the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services the salons would need at least 150 square feet of floor space and 23 square feet for additional practitioners; functional sinks and toilet facilities; adequate supply of clean water; waste water storage capacity; and has proper signage and adequate entrance.

Harms runs for national title

The first cause is volunteering, which has impacted her life in many ways. She and her family have benefitted greatly from the services of volunteer emergency medical technicians and others who selflessly put the needs of a community ahead of their own plans.

Harms has stepped up to volunteer for causes the past several years. She has been an EMT with Chester Fire and Rescue for four years. She is an active member of the Chesterfest Organizing Committee and

recently made a huge effort with the "Haunted Basement" this past Halloween.

This month, she was elected to be Vice-Chairman of the Chester

Community Foundation and will be working with a team to help Chester reach new heights.

Her second cause, and theme of her Mrs. Nebraska entry, is "Shine Beyond."

She encourages herself and others "to shine beyond your flaws. We all have them. By accepting that those do not define who we are, we can then be the best version of who God intended us to be."

Harms is also the clerk at the Chester Post Office and is well known for her cakes, which highlight many local celebrations. She has countless hobbies and a full menagerie at her farm just outside of town.

She is married to Jordan Harms, who is employed at MetalQuest and they have two children, Hayden and Harlow.

Recycling grant provides balers

The City of Hebron received a \$13,480 recycling grant from the Nebraska Recycling Council. The city used the grant to purchase two new balers, which will allow more items to be recycled. The balers differ in size, one is larger than the other.

Paper products such as junk mail, magazines, newspaper, phone books, wrapping paper and paperback books, are recyclable through the balers.

In addition, cereal and shoe boxes, juice cartons, shipping boxes and a number of other cardboard and corrugated board items may be eligible.

A training session for city employees to learn about the balers was held.

The city will coordinate with the scout groups on the balers. Scout troops volunteer every third Saturday of the month to collect recyclables.

1938 80 Years Ago

Wednesday of last week, Jan. 12, marked the 50th anniversary of 1888, the great blizzard of 1888, which will go down through history as Nebraska's greatest storm. Old timers of Alexandria and community, who went through this great blizzard, recall with vivid memory the events of this storm, in which many lost their lives as well as a great loss of livestock. According to the Old Timers, this day had been an ideal winter day until mid afternoon, when like a hurricane the storm hit from the north with sudden darkness and a great wind and choking sheet of snow that froze as it fell. It was so sudden and so strong that persons on the street or the roads and children in school were unable to reach home and many are the tales of heroism to come out of this storm.

For the past several weeks, F. B. Williams and Son of Belvidere have been putting down a new 12 inch tubular well, to furnish the water supply for the new water-works system for Alexandria, which is a PWA project. The well is now practically completed, with the casing in place, gravel packing completed and the 10 ft. strainer placed last week. Surging of the well has been completed and a 48 hour test—continous pumping of the well in which the well must produce 150 gallons per minute to meet the requirements. Mr. Williams states that he feels sure there will be no difficulty in securing this amount of water. Following this test, a sample of the water must be sent to the state for chemical analysis and purity test, and again no fear is felt for an o.k. by the state, for our artesian water has always been noted for its purity. This new well will take the place

of the several small artesian wells now supplying water for the village. The smaller wells will all be capped when the new system is put into use.

Influenza activity widespread; still time to get flu shot

Public Health Solutions reports that influenza activity in Nebraska continues to be widespread, but seems to have peaked in the last few weeks.

Influenza A is responsible for about 88 percent of the flu viruses causing illness, and there have been at least 18 lab-confirmed flu deaths in Nebraska since October 2017. Five of those occurred within the counties served by PHS.

Fortunately, there is still flu vaccine available and getting a flu shot is the single most important thing you can do to protect yourself and your family from influenza. Young children, the elderly, pregnant women, and those with chronic health conditions are at increased risk for severe complications from the flu.

Symptoms of the flu include fever or chills, sore throat, cough, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, and fatigue.

Besides getting a flu shot, you can also protect yourself and your family from flu by:

- Avoiding close contact

with people who are sick.

- Staying home when you are sick.
- Covering your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing.
- Washing your hands often, especially after coughing or sneezing.
- Not touching your eyes, nose, or mouth after touching door knobs, phones, and computer key boards.
- Cleaning/disinfecting frequently touched surfaces at home, school, and work.
- Practicing other good health habits, like getting plenty of sleep, being physically active, managing stress, drinking plenty of fluids, and eating a healthy diet.
- Seeking medical attention early if you feel that you may have the flu. Taking an anti viral medication within the first 48 hour of flu symptoms can greatly reduce the severity and length of your illness.

Discussion on LBNRD groundwater rules continues

The Little Blue Natural Resources District Board has been working on adopting new Guidelines for the Groundwater Rules and Regulations. They have made progress and have agreed on some of the key water strategies.

The board would like to see producers eliminate water waste and encourage them to eliminate gravity systems to more efficient systems, like pivots or sub-surface drip irrigation.

Managing your water applications and knowing what your soil moisture availability is with soil moisture probes, are great management tools to adopt to your systems.

The LBNRD Board has agreed to some rules and regulations, adopted in 2014. Flowmeters are required on all high capacity wells producing 50 gallons per minute or more. If producers do not have meters installed please contact the NRD for a list of approved meters and proper installation procedures.

Annual pumpage reports are due each year by December 31. Also, staff is currently requesting certain areas of the district to submit their certified irrigated acres

documents. All areas will need to complete this by January 1, 2019.

Allocation trigger will be the 2016 water levels as the baseline. If the District water levels fall one foot below 2016 levels for two consecutive years allocations will be activated.

The first-year allocation is currently set at, 60 inches over a five-year period with a 5-inch bank to begin the period (one time only, 5-inch bank) and then a 8-inch carry over to the next allocation. The reason for such a user-friendly allocation is that it will give producers time to convert to a more efficient watering system.

A Groundwater Committee meeting is set for February 6 at the Little Blue NRD to continue to discuss and modify language and goals for the new rules and regulations.

The goal is to have a complete set of rules and regulations for a public hearing by late winter and an approved set prior to spring planting.

Matters still being discussed are pooling of certified acres, transfer of irrigated acres, and water quality regulations.

Tide Pod challenge causes risk of poisoning

"If all your friends jumped off a bridge, would you?" This question has been asked by parents to their children for generations. But never has this been more evident than in the last several years thanks to viral internet challenges.

In recent years poison centers have received calls on the salt/ice challenge and the cinnamon challenge. The new disturbing Tide Pod Challenge has gained steam across the U.S. This has prompted YouTube, the Google-owned video streaming service to remove the videos from their site.

The Tide Pod Challenge is popular on social media showing videos and memes of teens and young adults putting laundry packets into their mouths. Calls to the nation's poison centers regarding ingestions in this age group are starting to increase.

In 2017, poison control centers received reports of more than 10,500 exposures to highly concentrated

packets of laundry detergent by children ages five and younger, according to the American Association of Poison Control Centers. Ingestion of packets has caused coma, seizures, respiratory arrest and death.

Manufacturers of the packets have sought to combat these ingestions by making changes to the packaging and some have added a bitter-tasting agent to the outer coating. These changes, along with public education provided by poison centers across the country, have resulted in a decrease in calls to poison centers.

The Nebraska Regional Poison Center would like to inform parents of this dangerous trend and recommends having a discussion with their children on the dangers of this challenge.



Flu cases and hospitalizations

The number of flu cases and hospitalizations are on the rise in Nebraska. The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness and possibly death. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year.

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with the flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might get the flu by touching something that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or nose.

For those affected, the flu can vary from mild to severe. While the flu can be serious even in people who are otherwise healthy, it can be especially dangerous for young children and children of any age who have certain long term health conditions.

Even previously healthy children can get very sick from the flu. Make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks enough fluids. If your child is five years or older and does not have other health problems and gets flu symptoms, including a fever and/or cough, consult your doctor as needed: fast breathing or trouble breathing, bluish or gray skin color, not drinking enough fluids (not going to the bathroom or not making as much urine as they normally do), severe or persistent vomiting, not waking up or not interacting, being so irritable that the child does not want to be held, symptoms improve but then return and are worse.

Symptoms of the flu can include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, fatigue and sometimes vomiting and diarrhea (more common in children than adults). Some people with the flu will not have a fever. People with the flu may be able to infect others from one day before getting sick to five to seven days after. However, children and people with weakened immune systems can infect others for longer



periods of time, especially if they still have symptoms.

Flu vaccine is updated annually to protect against the flu viruses that research indicates are most likely to cause illness during the upcoming flu season. Flu vaccines are made using strict safety and production measures. Over the years, millions of flu vaccines have been given in the United States with a very good safety record.

In addition to getting vaccinated, you and your children can take everyday steps to help prevent the spread of germs: These include the following:

- Stay away from people who are sick. If your child is sick with flu illness, try to keep him or her in a separate room from others in the household, if possible.
- CDC recommends that your sick child stay home for at least 24 hours after his or her fever is gone without the use of fever reducing medicine.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after it has been used.
- Wash hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based sanitizer.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Clean and disinfect hard surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs, including bathroom surfaces, kitchen counters and toys for children. Clean by wiping them down with a household disinfectant according to directions on the product label.

These everyday steps are a good way to reduce your chances of getting sick. However, a yearly flu vaccine is the best protection against flu illness. If you still need or want to get a flu vaccine, contact your healthcare provider. Source: www.cdc.gov

To qualify for the College of Saint Mary Dean's List, students must earn a GPA of 3.5 or higher after completing at least 12 semester hours as a full-time student.


Kluck named to Dean's list






Thayer Central Senior of the Week is Aubrey Fangmeier. Aubrey is the son of Mark and Jodie Fangmeier.





The 2016-2017 school year was the first year in which all juniors in the state of Nebraska were required to take the ACT. Every student's ACT score now counts towards the school average which has led to a decline of the school average for the majority of schools in Nebraska.

However, Deshler's class of 2018 continued their trend of performing extremely well despite the changes to the state assessment system.

The following compares the Deshler composite scores (listed first) to the state average:

English 20.7/18.4; Mathematics 20.2/19.4; Reading 22.0/19.5; Science 22.0/19.5; Composite 21.2/19.3

A perfect ACT score is 36, so the differences shown above are quite significant and exemplary. Deshler Jr/Sr High Principal Josh Weber stated, "Our students should be very proud of their academic accomplishments. Our high ACT scores are just one piece of evidence that our students are receiving a great education in Deshler. We have great teachers and support staff that prepare our students well for the ACT and most importantly for life after high school."

Deshler has now started an ACT Jump Club in order to showcase excellent student performance and growth on the ACT. Students become a member of the club by achieving a composite score of 25 or by Improving their composite score by three from points from one ACT test to the next.

Once again, the class of 2018 performed extremely well and have already added ten members to the club. All members will be entered into a scholarship drawing. The members are shown in the above picture. Our current juniors, the class of 2019, will be taking the ACT at school on April 3.



Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Out of all the bills we've seen in this opening month of the Legislature, I'd like to discuss why LB 299 and LB 790 are such high priorities for me, and what impact they could have on Nebraska.

My priority for this session, LB 299 aims to alleviate some of the barriers surrounding more than 150 different professions in Nebraska which require a license. LB 299 would provide Nebraska with an analytical framework for the state to review licensing requirements. Currently, Nebraska features some of the highest requirements surrounding occupational licensing, and while these laws are aimed at "protecting" the public, a very real consequence is a loss of jobs and services. If passed, LB 299 would work to reduce regulations and barriers to entry that impact Nebraska's small businesses and entrepreneurs.

I introduced LB299 last year but after the hearing in the Government Committee it was clear the bill needed a little more work. Over the interim my office worked with a number of interest groups including the Platte Institute and ACLU; government agencies and occupational boards; visited with Nebraskans who have been negatively hurt by licensing requirements; and even the Federal Trade Commission. The Federal Trade Commission even submitted a policy brief last week specifically on LB299.

The FTC says the following in the LB299 brief, "Occupational licensing can offer important benefits, such as protecting consumers from actual health and safety risks or supporting other public policy goals. That does not mean, however, that all occupations should be licensed, or that restriction on an occupation always yield more benefits than harms. Licensing impeded entry into professions and occupations, which inherently limits competition. Particular licensing requirements can also harm competition and consumers,

leading to higher prices, lower quality, and reduced consumer access to services and goods, with few or no offsetting consumer benefits. Licensing regulations may also impede economic and geographic mobility for workers, exacerbating unmet consumer demand for services."

Specifically considering LB299 in Nebraska the FTC offered this summary:

"LB299 reflects the Nebraska legislature's concerns about undue licensing regulations and the harm they can do to competition and consumers, as well as workers and the larger economy. We share those concerns. We support the bill's approach to occupational regulation, to the extent that it would apply an analytical framework similar to our own, because we believe this approach tends to foster procompetitive and pro-consumer regulatory reform; and we will continue our support of Nebraska lawmakers' efforts to advance procompetitive reform of your licensing regulations."

After feedback from many state boards, the Platte Institute, the ACLU, and other senators, and the FTC brief, I believe we have amended LB299 to a form that will pass into law. I'm hopeful the law will pass and the first phase of LB299 will be implemented in the interim and we can get more Nebraskans back in the workplace.

On the topic of economic innovation, I was pleased to introduce another bill - LB 790 - which would allow for mobile hair salons and barbers to operate in the State of Nebraska. This concern was initially brought forth to me by John Duncan - a cosmetologist and entrepreneur when he approached my office with concerns from his clientele. Mr. Duncan informed us of his successful career as a hairstylist and the loyalty he had earned from his clients as a result, but as some of his clients aged they found it more and more difficult to make the trip to his salon for their appointments. John came to us with a proposal - to amend the current law to enable the use of a mobile salon so that he could make the trip to see his clients. I'm pleased with the end result of LB 790, as the value of a fresh haircut becomes all the more valuable when it was previously so difficult to obtain.

There are several other occupational bills up for consideration in the 2018 session. I will be watching all of them closely and relying on my thoughts on them to you. I will certainly be helping on all bills that present common sense reforms to our licensing requirements and help Nebraska workers while keeping consumers safe.
