Area Legion Riders escort the Fallen

The American Legion Riders from Hebron, Fairbry, Deshler, Fairmont and Beatrice and other riders escorted "Remembering Our Fallen," a national photographic war traveling memorial, to Superior for four days of local events. The war memorial was in Chester Thursday morning, where Hebron Post 180 picked up the escort. The national traveling memorial includes 31 tribute towers with military and personal photos of nearly 5,000 Americans who have fallen since Sept. 11, 2001. The memorial was unveiled at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C., last year. Superior was one of two stops in Nebraska on the memorial's national tour. The tribute towers arrived in Superior Thursday and on Friday, a reception was held for Gold Star families, followed by an opening ceremony. Food and music, sponsored by the Superior Chamber of Commerce, was scheduled Friday night. Saturday, the memorial was on display. Closing ceremonies were held on Sunday. Students place fourth in nation

Three soon-to-be Thayer Central freshmen placed fourth in the nation at the 54th National SkillsUSA middle school competition in Louisville, Ky., June 25-29.

The students, Cayden Huber, Traven Virus and Treyton Waldmeier, qualified for and competed in the Team Engineering Challenge with 12 to 13 other teams, made up of students from

all over, including North Carolina, Hawaii and Wisconsin.

"We were very close to third place," Huber said. He's the speaker of the three. They all had roles and an unofficial team name, Delivertron.

Huber, Virus and Waldmeier were given a problem-solving objective to meet in two days that required them to design, build and test a contraption for a falling marble, seven feet above their design. The marble had to fall and move

through the contraption as close to 30 seconds as possible.

"The building came down to us and another team," Huber said. "They were getting 27 seconds and we were getting 28."

The Thayer Central team also had to present their design.

Huber said a lot of the teams were focused on presenting.

"We were zoned into making it," he said.

Sprints to be featured at fair

Thayer County Fair Board President for the Ag Society, Bob Dankenbring, gave a sneak peek into this year's fair to the July 11 coffee crowd, facilitated each week by the Hebron Chamber of Commerce.

The fair board is returning winged sprints to the Thayer County Speedway in Deshler through the United Rebel Sprint Series RaceSaver Sprints. The URSS begins a packed weekend Aug. 2 in Deshler for a \$1,000 purse and \$200 to start in A Feature.

According to the URSS website, it will be the first sprint car race on the 3/8 mile clay oval track for URSS.

The Hobby Stock Racing event begins at 7 p.m., Aug. 2, followed by the winged sprints. At 6 p.m., drivers will test the track out for Hot Laps.

Dankenbring said the winged sprints should pull drivers in who are scheduled to race in Belleville and want to make some extra points 30 miles north in Deshler.

"They're anticipating 60 to 100 cars, so hopefully a lot of those same cars will be on our track Thursday," he said. "Maybe some of their race fans will be there."

It has been over 10 years since winged sprints were featured at the fair. Lending his experience to schedule the event was board member, Terry Tuma, who is familiar with the racing community, drivers and promoters.

In another announcement, Dankenbring said the trailer races are no more.

"The cleanup was unreal," he said.

Plan is to flatten buildings

The Hebron City Council is planning to assist two property owners on the west side of 4th Street between Lincoln and Olive Avenues with \$2,500 each for demolition debris cleanup, as part of the council's routine procedure in addressing nuisance properties.

"We found purchasing the property and cleaning it up is cheaper than litigation itself," city administrator, Chris Fangmeier said. "It's a compromise to save both parties quite a bit of money."

Alan Johnson and John Levendofsky, who own 117 and 119 on 4th Street, respectively, had their buildings blocked off under emergency status weeks ago because the dilapidated structures are a safety concern. Should the property owners agree to demolish the buildings under the city's requirements that the neighboring property owners are fully protected, the city will offer them \$5,000 each for the empty lots.

But the city is not a party to the contract between the owners and the demolition contractor, which involves insurance and acquiring permits. The city has no immediate plans for the lots.

1888 130 Years Ago

During the picnic, three young ladies slipped away, took off their shoes and--ahem! that is to say, their footwear, etc., and waded to the island. Spectators appearing, they did not want to wade back for fear of showing their anxieties, and so remained for some time until they could return unseen to the mainland.

It is said Belvidere is to have a saloon.

E. W. Avery, late principal of the Belvidere schools, has embarked on the treacherous sea of journalism.

According to published notice, the voters of School District No. 7 (Hebron district) on May 10, decided the question of voting school bonds in the affirmative, the vote being, for bonds 142; against 64; total 206.

The result was a surprise to probably every person in the district, the general (if not unanimous) opinion being that the proposition would not receive the necessary two-thirds vote.

A prominent feature of the election was the large number of women voting. Many ladies who had expressed themselves as much opposed to woman suffrage, voted, and are just as womanly and lady-like as before.

After as close scrutiny as warranted by politeness, it is said by competent observers that no injury, either mental, moral or physical injury, either mental, moral or physical has overtaken any of the ladies by reason of their voting.

The question as carried authorizes the board of this district to issue bonds of the district in the sum of \$16,000. The bonds are to be sold and the money applied to the purchase of block 12 in the county addition and the erection of a school building thereon.

1898 120 Years Ago

Six inches of rainfall within six days is a record hard to beat in Nebraska, but such has been the experience in Hebron the past week. Sixth Street, rightly called Canal Street, has been a rushing stream since Saturday night.

Sidewalks, street crossings and bridges have been carried along with the water, while the cellars of residences in that part of town have been filled with water.

Second Street has also formed a channel to carry off surplus moisture, and heavy damages have been caused in many other parts of town.

The smooth, naturally paved streets are nearly impassable and as web-feet and mud-scows are scarce in Hebron, navigation has been nearly at a standstill for several days.

Died, June 7, 1898, Peter Olsen, at his home on Dry Creek, eight miles southeast of Hebron.

Interment occurred in the family lot in Sunny Slope, Hebron Cemetery.

Last Monday evening about 20 wheelmen were speeding down Lincoln Avenue, when at the crossing of Fourth Street, one of the riders ran against James Knox Sr., a gentleman upwards of 70 years of age.

Mr. Knox was struck in the back and thrown upon his face, very seriously bruising him and for a time it was feared fatally. He was carried home and his wounds dressed and at present time he is doing as

well as could be expected.

The Trans-Mississippi exposition at Omaha was officially opened June 1, at 12 o'clock. President McKinley pressed the electric button which set the machinery in motion.

The first American Army that ever sailed for a foreign shore started across the broad Pacific May 25.

It is predicted that in a few years western Nebraska and Kansas will become great onion-growing localities, as this soil onions grow easily and of a very choice variety. Sugar beets, chicory and many other varieties of produce will find as ready market as corn. Diversity crops.

The price of wheat and corn is still going up, but the price of the old reliable Hebron Journal still continues the same--three 50c pieces for 52 numbers.

William L. Grigsby of Belvidere has received an increase of pension from \$12 to \$35 per month.

The old county jail under the courthouse is being fixed up for a city bastille.

1908 110 Years Ago

Carleton: The new auditorium was filled Friday night almost to its capacity by the crowd that gathered to enjoy the graduating exercises of the class of '08...

We printed a lot of stationary the last of the week for the Merchants Protective Association. This association has been formed for the protection of the Merchants against what few deadbeats there are in the country tributary to Carleton and merchants in other surrounding towns will be kept in touch of the action taken.

If by chance you are one of the number who fall under the ban, it will be best to pay up with your home merchants and not let your reputation get abroad.

1918 100 Years Ago

Friday's light rain cleared the atmosphere and laid the dust, so that delightful weather heralded Saturday's exercises for dedicating Hebron's service flag, containing over forty stars, and inaugurating the third liberty-loan drive.

The 255th Regimental Band from Camp Funston and the two Hebron bands were in the parade with the Sammy Girls, Boy Scouts, D.A.R.'s, Women's Committee, Council of Defense, school children, Home Guards and Citizens. Four Boy Scouts--Tom Cruise, Allan Carte, Joseph Boyes and Dale Powell--were called to the platform and decorated with medals from the U.S. Treasury department in recognition of having each sold \$1,000 worth of Liberty Bonds in the second drive.

W. H. Rhodes outlined the purpose and scope of the third liberty bond drive. Mayor Harms of Bloomfield "of German birth but an out and out American" made a splendid impression in his talk as an American-German to the German-Americans.

He said that the darkest hour precedes the dawn, but God is with us, and those that be for us are greater than those

that be against us.

1928 90 Years Ago

The fire bug seems to have arrived in Davenport. Wes Mosier's barn being burned Saturday night and Charles Friedline's barn burning Sunday night.

At about 9 o'clock Sunday morning fire destroyed the iron-clad annex on the south of Nacker's hardware store. The loss is estimated at \$4,000, fully insured.

An epidemic of small pox struck Hebron last week, in consequence of which the Board of Health prohibited all public gatherings. The schools were closed and the graduation exercises of the high school and Hebron College and Academy were dispensed with. The movies, social gatherings and church services were also taboo.

Fortunately the disease is in a light form, there being seven or eight cases. The county promotion exercises for the eighth graders were also called off. On Tuesday, the quarantine was raised.

Messrs. Johnson and Dutsman, formerly of Beatrice, have formed a company to be known as the Hebron Bottling Co., and will occupy the Bethscheider building, south of the Majestic. The building is being remodeled and machinery installed for the manufacture of carbonated beverages.

1938 80 Years Ago

Drilling on the new city well this week is going ahead on a new location after efforts to set up a well south of the present two city wells, south of Hebron, proved fruitless.

The well is being drilled by Layne-Western Company of Kansas City. Water was reached on the land which the city had leased from A. J. DeWald on which the well was originally to have been built, but there was not enough sand to draw the water for a good well.

The new location is just across the road from the present wells, chosen after several test holes had been drilled. The city has an optional lease on the land which belongs to E. L. Wehrbein and a permanent lease will be obtained if the well proves to be a good one.

Ed Wulfkoetter, proprietor of Ed's Cafe, has installed a new Keg Flow Beer novelty box which is the latest invention for drawing beer from the keg.

Three men from Indiana were arrested late Wednesday night after confessing to the stealing of chickens from Fred Philippi, who lives southwest of Bruning.


A new port of entry will be built by the state at Chester.

Physician Assistants

It was in the mid-1960s, a new level of healthcare providers called physician assistants (PA) were introduced in the United States. This was in an effort to relieve the nationwide shortage of doctors providing primary care and to increase access to healthcare for people living in under served areas.

They are essential to addressing healthcare provider shortages in the U.S. There are more than 123,000 PA's practicing in all 50 states and D.C. An estimated 15 percent of PA's practice in rural areas, where provider shortages are most pronounced.

Physician assistant students take a course of study with an emphasis on primary that resembles a shortened form of traditional medical education. PA's are educated at the master's degree level in programs that are approximately three academic years in length, and include more than 2,000 hours of clinical rotations. Their training as medical generalists provides PA's with diagnostic and treatment skills in all areas of medicine and for all patients, regardless of age or gender.

Most PA students have had four years of medical experience before they start their training. Upon graduation from their accredited training, physician assistants must pass the national certifying examination of the National Commission on Certification of Physician Assistants, an independent accrediting agency, after which they must complete 100 hours of continuing medical education every two years and pass a recertification examination every six years.

Key facts regarding Physician Assistants:

- Physician assistants are licensed to practice medicine in a partnership with a physician and can be found in almost every medical and surgical specialty.
- Physician assistants are medical professionals who

can perform examinations, diagnose illness, develop and manage treatment plans, prescribe medication, diagnostic testing, treatment plans (including referral), medication management and often serve as a patient's principal healthcare provider.

- Research shows physician assistants are capable of giving care comparable to that of physicians for similar services.

- Physician assistants have improved access to health care for populations in rural, inner city, and other medically under served areas.

- Physician assistants receive training that allows them to staff satellite clinic offices, provide on-call services, and deliver care in rural areas.

Numerous studies have shown that the quality of care given by physician assistants has met with high levels of patient satisfaction. A 2014 Harris Poll found that patients who interact with PA's gave them a 93 percent rating as a trusted healthcare provider. They are accepted by both patients and doctors and their role in primary care allows patients to receive improved quality of care, expanded access to care, and more cost effective care.

And while the process may seem slow, it would drag on if the matter was in litigation, city attorney, Joe Murray said. He is assisting with the contract between Johnson and Levendofsky for the sake of the neighboring businesses that flank their buildings to the north, and to the south.

The council also had to officially declare Johnson's building as a nuisance. Next month, they will place Levendofsky's under the classification.

Two additional properties, 535 Jefferson Ave., and 220 S. 6th St., were declared nuisances. On nuisance declared properties, the city will identify them with Nuisance Abatement Procedure signs because council members are concerned about owners selling nuisance properties as is without informing potential buyers about problems with the properties.

In other business, the council discussed dates for

city clerk, Marcy Welch, who has requested a public hearing.

Welch was terminated from her position June 22 by Mayor Shane Day, according to the city. Policy allows for Welch, who remains on the city's payroll, to address Day and the council in an open forum, which will be held July 20 at 5:30 p.m. in the Hebron Secrest Library basement.

Welch has been with the city since June of 2012. She became the clerk in August of 2015.

Council members also authorized the annual contract with the Thayer County Sheriff's Office for \$11,796 per month.

West Nile virus infection can cause serious illness; prevent mosquito bites

Summer is officially here, and the annual upturn in outdoor activity has begun. Whether your outdoor time is spent camping, watching ball games, or working, spending long periods of time outdoors increases the risk of exposure to mosquitoes infected with West Nile virus (WNV). Preventing mosquito bites is the best way to prevent WNV infection.

Outbreaks of WNV infection occur in the Public Health Solutions (PHS) district each year. Most people infected with WNV either don't develop signs or symptoms, or have only minor ones, like fever and mild headache.

However, some people develop a serious illness that includes inflammation of the brain (encephalitis) and of the membranes surrounding the brain and spinal cord (meningitis). Symptoms of this more serious infection include fever, severe headache, confusion, stiff neck, and muscle weakness.

The elderly, disabled, and those with weakened immune systems are more susceptible to WNV infection. People with these more serious symptoms should see their health care provider right away.

To prevent mosquito bites, Public Health Solutions recommends:

- Apply an EPA registered insect repellent that contains DEET, picardin or oil of lemon eucalyptus when enjoying outdoor activities.
- Apply repellent after sun-tan lotion or oils, and reapply after swimming or other water activities.
- Mosquito proof your home by using screens, checking for and draining standing water weekly, and using larvicidal mosquito dunks for birdbaths, water troughs, or other standing water on your property.
- Insect repellent and mosquito dunks can be purchased at any sporting goods, hardware, or discount stores.
- Limit outdoor activities at dusk and dawn, prime feeding

time for mosquitos.

- Help your community and the health department by reporting dead birds for tracking of West Nile virus.

To determine the amount of virus circulating in our communities, PHS works closely with local and state officials to monitor and identify mosquito breeding sites as well as dead bird populations. This surveillance begins June 1st and continues through late fall.

We encourage the reporting of dead birds for possible testing. For more information on WNV surveillance and/or dead bird collection, please contact PHS at 402-826-3880. DO NOT handle dead birds without instruction.

Wagner's Carnival is back for four nights, beginning each night at 6 p.m. and ending at 11 p.m. Pre-sell wristbands are available at the banks in Thayer County.

The Ag Society has contracted with the carnival for

approximately five years.

"They are out of Texas and go to Beatrice, and that makes us on the way," Dankenbring said. "It is a large carnival for such a small place. We are lucky to have that."

"You can see people over there almost nightly working, cleaning it up and organizing," he said.

All around improvements, including LED lights in the beef barn and the 4H project that gave the horse barn a new coat of paint, along with water management near the beef barn, were well needed, Dankenbring said.

"Whenever we schedule the fair, there is a nice big rain for the county," he said.

Opening night will feature the 6 p.m., parade through downtown Deshler, followed by the Pioneer Farm Family Awards in the Grandstands. The Mutton Busting contest begins at 7 p.m., in the Horse Arena and the 4H Cake Raffle will be at 7:30 p.m., in the Grandstands.

Regarding last year's tragic accident that resulted in the death of performer, Abby Uecker, Dankenbring said they will have security and have talked with law enforcement. He would not comment as to whether the Ag Society had made any insurance payments in relation to Uecker's death.


