Influenza activity widespread in state

The latest report of flu activity in the U.S. shows influenza rates are continuing to increase, and flu activity in Nebraska is at the wide-spread level.

During the last week of 2018, almost 31 percent of ALL the flu tests done in Nebraska were positive. This is a sharp increase from the previous week, and while there were less than 700 positive flu tests during this same week last year, there were 1315 positive tests this year.

In addition, there have been seven flu-related deaths in the state, including one pediatric death within the PHS district. If this trend continues, we could be in for a rough flu season.

With this in mind, Public Health Solutions is strongly encouraging individuals and families to get a flu shot. Flu vaccine is the single most effective way to prevent hospitalization and death due to influenza.

According to public health nurse, Kate Lange, flu vaccine is recommended for everyone six months or older who does not have an allergy to the vaccine or a history of a serious reaction to a previous dose of flu vaccine.

In addition, health care providers, pharmacies, and others should continue to give flu vaccine through the end of February, especially if flu activity remains high.

Robotics team readies for state

The state competition for First Tech Challenge in robotics is Feb. 9 and for the second time, the Deshler team was able to practice with its alliance, a team from Humboldt Table Rock Steinauer.

The teams are working on robots — from building to programming and operating, team members must work closely

together.

"This is the first robotics group from Nebraska," Coach Hal Hockersmith said about the challenge. "It's an official scrimmage and a dry run for state."

Hockersmith said the teams used the day to finesse their robots.

"We're working on programming and construction. The object

is to create a robot to act on its own. It takes two drivers controlling the robot to move things around on the field," he said.

In addition to construction and programming skills, the teams must also use "gracious professionalism," Hockersmith said.

There are 12 robotics teams in Nebraska.

Linton served 14 years as chief

In his 14 years as Hebron fire chief, BJ Linton saw the department increase equipment, and calls since Highway 81 went from two lanes to four.

"When the four-lane went through, we had a bad time, about four to five fatalities in short order at that intersection," he said about Highways 81 and 136.

As the outgoing fire chief, Linton was presented with a plaque at the city council meeting Monday evening and thanked for his years of service.

Wayne Kugel, a captain and 26-year member, was elected and began serving as fire chief Jan. 1.

Linton spent time at the department while growing up because his dad served. He joined the department as soon as he was eligible, right after high school 28 years ago. At the time, he was the youngest member.

The department was close to full back then, Linton said. Its limit used to be 40 members and then it was changed to 45 due to a waiting list.

Linton, an emergency medical technician for more than 20 years, said equipment upgrades over the years include air packs, the ladder truck, ambulances, Jaws of Life and pumper trucks.

He went to work on organizing the budget and building the sinking fund.

"It wasn't up to where it should be. Our first couple of ambulances we had to go door-to-door for fundraising," he said.

Now, upgrades are part of the budget and planned out for the next 30 to 40 years.

"That was something we worked on with the city. We're on a schedule now to replace instead of being surprised," he said. Meetings between Linton, the city council and administrator Chris Fangmeier ironed out the details and a spreadsheet tracks department equipment for timely upgrades.

"It made things easier for the future. It's a benefit to everyone," Linton said.

It also doesn't require department members to go door-to-door asking for donations. The volunteers do fundraise through a street

dance and dinner for the July 4 celebration, fall gun raffle and for the last 11 years, annual golf tournaments.

Kugel said he isn't sure about the dance this year because July 4 falls on a Thursday.

Last year, the department served a meal to about 600 people on July 4.

The number varies from year to year, Kugel said.

In addition to being a captain, Kugel has overseen, in part, emergency management services for about 10 to 12 years. The department has 11 EMT's, with at least one member taking online courses through Southeast Community College.

Certification for an EMT can be completed in six months with a few trips to Lincoln for training.

Kugel said the online course is a benefit because members complete the training on their own time outside of their daily schedules. The online course has a 98 percent passing average.

Some members go to fire school in May for three days. Leadership skills are also taught.

As an EMS, Kugel must renew his license every two years and in the meantime, complete 20 hours of continuing education.

"There are people willing to

dedicate themselves to complete the class, he said.

As a rule, Hebron Fire sends two EMT's and a driver out.

"That's our department policy," Kugel said. "The state is one EMT, ours is two."

On scene training includes burning houses down. Drills are on the third Wednesday of every month. Meetings are on the first Wednesday.

"We've burned a lot of houses down in training," Kugel said.

The 34-member fire department had 176 calls in 2018 with 151 of them medical calls, Kugel reported to the council.

"We're fortunate to have good equipment. We don't have a lot of accidents on Highway 81, but it's not just one vehicle," Kugel said.

He said a new ambulance would arrive at the end of January with the former vehicle going to an EMS service in Iowa, which may want to negotiate for future equipment.

As fire chief, Shane Day. Captain for the city truck is Colt Viesselmeier. The rural truck captain is Andrew Fangmeier.

Kugel's 26 years with Hebron Fire has gone fast.

"Time flies when you're having fun," he said.

Health care "Close to Home"

The "Close to Home" campaign, set to launch by Thayer County Health Services, encourages people to stay in the home area for health care.

Throughout the campaign, the hospital will advertise on radio spots and online to emphasize access to care.

Marketing director, Kassi Hartley, developed the campaign. Hartley is from the Sandhills. Hospital executive director, David Burd, said Hartley realizes the value of a critical care access facility because she grew up near one.

"She realized the importance of having a facility close to home and once it's gone, you don't get it back," Burd said. "We're right here in the county."

Revenue was slow in November, but the hospital saw an increase in volume after a slow start to December.

"People just weren't sick in November," Burd, who talked with surrounding hospitals that had the same problem, said. "That seemed to be a common trend."

December saw a wave of flu patients and Burd said that will continue.

January has been busier and surgeries are rising with the most volume in 2018, the first bump in five years.

Burd attributes the rise to the new specialists TCHS brought in, such as ear, nose and throat and oncology. The existing specialists increased their volumes as well, and rehabilitation remained steady for the fiscal year.

"We receive lots of positive feedback on the specialists related to the breath of services available locally," Burd said, adding the first chemotherapy treatment was recently completed.

Also showing an increase was the amount of employees using the fitness center as the hospital started an employee bonus program last year. The hospital is currently tracking employee usage.

As of Jan. 1, hospitals were required to post medical charges online as part of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2009, and TCHS has standard charges in a machine-readable format. The hospital is working with a vendor on the task and will continue to improve the tools for patients to help them be more informed.

Burd said that while the transparency of medical charges was part of the 2009 Act, there were no regulations in place to implement it.

"At some point, our hope is to add more comparisons to other hospitals and give patients tools to estimate what they would owe after insurance," Burd said.

1889

130 Years Ago

If one half of those who have "sworn off" this year will maintain their new positions, Hebron will have a number of model men by the close of 1889.

Mrs. Joseph Walker, of Alexandria, one of the oldest citizens of Thayer county, died last week. She had been a resident of Nebraska twenty-eight years, having come six years before the state was admitted.

1899

120 Years Ago

From the Carleton Leader: The dedication of the new M. E. church took place Sunday, Jan. 1...The remains of Mrs. Priest, mother of Mrs. Ed. Beavers, were brought from Leon, Iowa, Tuesday morning and were buried in the cemetery here.

From the Chester Herald: Fred Lasby is now at Minco, Indian Ter., running a butcher shop under the name of F. J. Lasby & Co...This community is called again to mourn for one of her citizens, H. V. Black, who died at his home in this city on Saturday morning, November 19, 1898, aged 45 years, 1 month and 22 days.

A very remarkable phenomenon occurred at the Byron School house during the storm Monday. As soon as the fire was started, the stove became highly charged with electricity and remained so during the day. Anyone touching it received a shock as from an electric machine and if a knife or nail or even a finger were held within one fourth on an inch of it, a stream of brilliant sparks would pass to the stove. The hotter the fire the stronger the charge became. We do not understand the cause of this unheard of phenomenon, and will be very thankful if any one can enlighten us as to the cause, or refer us to other instances where the same thing has been observed. A very careful investigation of such phenomena might lead to the discovery of a method of generating electricity simply by the combustion of coal. It may be that during the storm the air was highly charged with electricity which induced the charge in the stove. W. E. Benjamin, Teacher.

Mr. Keil says it is not alone due to the fact that people are willing to pay for the surroundings of good neighbors, but that the level land around there is worth more than the rough land where the top soil washes away with the heavy rains. "You know soil like ours is practically everlasting," he said, "and the raising of alfalfa supplies the humus that is needed in the soil."

Between three and four hundred Home Guard organizations in Nebraska have been mustered out under an order issued by Gov. Neville, the order being effective Tuesday, Dec. 31, 1918.

From the Butler County Press: John B. Reemts, manager of the Farmers Grain Company elevator at Foley, was the victim of a shooting accident Sunday morning, Dec. 22, which was fatal. The accident happened while Mr. Reemts and son and neighbor boy were out hunting. They had gone about one-half mile from home and, while crawling through a fence, a repeating shotgun which Mr. Reemts carried was discharged. Death was instantaneous. Mr. Reemts is survived by his wife and two children, a son, Ralph, and a daughter, Marguerite, also his mother, Mrs. Mattie Reemts of Omaha, three brothers and three sisters. Albert Reemts of Carleton is a brother. Burial was at Bellwood, Neb.

Local working group meeting planned

A Local Working Group that provides advice on the priorities for many U.S. Department of Agriculture conservation programs will meet February 5, at 9:30 a.m., at the Little Blue Natural Resources District Office, 100 East 6th Street, Davenport.

The public is encouraged to attend and express their natural resource concerns. Ideas generated from the public will help the U.S. Department of Agriculture tailor their natural resource programs to meet the needs identified locally.

There is a Local Working Group in each Natural Resources District (NRD). Membership on the Local Working Group includes Federal, State, county, Tribal or local government representatives according to Janet Valasek, district conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) whose agency guides the Local Working Group.

"The Local Working Group recommends to the NRCS State Conservationist how conservation programs like the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP),

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), or Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) would be used most effectively in their area. This recommendation can include special target areas, cost share rates on conservation programs, which conservation practices should have cost assistance, or how many dollars could be needed," said Valasek. This work group allows local input into how Federal dollars are spent, she said.

Typically Nebraska NRCS obligates anywhere between \$45 million to over \$75 million dollars to farmers and ranchers statewide through NRCS conservation programs. These programs helped landowners and operators make natural resource improvements to their land, water, or wildlife. This funding was allocated according to the priorities set by the Local Working Group.

Navigate and know your health insurance

In recent years, all of us have seen many changes in our healthcare insurance. Some of these changes have been in what is offered or how it is provided by health insurance companies. To get the most out of what you are paying for and have available, Thayer County Health Services wants to remind you to 'read your policy's fine print' and annually review what your health insurance plan offers.

The following are some general tips for you to get the most from your insurance coverage:

1) Make sure your provider is in your insurance network. If not, you may pay a higher deductible or could be denied insurance coverage for out of network services. There is a phone number on the back of your insurance card or you can go to their website to confirm network providers.

Be careful when getting a referral, don't assume because your physician refers you to a specialist for a procedure, that it will be within your network. (Physicians don't know who all is covered by the many different insurance plans.) If the referred physician is not in network, know what it will cost you to see them. Otherwise, you should find a physician that is in your network and ask for a referral to them.

2) Know when to have preauthorization or referral for services. At Thayer County Health Services and many hospitals, staff can confirm preauthorization so you have the best coverage or they can inform you of the status of your coverage so you can make the best decision. Remember, don't assume; check and confirm.

3) Deductibles, copays, and co-insurance can be different for 'in or out of network' services. Make sure you understand your deductible levels: the amount of money you have to pay before insurance pays anything. Know what your copayment and/or coinsurance (the amount after your deductible is met) is going to be and expect to pay it when you go to your appointment.

You may be asked to pay a portion or all of the deductible prior to being seen. This is standard practice, so you shouldn't be shocked when this is asked of you. The best time to ask about this is when you make the appointment with your primary provider, specialists or for an outpatient or surgical procedure.

4) Services received in the emergency room come at a higher cost for that care. Although you cannot be denied treatment based on your ability to pay when being seen in the emergency room, you can expect to pay more for that care. Some payment may even be requested at the time of service.

5) Probably the most important tip is to take advantage of what you are paying for. Many services and tests are called preventative for a reason: to catch symptoms, illness or disease and prevent it either from occurring or progressing. Most health plans are required to cover preventative care without cost to the patient. Examples include immunizations; annual well child and well woman physicals; cholesterol screening; cancer screenings; mammograms; or counseling to improve your health. Know what your insurance plan covers for preventative or essential health benefits and make sure you are using them.

This list is not all inclusive of what is offered and what you must know regarding your insurance. The bottom line is to talk to your insurance provider, read the materials you received from your insurance company or check out their website.



Influenza activity widespread in Nebraska

The latest report of flu activity in the U.S. shows influenza rates are continuing to increase, and flu activity in Nebraska is at the WIDE-SPREAD level.

During the last week of 2018, almost 31 percent of ALL the flu tests done in Nebraska were positive. This is a sharp increase from the previous week, and while there were less than 700 positive flu tests during this same week last year, there were 1315 positive tests this year.

In addition, there have been seven flu-related deaths in the state, including one pediatric death within the PHS district. If this trend continues, we could be in for a rough flu season.

With this in mind, Public Health Solutions is strongly encouraging individuals and

families to get a flu shot. Flu vaccine is the single most effective way to prevent hospitalization and death due to influenza.

According to public health nurse, Kate Lange, flu vaccine is recommended for everyone six months or older who does not have an allergy to the vaccine or a history of a serious reaction to a previous dose of flu vaccine.

In addition, health care providers, pharmacies, and others should continue to give flu vaccine through the end of February, especially if flu activity remains high.

As of Monday, the girls had a 9-2 record and were preparing for the Mudecas Tournament in Beatrice with a contest against Sterling Jan. 7.



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


