Senior Legion baseball...

The Hebron Senior Legion baseball team kicked off its bid for the state finals upsetting Lawrence-Nelson in the first game of the C-5 Area 5 tournament at Wymore Thursday afternoon, July 21. The victory sent the team into game nine of the series to face Geneva on Saturday, July 23, where they won 5-4, advancing to take on Davenport-Edgar Monday night.

DeJong trial continued...

Jefferson County Attorney Linda Bauer asked for the continuance last week stating evidence processing by the Nebraska State Patrol Crime Lab would not arrive in her office for another three weeks.

DeJong's attorney, James Mowbray of the Nebraska Commission of Public Advocacy, objected to the continuance stating the defense was ready to start, but District Court Judge Paul Korslund overruled the objection and granted the continuance.

DeJong is being held at the Nebraska Correctional Center for Women in York and did not appear at Thursday's hearing.

MET tower goes up near Byron

Aether Energy LLC, a grassroots group of local landowners interested in wind production, erected a meteorological tower recently just south of Highway 8, one mile east of Byron on the Andy Schmidt farm. The 196-foot tower is the second one to go up in Thayer County; the first was installed by the Aeolus group a year ago on the Bob Marsh farm along Monument Road. That group is also made up of local landowners and both groups are held together by former Thayer County resident Gary Aksamit.

The Texas energy broker who grew up in Alexandria, visits the area often, especially since he's the idea man behind a couple of wind projects here. Aksamit began talking to county landowners three years ago to let them know what a valuable resource they were sitting

on. He also wanted them to know how to make that valuable resource work for them.

"We have a natural resource we should nurture," he said during installation of the second tower. "Wind is the only power generation we have that has no emissions and doesn't require water. It's totally self-sufficient. It's the only non-impact energy resource we have. It's really pretty simple."

The new project, affectionately referred to as the "Stoddard Road Project," is similar to the Aeolus project that will run along Monument Road in the central part of Thayer County. "We are looking at installing 40-50 turbines from Byron straight east to the Stoddard Road right along the Nebraska/Kansas border," Aksamit said. "We do not have the wind they have at Greeley, but we do not have

ME Collins Contracting starts prep-work

No, it won't be done in time for the 2011 football season, but the Thayer Central Community School's track and football field are undergoing a major renovation. The Thayer Central school board okayed the development of preliminary design for replacement of the track and football practice field in March and during a special session Monday, July 18, okayed the construction contract. Bids for the project were opened at 2 p.m. on July 11, and reviewed at the regularly scheduled July 11 meeting.

ME Collins Contracting secured the contract after stating they could do Phase 1 of the job for \$693,513.73. The final part of Phase 1, which begins in May 2012 after school lets out for the summer, will cost an additional \$186,424.20.

"We saved about \$160,000 going with this time line," said Thayer Central Superintendent Drew Harris. "It will not affect the school schedule, although our biggest inconvenience will be finding a place for football practice. Games will still be played at the Hebron Sports Complex."

Most of the money for Phase 1 will come from the building fund, Harris said. "We've been saving for quite some time; there hasn't been any major upgrade to our facility in decades."

Harris said there is approximately \$750,000 in the building fund and funding from the depreciation account will most likely make up for the additional expense.

Competitors Thayer County Fair just around the corner bring home CSG medals

Perhaps it was the heat, perhaps not, but only about half the athletes from Thayer County who signed on to participate in the Cornhusker State Games made their way to Lincoln. Of the 20 who did brave the elements and competition, 14 earned top medals in their respective fields.

Championship winners bringing home gold medals included Todd Heinrichs, Chester, in armwrestling; Manny Motto (235-game), Mariah Motto (246/handicap-game), and Brody Fayle (259/handicap-game), all of Deshler, in bowling; Jeff Kolath, Deshler, in shot put (32'8.5"); Caleb Maschmann, Lincoln, in 800 dash (2:11.72); and Cheryl Uhrmacher, Byron, in the 100 (17.6), 200 (36.93) and 400 (1:48.02) dashes, and the high jump (3'4").

Silver medalists included Sequoia Heinrichs, Chester, in armwrestling; Manny and Mariah Motto (397-game), all of Deshler, in doubles bowling; Emmitt and Justin Hintz and Manny and Mariah Motto (2677) in four-person team bowling; Caleb Maschmann, Lincoln, in the 400 dash (53.85) and Jeff Kolath, Deshler, in discus (97'7").

And rounding out the medal winners was William Mick, Carleton, with a bronze win in the pole vault (12'6").

Each year the county is well represented as amateur athletes take part in several of the offered competitions. The Cornhusker State Games ended Sunday, July 24.

It's almost time for the Thayer County Fair and the fair board and 4-H groups are getting ready to spruce up and set up stands and booths at the fairgrounds in Deshler. The board continues to have last minute meetings as fair dates Aug. 4-5-6 near, and 4-H students are quickly finishing up last minute adjustments on their projects.

Pre-fair contests begin this week as the fashion show and revue gets underway today, July 27. This Saturday, July 30, Thayer County 4-H clubs present the dog, cat and pet shows. All pre-fair shows take place at the agriculture hall.

Kicking off the evening entertainment Thursday, Aug. 4, is T-Marv & Hammer Down performing a mixture of country, rock, blues and southern rock from yesterday's hits to the top 40 hits of today. The show begins at 8 p.m.

On Friday at 7 p.m., hypnotist Mike Prochnow will entertain everyone and even take under his control some of those in attendance. Kids ride wristbands and bikes will be given away during the Thursday and Friday shows.

LINCOLN - State lawmakers could begin to feel pressure next year from folks who count greatly on Social Security benefits.

We're talking about the next year, which also is an election year.

They might call it something else, but there is a real possibility that Congress will reduce Social Security retirement benefits through the back door.

Some politicians on the Potomac want to fiddle with how benefits are calculated, so as to have the same effect as reductions. For the purposes of sound bites they will be called "formula adjustments" or "calculation reforms," or anything but what they are intended to be.

How could Gov. Dave Heineman and the Legislature provide some relief?

Nebraska is one of only 14 states that collect income tax on Social Security benefits.

Obviously the Legislature could eliminate or reduce the state tax that oldsters and others pay on those benefits.

The highly regarded Kiplinger Newsletter publishes a list of state Tax Heavens and Tax Hells for retirees.

Nebraska is on the Tax Hell list. A key reason is the state's policy of taxing Social Security income.

Lieutenant Governor Will Seek Top Job

Who is Nebraska's lieutenant governor? Hardly anyone who isn't a follower of state politics can tell you. And it's that way in virtually every state - voters very seldom keep track of their lieutenant governors.

That usually only changes when a lieutenant governor announces a bid for the top job when the incumbent is going to leave office.

Nebraska Lieutenant Governor Rick Sheehy, 51, has announced he'll seek the GOP nomination to be the state's next chief executive.

Regardless of incumbency, a lieutenant governor seldom has significant name recognition among the electorate.

What Sheehy does have is the endorsement of Gov. Dave Heineman, accompanying party connections, and the connections and experience that come with having been a two-term mayor of Hastings, as well as a city councilman.

Might a Tea Party type emerge to challenge Sheehy in the primary?

Stay tuned.

Bruning Leads GOP Senate Fundraising

Attorney General Jon Bruning leads the field of Republicans seeking the 2012 nomination for the U.S. Senate. At last report, Bruning had some \$1.3 million on hand. State Treasurer Don Stenberg and state Sen. Deb Fischer are nowhere near that level.

The national Republican Party has made incumbent Democratic Sen. Ben Nelson the No. 1 target for 2012. That means whoever wins the GOP nod will likely be able to count on plenty of bucks for the general election

Meanwhile, Nelson has raised nearly \$3 million as he prepares for an expected effort to win a third term.

Heineman Endorses Amendment To U.S. Constitution

Gov. Dave Heineman has endorsed the call for an amendment to the U.S. Constitution to require a balanced federal budget except in times of war or national emergencies.

It's a philosophical stand that touts a political mindset. Such an amendment is extremely unlikely to happen in your lifetime, even if you were born yesterday and live to be 120. And you'd have to be born yesterday to think Congress would offer the states a constitutional change that couldn't be circumvented about as easily as a campaign promise.

Cut, Cap and Balance

There are two debates going on in Washington regarding our national debt. One has been the immediate question of raising the debt ceiling; the other is on the future of government spending. Simply raising the debt ceiling to allow for more borrowing and more debt is not a solution to our current debt problem. Serious steps must be taken to reverse our ballooning debt and get us back on sound financial footing. I'm a co-sponsor of one such solution that deserves additional consideration in Congress: the Cut, Cap and Balance bill.

As it sounds, this bill is a three-fold approach to restoring government spending to acceptable, sustainable levels. First and foremost, the bill cuts spending almost immediately, returning many government expenditures to 2008 levels. This means the exorbitant spending unleashed by the ill-fated stimulus of 2009 and the bloated health care law of 2010, among others, would be counterbalanced by spending cuts. Second, the bill also puts a cap on future spending, limiting federal funding to a percentage of our economy over the next decade.

Making this fiscal responsibility structurally perma-

nent would be the third facet of the legislation, transmitting a balanced budget Constitutional amendment to the states for ratification. Such a requirement is nothing new to Nebraska, which already has its own Balanced Budget Amendment. A similar amendment at the federal level is long overdue, and would make fiscal responsibility as American as the Bill of Rights. While the cut and cap portions would go into effect immediately once passed by Congress and signed by the President, the Balanced Budget Amendment would need to be ratified by three-fourths of state legislatures. I'm confident

Nebraska would be one of them. In fact, 49 of our 50 states currently have some form of a Balanced Budget Amendment; it's time to employ one in Washington.

All three of these facets are critical to holding future Congresses accountable to the reality that we are currently spending dangerously beyond our means. A similar version of this bill has already passed in the House of Representatives, but unfortunately stalled in the Senate last week despite my support. With more and more economists sounding warning bells about our debt, I still hope it can gain traction to get the 60 Senate

votes needed. At the very least, major components of this legislation should be enacted into law.

Significantly reversing our debt is the only way forward. Ratings agencies are overtly warning us that an economic catastrophe awaits us if we don't act. We can still avoid the debt crises currently plaguing countries across Europe. The United States has always stood up to face challenges, and we must do so again. The Cut, Cap and Balance legislation would help to get our fiscal house in order and preserve the strength of our great country for the future.

we are not trying to admit you to the hospital; this wrist band is just a new safety measure being used by our lab.

The wristband contains your name and a barcode that allows the lab technician to scan your wristband and match it to your specimen that also has a label with your name and barcode on it. This new step is an additional precaution to crosscheck and make sure the two match.

Also patients may be wondering why their picture is being taken during their first check-in with the new EHR. This again is a safety measure for the patient which will allow our staff on your next visit to verify you are indeed who you say you are.

Even though our staff may personally know you, they cannot possibly know every patient coming in for an appointment.

The entire project involves putting in a new eight-lane track, irrigating the interior of the track area for an eventual football game field, restructuring the field events stations, wiring and conduit for lighting, and putting in infra-structure to facilitate other projects down the line, Harris said.

In a newsletter this Spring, the superintendent said developing issues for safety prompted the need for a new track, specifically surface cracking due to problems with the base. A drainage problem was causing water to flow beneath the surface of the track damaging the base.

"These plans complement the Thayer Central Athletic Boosters' plans for athletic facility improvements," Superintendent Harris said in his newsletter. "They serve as Phase I of their proposal."

The school administration and board of education have been working in conjunction

the wildlife issues here in Thayer County either."

Aksamit said the quality of wind and financing are not the problem with getting both projects off the ground.

"We need a buyer for our product," he stated. "That's the crux, that's the hold up, and that's where we are right now." Without a buyer, there's no sense in producing electricity, he said.

Aksamit said he's been talking to potential buyers outside of Nebraska and adds that the conversations are ongoing.

As for location, Aksamit said no wind farms will go up in central Nebraska if the Game and Parks have anything to do with it. "Wildlife habitats will be affected and the Game and Parks said that isn't going to happen," he said. "That's why we're sitting in a prime

situation right here in Thayer County."

Like the first tower, mostly financed by Aksamit, the second tower will measure the amount of wind indicating how much electricity can be generated by a wind project. "Once we know that, we'll be able to tell landowners what they can expect from a wind turbine on their property," he said.

Both tower sites have positives and negatives, he added. "I think we'll see more wind in the Byron area, but we're five miles from a power line, whereas, the Monument Road project has a power line running right through it," he said.

Aether Energy and Aeolus Energy are limited-liability companies so named in reference to the "upper sky" and Greek god of wind.

Patience

Patience is one aspect of the fruit of the spirit mentioned by St. Paul which concerns our relationships with our fellow human beings, alongside the virtues of kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. (Galatians 5:22-23) The Greek word which Paul uses there is "makrothumia," which is usually translated as either patience or long-suffering. The Greek word is a compound of macro (meaning large or long) and thumia (meaning temper or anger), and thus, the Greek word connotes being able to restrain one's temper, especially in the face of suffering at the hands of someone who is acting unjustly. Who among us has not been accused of something of which we were innocent? Who has not had something stolen from them? Who has never suffered at the hands of bullies or thugs? Surely, all of us have had these types of experiences, and our natural inclination is almost always to fight back, lash out, or scream for justice. However a godly response would be to suffer patiently and perhaps to admonish gently, but certainly not to be quick to anger. Think of how God dealt with the Israelites in Old Testament times, bearing patiently with their continued faithfulness and transgressions. And, consider too how Jesus patiently bore the pain and humiliation of being beaten, tortured and ridiculed in preparation for the most ignominious of deaths on the cross. Surely, Jesus was a model of long-suffering for all of us.



Be Safe In The Heat

It is hot! According to the National Weather Service, heat is the number one weather related killer in the U.S. Heat kills more people than floods, tornados, lighting combined.

The American Red Cross says in times of high heat it is important to start drinking fluids at least one-half hour before you go outside into the heat and continue drinking even if you don't feel thirsty.

Be sure to slow down and avoid strenuous activity if you can. If you have to work outdoors in the heat, the best times to do so is at the beginning and the ending of the day. Be sure to wear lightweight, light-colored clothing because light colors will reflect away some of the sun's energy.

If you are elderly it is suggested that you stay indoors as much as possible. If air conditioning is not available, stay on the lowest floor, out of the sunshine. Close the curtains and blinds to shut out the heat. Try to go to a public building with air conditioning each day for several hours.

Remember, electric fans do not cool the air, but they do help sweat evaporate, which cools your body.

The Mayo Clinic says the signs of heat exhaustion are feeling faint or dizzy, nausea, heavy sweating, rapid, weak heartbeat and low blood pressure. Your skin may feel cool, moist but pale in color. You may even have a low-grade fever, heat cramps and headache.

Water is the safest liquid to drink during heat emergencies. Avoid drinks with alcohol or caffeine in them. They can make you feel good briefly, but make the heat's effects on your body worse. This is especially true about beer, which dehydrates the body. It will also be helpful to eat small meals and eat more often.

Pinkeye in Cattle

Pinkeye is a highly contagious infectious disease affecting the eyes of cattle. The name describes the redness and inflammation of the lining of the eyelid and eyeball, an early sign of the disease. This common disease can vary in its severity from year to year.

Although pinkeye rarely causes the death of affected cattle; it can cause substantial losses to the cattle industry through decreased weight gain, lowered milk production and treatment costs.

Pinkeye is known to occur at all seasons of the year and in all breeds of cattle. Excessive weeping of the affected eye and closure due to pain are the two signs most commonly observed. As the disease progresses, the cornea becomes cloudy or white. An ulcer frequently develops near the center of the cornea. Blood vessels often extend into the cornea from the white of the eye as the healing processes begin.

Cattle with pinkeye keep the affected eye or eyes closed because of pain and to avoid bright sunlight. The course of the infection may run for four to eight weeks, or even longer.

As the eye begins to heal, white scar tissue infiltrates the cornea. In most cases this scar will gradually disappear as healing progresses and vision will be restored. However, in severely affected eyes, a white scar often persists and interferes with vision.

Pinkeye is primarily caused by Moraxella bovis (M. bovis) however veterinarians have also found that Mycoplasma bovovulvi and IBR virus are capable of causing an eye infection resembling pinkeye. Other factors instrumental in causing eye irritation, thereby allowing for invasion of M. bovis and subsequent disease, are excessive ultraviolet light (sunlight), the face fly, the house fly, the stable fly, plant material and dust.

Plant material such as cool and warm season grasses, hybrid Sudan grass and other forage sorghums, weeds and brush produce air-borne irritants, pollen and chaff, as well as serve as mechanical irritants. When animals eat out the middle of round bales, leaving a hay shelf over their heads, the incidence of foreign body irritation is greatly increased.

Vitamin A deficiency and inadequate protein intake may be other factors that possibly contribute to lessened resistance to eye infections. Vitamin A deficiency results in excessive watering of the eye, night blindness, and may cause cloudiness of the cornea in severe cases, giving the eyeball a dry, lusterless appearance.

Pinkeye is caused by a combination of factors. Dry, dusty environmental conditions or wet, warm environmental conditions play a role. In wet, warm conditions such as many parts of Nebraska experienced this year can lead to overgrowth of pastures. The taller grass and seedheads can damage the eyes. The wet, warm conditions also lead to heavier fly populations that irritate the eyes and spread the organisms.

A good control program should incorporate procedures to reduce initial eye irritation. An intensive fly control program is essential to limit the spread of pinkeye in a herd of cattle. Cattle often have grass or weed seeds in their eyes, and these materials no doubt irritate the eye and contribute to the development of pinkeye. Cattle with pinkeye can be helped by prompt treatment.

Since the cornea heals slowly, any ulceration is likely to require several weeks for complete recovery. There are medications available for treating pinkeye. However, many of the most effective pinkeye treatments must be recommended by a veterinarian with whom you have a valid veterinary-client-patient relationship. This is because the medications are only available by prescription or because the dose or route of administration is not on the label.

Also, at least a part of the decision on how to treat pinkeye is what kind of restraint is available and how frequently cattle can be treated. There are other infections that look like pinkeye so it is recommended that you consult with your veterinarian to assist you in the diagnosis and treatment of pinkeye.

Children in a wedding means no kidding around

The children were as young as three years old and as old as 10. Although the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge were confident enough in the kids' maturity to include them, reportedly some measures were taken to keep the tots in line. 

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Storm packs 60+ winds

Locals see tree damage

A powerful summer storm, packing winds in excess of 60 mph, trampled across the county Sunday evening darkening skies and damaging trees. Some areas of the county experienced power failures, but most of the damage from the straight-line winds were to trees. Rain also came down in sheets in some areas while others reported little or no precipitation. There were no injuries or hail damage reported although a semi was knocked off of Hwy 8 south of Fairbury in Jefferson County. Hebron received approximately 1.25 inches of rain while Davenport reported 1.30 inches.

The storm hit Hebron from the northwest at 6:20 p.m. on sustained 60 mph wind just before a torrential downpour made visibility nearly impossible. Temperature readings dropped from 97 degrees to 70 degrees in a matter of 20 minutes. Although no hail was associated with the storm, the strong wind with gusts in excess of 75 mph, downed large enough tree branches to block roads. In one instance in Hebron, an entire tree came crashing down in an alley near 3rd St. and Duffield.

At 6:30 p.m., power-lines were reported down in Hebron, Belvidere, Carleton, and Deshler. At 6:19 p.m., Thayer County emergency manager Bill McPherson reported 65-70 mph wind in Carleton and that the power was out. At 6:46, public storm watchers noted 60 mph wind in Chester lasting longer than ten minutes.

By 6:55 p.m., the rain stopped in Hebron and the wind had slowed to 30 mph. Within minutes the storm was over and although the it brought reprieve from the extreme heat, the cool down is short lived. High temperatures will climb back into the 90s for the next several days and dew points are expected to stay in the mid-70s making the "feels like" temperature reach triple digits again.

What Do Horse Owners Need To Know About Equine Herpesvirus?

(Editor's Note: This week's article is written by Extension Intern Kaci Schroer, student at Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture in Curtis.)

By this time, I'm sure many of you have heard of the high alert the people involved in the horse industry were put on in late May/early June concerning the outbreak of the Equine Herpesvirus (EHV-1).

The outbreak originated at the National Cutting Horse Association Western National Championship event that was held in Ogden, Utah, April 29-May 8. From the center of this outbreak, 28 confirmed primary cases were identified and 421 horses were exposed to this virus while in Utah.

While these numbers are alarming, Nebraska has had only seven primary exposed horses at the event and of these seven horses, none were ever confirmed of having caught the virus. There have been three identified levels of exposure; the first level being that of primary, which consists of the horses that were present at the event during the outbreak; the secondary level consists of horses that have been in direct contact with the primary horses and finally the tertiary level is horses that have at least three degrees of separations from the horses that were exposed in Ogden.

What exactly is Equine Herpesvirus and what dangers does it pose?

EHV-1 was previously known as the equine abortion virus and is a virus that is an enveloped double stranded DNA virus. There are five alpha herpesviruses that can infect horses, but EHV-1 is the cause of the latest and most alarming disease outbreak among the U.S. horse populations.

The clinical warning signs may not immediately indicate that your horse has EHV-1, so close monitoring of ill horses is a necessity. With an incubation period ranging from two to ten days; a fever that can last up to seven days is usually one of the first signs you will notice, along with coughing, nasal discharge, depression, and going off feed.

On pregnant mares, abortion will usually occur between seven and 11 months of gestation after the mare has been infected with the virus for anywhere from two to 12

weeks. As of now, EHV-1 is not believed to affect conception rates after a mare has been infected with the virus.

Also, a few neurological signs of the disease include: incoordination, hind limb paralysis, recumbency, loss of bladder and tail function and loss of sensation to skin around the tail and hind limbs.

EHV-1 can be transmitted either directly or indirectly. Direct transmission of the disease occurs when horses come in nose to nose contact with one another. Indirect ways of transmission would be through water buckets, clothing, blankets, and other items that have been in contact with nasal discharge of another horse.

This disease can also travel through the air for short distances; contact with aborted fetuses, placental fluids or placentas of the infected horses can also be another way the virus is spread. Once a horse has been infected it can become a latent carrier of EHV-1 that may be reactivated in times of high stress or high doses of corticosteroids.

Two types of vaccine-modified live virus and killed virus vaccines are available for prevention of the disease, but in light of the recent outbreak the uses of these preventative vaccines remains controversial.

If your horse(s) is confirmed to have the EHV-1 virus, a quarantine of 28 days from any other horse is highly encouraged. Quarantining is also encouraged if you have recently purchased or brought in a new horse to your stables.

If an infected horse is confirmed, it is suggested to completely clean out and burn the bedding as well as having the stable and all equipment quarantine for at least three weeks.

With this information it is my hopes that you are more aware and cautious of the EHV-1 virus and will help keep the number of confirmed cases in Nebraska at 0.
