Pets ruled fairgrounds for judging Sunday

A different kind of companion competed in the 4-H animal and dog show Sunday. The judge determined Zion Reinke's Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches are obviously pets.

"These are pets," Judge Darci Lindgren of Albion said while Reinke demonstrated how he cares for his cockroaches.

He doesn't have names for them, but feeds them fruits, vegetables and dog food.

"They like warm and humid places and I give them a sponge to suck on for water," he said.

Reinke has had cockroaches for two years.

"They're just cool," he said.

As Extension Associate Crystal Fangmeier prepared for the show, she said attendance was down because of the early fair schedule this year.

"Kids are in sports and they didn't have time for projects," Fangmeier said.

She said a good time to start on fair projects is a couple weeks after the fair ends.

"You don't have to work on projects in 2017 for the 2017 fair," Fangmeier said.

Meanwhile, Thayer County Fair President, Tim Wenske, said the fair

board has been working to prepare the grounds. He said they've been watering the track and taking care of other tasks.

"The parade is Thursday and that's a big draw," Wenske said.

"Friday, we'll have our late models and cruisers. I'm excited about the late models."

He said the board is expecting "great attendance" during the fair, despite the heat.

The forecast as of Monday showed Wednesday at 100 degrees; Thursday at 102; and Friday, 104.

Saturday drops several degrees to top out at 96 and Sunday is forecasted to be 91 degrees.

Trail takes shape as phase one readies for pour

The Walkability Coalition in Hebron is hoping to pour 200 feet of cement trail just west of 4th Street bridge Saturday as it completes phase one of the trail project.

"Everyone is doing a great job so far," Tim Pickering of the coalition said during a meeting Monday evening. Materials for the project are being purchased in Thayer County.

The coalition agreed the help of volunteers is essential to completing the trail, which is expected to cut through to South Street in phase two, as it slices into an eight-foot section of the parking lot just off South Street.

The coalition will use temporary barricades during its phase two work.

"It's going to be neat to start on, but neat to see it done," Phil Prater of the coalition said.

A bicycle raffle from the Fourth of July celebration earned \$78 in funds for the trail. The coalition also received a donation from Public Health Solutions.

Winners of the raffle were Trudy Kassebaum and Phil Prater.

Lunches five cents more, addition coming along

Construction at the Thayer Central campus is right on schedule. Members of the Thayer Central Board of Education toured the new addition at their July 11 meeting.

The windows on the addition are in and by next week, construction workers are expected to have the large window in the front set. The window is 18 to 20 feet high and about 30 feet wide.

The school calendar was altered a bit for the new building, but Superintendent Drew Harris said students

will return to their regular schedule next year.

School will begin Sept. 6 after Labor Day. Six days were shaved off the winter break, which typically runs almost two weeks. The break will begin Dec. 23 after a brief school day. Students are scheduled to return Jan. 3.

Harris said the day after Easter will be a school day as well.

"We took out most of the breaks we

get during the school year," he said.

At the meeting, school board members also started budget talks.

"Our federal funding dollars are comparable to last year," Harris said. "Valuations for the district should be up roughly eight percent."

In other business, the board approved a combination oven for the school kitchen since it saved approximately \$12,000 from the Titan Beef Boosters program last year. The combination oven will not only

keep food warm, it will also steam vegetables and serve as a confectionary oven.

Student fees were the subject of an annual hearing. Lunch fees were raised five cents and the activity fees stayed the same. Various clubs charge membership fees to cover their state organization dues.

The new year will also bring a new cheerleading squad, which is preparing for home and post season games.

City wipes one-way, talks business incentives

The Hebron City Council cancelled out the one-way on 6th Street at its July meeting. The no parking on the west side of the street remains in effect.

The street was a main thoroughfare for the primary school, which was permanently closed at the end of the school year.

Primary students will begin the school year in the new addition to

Thayer Central.

The council also discussed incentives for new businesses, but didn't make a decision.

At the June meeting, Councilman Kurk Wiedel said if the city doesn't give some kind of incentive, businesses will ignore Hebron.

"It's time we do something," Wiedel said.

Deposits on electricity and water

were mentioned. Since start-up construction is costly, a deposit incentive of \$210 on electricity could be a motivator, especially if a new business made its payments on time for 12 months. After the 12 months, the city would be refunded its deposit.

"It would make sense for us to improve downtown," Wiedel proposed.

In other business, the council approved the June 24 minutes of a special meeting that saw the purchase of dilapidated property at 210 Eads St., for \$2,000.

In June, City Administrator Chris Fangmeier said two of the city's acquired properties were ready to be sold at auction.

The Eads property will be razed this fall.

1886

130 Years Ago

Wetherald Brothers inform us their mill will not be in running order before August 1.

Robert Wilson and J. R. Morgan have ordered a set of butcher tools from St. Louis to be used in Belvidere.

George Voll has his third brick kiln burned. It contains 165,000.

Born on July 15, 1886, to Mrs. Mattie Reed, at the poor farm in Thayer County, a son.

We are informed that Harvey Lemon of Kiowa precinct, who recently returned from Hot Springs, Ark., is now at home in a precarious condition. A few days ago he went to St. Joseph to have what he supposed was an abscess opened. On examination, the surgeon told him his backbone was decaying. His case is considered extremely critical.

About 11:30 Monday night the cry of fire awoke the sleepers in the beautiful town of Chester. The fire was discovered almost simultaneously by Dallas Rasher, and several other parties who were in the adjoining building, among which were Aaron Wilkenson, one of the proprietors of the burning building, and four young men of Hebron, named Al Norboe, C. J. Gilly, Wm. Phebus and Chas. Southwell.

Mr. Rasher says when he first saw the fire in the livery "it was about the size of a barrel," but almost before he could cross the street the whole building was in a blaze, and the flames were pouring down into the horse's mangers. So dry and combustible were the buildings and contents that in the short time of half an hour the fierce flames had done their work of destruction. A distance of about 12 feet only separated the rink building from the livery barn.

As soon as the flames touched the tarred roof of the rink, the fire spread over it in a few moments and it was soon a mass of flames. So sudden was the fiery onslaught that scarcely anything was saved. The building built as a skating rink had been partitioned into several rooms, which were respectively occupied by Lee Donnell, flour and feed; Phillips & Smith, real estate; and Kautzman & Co., saloon.

About the only things saved from this building were the books of Phillips & Smith and three boxes of cigars from the saloon. Strain's building next north and about 25 feet distance from the burning building was saved by the extreme exertions of the people.

The citizens of Belvidere are much excited and very joyful over recent railroad developments. Last night, Supt. Calvert of the B&M railroad, and Capt. R. O. Phillips of the B&M Town Lot Company, arrived at Belvidere and purchased property to the amount of \$3,500. They also instructed Clark Marshal to buy more property. It is said the engineers will be at work in a short time. It is thought to be certain that the gap between Hebron and Geneva, or between Hebron and Strang, will at once be filled up by the construction of a line which will take in Belvidere.

marching division, which will figure largely in the coming campaign.

A company of about 37 young ladies met at the residence of Dr. Hinchman to form a Young Ladies' Republican Club. Mrs. Liggett was elected permanent president, Miss Edna Gates, vice president and Miss Alice Hinchman, secretary.

The infant baby of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McCleary, living about four miles east of Hebron, died last Friday night of cholera infantum.

Gilead: Mr. Moss of Fairbury is repairing his grain elevator at this place, getting ready for business.

Belvidere: Mrs. T. I. Miller has gone back east to be with her son, Edmond, who is dangerously sick with typhoid fever.

Chester: Died, on July 22, at the home of his mother in Chester, G. W. Blanchard, of consumption, in the 31st year of his age. He leaves a wife and one daughter.

Davenport: You can't see the country for the corn...The whistle of the steam thrasher may now be heard...Mr. Robert Tweed of Davenport and Miss Sarah R. Hunter of Burchard, were united in marriage at the home of Mr. S. B. Shin of Burchard, on the evening of the Fourth.

Hubbell: Harry Logan has bought Al Prather's liver barn...Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Carpenter's baby died last Thursday.

1906

110 Years Ago

J. H. Lake has sold the house on his farm to Dr. Newman who will move it to the farm recently purchased of John Pew.

Claude Hensel met his wife at Lincoln Thursday upon her return from Missoula, Mont., where she has been for several months visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. G. Pratt.

The Lake house south of town is receiving the finishing touches and Mrs. Borden has arrived to approve of the work. A carload of furniture is being placed in the beautiful home.

Chas. Craig has purchased the interest of his partner, Mr. Stierlen, in the feed yard and livery stable, and will conduct the big business alone.

A. C. Pratt of Martinez, Calif., is in Hebron for an extended visit with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Pratt, who live in the Suburbanville addition to the city, and also his sister, Mr. C. W. Woltemath. Mr. Pratt was among the unfortunate sufferers from the California earthquake in which disaster he suffered the loss of his wife and child.

Geo. Mackey, formerly of Reynolds, was drowned at Tilden last Sunday and was buried at Reynold on Tuesday. He was fishing, wading along in the river, and stepped into a hole, dropping out of sight. He could not swim and was drowned. He was about 30 years of age, and leaves a heartbroken wife to mourn his loss. The deceased was a member of the 2nd Nebraska Regiment, having served in the Spanish War.

Lou Halfman, J. T. McCuiston, Peter Stutz, Dan Jones and Harry Ferguson left on Wednesday for the Shoshone reservation country to get free homesteads.

At a meeting of the citizens Monday night, the soliciting committee reported that \$2,210 had been raised to buy a lot besides erecting a \$2,000 building. It had not yet been definitely settled whether to build near the Burlington or the Rock Island railway.

100 Years Ago

The Thayer County Republican Convention met at the courthouse in Hebron on Tuesday. In spite of threshing time and sultry weather, a large crowd of delegates attended. It was an enthusiastic gathering and not a ripple of discord marred the most harmonious convention in years.

Wednesday, A. J. Barlow, a highly respected citizen of Belvidere, aged 80 years, was struck by the freight train as he was crossing the track. Spectators and the whistling engine tried to warn him, but being totally deaf he was unconscious of danger. He was taken to Charlie Leslie's house and later was placed on a stretcher and removed to his home, where he

died about 6:30 p.m.

A combination of good weather and tireless committees produced an exceptionally successful picnic on the Little Blue at the southwest corner of town yesterday, where the Christian Sunday School entertained the schools from Chester, Belvidere and Liberty Ridge. Paths had been cut among the elder berry bushes and matira; advantages were utilized for pretty landscape garden effects. Flags and welcome pennants gave a festive touch to the pretty surroundings.

EMDR (Eye Movement Desensitization Reprocessing)

Patients who suffer from anxiety or distressing memories, nightmares, insomnia, abuse or other traumatic events now have a new treatment option that may help them gain relief. A therapy called EMDR (Eye Movement Desensitization Reprocessing) is a new therapy available through the Behavioral Health Clinic at Thayer County Health Services.

Approximately 20 controlled studies have investigated the effects of EMDR. These studies have found that EMDR has effectively decreased or eliminated the symptoms of post-traumatic stress for the majority of clients. Clients often report improvement in other symptoms such as anxiety as well.

The American Psychiatric Association along with other organizations recognize EMDR as an evidence based practice in the treatment of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD).

Many patients, who experienced slow improvement in the past from more traditional therapies, have found that EMDR works for them. This powerful short-term therapy is highly effective for a wide range of disorders including chronic pain, phobias, depression, panic attacks, eating disorders and poor self-image, stress, worry, stage fright, performance anxiety, recovery from sexual abuse and traumatic incidents.

During a EMDR therapy session, the therapist works with the client to identify a specific problem to focus on during the treatment session. The client calls to mind the disturbing issue or event. They remember what was seen, felt, heard, etc., and what thoughts and beliefs are currently held



about that event. The therapist then facilitates the directional movement of the eyes or other dual attention stimulation of the brain while the client focuses on the disturbing material. Using sets of eye movements, the therapist works with the patient until the memory becomes less disturbing and is associated with more positive thoughts and beliefs about one's self.

EMDR seems to have a direct effect on the way the brain processes information. Normal information processing is resumed, so following a successful EMDR therapy session; a person no longer relives the same images, sounds and feelings when they think about that disturbing event. They still remember what happened, but it is less upsetting.

Through the use of this therapy, the client may experience intense emotions, but will gradually have a reduction in the level of anxiety associated with it.

EMDR is thought of as a physiologically based therapy that helps people see disturbing material in a new and less distressing way. Its effects are similar to those that occur naturally during dreaming or REM (rapid eye movement) sleep. EMDR helps lessen the anxiety and stress associated with a past traumatic situation.

If you think you might benefit from an EMDR therapy session, talk to your healthcare provider.

The pros and cons of Friday weddings

Couples give a great deal of thought to the day they choose to get married. Many engaged couples are more attached to a particular season than a specific day, but some couples will consider any time of year to say "I do."

Weather factors heavily into many couples' decisions regarding when to get married. According to The Knot 2015 Real Weddings Study, 39 percent of the nearly 18,000 U.S. brides and grooms surveyed chose to get married in the months of September, October or November, three months of the year when the weather tends to be both predictable and pleasant.

But more and more couples are paying more mind to which day of the week to get married as well. While Saturday is widely considered the most traditional day to tie the knot, couples may want to consider walking down the aisle on Friday. Another advantage to getting married on a Friday is the opportunity to spend more time with guests. Couples who get married on a Saturday tend to be busy most of Friday and Saturday, and that leaves little time to spend with their guests, many of whom will return home first thing on Sunday morning. But by getting married on a Friday, couples then have Saturday to spend with their guests, and they can even plan a laid back get-together like a backyard barbecue or Saturday brunch with guests who will likely stay in town through the weekend.

Cons: Likely because they are so extraordinary, Friday weddings may be less popular with guests. Bridal party members may be obligated to take two days off from work in order to make it to the rehearsal dinner on Thursday night, and that might not sit well with friends and family who do not have much vacation or personal time. Even guests who are not in the bridal party may need to take a day off from work that they otherwise can avoid taking if the wedding was scheduled for Saturday or even Sunday.

Couples also should know that Friday weddings tend to begin later at night, as it's customary to start the ceremony in the evening so guests who have to work can still arrive on time. Couples inviting several elderly guests or children may find that these people miss the ceremony and/or reception because of the later start time.

Brides- and grooms-to-be may find their options with regard to venues and entertainment are more limited when they choose to get married on a Friday instead of a Saturday. Some venues may only host weddings on Saturdays, while entertainers like deejays or bands who work day jobs during the week may not be available on Friday nights.

Couples considering tying the knot on a Friday should consider a host of factors before making their final decision.

Terry Olson reported the Library has sponsored one Speaker Program this year. 55 attended Walt Miller's fascinating program on the U.S. Naval Ammunition Depot. The next Speaker Program, Radical Islam will be presented by Pastor Darrell Sutton. Program will be held at Courtyard Terrace on August 14, 2016 at 2:00. Terry reported that they are still doing mini outreach programs at Kids Parise and Care Home. The Summer Reading Programs 2 per week ended June 23rd with 90 to over 100 children and youth attending each week. To keep the children reading, the library added 5 Summer Adventure Fun Shops featuring Books and Art with Mrs. Baden. The library is also participating in the Nest- Read to Win Scholarship Program.

EMS COVERAGE FEES

Councilmember Fangmeier reported part of our deal with fire department coverage fee is to help with overhead costs, housing equipment, training etc. We are proposing an agreement with Hebron, Bruning, Gilead, and Belvidere. It will be approximately \$12,000 a year X 3,000 = \$36,000.00. This would be a big chunk of a new vehicle. This is overhead fixed costs. Larry reported that in the last year we have been to Bruning for ambulance transport approximately 6 times, so really is a good deal for everyone. This would help the firefighters from having to do a lot of fundraising for things like the new building addition which the firefighters donated their own time to help keep the costs down. Larry reported that the building should have been built by a contractor and it would be done, but bless the volunteers that put time in to try and get it done and save money.

Councilmember Fangmeier also reported that the hospital is getting on board with taking our old ambulance but it won't happen for a couple years yet.

Councilmember Bauer made a motion second by Pickering to Approve the Minutes from the June 6th, 2016 Meeting.
