Thayer County Thunder...

Road Work near Reynolds on N-8...

According to the Nebraska Department of Roads, a fog seal project will begin the week of July 29 on N-8 weather permitting. A fog seal is oil sprayed onto the surface of a newer road to seal the fine cracks.

State maintenance forces will be doing a fog seal from Reference Post 39 to Reference Post 51, Reynolds east to the junction of N-8 and N-15. The work is anticipated to take three days. One lane traffic will occur with the use of a pilot car and flaggers. Motorists should expect to see delays and are reminded to drive cautiously through highway work zones.

Thayer County receives grant...

TCEDA is proud to announce that Thayer County has been awarded over \$20,000 from the Joint Opportunities for Building Success (JOBS) Grant given out by the Federal Home Loan Bank of Topeka.

USDA authorizes emergency haying and grazing of CRP

On July 15, Farm Service Agency (FSA) Director Dan Steinkruger announced that 54 counties in Nebraska were authorized for emergency haying and grazing of CRP acres for 2013 due to drought conditions.

At that time, Thayer County wasn't included on the list, but a few days later on July 17 the county was added.

"Drought has been ongoing in Thayer County for more than a year and forage losses have impacted

livestock producers," said Jay VanWesten, FSA County Executive Director.

In the middle of July last year, the USDA allowed emergency haying and grazing as well.

"In 2012, USDA opened CRP acres for emergency haying and grazing and many Thayer County producers took advantage of this option to provide forage for their livestock," he said.

Although many of the limitations and requirements of emergency

haying and grazing were waived in 2012, the same does not apply this year. For 2013, there will be a 25 percent reduction in the annual rental payments and no haying or grazing will be allowed on practice CP25 (rare and declining habitat). Along with these restrictions, CRP participants cannot sell the hay. However, if the participant is not a livestock producer they may rent or lease the haying or grazing privilege to an eligible livestock

Shaded in gray are the counties that were approved for emergency haying and grazing by the USDA. The initial list on July 15 included 54 counties, but since then more have been added. Thayer County was added to the list of counties on July 17.

NWS releases drought outlook

Although a few storms have come through the past few weeks, they haven't been enough to help with the deficit of moisture in Thayer County.

The National Weather Service's Climate Prediction Center released its seasonal drought outlook on July 18. In this outlook, the center said that in south central Nebraska the drought is expected to persist or intensify throughout the rest of the summer.

The current drought condition map released from the U.S. Drought Monitor shows that all of Thayer County is in a moderate drought. Roughly 98 percent of the state is in some sort of drought ranging from abnormally dry to exceptional.

Although the outlook on the drought doesn't look promising, improvements have been seen within the past few months. It has been the end of May since Thayer County's drought condition was in the severe category and April since any part of the county's drought was considered extreme.

The next drought condition map will be released on July 26 and the next seasonal drought outlook will be posted on August 15.

The winners of the tournament will advance to the state tournament that will begin July 26 in O'Neill.

1883

130 Years Ago

Werner Bros. and R.D. Ferguson are building an awning over their stores.

Two children played with matches. The result was the destruction of Noah Brouhard's stable and contents. Loss, \$50.

At the Settler's meeting final action in regard to settlement with Knevals, was postponed until a subsequent meeting.

Dr. B.R. Smith reports that Burton Blunt of Gilead precinct, partially dislocated the bones in one of his feet, much pain resulting.

McLarland & Stone are building a business house at Hubbell, 50x80, two stories high. The building is to be of stone with a brick front.

It is said that Belvidere is to have a saloon. Will not the tendency then be to increase the combative manifestations of the fighting members of the community?

Died, some time since. The Hubbell Independent. And thus another is added to the many crafts that have sunk in the stormy seas of newspaperdom in Thayer County.

Prof. Willy's music publishers write: "Your piece, 'Bells of the West' is going to have a continued sale." He is now having his third piece, "Starlight Waltz," published.

W.J. Green met with a peculiar adventure while fording the river. He lost the bifurcated part of his costume called in silly novels, the unmentionables, and known in ordinary language as pantaloons, trousers or breeches. The current bore the missing garment from his sight. Long and diligent search was made because the pockets contained papers of value, and a reward of \$10 was offered for the return of the garment to the owner. At first it was thought some water nymph, mermaid or naiad had appropriated them, but this idea was abandoned when a boy found them and received the reward.

On consultation with interested parties, the following suggestions, relative to the proposed telegraph and telephone line connecting Belvidere and Hebron, appear to meet with general acceptance: Capital stock of company, \$500, to be divided into shares of \$25 each, to be paid in when stock is fully subscribed; messages on a basis of two cents a word but not less than 15 cents a message. Stockholders to pay the same rate as others. The business management, name, election of officers, incorporation and other matters to be settled by the stockholders at the first meeting.

Dr. S.F. Dean of Carleton reported that Mr. Loetterle's little child swallowed a triangular piece of sharp-edged window glass, about three-fourths of an inch long on each side. A fatal result was expected, but contrary to general expectation; the glass passed safely through the stomach and intestines.

It is reported that a deputy United States marshal arrested Wm. Gaunt of Belvidere on the charge of selling liquor without license, and took C. Wissenburg, P. Crawford, and W. Crawford as witnesses with them to Lincoln.

Lou White, living south of Davenport, carried strychnine and tobacco in the same pocket. The result was that he was poisoned. Dr. Snowden of Davenport administered remedies in time so that a fatal result was averted. People should be more careful.

An offer has been made by the line repairers of the U.P. telegraph line to build a telephone and telegraph line between Hebron and Belvidere and put in running order for \$7 per mile, material to be furnished by the stockholders.

120 Years Ago

Murray Ashbrook and Loyd Avers have put up a telegraph wire to connect their two homes and will make a study of telegraphy.

It is said that large withdrawals of savings deposits are tempting desperate men to burglaries. As a consequence depositors have already begun to replace their money in the banks.

H.H. Hersh will take possession of the stock of goods recently purchased of S.H. Webb.

J.M. Curran has just unloaded a car of Bain wagons, also one car of Gendale press drills and a car of Henney buggies at his implement house. He has sold his branch house at Ohio and will concentrate his business at Hebron. He is meeting with unprecedented success and thoroughly understands the business.

County Attorney J.B. Skinner and family have moved into their residence on Olive Avenue between Fourth and Fifth streets. It has been remodeled, repainted and repaired "from turret to foundation stone" and is neat and natty in appearance.

This paper has often spoken of W.L. Thompson's good luck with his racing horses. Sunday morning a special engine brought Mr. Thompson's palace horse car over from Chester on their return trip from Kansas City, where Wedgefield, Mr. Thompson's horse, won the cup race and \$1,000 purse. Since Mr. Thompson's return, there have been many visitors at his house, anxious to see the cup. The contract price of the cup was \$500 but before it was finished the design was changed and the cost to Kansas City was \$700, thus being the greatest prize ever given in this line in America. The cup is about 3 feet, 7 inches in height, and its greatest circumference is 4 feet, 6 inches. It is made of solid silver, lined with gold and rests on a circular pedestal of white ash.

William Tracy of Gilead precinct met with a severe accident while harvesting oats. His team ran away throwing him out of the wagon which passed over him. His arm was broken and his head badly bruised.

We have a new grain firm in town. H.H. Otten and W.D. Church, having leased the Kendall & Smith Elevator, and are now prepared to purchase all kinds of grain.

Last Monday while Mr. Hill, the St. Joe & G.I. station agent, was gone to his dinner, two young men supposed to be from Edgar, entered the depot, forced their way into the office where they pried open the cash drawer, pocketed the money (\$2.30) and skipped.

Leroy Towers has secured a year's lease on the building formerly occupied by the W.C. Beer's funeral parlors and will open for business in the very near future.


1943

Nebraska Timeline

Subject: The Trials of Solomon Gerber

“Has Escaped from Siberia,” read a headline in the Omaha Daily Bee on July 16, 1892, giving Nebraska readers the welcome news that former Omaha resident Solomon Gerber was on his way home to the United States. Gerber’s return to his native Russian-dominated Poland for a brief visit the year before had resulted in his imprisonment by Russian authorities in a case that eventually involved William Jennings Bryan and the U.S. State Department.

The Bee, which took an active interest in Gerber’s plight, on August 2, 1891, summarized events: “It appears that Gerber [a peddler] came to the United States about five years ago, leaving his family in his native town in Russian Poland. In the meantime he had purchased property there, and upon the death of his father last year he determined to go to his native land and bring his family to this country. On September 25, 1890, as the record of the district court of Douglas county shows, Gerber declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States and to especially renounce allegiance to the czar of Russia.

“Last February he went to Poland and some time after arriving there learned that the authorities intended to arrest him [ostensibly for leaving the area five years earlier without permission]. . . . He fled to Germany, but a demand having been made for his surrender to the Russian authorities he was given up. He was convicted of the charge against him and sentenced to serve a year in the prison of the town where he had lived and then to be exiled to Siberia for life, the confiscation of his property being also decreed. Gerber is now undergoing the first part of his sentence.”

On its editorial page on August 2 the Bee said: “The despotic and relentless policy of Russia toward the Jewish residents of that empire [such as Gerber] is the subject of universal condemnation.” It reported on August 9: “The story has been published in and commented upon by every leading paper, and a deep-rooted sympathy has been expressed for the unfortunate. In several places indignation meetings have

been held . . . [T]he matter is to be made the special order at a meeting of the Omaha branch of the Jewish alliance which meets in this city next Sunday.” Letters of support were published from Nebraska Attorney General George H. Hastings and Congressman William Jennings Bryan, who promised to contact the U.S. State Department on Gerber’s behalf.

The major difficulty in procuring official aid for Gerber stemmed from the fact that he had declared his intention to naturalize but had not taken the final step to become a U.S. citizen. Acting U.S. Secretary of State William F. Wharton declined to intervene in the matter because Gerber had not completed the naturalization process and therefore was not entitled to the protections conferred by full citizenship.

Little more was said of Gerber in the Nebraska press until the startling announcement nearly a year later, in July of 1892, that he had escaped from Siberia. The Bee said on July 16, “How or when his escape was made is not known, the only information being contained in a postscript to a letter written by the banished man’s son to Mr. [Fred] Loewe of the Boston store [in Omaha], in which he says that his father has escaped and is now on his way to America.” The Bee neglected to mention whether Gerber intended to come back to Omaha, but the welcome news of his return to the U.S. was carried by many newspapers.

Scooter and Motorcycle Safety

Imagine filling up your gas tank for less than \$15. Some Americans are doing it — but they’re doing it on two wheels. As fuel prices increase, the interest in motorcycles and scooters has also risen. In fact, a recent survey by Consumer Reports, found that a staggering 26 percent of respondents have considered downsizing from four wheels to two.

Not everybody is upset by rising fuel prices. Motorcycle makers are ecstatic. According to the Motorcycle Industry Council, sales are up about 24 percent. For some scooters, sales are up 65 percent. The reason for this trend is motorcycles and scooters offer increased fuel economy over most vehicles. Their fuel efficiency may range from 40 to 100 miles per gallon.

While the fuel benefits are alluring, there are compromises; one is the limitation from driving in all seasons and the second is safety. Scooters and motorcycles are not good year-round transportation; especially here in Nebraska.

According to the Motorcycle Safety Foundation, more than 350,000 people take its new-rider course. In fact, so many people want to take the course that there is often a waiting list of several months. Waiting to take the course is a good idea for new riders. Motorcycles are far more dangerous than cars. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) fatalities have increased by 127 percent since 1997 and motorcyclists are about 34 times more likely to die in a crash than someone in a passenger car. In 2006, motorcycle fatalities accounted for more than 10 percent of all crash deaths, despite the fact that they accounted for only a fraction of total vehicle miles traveled.

For those choosing two-wheel transportation, an im-

portant safety device is a helmet. Head injuries are the leading cause of death in motorcycle crashes. NHTSA estimates that using a helmet could reduce crash fatalities by 37 percent.

Too often after a crash, the driver of the other vehicle says they never saw the motorcyclist and were unable to respond in time. Here are some tips to help motorcyclists stay safe on our roadways:

- Always allow a motorcyclist the full lane width — never try to share a lane.

- Always make a visual check for motorcycles by checking mirrors and blind spots.

- Always signal your intentions before changing lanes or merging with traffic.

- Motorcycle turn signals are often not self-canceling and riders may forget to turn them off.

- Remember that simple road conditions for you may pose major hazards to motorcyclists.

- Allow more following distance, three or four seconds, when following a motorcycle.

Thayer County Health Services wants everyone to be safe while traveling, regardless of your mode of transportation. Let’s all do our part to keep the journey safe and not end with a trip to the emergency room.

Last year Dr. Gordy Klatt, founder of the American Cancer Society Relay For Life program, announced he had been diagnosed with stomach cancer. In an email to Society staff, Klatt stated: "Throughout the years I have spoken and written about how cancer can personally affect everyone. It affects the rich, the poor, and all nationalities and cultures around the world. About 4 weeks ago I was diagnosed with stomach cancer and I have begun my battle."

Relay For Life started in the mid-1980s in Tacoma, Washington when Klatt, a colorectal surgeon, wanted to enhance the income of his local American Cancer Society. He decided to personally raise money for the fight by doing something he enjoyed — running marathons. In the spring of 1985, Klatt spent 24 hours going around a local track — more than 83 miles — and throughout the night, nearly

300 people paid money to run or walk at intervals with him. He raised \$27,000, and the experience led to his vision of 24-hour relay teams that raise money for cancer research. Dr. Klatt's vision turned into an annual program that has been an inspiration for millions of cancer survivors, caregivers and communities across the globe.

This Friday evening beginning at 6 p.m. at the high school track in Deshler, survivors, caregivers and Relay supporters will once again become part of Dr. Klatt's vision as they celebrate, remember and fight back against a disease which has affected so many. The Relay for Life committee invites you to share in that celebration, cheer on our survivors as they make their lap and at dusk, place a glow stick in one of the hundreds of luminary bags encircling the track for a friend, a relative, or perhaps one in honor of Dr. Klatt.

There are several food blogs on this website for a variety of interests that you may have. From recipes you are interested in to learning more about what foods are best for you if you are a runner.

You can also download different apps for your phone and iPad for useful information related to foods. For example, learn more about what cuts of beef you might want to purchase in the grocery store by looking at the NUBeef Anatomy App (available from iTunes and the Google Play Store for Android).

Keep up-to-date with good food information by using technology which can be more accessible than looking for books.

Dave Rogers brought and issue to the board about a town issue with stray cats. The board discussed their different options and decided the cats will be caught and taken to farms of people who want the cats.

Dave also had a concern about the town dumpster and what is allowed to be put in the dumpsters. The board discussed putting a sign on the dumpster, but no decision has been made at this time.

A letter from Lester and Vernida was read aloud to the board. They are asking that the power lines be moved to the other side of the road due to sagging electric lines, trees in the way, and bad poles. The board has tabled this topic until next month.

The Village of Gilead is looking to fill a board member position. If you are a resident of Gilead and are interested in sitting on the Village Board please contact Lyle or come to the next meeting.

There being no further business, Larry made a motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Quint. All in favor, motion carried. The next meeting will be held August 7th, 2013 at 7:00 pm at the village hall.
