



## Deshler and Hebron consider educational co-op

The Thayer Central and Deshler Public School board members have met to discuss the possibility of forming a co-op between the two facilities.

Members bounced around ideas such as conjoining on educational courses like agriculture, woodworking and welding classes. Even the suggestion of joining sports teams was thrown into the mix, though at this time, the schools will not be partaking in an athletic co-op.

"[However,] education was our main focus," said Kurt Mumm, Thayer Central school board president. "We only discussed sports about 30 percent of the time."

During the Thayer Central school board meeting, all Thayer Central school board members were in agreement that a co-op between Deshler and Hebron would be beneficial to the schools.

According to Drew Harris, Thayer Central superintendent, Deshler officials were mainly interested in sharing agriculture and industrial tech programs.

Titan students are already shuttled to Deshler for advanced welding classes during the school year.

The earliest the educational co-op could take place is the 2016-17 school year.

"We have no dates for the future set," said Dr. Al Meier, Deshler superintendent. "We have to sit down and see what classes we'd be interested in doing."

# Pages of the Past...

## 1885

### 130 Years Ago

Teach your children to swim.

Prairie chickens will be ripe enough to hunt September 1st.

Enterprising citizens of Chester are advocating the laying out of a park.

D. M. Dwire is painting the Belvidere hotel and the Belvidere opera house.

The Presbyterians of Alexandria have ordered a church bell weighing 400 pounds.

The Hebron Creamery boiler has been repaired by an expert from Chicago. Yesterday Manager Andrews sent 30 tubs containing 35 lbs. each of butter, to Denver, in the refrigerator car.

The windstorm at Hubbell, July 23, was disastrous in its effects. A new elevator and several barns were blown down, and the M.E. Church building was moved about four inches, damaging the plastering and inside work.

The Board of Town Trustees met last night, and in answer to several petitions for billiard table license, passed a resolution declaring that, "it is the sense of this board that no license for billiard tables be issued during the present municipal year."

F. M. Gallant has purchased the Smith residence on Olive Avenue, moved here with his family and is now a resident of Hebron. Mr. Gallant is an accomplished penman, and is getting up a writing class. Those who receive his instruction in this beautiful and necessary art will be much benefited.

Peter B. Lee, one of the noted printers in the west, is setting type in the Journal office. He is a typo of migratory habits and has visited probably the majority of the office in the United States. He has read his own obituary a number of times, and has had many strange experiences.

The new arch over the raceway at Wetherald's mill is a substantial and creditable job of masonry.

The Thayer County Agricultural and Mechanical Society has decided to hold a fair Sept. 22d, 23d and 24th, 1885, and offer \$500 in premiums.

The enterprising citizens of Belvidere are establishing an institution of learning, bearing the title, "Belvidere Telegraph and Commercial School." German, French, Latin and typewriting will be taught by Rev. C. M. Des Isles. F. C. Marshall will teach telegraphy and phonetic shorthand. Bookkeeping, penmanship, commercial arithmetic and business forms will be taught by J. O. Talmadge. The fall term will commence Sept 1st, 1885. Rates of tuition in all branches will be reasonable and good board can be obtained at moderate prices. Parties interested can obtain further particulars by address W. J. McAnally, Belvidere, Neb.

Chester: The Gentlemen's Driving Association has a wet time of their races. Friday's races were postponed until Saturday, and Saturday's were postponed until Monday. The race on Saturday was a nice one, and was easily taken by an outsider, who happened along with a drove of ponies. Monday's race (which was postponed from Saturday) was a farce and a very disgusting affair. The participants and some others got into a regular jangle, and the outcome of it was that Strickler, of Chester, drew half of the money, and Ward, of Ida, drew half. A good, honest race is a pleasure to look at, but such a thing as this was, ought to be discouraged by every man. We understand there were several gamblers around, and also lots of bad whiskey.

## 1895

### 120 Years Ago

J. F. Foote has a new delivery wagon made by the Courtland (N.Y.) Buggy Co. The wagon is a dandy and has attracted much favorable comment.

Last Tuesday evening Mrs. Mayrhofer gave the closing exercises of her kindergarten school at the Christian Church.

Lawn tennis is now the order of the day.

The little boy of Frank Peterson, living about four miles northwest of Hebron, has been

very sick with cholera infantum, but is now improving.

Alexandria: Tuesday was the hottest day of the year, 107 degrees in the shade...The infant of Mr. and Mrs. C. Botts died this morning...The school board has employed Prof. L. H. Thornburg, principal...The infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Hard died yesterday of ileocolitis...Died, July 12, Joseph Nun Sr. of heart disease...Died, July 9, at Omaha, Nellie, the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Overman, aged 16 years. Buried at Western.

## 1905

### 110 Years Ago

Two hundred eleven tickets were sold from Hebron to the Beatrice chautauqua last Sunday over the Rock Island road.

Wm. Hughes has sold out his pump and windmill business to Knox & Jamison and will devote his time to plumbing.

A press dispatch from Grand Island, July 17, says: "Lewis Stanter, the member of the soldiers' home who accidentally fell into a bathtub yesterday afternoon before he had turned on the cold water and was badly scalded before relief could come to him, died as a result of his injuries. Stanter was admitted from Thayer County in 1888.

Tuesday evening, Mrs. T. D. Rafter, Jr., gave a porch party in honor of her mother, Mrs. Barnes of St. Louis. The spacious porch and fine lawn illuminated with large Japanese lanterns made an ideal place to entertain the 50 guests and serve the cooling refreshments. In the dining room, frappe was served from under a Japanese umbrella from which were suspended lanterns, giving a soft light to the room. Quantities of sweet peas made fragrant the air of the pretty rooms and the music from a pianola added to the pleasure of a most enjoyable evening.

Jonas Axelson died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jay Mercer, last Saturday afternoon, aged about 82 years.

During the storm Tuesday night, lightning killed a number of head of stock belonging to Walter Craig, who lives eight miles southeast of Hebron, one mile east of the Liberty Ridge Church. The lightning ran along the wire fence, killing four good horses and three head of cattle. It is said that \$600 would not cover the loss.

## 1915

### 100 Years Ago

Last Sunday morning little Della Walters passed away after an illness of five days. Tonsillitis with complication was the cause of the death. Interment took place Monday at the Hebron cemetery with a short service at the grave conducted by Rev. Weissmiller.

During the week, G. G. Bruckert started improvements at his residence on main street. The building in which the photo gallery was situated was cut in two, one part being moved to the rear for a kitchen and the other put on the south side. A cave on the north will complete the arrangements.

## 1925

### 90 Years Ago

Fred P. Komarek has joined forces with E. G. Gangstad and Sons of Omaha, real estate firm there. His new address is in the World Herald Building.

Members of the village board who autoed to Superior last Thursday report a cold reception at the hands of the Southern Nebraska Power Company. The company admitted to Bruning representatives that with present equipment they were not able to give good service to their customers. There were many promises given to the Bruning board and if they are made good, Bruning will once more enjoy good electric service.

Anthony Jackson will leave soon for Witton-le-War, England, where he will engage in chicken farming.

## 1935

### 80 Years Ago

Hot, dry weather favorable to small grain harvesting, but

detrimental for the most part to corn and pasture, continued in the Bruning community this week. Meanwhile wheat yields of fields around Bruning continued to be low, ranging from the high of 18 bushels per acre, test 56, reported by Herman Harms down to the low of three bushels per acre, test 51, reported by H. W. Bruning.

There was a time in days of yore, when Alexandria was young and the prairies were still unplowed and unfenced, that the killing of a rattlesnake was an every day occurrence, and taken as part of the day's work by our early settlers; but when a rattler is killed on the business main street these days—that is news. Just such an event occurred in Alexandria last Thursday afternoon, when Gerald Joe, with the assistance of several volunteers, finally succeeded in administering the death blow to a rattler, in front of the Fairmont Cream Station. The snake had four rattlers and one button.

## 1945

### 70 Years Ago

(The Alexandria Argus) John H. Glaum has informed The Argus that the entire plant including the hatchery, feed mill, home, all other buildings and ten acres of land, is now offered for sale, since he is quitting business Sept. 1. Glaum's Hatchery is the oldest in south-central Nebraska, being established 26 years ago by Mr. Glaum.

### 50 Years Ago

(The Bruning Banner) Bethscheider Auto Supply observed its 20th anniversary. In July 1945, John N. Bethscheider began the operation of a wholesale-retail N.A.P.A. Auto Parts store in Hebron. The May 1953 tornado partially destroyed the building and severely injured John. The building was rebuilt and somewhat remodeled at that time. However, the permanent disabilities suffered from his injuries in the tornado prevented John from again being active in the store's operation; his son John J. took on the responsibility of manager.

## 1975

### 40 Years Ago

# Little Blue River Basin Water Management Plan

Over the last year, a combined effort of the Little Blue Natural Resources District and the Tri-Basin Natural Resources District has resulted in a new planning document: the Little Blue River Basin Water Management Plan (Plan).

The Plan is intended to guide decision makers facing a variety of water resource issues and to work toward making water resources more sustainable for the future. The Little Blue River Basin drains 1,722,200 acres of land in south-central Nebraska from Minden downstream to Fairbury.

The Plan provides a single coordinated strategy to identify water quality and quantity threats and needs, prioritize watershed areas for development of enhanced planning and restoration projects, and identify practices and activities appropriate to address the known deficiencies in water quality and quantity in the basin.

Two of the most-discussed issues during the creation of the Plan were decreasing nitrate loading to groundwater and working to reduce groundwater level declines.

A Steering Committee and Technical Advisory Team, each of which met a total of four times over the last 15 months, oversaw the development of the Plan.

Examples of a few Plan recommendations include:

- Establishment of projects and programs for groundwater management, including nutrient and irrigation management;
- Increasing adoption of management practices such as no-till or reduced tillage and soil sampling;
- Installation of groundwater recharge structures or modification to existing structures;
- Supporting municipalities with water system assistance and source water protection;

• Conducting additional hydrogeology and nitrate assessments;

• Renovation of area lakes including Liberty Cove and Crystal Lake;

• Installation of stream restoration and bank stabilization practices, including reconnection to relic oxbows;

• Hiring a watershed plan coordinator; and,

• Increased monitoring of surface water flows and groundwater quality and quantity.

The public is invited to review the draft plan and attend one of the public Open House meetings scheduled in this area in August 2015.

These Open Houses have been scheduled to provide information regarding the purpose of the Plan, its recommendations, and to encourage the public and agricultural producers to assist with implementation of the Plan. All Open House meetings start at 7 p.m. at the following locations:

• Thursday, August 6, Fairbury at the Union Bank, 1313 K Street, Basement

• Monday, August 10, Davenport at the LBNRD Office, 100 East 6th Street

• Monday, August 17, Deshler at the Thayer Co. Fairgrounds, 1302 4th Street, Main Building South Meeting Room

The project is funded by both NRD's, the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, and the Nebraska Environmental Trust.

## Ground breaking for renovation

On August 2, Thayer County Health Services invites the public to attend their ground breaking ceremony to mark the beginning of their "Investing in Healthier Tomorrows" renovation and wellness project. The event will be held at 6 p.m. in the parking lot on the north side of the hospital's lower level, located at 120 Park Avenue in Hebron.

The initial phase of the construction project was made possible by a \$6.9 million gift from the Glenn Korff estate. It will add a new Rehab and Wellness Center to the north side of the hospital and will create opportunities for residents of Thayer County to improve their quality of life through education and fitness.

An indoor track, weights, aerobic room and a walking pool are just some of the amenities. This addition also includes an enhanced rehabilitation department with new and expanded services for therapy patients. The Rehab and Wellness Center is scheduled to be completed in fall of 2016.

The next phase will be a \$7.9 million renovation and upgrades to the main floor of the hospital. This three-phase renovation plan includes necessary upgrades to the kitchen and cafeteria, as well as replacing some of the facility's outdated mechanical and electrical system. The project also includes modernizing the outpatient and emergency services to improve patient care.

Additional plans in this renovation project include separating the emergency room, specialty clinic, and labor and delivery into their own updated areas. Giving them more space will allow additional services, such as chemotherapy, to be added.

Relocating the mechanical units to the lower level will free up space in the clinic for additional exam rooms. The final phase of the project will add a second operating room to the surgery center so that more procedures can be done locally at Thayer County Health Services.

Working closely with McCarthy Building Companies, Inc. and Altus Architectural Studios, Thayer County Health Services has developed this comprehensive construction and renovation plan. It has been designed to address the



current and future healthcare needs of the local communities.

This project will allow Thayer County Health Services to continue improving local access to high quality, cost-efficient healthcare for generations to come.



## Thinking about health; Food safety law good for consumers -- if funded

Just five years ago, Congress passed a big, widely hailed law that promised to make America's food supply safer. But because of inadequate funding for new regulations and inspectors, the promise has yet to be kept.

Sometimes cutting government spending has serious consequences, and there's no better example of that than what's happened to the Food Safety Modernization Act.

In 2010 Congress enacted legislation whose goal was to set tough anti-contamination standards for foods ranging from peaches to imported pesto sauces and to increase the number of inspectors for the increasingly complex food system.

Two decades ago inspectors for the Food and Drug Administration, which is in charge of most of the food supply, checked on 200,000 imports. Today they are charged with overseeing 12 million imports, accounting for about 15 percent of what the nation eats. About 80 percent of the country's seafood and about half of all fruits and vegetables are imported. American food companies might get inspected every four or five years, but foreign food producers may never be inspected.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture inspects what FDA does not, but sometimes it's hard to tell who does what. For example, the FDA regulates eggs unless the eggs are cracked or processed. Then the USDA takes over.

After several major outbreaks of illness caused by contaminated food, momentum built in Congress for fixing the system. The food industry, which worried that bad publicity about Americans dying from tainted spinach was giving them a black eye, got behind the new law.

But did the food industry really want what could be tough new rules and regulations, or was the law simply intended as a symbol to assure the public the food supply was safe? Given what's happened to the law in the last few years, it's easy to conclude that symbolism may have been the goal all along.

In a story that may make you think twice before licking an ice cream cone, Politico

food policy reporter Helena Bottemiller Evich, has told a sorry tale of the food safety law, including reference to the recall, earlier this year, of the entire ice cream inventory of Blue Bell Creameries. This and other deadly incidents have come five years after former Iowa Sen. Tom Harkin declared, "This legislation means that parents who tell their kids to eat their spinach can be assured it won't make them sick."

When the law was passed, the Congressional Budget Office estimated that the FDA, which regulates most of the country's food supply, would need an increase of \$116 million to its \$4 billion budget each year for five years in order to do the job the law intended. In 2012 even though the Obama administration asked for \$183 million, Congress approved only \$46 million.

After that the administration asked for smaller increases, although this year it has asked for \$109 million, closer to the estimate. But Evich told me appropriations bills moving through Congress would result in less than a \$46 million boost for the FDA.

FDA deputy commissioner Michael Taylor told Politico. "At this juncture, (the law) either succeeds...or it falls off the rails."

Evich reported the coalition that backed the law has walked away from funding it. She told me, "Who is actually going in and asking for money is a very short list." In other words, very few groups are using their political capital to wring out more money for more inspectors or are pushing the FDA for rules that make the law a reality.

The FDA has yet to issue regulations implementing the anti-contamination standards

that were supposed to make it harder to get sick from bad food.

Does the country still need to beef up its food inspection program? A visit to the website of Food Safety News helps answer that question. From July 1 through July 25, it reported 11 recalls listed for foods consumed by humans and several more for pets. Some of those for consumers involved millions of pounds of chicken products that put them at risk for salmonella poisoning, spices found on supermarket shelves, cashew nuts and bags of fruit and nuts also linked to salmonella; and pickles and sauces recalled for potential botulism risk.

In the absence of more forceful regulation which is not likely anytime soon, you'll have to be careful about your food choices checking with Food Safety News to see what foods have been recalled. And when you hear some politician talk about cutting government spending, think about who will be hurt. As the food safety fiasco shows, real people do die from government penny-pinching.

## Income Eligibility Guidelines Announced for Lunch Programs

The Nebraska Department of Education's Nutrition Services office has announced the Income Eligibility Guidelines for free and reduced price meals for persons unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch, Breakfast, Special Milk and Child and Adult Care Food Programs.

Participating schools, child care and adult care centers have a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Application forms are being given to all households with a letter to parents, guardians or adult participants. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school or agency. Additional copies are available from the school principals or agency administrator. The information provided on the application will be used to determine eligibility and may be verified at any time during the year by school or other program officials.

For the school or agency officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information on the application: names of all household members; the last four digits of the social security number of an adult household member or a statement that the household member does not have one; total monthly household income by source; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. Children who are members of Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) assistance units or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) households are automatically eligible to receive free meals. Participants at adult care centers receiving Food Stamps, FDPIR, SSI or Medicaid are automatically eligible to receive free meals.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

The same meals will be made available to all enrolled participants regardless of race, color, sex, age, national origin or disability, and there is no discrimination in the course of the meal service. Nonpricing programs provide meals at no separate charge. Pricing programs provide free and reduced price meals to those meeting the approved eligibility criteria. Persons who believe they have been treated unfairly in receiving food services for any of these reasons should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Participants from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.


