

Thayer County Youth Attend June Jam


Twenty-one youth members from the Thayer County Healthy Communities Youth Coalition attended a two and one-half day drug free celebration called June Jam in Milford at Southeast Community College. TCHCC also had two Youth Action Board members and a staff member from Thayer County leading the conference.

Region V Systems, Regional Prevention Center and the Youth Action Board sponsored the event for junior and senior high students from 16 counties.

June Jam is a fun-filled, educational event that allows youth to meet new friends, spend time with other youth committed to being alcohol and drug free, all while learning more about themselves and the environment in which they live. The students arrived at the college on Sunday evening where they were greeted by the Youth Action Board and staff members. Later they attended the opening session where they learned about the expectations and rules of the event. To end the evening the students broke up into small groups and created posters to represent the values, leadership skills, and goals of their individual group.

On Monday, the students had the privilege to meet Mike White, the founder of "Skate for Change." Mike visited with the students about growing up in the small town of Imperial. He got a 2.4 GPA and was a bit of a troublemaker, but he was a great basketball player. Sounds like a pretty ordinary Nebraska kid, right?

That's exactly what Mike was, until he decided to make his life extraordinary and teach

others to do the same. After a drunk-driving accident took some of his best friends away from him, he made the commitment to live life intentionally and to convert his reckless poor choices into recklessly pursuing his dreams. Since that time, he has never looked back.

A decade of working with youth and two non-profits later, Mike lives his life as a "professional teenager" that doubles as an action sports personality. While other professional speakers struggle to remain current as they continually talk about their past experiences, Mike stays relevant by talking about what he's doing. Mike challenged the students to make a difference in their school and community. He asked them to make a list of 100 things they could do to have fun without drinking alcohol.

In the afternoon, the students

attended small breakout sessions where they discovered more about their individual personality traits and how to develop their leadership skills by applying to be a Youth Action Board member. They also had the opportunity to attend a question and answer session with Mike White. After a few hours of free time, the youth participated in a talent show and dance until midnight.

On Tuesday, Mike White gave another presentation to expand on his first day and to tell the students more about his non-profit organizations and how they can get more involved with helping others in need. After his session, the youth broke up in their small groups and discussed ways they could set goals and help others in their local areas. After lunch the students attended a closing ceremony and then headed back to Thayer County.

Most Rural Nebraskans Skeptical About New Health Insurance Law

Most rural Nebraskans have health insurance and a majority think the nation will be worse off under the new health care law, though many also acknowledge they don't sufficiently understand the law, according to the 2013 Nebraska Rural Poll.

The 18th annual University of Nebraska-Lincoln poll was sent to 6,320 households in Nebraska's 84 nonmetropolitan counties in March and April. Results are based on 2,317 responses.

The poll asked participants a series of questions about their own health-insurance situation and about their opinions of the Affordable Care Act, also known as the health care reform law, passed by Congress in 2010.

Fifty-five percent of respondents reported having health insurance through their job benefits or their spouse's. Twenty-four percent said they have insurance through a government program such as Medicaid or Medicare. Nine percent said they have no health insurance.

Most likely to be uninsured are those who live in North Central Nebraska, people with lower household incomes, people who never married, people with lower education levels and people with food service or personal care occupations.

The poll also found rural Nebraskans to be highly skeptical about the Affordable Care Act. Cheryl Burkhardt Kreisel, UNL Extension specialist

in entrepreneurship/business development, said that skepticism is not surprising considering the law came from a democratic president and members of Congress, "and we're polling a very conservative red state."

Fifty-four percent of poll respondents said they think the country will be worse off under the new law, and just 9 percent think it will be better off. Also, 52 percent think self-employed individuals will be worse off, and 8 percent think they will be better off.

Thirty-five percent said they believed people currently without health insurance will be better off under the new law, while 27 percent think they'd be worse off.

Other findings:

-- Thirty-six percent think the new law will be somewhat successful at increasing access to health insurance coverage, while 27 percent think it won't.

-- 58 percent think the law will not succeed in decreasing overall health care costs, while only 13 percent think it will. Also, 44 percent think it will not help increase the quality of health care, while 24 percent think it will.

-- Persons living in or near smaller communities are more likely than those in or near large communities to say they and their family will be worse off under the new law -- 56 percent compared to 43 percent.

Underlying respondents' opinions of the new law,

though, is an acknowledgment by many that they don't understand it well. Only 5 percent say they understand the law "very well." More than 40 percent say they don't understand it at all and almost one-third say not too well.

"There's a lot of learning and education that needs to take place," Burkhardt-Kreisel said.

"There's a lack of trust in the entire system," added Randy Cantrell, rural sociologist with the Rural Futures Institute.

"It's a fascinating look at what you get with a major national policy change," he said.

The Rural Poll is the largest annual poll of rural Nebraskans' perceptions on quality of life and policy issues. This year's response rate was about 37 percent. The margin of error is plus or minus 2 percent. Complete results are available online at <http://ruralpoll.unl.edu>.

With its 18-year history, the poll has a collection of data about rural trends and perceptions that is unmatched in the country, said Becky Vogt, project manager who's been working on the Rural Poll since its second year.

The university's Center for Applied Rural Innovation conducts the poll in cooperation with the Nebraska Rural Futures Institute with funding from UNL Extension and the Agricultural Research Division in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

Try These Tips To Make Small Gardens Seem Larger

A primary goal with many small gardens is to make them feel larger... to enlarge, if not the space, at least the perception of space.

Many gardeners do this by making better use of vertical space. Trees, shrubs and vines and physical elements like sculpture, fences, plant containers and trellises can extend the ground plane so the eye never stops but simply moves from the ground level upward and outward. Gradual and varied changes of height -- groundcover to flowerbed to shrub to tree -- can give an impression of depth and complexity and keep the sense of space fluid and moving. A diversity of plants in varying heights also makes the yard less susceptible to plant-specific problems and attracts a wider variety of birds and other wildlife and pollinators.

Placed properly, trees and shrubs can obscure the view into the garden, making it appear larger and attracting attention into the space but not beyond it. It might seem best not to divide a limited space into smaller areas but the effect can be just the opposite, increasing rather than limiting the sense of space. Curved rather than straight pathways and plantings can make separate areas seem farther apart than they are. And careful attention to scale can make a striking difference. The size of trees, plants, sidewalks and any focus points can help make portions of the garden seem farther away or hide views into corners, making the end-points disappear.

In small lots, air circulation

is often restricted by nearby buildings or privacy fences. Using a border of plants in varying heights means air can circulate more freely to avoid hot, stale spaces with limited air movement. They can also provide microclimates with varying degrees of sunlight, another element that is often restricted in small spaces. With a little more sunlight in a few spots, the color options increase as well. For shady areas, using variegated plants like hosta and Jack Frost brunnera in dark corners will draw interest and make them much more visually interesting.

If the garden is squeezed in by other gardens or an interesting view, why not "borrow" them? With the right-sized plants, you can frame views and make them appear part of your own landscape.

In a small yard, it's important to have plants that offer several seasons of interest. Many shrubs or small trees have spring bloom, summer fruit and fall color: redbud, serviceberry, viburnum, currant, wahoo, dogwood, crabapple, chokeberry, etc. Vines can add vertical interest.

Evergreens are available in sizes to fit even the smallest garden and evergreen groundcovers like periwinkle, germander and ivy can help keep it green. If there's enough sunshine, grasses are beautiful most of the year and there are grasslike sedges that can handle dry shade. For perennials, some of the best year-round workhorses for small gardens are: coralbells, Lenten rose, coneflower, black-eyed Susan and sedum.

A bone density screening to assess osteoporosis risk is also offered and is appropriate for both men and women.

OFFICIAL MINUTES OF THE REGULAR UNIFIED SCHOOL BOARD MEETING July 8, 2013

The Unified Board of Education met in Davenport on July 8, 2013. Pursuant to laws and notices posted in Bruning and Davenport, all proceedings were taken while convened meeting was open to the public. President Jodi Weber called the meeting to order at 12:05 p.m. Unified members present were Dan Domeier, Ron Holeman, Ted Norder, Rod Tegtmeier. Local board member present was Dave Messman. Also present were Superintendent Trudy Clark, Sara Dierking and Principal Patrick Moore.

Ron Holeman made the motion to excuse the absence of Unified Board Member Nate Schardt. Motion was seconded Dan Domeier.

President Weber welcomed the guests and recognized the Open Meeting Act.

The Consent Agenda included the agenda, minutes of June 12, 2013 Unified Board meeting, Treasurer's Report, July claims and approval on 2nd reading, changes to 611.07 (graduation requirements), 602.01 (school calendar), and 602.02 (school day). Ted Norder moved to approve the Consent Agenda as presented and Holeman seconded the motion. Roll call vote carried 5-0.

Principal Moore gave the principal report on the following items: ECERS training, Administrator Days, Thayer County Fair, Google Docs, Coach's Handbook, and Bus Discipline Policy.

Superintendent Clark reported on the budgetary exclusions available to the District and the BDS Athletic Handbook & Coach Evaluation. Her report also consisted of information relating to the New Business on the Agenda.

New Business (All motions require a roll call vote and all carried 5-0 unless noted.)

A. Holeman moved to approve, on first reading, board policy 405.01, which sets boundaries between employees and students. Domeier seconded.

B. Motion was made by Domeier, seconded by Norder to approve, on first reading, board policy 405.02 regarding self-reporting arrests, convictions and other matters by staff.

C. Holeman moved to approve the request for additional budget growth in the amount of 2% of the 2012-13 Certified General Fund Budget Authority, seconded by Domeier.

D. Holeman, seconded by Domeier, moved to approve the classified negotiations for the 2013-2014 school year. Vote 4-0-1 (Yes-Domeier, Holeman, Tegtmeier, Weber) (Abstained-Norder).

E. Domeier, seconded by Tegtmeier, moved to approve the certified negotiations for a 2.5% increase on the base, a move to

80% of A, B, and C dental coverage, and the changes to the extra duty schedule.

F. Motion by Domeier, seconded by Norder, to adopt the Student Fees Policy (504.21).

G. Motion by Domeier, seconded by Holeman, to adopt the Parent Involvement Policy (1005.03).

H. Motion to approve, on first reading, changes to 603.03 concerning curriculum guides and course outlines by Domeier, seconded by Norder.

I. Motion to approve, on first reading, changes to 405, concerning employee conduct and appearance, by Domeier, seconded by Tegtmeier.

J. No action taken on the review of Board Policies: : 603.01, 603.02, 603.04, 603.05 (curriculum development, curriculum adoption, curriculum evaluation, pilot, experimental or innovative projects).

The meeting was adjourned at 12:30 p.m. Motion made by Domeier, seconded by Norder.



Parenting From A Distance

Parenting is never easy, even when the parent and child live in the same house. Due to military assignment, traveling for a job, divorce or other reasons, sometimes parents and children do not live in the same house. Parents must parent from a distance and that can be challenging.

Staying connected to children is important for their emotional, social, and physical development. Kids have the right to love both parents. In the case of divorce, in all but court restricted visitation, kids have a right to enjoy spending times with each parent. The love between a parent and children can be strengthened with some innovative parenting techniques.

Use technology to keep connected with text messaging, instant messaging, Facebook, Skype and email. This can be done every day. Kids can chat with their parents through cellular phones or through the computer keyboard. This can help children feel an instant connection with the long-distance parent.

When using technology, be sure to share your feelings and what is happening in your life. Ask questions of the child and send pictures, cartoons and jokes.

Every child loves to get his/her own mail. Writing frequently is more important than writing long letters. Children can hold letters and re-read them, keeping memories and feeling loved. Be sure to say

I love you in letters and cards. Send self-addressed stamped envelopes so the child can reply if he or she wants to — but don't expect as many letters sent back that you send to them.

Calling on the phone to chat, read a story and say "I love you" is very important. Keep the conversations focused on the child and keep them out of the middle of parental comments. Phones can increase feelings of love and connection.

Send a ticket for a movie. Even through you may not be able to attend the same movie at the same time — if you both see the movie you can talk about it on the phone.

Gift certificates or small tokens can be used as incentives for good grades and behavior or for appreciation of doing chores. Gifts should not be used as bribes or one-ups-manship trophies against the other parent.


Give your child a thinking of you box where they can keep small things to remind them of shared memories. They may want to keep pictures, clippings, ticket stubs, etc., that have meanings.

When communicating with your child, be sure to use positive and loving comments. Stay away from making the child feel guilty, manipulating his/her behavior or criticizing the other parent. Let them know that you are sad that you are apart.
