Majestic Theatre prepares for second cinema

The Arts Council of Thayer County's first movie for the public was "Lincoln" with Daniel-Day Lewis after the council had organized in 2012 to keep the theater open as it transitioned to a digital format.

As volunteers work to open a second cinema, the first is also going through an upgrade to welcome viewers in wheelchairs.

"We had spaces for six wheelchairs with two to four down in front and two more in the back," ACT board member, Lloyd Van Cleef said of the 140-seat cinema.

"Throughout the learning process of doing this, we thought if we build a flat surface in the back with a ramp, people would like it much better," his wife, Marion, also a board member, said.

The new seating area for wheelchairs will also be carpeted, Marion said.

Work on the second cinema began last fall with repairs to the outside of the building, which needed a paint job and insulation for heat and air efficiency. Repairs also stopped leaks.


Once the outside was taken care of, volunteers focused on the inside of the second cinema.

A free standing wall between the two cinemas locks the sound in for each. Speakers will be mounted on the walls and a special sound system is planned for the second cinema for events.

"So actually, our next step will be to take the screen down and put the stage in," Marion said.

The stage will extend 12 feet from the back of the cinema, and will be available for public events.

As for the seats, ACT already has them in stock from an Omaha theater, which also adopted the Majestic name.

"We are now in the process of cleaning all those seats," Lloyd said.

Marion said the first time around on the seats had no shortage of volunteers.

"We had 20 people putting the seats together. They come in pieces and we assembled them in the evenings," she said about the first cinema.

There are 40 to 50 volunteers and 16 members on the ACT board of directors. Most of the volunteers are from Hebron, however, Lloyd said the volunteers represent almost every town in Thayer County, and they work in groups like Cargill. Soon the American Legion riders will join for

a night at the movies to take tickets and serve popcorn.

"We have lots of volunteers who want to help," Lloyd said about Don Gallagher, who painted the first cinema floor and has committed to the second floor. Or Eric Hopken's help with cleaning the popcorn and butter machines.

Groups working movie nights flow, Marion said.

"They all figure out what job they want and just do it," she said.

Movies are shown Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, and twice on Sundays in the afternoon and evening.

The ACT board, which meets

monthly, is thrilled the second cinema is closer to being finished.

"It really gives you a good feeling," Marion said. "It's amazing how well 16 people can get along for three years."

While they haven't raised the funds for the \$50,000 digital projector, Lloyd said the renovation will be complete when the funds are raised.

"So when we do get the projector, we'll be in business," he said.

Accident leaves one critical

Two area women were in an injury-accident July 9 at 12 a.m., on Highway 81 near McCool Junction.

Thayer High School Alumni Bridgette Baden, 21, suffered life-threatening injuries and was listed in critical condition after she was ejected from the vehicle driven by Brittany Walburn, 24, of Deshler.

According to the sheriff's office, Louis Sanna, 26, of Geneva, was traveling northbound on Highway 81 at Road 2. Sanna struck Walburn's northbound vehicle in the right rear bumper at a high rate of speed. The impact caused Walburn's vehicle to spin three times into the median and then roll several times before coming to a rest in the west ditch facing south on Highway 81 facing south.

Two witnesses saw the accident. Sanna was driving a 2008 Volkswagen Jetta while Walburn's vehicle was a 2004 Chrysler PT cruiser.

Sanna was suspected of using drugs and alcohol and was tested for alcohol. The accident remained under investigation as of Monday morning.

Commissioners save \$62,000 on salary, benefits

The Thayer County Commissioners sidestepped a request by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to fund the Extension associate position.

As UNL attempted to ease 44 counties into paying for the position over a period of four years, the Thayer and Nuckolls county commissioners were the only two counties that hadn't signed an agreement.

The Fillmore County discussed UNL's plan as early as their Sept. 22, 2015 meeting, showing UNL was planning to fund the position 80 percent in 2016; 55 percent for 2017; 30 percent for 2018; and

for 2019, the position would be fully funded by the county.

The plan saw UNL shifting funds to boost the 4-H program in metropolitan counties.

That was one concern the Thayer commissioners had. The other was property taxes. If the county paid the extension associate salary and benefits of approximately \$62,000 a year, they would have to take a look at property taxes.

As UNL presented its idea to the Thayer commissioners, a May meeting had to relocate to a county courtroom because the Nuckolls commissioners, Dean of Extension Chuck Hibberd and Dave Varner of

the Southeast Extension, extension board members and residents from both counties attended.

According to the minutes, UNL said educators would become more specialized. Educators in Thayer County would cover classes in other counties, including Gage, Webster, Saline and Clay while another educator would come into Thayer from another county to hold classes.

It would free up funding for UNL, which intends to saturate the metropolitan counties to grow the 4-H program.

The commissioners from Nuckolls were also concerned, the minutes stated.

"Commissioners from both counties voiced concerns in how this program was presented, especially when 90 percent of changes have been implemented before they were advised of the proposed changes," the minutes read.

Commissioner Dean Krueger said UNL wants at least 50 percent 4-H participation in the metro areas.

"Thayer has 63 percent. Nuckolls has 52 percent," Krueger said.

The commissioners went into closed session to discuss the matter because it involved personnel.

About two weeks later, the commissioners were informed UNL

On Monday evening, the Hebron Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle finished its first year's course of study and will take the customary vacation until October.

The new cook at the Central house, Mr. C. W. McAfee, is highly accomplished in his line.

Miss Lizzie Higby, well known to many citizens of Belvidere precinct, was married at Rockford, Ill., July 7th, to Mr. Asa Kilburn.

On June 21st, Rev. G. Boll was appointed to the charge of the Catholic Church of this place. He also has charge of the churches at Fairbury and Alexandria.

Belvidere: A. E. Hunt has opened a real estate and loan office... Allen Weaver has opened a restaurant in the room adjoining Wilson's store.

North County Line Notes: George Whitman, Sr., and Mr. Brotherhood are building a livery barn in Strang.

Three precincts in the county, viz: Spring Creek, Hebron and Gilead are asked to vote bonds to aid in the construction of the Chicago, Kansas & Nebraska railroad. Thirty thousand dollars is asked from hebron precinct and ten thousand from each of the others. Will it pay the voters of these precincts to vote the bonds asked is an important question which all should be able to answer in the affirmative before favoring the proposition submitted by the company. The article then goes on for about two columns on reasons that it would pay the three precincts to vote for the bonds.

McReynolds & Muckle of the Hebron creamery shipped 12,000 pounds of butter to New York yesterday.

Chester: The Munden Telephone Co. have up their poles and wire and will soon put in some phones in town.

Davenport: The electric light plant is now an assured fact. The plant will be in full operation by the middle or last of September and Davenport will be one of the best lighted towns in the South Platte country. Good Beam is financing the enterprise and deserves the hearty support of the entire community.

Carleton: Chas. S. Macy of our city was lucky enough to draw No. 1347 in the Crown Reservation, which means that Charley is worth \$6,000 more than he was the first of the week... Dozens of the good housewives have been helping the men in the harvest fields for several days. Scarcity of hands almost made it necessary. How a man can farm without a wife is a mystery anyway.

1916

100 Years Ago

George Cording's barn, seven miles northeast of Hebron, was struck by lightning about noon yesterday and burned, together with ten head of horses, harness, etc.

A bunch of fishermen caught a three pound catfish, over three feet long, in the Little Blue on the John Buller farm Monday. A clothesline was used to land the whaler. On Tuesday night about thirty from Hebron enjoyed a big fish bake at the buller place.

90 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) One of the most disastrous hail storms in history fell upon this community Monday evening when gardens and corn were reduced to ruins. Many windows were broken and damage to roofs occurred. The storm seemed to be the most severe across a two-mile strip north and a little to the east of Bruning and completely covering the town gardens and taking a southwesterly course from Bruning toward Carleton. The hail was about the size of pigeon eggs and complete covered the ground, accompanied by a strong north wind.

While engaged in helping his father-in-law, Mr. Ernest Heinrichs, north of Deshler, Alvin Ehlers, residing on the Arnold farm, north and east of Belvidere, was instantly killed by lightning.

80 Years Ago



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ACCESSNebraska helps expedite benefits

New ACCESSNebraska services now provide faster service by taking applications over the phone, and sending notifications via email to clients.

During June, more than 3,200 applications and re-certifications for Economic Assistance benefits were received by phone, and more than 17,600 had signed up to receive email notices about their accounts.

"I applaud DHHS for continuing to improve services for our most vulnerable Nebraskans by utilizing technology to make their service more customer friendly and focused," said Governor Pete Ricketts. "This adds to a wide array of e-government improvements that are helping cut bureaucratic red tape and streamline the delivery of our services."

"Improving our services to clients is our ongoing goal," said Courtney Phillips, DHHS chief executive officer. "These new services provide benefits more quickly and make the application and notification processes more convenient for clients. We are committed to seek ways to improve our services for Nebraskans."

"When clients call ACCESSNebraska wanting Economic Assistance programs, they can talk with an employee who completes their application or re-certification," said Doug Weinberg, director of Children and Family Services in the Department of Health and Human Services. "This service is especially helpful to people who may not have access to a computer."

The advantage, he said, is that about 60 percent of all phone applications and re-certifications for services are

completed the day of the call. This makes benefits available almost immediately. In addition, when employees talk directly with a client they can clarify the information provided, which reduces their time working on a case.

Eventually, it's expected that at least 20 percent of an average of 24,000 applications and re-certifications received each month will be handled by the new phone service.

Email notifications also are new for Economic Assistance clients. ACCESSNebraska previously sent email notifications only to Medicaid clients. Clients can sign up by calling ACCESSNebraska to receive email alerts instead of a mailed letter. The email advises clients to go to their ACCESSNebraska account to view the information. While email notifications are received the same day, mailed letters may take two days or more to reach clients.

Calder Lynch, director of Medicaid and Long-Term Care said email notices have worked well with clients. "If we need more information from a client, email notices result in a faster turnaround for the client and ACCESSNebraska. And, we are able to process their case quickly so clients receive their benefits sooner."

"We also save money on printing and mailing costs, and that will only grow as more clients participate," Weinberg said.

Clients wanting to receive email notices can sign up on the ACCESSNebraska website at www.accessnebraska.ne.gov after logging into My Account and clicking on My Preferences, or by calling ACCESSNebraska.

- The reduction of gravitational forces in the pool allows the patient to do strengthening exercises without causing further damage to healing structures.
- Warm water results in decreased pain sensitivity.
- Improvement of patient morale and confidence as they are able to complete different exercises and show progress.

Adding aquatic therapy to its list of services, will allow Thayer County Health Services to better serve patients who can benefit from this

type of therapy. Patients will be able to participate in a program that involves supervised exercises performed in the water. Swimming is not a prerequisite skill.

Patients can perform each exercise while standing in the water, holding onto the side of the pool or using a flotation device. The water provides a safe and effective method for healing injuries, restoring patient confidence and increasing mobility.

Aquatic rehabilitation may be used to treat patients who are experiencing:

- Low back pain
- Joint pain from sports or daily repetitive activities
- Neurological and orthopedic injuries
- Post-surgical debilitation
- Muscle weakness secondary to chronic or acute injury or illness.

The new fitness center will also allow the local residents to take advantage of the benefits of aqua aerobics. This is a great way to get a good cardio workout for your legs and arms. As with any cardio exercise, it helps improve your lung function. This is extremely beneficial if you have respiratory problems or asthma related complication.

Gentry's Dog and Pony Show

Omaha Sunday Bee, June 10, 1900.

Today, "dog and pony show" is a term of derision applied to pretentious or over-dramatized performances or presentations lacking substance, or failing to meet the audience's expectations. That was not the case during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries when actual dog and pony shows, particularly those presented by Henry B. Gentry and his brothers, were considered not only credible, high-quality entertainment, but suitable fare for all ages and genders.

According to a story appearing in the October 1917 issue of The American Magazine, as a youth in Bloomington, Indiana, Gentry trained several of his own pet dogs to

do tricks. When a traveling animal troupe came to town, young Gentry was hired to accompany the show and "wash dogs." A year later the troupe's proprietor went broke and Gentry found himself "with three crates of hungry, but highly trained dogs on his hands." Apparently that was the genesis of a business that soon involved Gentry's three brothers and made him a wealthy man. By 1895 four Gentry dog and pony shows traveled the country. Later, elephants and other trained animals were added, with the show evolving into a full-fledged circus. By 1910 the Gentry Brothers Circus was said to be the largest traveling show in the United States. About 1916 Gentry sold out for an alleged \$100,000 and became manager of the Sells-Floto Circus.

The Gentry shows often played Nebraska, though which brother was in charge of any given show is not known. On July 5, 1901, the show came to Central City. The company consisted of 124 dogs, 63 Shetland ponies, 25 monkeys, and 3 small elephants named "Pinto," "Alice," and "Little Jim." "Professor" Gentry had added a new feature for the 1901 season, called "Night Alarm." According to the Central City Nonpareil, "It is a fire scene, an everyday episode in metropolitan life, in which animal actors take the place of firemen, the dogs

and monkeys portraying the parts of life and property savers in a most exciting and amusing manner." Following the show, the paper noted that "the remarkable intelligence exhibited by the animals is very surprising. The Gentrys have reached the height of animal training and give a clean, credible performance."

A performance in Omaha in May 1899 inspired the Omaha Daily Bee to rhapsodize, "There is something about an exhibition of trained animals that appeals to almost everyone, man, woman, and child, which only the coldest hearted of humanity fails to appreciate. . . . [The show] cultivates in the heart of everyone who attends it a kindlier feeling for all things of the lower world. The dog and the pony, for instance, are looked upon in a different light, and there are less cruel words and complaints than there were before." Admission was then 15 cents for children and 25 cents for adults. The show's tent could seat two thousand. In June 1914, when Gentry's show was at its peak, it played in Omaha for a week at several venues and included not only trained dogs, ponies, elephants, and monkeys, but also cats, pigs, sheep, goats, and horses.

AAA News and Notes

Traffic Fatalities in 2015 Climbed to Levels Not Seen Since 2008

Motor vehicle related fatalities are rising according to preliminary data released by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Preliminary data for 2015 shows an estimated 35,200 people died in motor vehicle crashes compared to 32,675 in 2014, reflecting an increase of 7.7 percent. Based on the safety agency analysis and projections, this could be the highest fatality rate since 2008. The Federal Highway Administration is reporting a slight increase of 3.5 percent in vehicle miles traveled from 2014 to 2015, which would account for some but not all of the increase in fatalities. NHTSA's year-end projections also indicate there will be increases in fatalities for pedal cyclists (+13%), pedestrians (+10%), and motorcyclists (+9%). Included in the national traffic fatality toll is Nebraska's 246 traffic deaths which is up 9% over the 2014 total of 225. The Nebraska Office of Highway Safety reports that the increase in traffic fatalities for 2015 was led by a 42% increase in the state's urban roadway deaths of 78 compared with 55 in 2014. The 78 urban roadway fatalities was the highest number recorded since 1987 when 81 people died in urban roadway crashes in Nebraska. As of July 11, 2016, roadway crashes have claimed the lives of 104 people on Nebraska roadways which is down 11 percent compared to last year at this time.

Gas Prices Continue to Slide

The national average price for unleaded fuel has fallen for 30 consecutive days and is at its lowest mark for this date since 2004, reports AAA. This current streak of declines is the longest since last fall when prices dropped for 37 straight days beginning August. Today's national average price for regular unleaded gasoline is \$2.23 per gallon, which represents a savings of four cents per gallon on the week and 14 cents per gallon on the month. Year-over-year drivers continue to benefit from noticeable discounts at the pump to refuel their vehicles with prices down 53 cents per gallon compared to this same date last year. Crude oil prices continue to retreat in the U.S. trading market ending the week at \$45 a barrel. With processed fuel prices retreating in the commodities market, motorists may soon see prices retreat below \$2 a gallon in many markets across the south central and southeastern states, says AAA. South Carolina posts the lowest average in the nation with fuel averaging \$1.92 a gallon. California maintains the highest average at \$2.88 a gallon. Nebraska's fuel price average is currently \$2.25 a gallon with four communities (out of 178 Nebraska cities) reporting averages below \$2 a gallon. 

NOTICE TO LANDOWNERS



Commissioners Proceedings July 6, 2016

The Thayer County Board of Commissioners met in open and public session, in the commissioner's room of the courthouse, at 9:00 a.m. on July 6, 2016. Present were Commissioners Dave Bruning, Chris Frye, Dean Krueger and County Clerk, Marie Rauner. Dave Bruning, chairman of the board, called the meeting to order. Public meeting laws are posted and available on the north wall of the meeting room, in compliance with Nebraska statutes.

The minutes from the previous meeting were mailed to the commissioners for review. Dean Krueger moved and Chris Frye seconded to approve the minutes from the June 28, 2016 meeting. Result of vote: Krueger-yes, Frye-yes, and Bruning-yes. Motion carried.

Mark Timmerman, Ass't Thayer County Road Superintendent, met with the commissioners to discuss ongoing road projects, and give a department update.

The department requested the adoption of resolutions to complete project expense reimbursements for last year's flood damage.

Chris Frye made a motion and Dave Bruning seconded to adopt Resolution #1791 for reimbursement for project ER-2745(9)L85-1. Cost of repairs is \$12,930.80 at 100% reimbursement, since work was completed within 180 days following the flooding. Result of vote: Frye-yes, Bruning-yes. Motion carried.

Chris Frye made a motion, and Dean Krueger seconded, to adopt Resolution #1792, for reimbursement for project ER2-2745(9)L85-2.
