Autographing the Mochila

In temperatures around 100 degrees June 29, the Nebraska Division of National Pony Express Association trotted into Oak for the annual re-ride, this year headed east from California to St. Joe, Mo. Local members picked up the ride from Oak to Highway 53 with 25-year veteran Alice Heinrichs in the saddle for the first mile. In Oak, riders gathered to sign the Mochila, used to carry the mail by the Pony Express. The Mochila is transferred from horse to horse on the re-ride as well. Riders arrived at Highway 53, where they handed off the reigns and Mochila to the next set of riders around 10 p.m. Heinrichs, who with her husband 35-year veteran Dick Heinrichs, schedules riders for 32 miles from Oak. She said this year was the first time they've ever been late because of the heat. The riders came in about three hours behind schedule. More photos, page 6.

Group surprises itself every day

Hebron was the "Destination Unknown" for members of the Calvary Christian Church in Bellevue, who pull a time and direction out of a hat each morning to see where they'll end up that day.

"Whichever town we end up in, we try to serve them anyway we can," Chase Horton said. Horton, a college student, is a member of the church. "We landed in this town this morning. Yesterday, we were in Bradshaw."

Hebron is the third town on the group's "map" this year. Waverly was the first, where the young people pulled weeds at a rehabilitation center for special needs, scraped

gum from underneath school desks and did some sanding. In Bradshaw, they pulled weeds again and dug horseshoe pits.

In Hebron, they were found at the ballfield painting bleachers. A few went to Belvidere and washed the fence at Belvidere Memorial Park with the gazebo. They also pulled weeds in Theresa's Garden near the train depot. Later, a photo was posted on Facebook of the group at Majestic Theatre.

One rule of the service excursion is they can't ask for a place to stay overnight. Hebron Bible Church put the volunteers up for the night, and they enjoyed a free dip at the pool.

Volunteer Raychel Ausenbaugh said the volunteers have never not had a place to stay.

"It's an opportunity to see God working. He's still doing really great things and it's a great reminder. We have people buying our food and dinner and that is a blessing," she said.

The work might not be that much fun, but the church members become friends and accomplish a lot together, Ausenbaugh said.

She said church volunteers have served towns for "Destination Unknown" for two years after a church pastor started the project.

"We wake up and we draw," Horton said.

Ball funds still coming in

The 2018 Cattlemen's Ball "Whip Cancer Down the Oregon Trail" crew is planning to present the Fred and Pamela Buffett Cancer Center with 90 percent of the funds raised at the ball in mid-August. The ball raised over \$1 million through auctions, both live and silent, the Calf-For-A-Cure program, online donations and other activities.

Co-hosts for the 2018 ball were Randy and Becky Hergott and Rob and Natalie Marsh. Next year's hosts will be Derek and Allison Sandman with the help of Wayne and Chris Krausnick. The ball will be held in rural Wauneta near the Frenchman River in Chase County.

Tickets, the Trail Boss for two days and the Top Hand for one, were sold out. Nearly 5,000 people walked the grounds of the Hergott Farm off Highway 81 over June 1-2.

The Hergotts and Marshes hitched Thayer County and beyond to a long-standing tradition of fighting cancer by supporting the research behind the disease. The Buffett Center encompasses every step of the disease-treating process and houses laboratories for cancer research. Each ball adds to the foundation of tracking down a cure.

Together with more than 1,200 volunteers, the co-hosts and numerous committees, covering each detail from entertainment to portable restrooms, brought funds back to their community and surrounding area. Ten percent of what the ball raised in total will be donated for health and wellness needs that can range from first responders to medical equipment to educational programs.

Nancy Hofts, who chaired the inside décor for the main tent, which translated to 563 centerpieces, is still adding to the final tally of the ball's proceeds.

"We're edging up to \$13,000," she said. The centerpieces were for sale during the ball, and Hofts sold one of two full trailers of centerpieces onsite. The rest were hauled to Hergott's building in Hebron for patrons.

Hofts said they sold \$5,000 worth of the handmade décor in three days.

"We also had deals. They're now half price," she said.

Hofts began the centerpiece project with the Oregon Trail and the pioneers who navigated it in mind. Last fall, she gathered a group of "harvesters."

"They harvested wheat, rye and ears of corn. They were all ladies. I had one guy, Jim Kenner," she said. "It saved a tremendous amount of money."

That was her goal - to save the ball money.

"I did not use a penny of the ball's," she said. "That was my pledge to one of the state board members. We were not going to use any cattlemen's money."

She asked families and businesses to sponsor the centerpieces, and it wasn't always money. Things & Stuff became one of her best sources for worn boots, hats, ceramic items and other accessories. Her aunt from Smith Center, Kan., donated nine lariats used by a professional bull rider. Hofts asked a disabled friend who crafts pieces from barnwood to make 100 wooden boxes. Someone donated old Zane Grey books.

"We used sunflowers to tie everything together. A lot of the centerpieces had sunflowers in

1888

130 Years Ago

The firm of George M. Church & Co., dealers in boots and shoes, Hebron, has been dissolved by mutual consent, Mr. Church retiring. The business will hereafter be conducted by the remaining members of the firm, Messrs. H. V. Lyle and R. C. Shearer, under the firm name of Lyle & Shearer.

Hebron is spreading out enough for a city of 10 times its population.

Architect J. S. Brewer has prepared elegant plans and drawings for the proposed \$16,000 school. They reflect much credit on him both as an architect and as a draughtsman.

1898

120 Years Ago

Hebron had a regular Fourth of July celebration Monday evening over Dewey's victory. Shotguns, rifles, revolvers, anvils and in fact everything that would make a noise was brought into requisition, and used to give vent to a portion of the surplus enthusiasm. A procession was formed, and the jubilee showed that Hebron is strictly alive.

J. W. Mendenhall is endeavoring to organize a company of cavalry and has about 30 signers.

J. F. Gates is endeavoring to work up a company of infantry and has secured 31 names.

An effort is being made to raise a regiment of Negro soldiers at Lincoln.

Obituary: Paris Richardson, born at Hoosac Falls, Herkimer County, N.Y., Sept. 15, 1828. Died at Deshler, April 29, 1898, aged 69 years, 6 months and 15 days. Was married Nov. 18, 1850, to Miss Barbara E. Boyle, at St. Charles, Mo. Has lived in Thayer County since about 1884. Has had seven children. Enlisted in Co. H, 14th Regt., Ill. Vol. Inf. on Feb. 18, 1865. Honorably discharged at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., on the 16th day of November, 1865. His remains were brought to Hebron on Monday, May 2, and interred in the new cemetery.

Last Saturday there were 3.06 inches of rainfall in this locality. Pretty good for a drouth stricken district, eh?

O. D. Dain shipped over \$3,000 worth of butter and eggs last month. His headquarters are at the old Lovercheck stand. Mr. Dain is encouraging an industry which placed ready cash in the hands of farmer's wives at this season of the year when there is but little produce to bring in cash.

The Hebron school board at the annual meeting decided to add another grade to the high school, making 12 grades in all. This will necessitate the addition of one more teacher as assistant principal. The board also appropriated funds to pay off the old judgment of \$412 that has been hanging over the school district for the last 10 years.

Lee Roper and family returned last week from Murietta, Calif. Mr. Roper, like the rest of Thayer County's wanderers, is glad to get back to a land of prosperity. He reports a number of the Thayer County colony anxious to follow his example as soon as possible.

1908

110 Years Ago

Mrs. Len Morris, who started three weeks ago for a visit to their old home in Norway, was detained in Chicago on account of the ship with the American Liner, upon which she was to sail being detained in dock for repairs. Mrs. Morris returned last week and was accompanied home from

Chicago by her cousin, Mrs. Mary Clipping.

G. E. Gerard of Deshler, who purchased the Belvidere Independent, issued his first paper there on May 8. Belvidere is a good live town, and Mr. Gerard will doubtless do well there as he has plenty of enthusiasm and determination. He will also run a photograph gallery with the assistance of his wife.

Hebron opened up the ball season with a parade of the team and the mayor pitching the first ball.

1918

100 Years Ago

The Germans have made four drives on the western front to break through the lines of the allies. There are now one million of U.S. soldiers in France and are landing at the French ports at the rate of 100,000 per week. At the end of four months, Uncle Sam will have two and one-half million boys in France all ready to sing the "Star Spangled Banner" on the road to Berlin.

By order of the Pope, a mass for peace will be said in the Catholic Church Saturday morning.

The annual egg crop of Nebraska is worth more than the gold output of any one state or territory.

All persons in the neighborhood of Alexandria having walnut trees on their property are requested to report immediately to James H. Butter, Alexandria, their number and dimensions. This is an order from the government at Washington, D.C.

1928

90 Years Ago

A large crowd assembled at the Presbyterian Church Tuesday evening to participate in the installation ceremonies of Rev. J. W. Turner as pastor of the Alexandria Presbyterian Church.

Ben Terry, Wm. Beer and Wm. Sinn attended the Golden Celebration of the founding of the Masonic Lodge at Aurora last week. While there they gathered pointers for the Alexandria lodge which will celebrate their 50th anniversary sometime this coming year.

1938

80 Years Ago

With weather and crop conditions indicating a probable marked demand for labor during the coming months, State Administrator D. F. Felton of the Works Progress Administration, has instructed all supervising employees to aid in every possible way the immediate supplying of workers to private employers.

1948

70 Years Ago

The northeast room of the opera house is being converted into a public ladies rest room and will be ready for use in the near future. The community has long awaited this modern convenience, and the coming of the sanitary sewer system finally made the project feasible.

1958

60 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner)
Investigation is continuing into the early Friday morning break-in at the Citizens State Bank at Carleton. The burglars punched a hole through the wall in a rest room and entered the vault where they rifled about 125 safety deposit boxes. The main vault, containing \$6,000, was not entered, but some \$1,800 in bank money was taken from other places. E. J. Fujan, cashier, opened the bank Friday morning and said he noticed a stepladder on the back room floor. He investigated and found the back door had been pried open. He called Sheriff Herb Schoenfeld of Hebron. Also coming to investigate were Deputy Sheriff Claude Young and two State Troopers. Mrs. Lela Heisey, president of

bank, said Fujan had been in the bank at 9:30 p.m. and nothing seemed wrong. After the robbery was reported, some of the persons who live near the bank recalled they heard pounding during the night but though little of it. The intruders were careful about what they took. They littered the bank vault with deeds, abstracts and titles to cars. Schoenfeld said he couldn't understand why they took U.S. Savings Bonds, which are easy to trace. The Carleton bank was also burglarized in 1940 by cutting a hold through the bottom of the vault when about \$3,000 was taken. The persons involved were later captured in the south and convicted. In 1950, a holdup man with a mask entered the bank and got \$12.50 from the counter. A resident of the area was arrested at Beatrice and received a three-year sentence. It was learned he used a toy pistol.

Seven-year-old David Schaldeck, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Schaldeck, of Deshler was killed when a 1,000 pound concrete slab slid down an embankment crushing him. He was fishing when the concrete somehow dislodged and slid down the embankment hitting David in the back.

30 Years Ago

What are Ancillary services?

When talking about healthcare, we tend to think of doctors and nurses as the primary providers of care. But, did you know that ancillary services providers far outnumber primary healthcare providers? Without ancillary services doctors and nurses would not be able to provide the care they do to their patients.

Ancillary care refers to a wide range of healthcare services provided at the request of your primary physician. They are the support services other than room, board, medical and nursing services involved in providing your healthcare. They include services such as laboratory, radiology, pharmacy, rehab services, behavioral health and home health.

Ancillary service providers extend and facilitate the care you receive from your primary healthcare provider. These services are usually provided at a hospital, medical clinic or at a free-standing facility.

These ancillary services are done with a physician's order and are used to help the physician in diagnosing or treating a medical condition.

Therapeutic services: If after repairing the bone in your leg, you are referred to a physical therapist for proper exercise routines, this is a therapeutic ancillary service.

This type of ancillary service included services such as; cardiac rehab, physical and occupational therapy, and speech therapy.

Custodial services: When a doctor requests home health care for a patient recovering from surgery, this is a custodial service. This type of ancillary service includes hospice, long-term acute care, and nursing facilities.

Thayer County Health Services offers a wide range of ancillary services. Our ancillary services are here to meet a specific medical need when providing your healthcare. Your healthcare provider uses these support services to enhance the local care we provide.

Even if you are referred to another hospital or clinic for specialized care, you can still request to have your ancillary services done at the hospital in Hebron. Ancillary services such as physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, home health, swing bed, radiology, laboratory and many other types of diagnostic testing can be done locally. PHS continues to work to lower blood lead levels in children with lead poisoning

It's been 40 years since the federal government banned the use of lead-based paint for new construction, but lead poisoning is still a problem in Nebraska. Though it is possible to breath in lead dust from the air, lead poisoning usually occurs in young children who put lead-contaminated hands and objects in their mouths. Elevated blood lead levels (5 or higher) are not safe for any person and are especially dangerous in children under the age of 6. Damage done to the quickly developing brain and organs of youngsters is usually permanent.

Sources of lead are not particular to regions, neighborhoods, or social class. According to the EPA, "Lead can be found:

- In homes and childcare facilities in the city, country, or suburbs
- In private and public single-family homes and apartments
- On surfaces inside and outside of the house, and

- In soil around a home. (Soil can pick up lead from exterior paint or other sources, such as past use of leaded gas in cars.)"

In recent weeks, PHS has seen an increase in the number of children with elevated blood lead levels. Warmer weather increases the risk to lead exposure as windows are opened to catch cool breezes, children play outside in areas where soil may be contaminated, and families make repairs to their homes. According to community health worker, Jennifer Banos, "Education is key to the treatment and prevention of lead poisoning. The department's continued partnership with health care providers and families is vital to the healthy future of children living in the district."

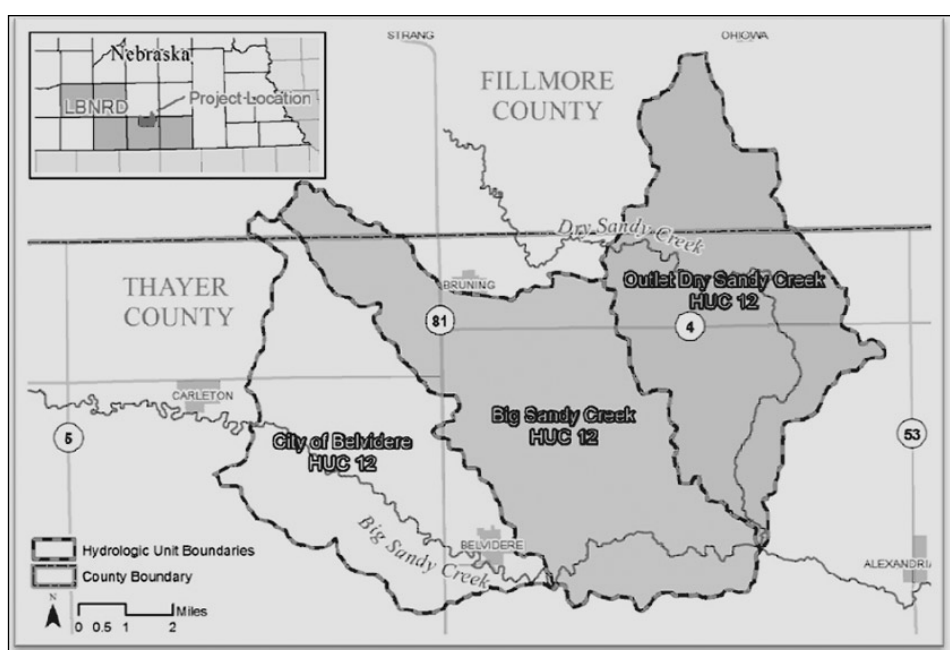

Landowners in Big Sandy Watershed eligible for water quality funding

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service is working with landowners in the Big Sandy watershed to protect water quality. Funds are available to landowners within this watershed through the Water Quality Initiative to install conservation practices that improve water quality. The deadline to sign up for these funds has been extended to July 20. Landowners interested in applying for conservation practice funds should visit their local NRCS office.

This Initiative provides

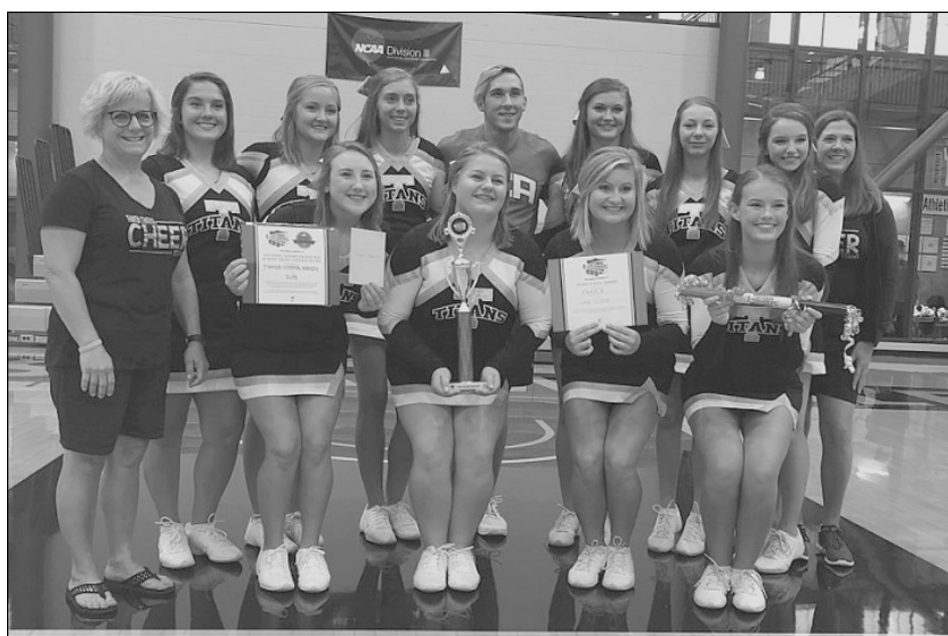
eligible landowners financial assistance to install conservation practices like cover crops, terraces, irrigation water management and buffer strips to reduce soil erosion and improve water quality in the Big Sandy Watershed located in portions of Thayer and Fillmore counties (see map).

The targeted watershed was identified with help from the Little Blue Natural Resources District and the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality. According to NRCS, targeting this watershed through

the Water Quality Initiative will strengthen the overall effort to improve water quality in impaired streams in Nebraska.

District Conservationist Janet Valasek said, "The conservation practices available through this initiative work to improve soil health and prevent erosion, keeping soil out of streams and improving water quality."

Interested landowners and operators should check with the local NRCS office to see if their farm or ranch is in the area eligible to receive Water Quality Initiative funding.

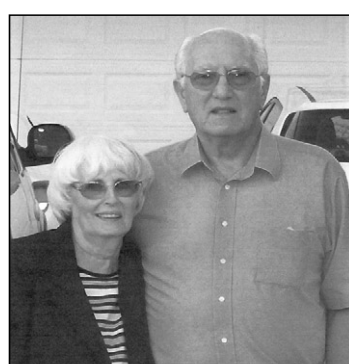

Military items will most likely be stored inside once its completed. Reinke has personal ties to the POW era, in which prisoners were housed in Hebron from 1943 to 1945, and hired by local farmers. Reinke's grandfather hired POWs to work in the fields near Byron and became good friends with them.

threatened a muddy mess for the second day of the ball. Hofts said the volunteers "just came out of the woodwork." "They put out the plea for help and people just showed up," she said. All week long, she had watched the younger volunteers work hard. As Hofts described their work ethic, her eyes became watery. "You didn't see a cell phone. You didn't see them messing around. Someone would tell them to do something and they would. They worked hard, pushing wheelbarrows, shoveling, raking, unloading semis and picking up trash," she said. For as many people there were at the ball, it flowed, she said. "It was worth every bit

of it. I would do it again in a heartbeat," she said. "I had no money, so I gave my time. Hopefully, my time became money. And I made friends. That was another plus." Karla Deepe, who managed public relations and marketing, said she made friends with people she knew, but not on a personal level. "It not only brought our county together, but our entire area seems closer knit now than it was before. I'm really proud," she said. Deepe is excited for the Wauneta crew to carry the torch. "It's exciting to hand off a torch that's burning so brightly. There is no way to do it without funding. We have to get on top of cancer."
