### Sales Tax...

Thayer County collected \$179,764.95 in sales tax for the month of March 2014 after showing a .6 percent increase in net taxable sales over March 2013. For March 2014, the county had \$3,268,447 in net taxable sales - up from \$3,247,704 in 2013.

According to Hebron Clerk Jean Nagey, the City of Hebron collected \$14,527.55 in motor vehicle and sales taxes on net taxable sales of \$1,684,923 for the month of March. That shows a decrease of 1.9 percent in net taxable sales over March 2013. The motor vehicle tax (\$2,954.45) goes into the street fund, while the remainder (\$11,573.10) goes into the sales tax fund.

The Department of Revenue releases figures approximately three months later than the actual month being profiled. April 2014 figures will be released at the beginning of July.

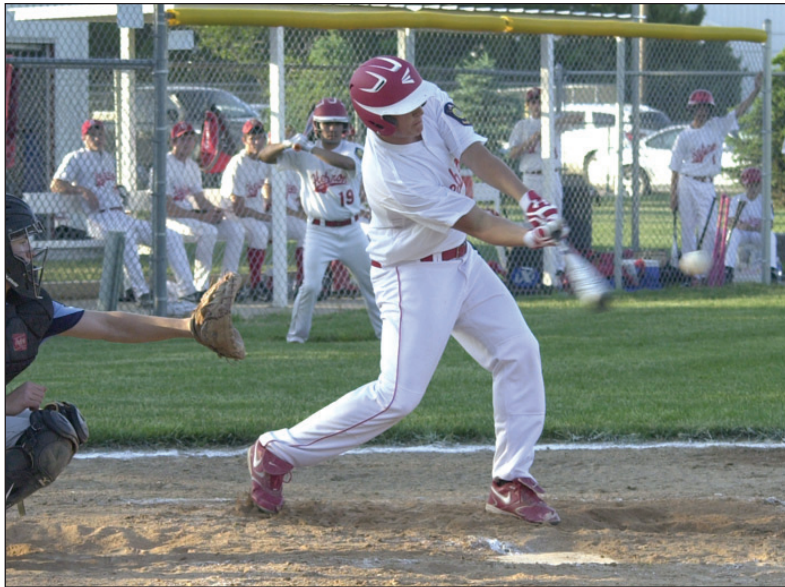
### Livestock Friendly...

## Legion Seniors to host wood bat tourney this weekend

### 2014 state tourney to be held here

The unmistakable "TING" of aluminum bats hitting the pliable leather of baseballs seems to be the perfect sound to ring in the warm days of summer. That sound has been resounding throughout the Hebron Sports Complex for the last three weeks as area youth take to the diamonds.

The Hebron Senior Legion games are also well underway; the squad has already played six games and is currently 5-1. Coached by Mark Hintz, the team is getting ready to host the second annual wood bat tournament dedicated to the fight against cancer. Funds collected from the event will be donated to the American Cancer Society during its annual Relay for Life event in Hebron on July 25.

As last year, pink bats will be in use for the tourney. Locals and area busi-

nesses can sponsor the bats, which will be signed by all the players, and when the tournament is over, those sponsors get to keep them. "Even if they're broken," said tournament organizer Loren Goedeken. "Last year the sponsors were more than happy to accept their bats, even the broken ones, after the tourney."

Six teams are expected to participate in the June 14 and 15 tournament including Bruning-Davenport-Shickley, Concordia, Doniphan-Trumbull, Geneva, Sutton and Hebron. Coach Hintz said games are scheduled to start at 8 a.m. Saturday with the final game at 8:30 p.m. "We'll play six games on the first day," he said. "Then we'll have four on Sunday." Games will begin Sunday at noon with the championship match held at 7:30 p.m. There are still pink bats available if anyone

## School board focus on safety, closing primary

The Thayer Central Board of Education informed about 35 visitors last night that the district's plan is to move forward with safety issues at the school as well as campus unification. The question, however, is whether to make the improvements a bond issue or use the building fund to pay for the improvements.

"A month ago I said I'd never go through this again," said Superintendent Drew Harris in reference to seeking a bond issue for facility improvements. The district's previous attempts fell to narrow defeats in primary elections in 2013 and again this year. "But I think it's the right thing for the kids. We need to make these improvements one way or another. Our school is not safe."

Harris said the district will be taking some safety measures this summer to ready the school for fall classes including installation of keyless door entries and door buzzers in all the school buildings. He also said the installation of cameras, stop signs, barricades and speed bumps in the parking lot will help, but other issues still need to be addressed such as tornado shelters and a safer way for children to cross the parking lot between buildings during school hours.

The board would like to see the addition of classrooms at the main campus in order to permanently bring all the students to one area. And while options are available to fix the primary building to keep preschool kids at that location, or make it safe to keep the youngest elementary kids there, members of the board were united in wanting to close the building down.

Creating a plan to incorporate these safety measures would not take much time to accomplish, said board member Curt Mumm noting the board's current plan can easily be edited for these specific areas. "We

could have a plan very soon, but we need to know if this should be a bond issue or if we should budget for it. I don't want to go to a bond again unless I know there's a good chance of it passing."

Mumm asked for a show of hands if there was support for new classrooms, tornado shelters and possibly closing the primary building. Nearly everyone in the room raised their hands.

Any mention of a new gymnasium was quickly squelched during the meeting. "We aren't going to visit that issue," Harris said. "We are concentrating on safety and new classrooms."

How the board would pay for the improvements was left to debate as a plan of action was needed first. "If we went to a bond," Mumm said, "we could be breaking ground next spring. If we budget for it, we'll have to wait a little longer." Mumm added that the board will likely budget for necessary improvements in September, but if a bond were to pass, budgeted funds would be used to reduce the bond.

Harris said it was too late to put anything on the ballot for this year's general election, but the district could hold its own mail-in vote in December at the soonest. "The district would be responsible for the cost," he said.

First and foremost, however, is the need for a plan that focuses on safety measures and campus unification. Board members would like to form a committee of interested individuals to work with them and school administration to address these needs. If anyone is interested in serving on the committee, contact Drew Harris at Thayer Central Community Schools.

"Also, we need everyone to get the word out," Mumm said. "Use social media, talk to people, let everyone know we need to make our school safe."

## City approves community center plan

The Hebron City Council approved plans for the Stastny Community Center during its regular meeting June 2. JEO Consulting Group senior project manager Marvin Larson presented the finalized outline of the 10,935 square foot pre-manufactured metal building to the board and went over details during the meeting.

Cost range for the building and site is between \$1.6 million and \$1.8 million, he said, while total construction and furnishings will range from \$1.8

million to \$2 million.

In a breakdown of cost estimates, the site, including grading and landscaping, parking for 52 vehicles, sidewalks, site utilities and irrigation and sodding, would cost approximately \$208,000. The structure, including storage addition, covered patio and canopy and a covered drive would run approximately \$1.36 million and special items, including the kitchen and bar equipment and furnishings would run approximately \$300,000.

The plan also includes a layout for additional parking; choice one includes an area with an additional 40 stalls and choice two allows for a third area with 45 stalls. The council can decide if they want one, two, both or neither. Additional cost for both would run approximately \$106,000.

Councilman Jay Bauer, who also serves on the community center committee said the exterior colors of the building (ash gray and polar white with charcoal trim) will blend into the interior design and scheme. "The floor will be polished cement and the tile has different colors that match the brick and colors outside. It'll look really nice," he said, although stressing the fact that he voluntarily ceded color choosing to other com-

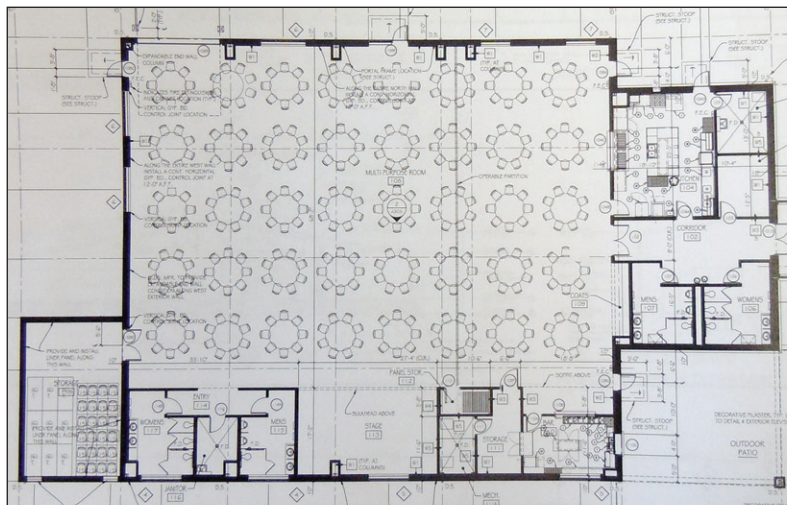
mittee members.

The multi-purpose room is large enough to hold 40 round 8-seat tables or approximately 320 people. A stage, storage area, restrooms and the bar line the south side of the room. A second set of restrooms, kitchen and outdoor patio are located on the east side of the room just beyond the entrance vestibule.

As for landscaping, while the grass and sprinklers are included in the base price, Larson said, bushes, trees or other such vegetation is not.

The City will receive project bids until 2 p.m., on July 3. Approval of bids will be made at the July 7 City Council meeting which begins at 6:30 p.m.

1884 130 Years Ago

It is 97 degrees Fahrenheit in the shade.

J.M. Bell of Belvidere has leased the Parker House in Alexandria for a year.

The sad news of the death of Mrs. H.W. Cornell of Belvidere is received.

Farmers report the stand of corn excellent and the prospect for a heavy crop good.

A kiln of brick, containing between 70 and 70 thousand, is being burned at Hubbell.

One of the largest in the county is the 300 acre pasture, L.P. Luce of Hubbell precinct is enclosing.

A board of trade among the business men here would add largely to the success of the town and the advantage of its members.

J.W. Cook of Sarpy County has become a resident of Thayer County. He is the owner of 1,120 acres in Town 2 Range 1 in this county.

The Belvidere Cornet Band will have a strawberry festival.

An infuriated zephyr with the pretensions of a young, half-grown tornado visited the county. It blew down one side of Webb's store, which had just been erected. Damage nominal.

The new Sherman Hotel is now rapidly approaching completion and the landlord Ebling is fitting up his rooms with new furniture. To him belongs the honor of building the first three-story house in this county for hotel purposes. It is 27x40 feet in size, and contains 19 sleeping rooms. In connection with his old hotel, he now has ample facilities for taking care of a large number of guests.

The graves of the following Union soldiers in the cemetery here were marked with flags and ornamented floral tributes on Decoration Day: James B. Smith, John Orr, Samuel Johnson, Joseph D. Austin, E. Raymond, Andy Lawson, R. Palmer, Samuel Daner, John G. Rice, and James bishop.

Bell Brothers two miles west of Leland's Mill have a calf with a remarkable displacement of one of its principal organs, its heart hanging in a bag suspended from its neck in front, where its action can readily be seen. The calf is doing well, notwithstanding its curious appearance.

A gentleman from Red Cloud by the name of Houghton has leased the old post office building, and will soon open a tailor shop. He will also carry a large stock of ready-made clothing, hats and caps and gents furnishing goods.

A first-class baseball club has been organized here, but as the secretary has not reported the name, organization and officers of the club, we are unable to give particulars.

Our attention has been called to the new Champion double-acting force pump placed in the well opposite Green's livery stable for the benefits of the public, by Bradley & Co. It is handsome in appearance, works easily, and is a great improvement over the ordinary pump.

W.H. Mitchell and wife of St. Joseph, Mo., are now residents of Hebron. Mr Mitchell is an employee of the Journal office and expects to reside here permanently.

Some time since, the government made an appropriation to furnish tombstones for soldiers' graves. They can be had by making a requisition, and we hope that ere long every loyal soldier's grave in this county and state will be thus designated.

Last Sunday at about 1 o'clock, the startling alarm of fire was given. It was soon discovered that an addition to the residence of F.J. Hendershot was on fire. The structure had been built by E.T. Hanlon as a kitchen and storeroom until his residence should be completed. Immediately on the alarm being given, Mr. Hendershot and another man, with superhuman strength, broke a connecting pipe from his tank to the well, and obtained an ample supply of water with which citizens and the members of Rescue Hook and Ladder Company saved Mr. Hendershot's elegant residence from destruction of household goods, clothing, etc., stored in the addition, will

not be less than \$300. Mr. Hendershot's damage was appraised at \$40 and is covered by insurance.

Dr. Piggott has been squandering some more money. This time he purchased the northwest quarter of section 9, township 4, range 2. This swells the number to 16, and now the doctor says he believes there is luck in odd numbers, and he will try to make it 17 before long.

1894

120 Years Ago

Work is being vigorously prosecuted on city well number 3, well number 2, having caved in so badly that it was abandoned. The new well is located about 30 feet northeast of well number 2 and is being put down the same way. The brick wall, however, is heavier than the former wall. A new centrifugal pump has been received. We understand it has not been decided to move the pump house to well number 3 which would lead to the abandonment of well number 1, and the drainage feed pipe laid last year by W.M. Barger.

The circus here was attended by a lot of confidence men and gamblers who swindled the people right and left. One man who owes this paper several years of subscriptions lost a large sum of money by the shell game.

While a number of boys were near the river, an accident occurred which may carry serious if not fatal results. It appears that Earle Smith, a boy about 13 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Madison Smith, and a son about the same age of Mr. and Mrs. W.L. Thompson, had revolvers. They were sitting together on the ground. As the Thompson boy arose, his revolver was discharged, in some manner, the ball entered the hip of the Smith boy and passing downwards. The ball has not yet been found, and blood-poisoning may result.

Liberty Corners Sunday School now has a membership of 76 and celebrated Children's Day.

L.J. Harvey succeeded Mrs. L.C. Jones as editor of the Deshler Herald. He gets out a bright and newsy local newspaper and this paper cordially wishes him success.

Clarence Fowler and Earnest Correll are expected home from the state university. They will come on their bicycles and expect to make the distance of 100 miles a day.

Cards are out announcing the marriage ceremony at the Brethren Church at Carleton of J.E. Shearer and Miss Stella M. Eastabrooks.

Married at the home of the bride's parents at Hebron, James M. McConnell of Deshler to Miss Nettie Hendershot of Hebron.

W.P. Burt has bought the interest of Herbert Stewart in the firm of Burt & Stewart, painters and paper hangers, and is now sole proprietor.

The hard times do not seem to affect our city much from the amount of building and the different improvements that are being made.

Tehman and Herman Wolf finished a well to the depth of 81 feet in the northwest part of our city, doing the work in one day's time.

Belvidere

Burglars entered A.P. Hazard's store by taking out a pane of glass in one of the windows. They secured \$18.75 in money besides a revolver, gold watch and opera glass. The next morning one of the drawers to his safe was found under the G.I. railroad bridge west of town. A reward of \$50 is being offered for the arrest and conviction of the guilty parties.

1904

110 Years Ago

Hebron is showing the teachers a good time. Even Canal Street got on a tear in their honor.

The framework for Wm. Green's livery stable is nearing completion, and will soon be ready for brick veneering.

The new sidewalk from the corner to the courthouse is so full of curves that 'tis a delight

to the fellow that's drunk. But the sober individual, competent to walk straight, considers the extra distance a needless waste of time and expense in "getting there."

The flood-gates of heaven were opened and the dam at Canal Street held - but it would have been better if it had given way. The immense volume of water coming like a turbulent river down the street, had to have an outlet, so cut a new channel east of the dam, making the street worse than before it was fixed. It seems useless to attempt to control or curb the flow. The drainage from the hills, north of Hebron, must have an outlet, and it would seem the better part of wisdom to wall up the sides and bridge it over, deepening and straightening the channel. Fairbury thus fixed a viaduct street, similar to ours, and has no more trouble. Of course the cost would be considerable - but the present "fixin's" are costing much without accomplishing results.

The Rock Island railroad has discontinued its Sunday train on his branch, but will run occasional Sunday excursions to Omaha.

The Watt's Orchestra of Hebron gave a concert at Deshler which certainly deserved a better attendance. The boys played well, and it is a pity that some of our boys outside behaved like rascals.

1914

100 Years Ago

The river was out of its banks and boys were catching carp in the pastures.

Mrs. Lucia O. Case, state suffrage organizer, will deliver an address in an automobile on the streets in our city. During the week she plans to effect organizations in the various towns of the county.

Wm. H. Bull, aged 82, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C.D. Apley. The remains were shipped to Rockwell, Iowa.

Canal Street was a rip-roaring surging stream of many muddy waters, and numerous pedestrians had to go home with all sails spread.

The people of Hubbell showed their patriotism by placing a 50 foot flag pole in the center of their street at the end of the block north of the depot, and have purchased a fine big flag which will swing from the top of the pole on Decoration Day.

90 Years Ago

The Chick Boyes Players Company made its last appearance for the season in "Her Father's Sin," at the Majestic. Chick left the first of the week for Fremont for a big tent for the summer season and will travel Nebraska and Kansas.

Hebron's new mayor, G.H. Cropsy, took charge of city affairs at the regular meeting.

Mrs. E.L. Miller arrived in Alexandria from Eldora, Iowa. Her husband, Dr. Miller, having recently bought out the dental office here.

## COUNTY COURT Fines Paid by June 4, 2014

Court costs \$48.00 unless otherwise stated. Probation costs also include \$30 enrollment fee and \$25 per each month on probation. Chemical testing costs are \$5 per month on probation.

Goedeken, who heads up the Friends of American Legion Baseball group said a lot of work has gone into getting the field ready for the event. ## Reducing Fall Risk Factors

Thayer County Health Services works closely with all staff members to provide the highest quality, safest care for patients with a specific focus on reducing the risk of inpatient falls, a costly and serious adverse event in hospitals.

Falls have a negative impact on patients' health and quality of life and represent a significant cost to society. As such, decreasing the incidence of patient falls is a priority of the federal government, regulatory agencies, hospital quality improvement and risk management programs, and patient safety research.

Although reducing patient fall risk is often viewed as a nursing issue, successful fall risk reduction programs have input from a variety of health care professionals including nursing, physical therapy, pharmacy, medicine, quality improvement/risk management, as well as the support of hospital leadership.

Facts about falls: The risk of falling increases with age and is greater for women than for men.

Two-thirds of those who experience a fall will fall again within six months.

A decrease in bone density contributes to falls and resultant injuries.

Failure to exercise regularly results in poor muscle tone, decreased strength, and loss of bone mass and flexibility.

The causes for falls are known as risk factors. Although no single risk factor causes all falls, the greater the number of risk factors to which an individual is exposed, the greater the probability of a fall and the more likely the results of the fall will threaten the person's independence.

Many of these risk factors are preventable. As obvious as it may sound, a lack of knowledge about risk factors and how to prevent them, contribute to many falls. Some

people believe that falls are a normal part of aging, and as such are not preventable. Lack of knowledge leads to lack of preventive action, resulting in falls.

The following tips are things patients can do to help reduce their own inpatient risk factors:

Always follow your physician's orders and the nurses' instructions regarding whether you must stay in bed or require assistance to go to the bathroom.

Use your call light to ask for assistance. Ask for help if you feel dizzy or weak getting out of bed or out of the bathroom.

Remain lying or seated while waiting for assistance. Please be patient. Someone will respond as promptly as possible.

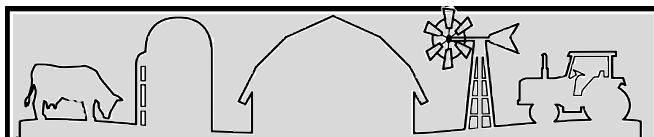
If you must get up without waiting for help, sit for a moment before standing. Then rise carefully and walk slowly.

Do not lean or support yourself on your bedside table or IV poles, as they may roll.

Side rails and alarms are used as a reminder to stay in bed and are designed to ensure your safety. Do not tamper with alarms or reminder devices.

Thayer County Health Services remains committed to patient safety. We work to educate our staff and patients on ways to reduce the risk factors for inpatient falls and educating our patients on what they can do, within their own homes, to prevent falls.

## City seeks pre-applicants to implement housing rehabilitation program

The City of Hebron is requesting residents needing financial assistance in completing housing rehabilitation projects to submit a pre-application by July 11, 2014. The pre-applications are being requested from potential program participants to determine a market for financing.

The City anticipates submitting an application for 2014 to the Nebraska Department of Economic Development for financial assistance to continue an Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program for the City of Hebron.

If the City's application to NDED is approved, eligible homeowners may receive assistance to make improvements ranging from \$5,000 to \$25,000 to their homes. If funded, eligible repairs include health and safety issues and all major systems which would bring a property to accepted housing standards and extend the effective life of the house for another twenty years.

Eligibility for the program is

determined by several criteria including owning and occupying a single-family residence within the City of Hebron and meeting annual household income limits.

The program is funded through the community development block grant (CDBG) administered by the Nebraska Department of Economic Development and will be implemented in accordance with the federal fair housing law (the fair housing amendments act of 1988).

### Summer Alert

Each summer we hear tragic reports of children dying from overheated temperatures and dehydration after being left in a vehicle unattended. It is critical for parents of young children not to underestimate the dangers involved. Recently there have been several television announcements warning of this danger.

According to eXtension.org and <http://www.safekids.org> caregivers should realize that:

- On a sunny day, temperatures of only 60 degrees Fahrenheit can turn a car into an oven, especially when the car is parked and the windows are closed. Dark colored seats also attract and increase heat conditions.

- Outside air temperature in the nineties can heat up within 20 minutes to dangerous levels of 125 degrees in a closed vehicle. Within 40 minutes, that same temperature can rise to 140 degrees.

- Young children's core body temperature rises three to five times faster than an adult's. Because heat affects children more quickly and severely than adults, children are especially vulnerable to brain damage and death.

Some Simple Steps To Protect Young Children

- Lock your vehicles at all times, doors and trunk, even in the driveway or garage. Young children can climb inside and become trapped, unable to get out.

- Never leave a child alone in a parked car, even with the windows down.

- Teach children not to play in or around cars. Keep car keys out of reach and out of sight of children.

- If your vehicle has child-resistant locks, teach older children how to unlock the doors.

- Plan to take children with you while running errands or make needed arrangements for them to be left in a caring environment with a competent person.

- Consider contacting your car dealership to get your car fitted with a trunk release mechanism, if it does not already have one.

- Folding windshield shades can help keep the interior of a car from getting hot, but it does not make it safe for a child to be left inside.

- Heatstroke is a life-threatening condition. If you find a child in a parked car, call 911, and get air to the child, even if a window needs to be broken.
