Home health ongoing hospital budget issue

After a brief discussion at the Thayer County Health Services board meeting June 29, home health care remained in the budget for another year, but CEO Michael Burcham said the service continues to wedge a negative \$261,000 into hospital operations.

Heartland Home Health nurses and a certified nursing assistant travel to patients in hospital vehicles across a wide area, known as windshield time.

Medicare doesn't reimburse for mileage and one home visit could rack up over 100 miles. To help alleviate the problem last year, the hospital board's auditor recommended TCHS apply for a shortage designation area, which would give the hospital access to the rural health clinic benefit cost reimbursement.

"As much as we love taking care of patients, we need to provide it more efficiently," Burcham said.

He said he initially went through the regional office of the Center for Medicare/Medicaid Services to apply for the designation, but he was kicked back to the state, along with a large

file substantiating TCHS's position as the primary home health provider in Thayer County, a rural landscape with miles of terrain between home stops.

Mike Fierberg, a public affairs officer for CMS, said TCHS probably wouldn't receive the designation because it isn't the only home health care provider for the county.

"He may be the only one physically located in Thayer County, but he is not the only one licensed," Fierberg said, adding three home health agencies are licensed to provide services in the county.

But Burcham said one of those facilities, Good Samaritan in Hastings, barely eats into Thayer County with its one visit to Byron.

Jefferson County won't cross the county line and Tabitha may have seen a patient in Carleton, Burcham said.

When he contacted Tabitha, Burcham was told to send them information on the visits Heartland schedules because Tabitha wasn't sure they could help.

"We are committed to taking care of those patients. That has never been the question. Medicare has provided an avenue to help us, but we are battling for the designation spot," Burcham said.

He said he has contacted Sen. Deb Fischer's and Congressman Adrian Smith's offices. Those contacts and Burcham's pursuit for legal advice should make for a healthy package as TCHS pleads its case in the near future.

He said a formal presentation will be ready in about three months.

Burcham was informed via a June 24 email from CMS he could submit a formal request for Visiting Nurse Services with TCHS's leverage be-

ing the government's third criteria for unreasonable traveling distance based on climate and terrain.

In that same email, CMS relayed the state's decision no home health shortage exists in Thayer County.

While home health care eats up miles, "medical tourism" chews into the revenue that could be for the hospital.

Medical tourism is when people receive care at other hospitals, such as in Lincoln and Omaha, or closer to home in Hastings, and are told where to receive their follow-up care, which, unfortunately, is typically not their hometown hospital.

"That is money that this county loses when patients seek health services outside of Thayer County Health Services. It cost the community money," Burcham said. "Being a small rural hospital is a disadvantage."

Wellness center nears completion

Ken Korff visited the up and coming rehab and wellness center at Thayer County Health Services in early June to see the progress.

His brother, Glenn Korff, lifted the center into reality with his \$6.9 million gift to Thayer County Health Services Foundation. Construction on the center began last year in August.

Korff was impressed with the facility, hospital CEO Michael Burcham said.

Advertising brochures were nearly finished last week and the hospital is eager to promote the center's wellness amenities, including a warm, zero-entry pool that surrounds a therapy pool. A current will flow around the therapy pool for users to walk against it. The therapy pool will be open to the public.

Users of the facility will enter through the main entrance on the north side. Computerized identification badges will be issued to members.

The approximate \$18,000-square foot building will house a new dietitian, physical therapist and assistants and new wellness director.

"Therapists and assistants work in the wellness center to see patients through from beginning of therapy to the end," Burcham said.

An exercise area will sit in the middle of the main room, surrounded by a soft-surface track and in view of the therapist's office. Free weights will be located near the aerobics room, along with cardio equipment, bikes and treadmills.

In the aerobic's room, a computer kiosk funded by a grant, will pull up virtual workout classes.

The rehab and wellness service will see patients through, from the beginning of their medical needs to the end.

A patient who has suffered a stroke and needs occupational therapy, will be reintroduced to everyday functions, such as cooking in the center's full kitchen.

The center is close to completion with physical therapy set to move in at the end of July.

Burcham said the membership fees are set competitively low.

"We've got a lot of neat things coming," he said.

The hospital purchased Good Life Fitness, which is set to close Aug. 1, and sold it to Hebron Bible Church.

Burcham said the existing church will be converted to a childcare and early childhood development facility.

"It's a win-win for everyone," Burcham said.

130 Years Ago

E. A. Crane and F. M. Braidwood, from Braidwood, Ill., have rented the new Coon building, and will open a general merchandise store as soon as the building is completed. They are from Dr. Easton's old home, and are stirring and enterprising business men.

The weather has been very hot during the week, the thermometer showing from 98 degrees to 104 degrees in the shade.

Geo. Loeber has staked off the plot for a fine residence on the corner of Eads Ave. and Fifth St., north of C. B. Coon's.

Attention is called to the legal notices in this issue, calling for special election to vote on the bond proposition for the benefit of the C.R.I. & P.R.R.

Mr. Brown, attorney of the C.R.I. & P. Railroad, states that if the bond proposition carries in Thayer County, the road will be built according to the proposition.

Ed Armstrong, living on the south fork of Spring Creek, has the largest and finest potatoes we have seen this season, and July 2d he brought a stock of corn to town that measured eight feet and four inches in height.

Schafer & Burden, proprietors of the Friedensau Mill, have for some time contemplated reconstructing their mill to the roller process. Mr. Burden and Mr. Malone, the miller, went east last week to purchase machinery, and returned last Saturday having secured the necessary outfit. The work will be commenced in about a week and it will take about a month to complete the work. They have secured the centrifugal bolting system, and when completed will be able to compete with any mill in the country. They are running day and night and have more work than they can do.

Fred Harms of Gilead is threshing the first wheat of the season, testing 63 lbs. and yielding much better than expected.

W. H. Dow of Pleasant Plain was a caller last Friday and in commenting on the fine wheat crop, recalled the time when it was through only spring wheat could be raised in Nebraska and that an uncertain crop. Seasons have changed as well as methods of farming in the last quarter of a century.

Mrs. Henry Pape, residing on a farm northeast of Bruning, died Tuesday afternoon.

Hebron was patriotically quiet on the 4th. Two-hundred-eighty-five tickets were sold from here to attend the celebration at Geneva where the Hebron band was the chief attraction. Two trainloads went up, and the night train returned with standing room at a premium. The tired crowd reached home about 2 o'clock in the morning. There is said to have been about 700 passengers on this run.

In the government drawing for lands at the Crow Indian reservation at Billings, Mont., last Monday, numbers were drawn by the following Hebron citizens: T. C. Marshall, L. H. Halfman, O. A. Ashbrook, T. D. Rafer and C. S. Macey of Carleton.

A crowd of small boys and some larger ones were kept busy hunting nickels and dimes in front of Peterson's store when the boardwalk was torn up Tuesday. The report that a ten dollar gold piece had been lost through the cracks added zeal to the sweeping and digging for coins.

Hubbell: Last Thursday evening one of O. W. Blakesley's twin babies was playing in the barnyard and fell into the 50-barrel water tank. Rayburn Edwards was not far away and he heard the splash of the water, and thinking it might be the baby he ran as fast as he could to the tank and found her there. He got her out and they all worked hard to bring her to. She soon recovered, leaving no bad results, only a very badly frightened family to think what might have happened if Rayburn had not been near.

Deshler: The electric light power house is now in the course of erection. Under the skillful manipulation of W. F. Irwin the building will soon be completed. The architectural design is taken from the old Roman styles, and when completed will be quite an ornament. A letter from Mr. Gotrox from New York City informs us that all machinery

has been purchased and is now enroute.
