Five TC businesses fail alcohol compliance checks

The Nebraska State Patrol (NSP) in conjunction with the Southeast Nebraska Coalition, conducted compliance checks at 11 retail outlets. During the checks conducted Saturday, June 2, five businesses in Thayer County were found to be non-compliant after selling alcohol to minors, for a non-compliant rate

of 45%. The retail outlets checked during the collaborative effort included convenience, liquor, and grocery stores as well as restaurants and bars. Those that **failed** the check: Betty's Place, 120 Main Street, Bruning. Base Hit Bar, 102 S. Maple Av-

enue, Davenport. Casey's General store #1576, 105 S. 13th Street, Hebron. Hebron Liquor Store, 248 S. 13th Street, Hebron. L & R Hitching Post, 362 D Street, Carleton. Those that **passed** the check: 81 Express, 1375 Dove Road,

Hebron. Bottle Shop, 123 N. 4th, Hebron. Brand X Saloon, 441 Lincoln Avenue, Hebron. Bruning Food Mart, 6206 Spur 85C, Bruning. Pioneer Inn, 302 Main St., Gilead. Toads Bar & Lounge, C Street,

Belvidere. Compliance checks are conducted to help communities determine the extent of the problem of alcohol sales as a source of youth access to alcohol. Local law enforcement conducts compliance checks to ensure that businesses are in compliance with the state's youth alcohol laws.

Pioneer Center fades to memory



The Hebron City Council officially changed the name of the old Pioneer Center to the Hebron Activity Center recently, but that isn't the only thing that's changed in the old clubroom. Nearly 50 volunteers working over 435 hours took the old community room down to bare wood then built the area back up once the electrical and plumbing issues were addressed. The Activity Center is expected to be finished by July 2.

Council changes Center's name to Hebron Activity Center

There's been lots of changes going on at the old Pioneer Center recently, including a new name. The Hebron City Council, on a suggestion from Center manager Howard Mills,

changed the name to the Hebron Activity Center during its regular meeting June 4, in hopes of making the new community meeting place sound more modern. "A new name for a new community center," Mills said. "Hebron Activity Center sounds up to date and lets the public know that the meeting room is open to everyone."

The City acquired the Center in 2010 after the last member of the Pioneer Club died. Howard and Sam Mills volunteer to manage the building keeping the restrooms clean and maintaining the kitchen and main living area for potential rentals. The City pays them a small fee to take care of custodial duties.

But, last year the Center was fated for destruction after a leaky roof caused inside water damage to the ceiling and what the council thought might have been the floor and support beams. And since the structure shares walls with buildings on either side, the cost to tear it down quickly skyrocketed to \$70,000.

Enter Chuck Fink, a local contractor who could see something no one else could. "I knew the walls were in pretty good shape," he said while installing insulation in the new ceiling last week. "And there was nothing wrong with the floor - just a few loose tiles that needed to be replaced."

Fink, who was attending an October 2011 council meeting for a sepa-

rate issue, told the city officials then that he thought the building could be repaired and made into a usable community center for far less than \$70,000. "For \$15,000, you can put on a rubber membrane roof to stop the leakage," he said. "Another \$2,500 for a suspended ceiling, \$7,000 to \$8,000 for a new furnace and electrical...I'm just saying, for \$70,000 you can tear it down and have nothing, or for less you can fix it and have a community center."

His idea sold the council and they immediately voted to save the building. Fink, who offered his construction services free of charge, also became the unofficial leader of the project and regularly updates the council as the job progresses.

"I really don't sit around very

well," he said while working at the Center last week. "I've never been one to sit around and watch t.v. I have to have something to do."

Fink said he's personally put in nearly 200 man hours rebuilding the community hall. He has regular volunteers who have helped him throughout, but appreciates everyone who has chipped in. "We needed a meeting place like this in Hebron," he said. "That's obvious, because Howard already has it rented four times in July."

Once the new roof was added, new heating and air conditioning as well as the replacement of all the old wiring gave Fink the go-ahead to start construction. So far he's replaced the

NRD Local Working Group Meeting Planned

A Local Working Group that provides advice on the priorities for many U.S. Department of Agriculture conservation programs will meet June 21 at the Little Blue NRD office beginning at 9:30 a.m. The Little Blue NRD office is located at 100 East 6th Street, Davenport.

The public is encouraged to attend and express natural resource concerns. Ideas generated from the public will help the U.S. Department of Agriculture tailor its natural resource programs to meet the needs identified locally.

There is a Local Working Group in each Natural Resources District (NRD). Membership on the Local Working Group includes federal, state, county, tribal or local government representatives according to Janet Valasek, district conservationist for the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) whose agency guides the Local Working Group.

"The Local Working Group recommends to the NRCS State Conservationist how conservation programs like the Environmental Quality

Incentives Program (EQIP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), or Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) would be used most effectively in their area. This recommendation can include special target areas, cost share rates on conservation programs, which conservation practices should have cost assistance, or how many dollars could be needed," said Miss Valasek. This work group allows local input into how federal dollars are spent, she said.

For example, in 2011, over \$50 million dollars was committed to farmers and ranchers statewide through NRCS conservation programs. These programs helped landowners and operators make natural resource improvements to their land, water, or wildlife. This funding was allocated according to the priorities set by the Local Working Group.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

The consumption of alcohol by our youth has reached a critical mass level nationally. Alcohol abuse affects our families and communities. Alcohol claims more lives than any other drug combined. It is the leading cause of traffic accidents, fatalities, crime, suicides, sexually transmitted diseases as well as decreasing our youths' scholastic and athletic abilities.

Communities across the United States have mobilized efforts to reduce the tragedies surrounding underage drinking and the consequences thereof; in the areas of prevention, treatment, enforcement and education. With that in mind, no single approach can solve the problem facing our communities. Each effort must be implemented and enforced consistently and fairly for positive changes to take place in our communities. Research reflects that effective and regular alcohol compliance checks (A.C.C.) will decrease sales to minors, decrease traffic accidents, decrease health problems and helps build awareness to the dangers of underage drinking.

The Southeast Nebraska Coalition and Thayer County Healthy Communities Coalition's goal is to provide education for community members and retailers in creating a safe environment and community for youth. Nebraska State Patrol received federal grant funds through the South-

east Nebraska Coalition to complete compliance checks. They were conducted by the Nebraska State Patrol to help identify the extent of the problem of alcohol sales to minors as a source of youth access to alcohol and to ensure that businesses are in compliance with the state's youth alcohol laws. The most recent check provides a benchmark for businesses and hopefully all businesses in the county will pass any future checks.

The Southeast Nebraska Coalition and TCHCC recommend that individuals who serve alcohol become trained in Responsible Beverage Server Training (RBST). The training helps to ensure that there is education on reducing alcohol-related problems at the point of sale. The training teaches employees how to check id's, spot fake id's, learn Nebraska laws and policies, stop over-service to intoxicated customers, build relationships with law enforcement and more.

The Southeast Nebraska Coalition and TCHCC are committed to continue helping businesses and community members understand the risks and dangers of underage drinking. The coalition will continue to be in touch to see how they can best support your efforts in keeping Thayer County safe for our youth.

Got Milk?

UNL Extension Nutrition Specialist Lisa Fanazen-Castle says that only 30 percent of Americans meet their recommended intake of calcium. The U.S. Surgeon General's office predicted that by 2020, half of all Americans older than 50 will be at risk for fractures from osteoporosis and low bone mass.

June is National Dairy Month and dairy foods can help close the gap. Dairy foods supply not only calcium, but also potassium, magnesium and vitamin A, which are nutrients of which most Americans don't get enough.

About 85-90 percent of adult bone mass is acquired by age 18 in girls and 20 in boys. Building strong bones during childhood and adolescence can help prevent osteoporosis later in life.

Current recommendations show that children two to three years old should get two cups of dairy foods daily, children four to eight years old should get two and one-half cups daily, and males and females nine years and older should get three cups daily. This includes low-fat and fat-free milk, as well as cheese and yogurt, since these foods are

also valuable and tasty sources of essential nutrients.

Research also shows that enjoying three cups of low-fat and fat-free milk, cheese or yogurt each day as part of a balanced diet may help maintain a healthy weight. At least 45 observational studies exploring eating patterns and body weight found dairy foods played a positive role in healthy weight.

Studies show dairy foods, when consumed as part of a healthy diet, improve overall diet quality and may help reduce the risk of osteoporosis, hypertension, obesity, colon cancer and metabolic syndrome.

What if you have indigestion after drinking milk or eating dairy products? If you avoid milk because of lactose intolerance, there are still several ways to get calcium in your diet. You can choose alternatives lower in lactose or lactose-free such as cheese, yogurt, or lactose-free milk, or consume the enzyme lactase before consuming milk products. There are also calcium fortified juices, cereals, breads, soy beverages, or rice beverages available in stores.

National Men's Health Month

June is National Men's Health Month; a month to raise awareness about preventable health problems facing men. Health professionals know that early detection and treatment is critical when dealing with any preventable health issue. The challenge with most men is getting them to see a doctor at all, let alone on a regular basis.

All 10 of the 10 leading causes of death as defined by CDC affect men more than they affect women. The National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) reviewed the leading causes of death among men and found the majority of causes had links to preventable, lifestyle-related behaviors, such as poor nutrition and smoking.

In 1920 women lived on average, one year longer than men. Today men die, on average, six years before their female counterparts. Although there are many theories on this increase, the one key contributor may be the fact that women visit their doctor on a regular basis.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, women are 100 percent more likely to schedule an appointment for their annual examinations and preventive services than men. On average (excluding pregnancy-related visits) women make twice as many preventive care visits as men.

According to the CDC, the top seven risks that men face are heart disease, cancer, accidents, chronic lower respiratory diseases, stroke, type II diabetes and suicide. For prevention, the CDC emphasizes the importance of quitting smoking, staying active, following a healthy diet and to

getting regular checkups.

Recognizing and preventing men's health problems is not just a man's issue. Because of its impact on wives, mothers, daughters and sisters, men's health is truly a family issue. Some ways men's health can affect women:

- As of 2009, older women outnumber older men at 22.4 million women to 16.5 men

- Older women are three times more likely to be living alone and twice as likely to reside in a nursing home and more than twice as likely to live in poverty

- 7 out of 10 "baby boom" women will outlive their husbands and many can expect to be widows for 15-20 years. This is because women often marry men older than them.

What can be done to counter this pattern? Probably the biggest influence would be the women in their lives. It's a known fact that women have a strong influence on their family's health and lifestyle choices.

Another way to educate men may be through the internet. This gives men an anonymous way to access health information. By coupling these with workplace and community health programs, can go a long way toward encouraging healthier living among men. ceiling; combined the two old bathrooms into a new, larger and wheelchair accessible restroom; completely replaced the kitchen countertops and will add new cupboards and appliances; repaired, orange-pealed and painted the walls; replaced windows and doors; and is currently repairing broken tiles in the floor and insulating the ceiling.

"We're using all local businesses to get the job done," Fink said adding the current bills range around \$36,000. "That's far below the initial \$50,000 the city earmarked for the job. The government figures \$35 an hour for construction jobs, so I'd say the volunteers have saved the City of Hebron over \$15,000 in labor."

The Center, with its expected finish date of July 1, can be rented for \$80 a day and if the place is left as found, Mills added, renters receive a \$20 refund.

DHHS Helps Nebraskans Cool Down with Fans, Bill Payment Assistance

Facing the hot days of summer, fans and assistance in paying summer cooling bills are available to those who meet the qualifications for the two Department of Health and Human Services programs, according to Thomas Pristow, director of Children and Family Services.

DHHS has partnered with 43 organizations in 33 Nebraska communities to distribute fans to citizens. The recipients of the fans are determined by the organizations that distribute them, Pristow said.

Persons seeking a fan should call the telephone number of the organization nearest them for more information, he said.

The fans were purchased with funds from the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Administration for Children and Families, and the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services administers the funds, he said.

"We expect hundreds of fans will be provided across the state to help individuals and families who are most likely to be affected by the hot weather," Pristow said. "This is just one of many programs at DHHS that help people live better lives."

Funds also are available through the DHHS cooling program to assist low-income individuals and families with bill payments, Pristow said. Applications can be requested online at <http://www.ACCESSNebraska.ne.gov>, or by calling 1-800-383-4278, or any local DHHS office, he said.

To be eligible for funds, a person 70 years of age or older, or a person who is more susceptible to heat because of their medical condition must live in the household. The limit of a household's financial resources to qualify for the cooling program is

\$5,000, and the annual income limits are:

Household Size Income Limit: \$12,639, \$17,066, \$21,506, \$25,933, \$30,360, \$34,800, \$39,377, \$43,653, \$48,094, \$52,520 and each additional member, \$4,413.



ORDINANCE NO. 836

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEBRON, TO PROHIBIT THE POSSESSION OF DANGEROUS DOG BREEDS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS AND DEFINING CERTAIN BREEDS OF DOGS AS DANGEROUS; PROVIDE FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEBRON, THAYER COUNTY, NEBRASKA, AS FOLLOWS:

1. Section 6-123 of the Hebron Municipal Code shall hereafter provide as follows:

6-123. PROHIBITING THE POSSESSION OF DANGEROUS DOG BREEDS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS AND DEFINING CERTAIN BREEDS AS DANGEROUS. It shall be unlawful in the city to keep, harbor, maintain or have in a person's possession or control any dog whose breeding has been deemed as dangerous. Dog breeds which are deemed dangerous are as follows:

(a) Pit Bull dog.

(b) The Bull Terrier breed of dogs.

(c) The Staffordshire Bull terrier breed of dogs.

(d) The American Pit Bull Terrier breed of dogs.

(e) The American Staffordshire Terrier breed of dogs.

(f) Any Chows.

(g) Any Dobermans.

(h) Any Rottweiler

(i) Any Wolf or Wolf Hybrids.

(j) Dogs of mixed breed or of other breed than above listed which breed or mixed breed is known as pit bulls, pit bull dogs or pit bull terriers.

(k) Any dog which has the appearance and characteristics of being predominantly of the breed of Bull Terrier, American Staffordshire Terrier; any other breed commonly known as pit bulls, pitbull dogs or pit bull terriers; or a combination of any of these breeds.

(l) Any trained attack dog.

2. Section 6-124 of the Hebron Municipal Code shall hereafter provide as follows:

6-124. VIOLATION; PENALTY. Any person who shall violate or refuse to comply with any provision of Article 1, Chapter 6 of the Hebron Municipal Code (§§6-101 through 6-123, inclusive), shall be guilty of an infraction and subject to a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) per infraction. Each animal not maintained in accordance with the provisions of said article shall constitute an individual infraction. A new violation shall be deemed to have been committed every twenty-four (24) hours of such failure to comply.

3. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance and hereby repealed.

FSA County Committee Nomination Period Underway

The Thayer County Farm Service Agency is currently accepting nominations for this year's County Committee Election. "Producers who are eligible voters are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by August 1, 2012, for the county Farm Service Agency (FSA) committee election ballot," said County Executive Director Jay Van-Westen.

This year's FSA county committee election will be conducted in LAA No. 2 from November 5 to December 3, 2012, by mail ballot. Thayer County producers from this area have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve their farm community on the FSA county committee. Producers from LAA No. 2 are encouraged to petition for individuals they feel would do a good job as a FSA committee member. "FSA committees are essential in the administration of farm programs," Mr. Van-Westen said, "and we welcome all valid petitions."

To be eligible to serve on a Farm Service Agency county committee a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate. Producers may nominate themselves or others and organizations representing

minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign the nomination form FSA-669A. The form and other valuable information about FSA county committee elections are available online at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections> or you may visit your local FSA office to obtain a copy. Nomination forms for the 2012 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by close of business on August 1.

FSA county committee members make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other important agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. In Nebraska, committees consist of three to 11 members who are elected by eligible producers.

Anyone wishing to nominate a producer for the county FSA committee election may contact the county office for details, including eligibility requirements. The opportunity to nominate, vote, and be elected to office is guaranteed to a producers regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, marital status or disability.
